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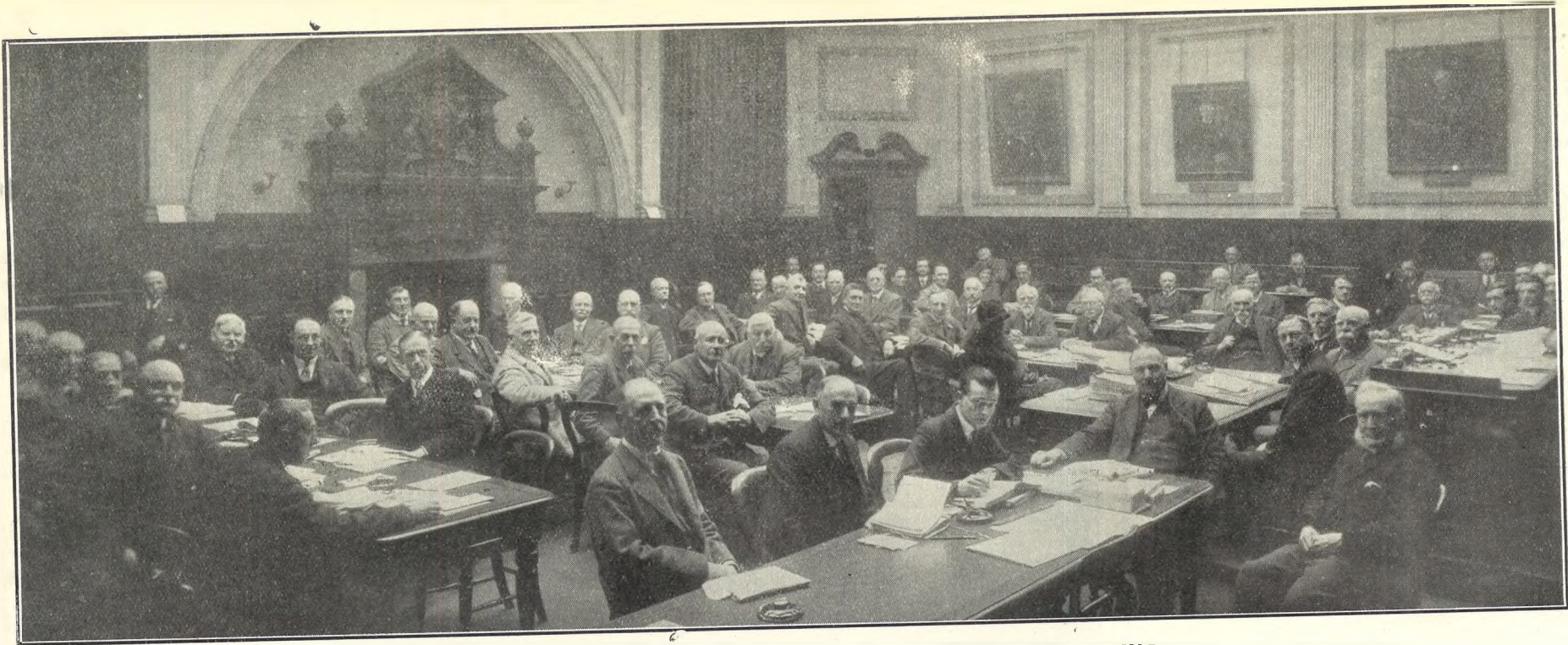
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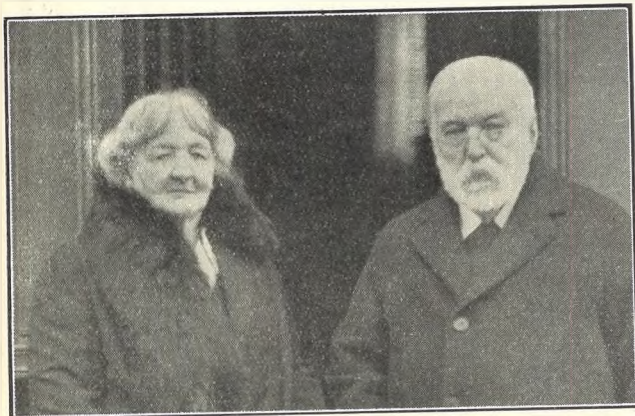
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GLOUCESTERSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL AT THEIR BUDGET MEETING.

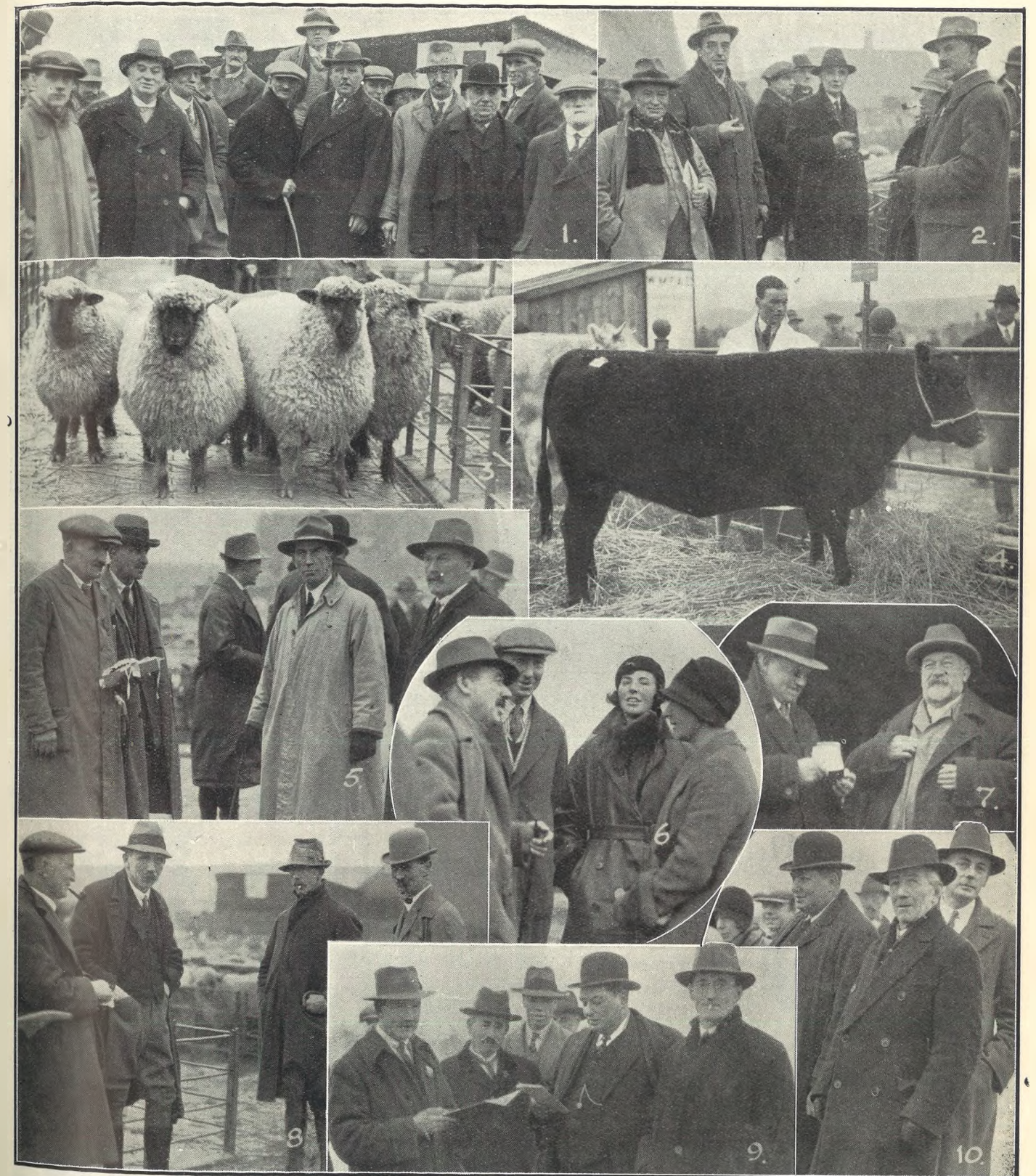

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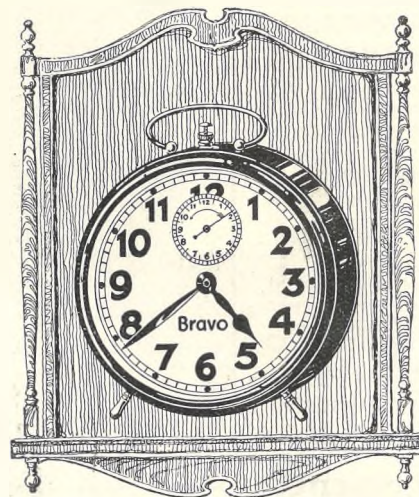

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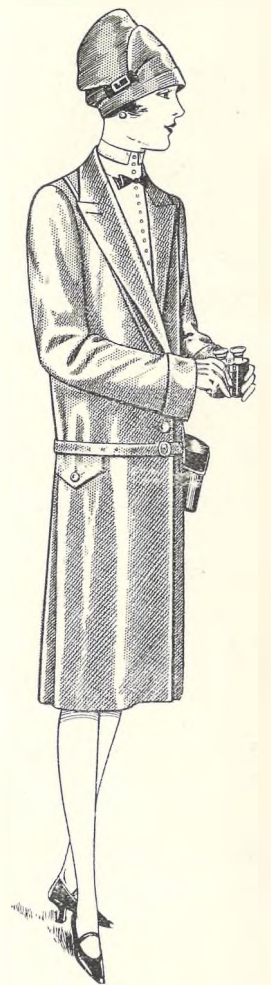
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LADIES' LACROSSE TRIAL MATCH IN CHELTENHAM.

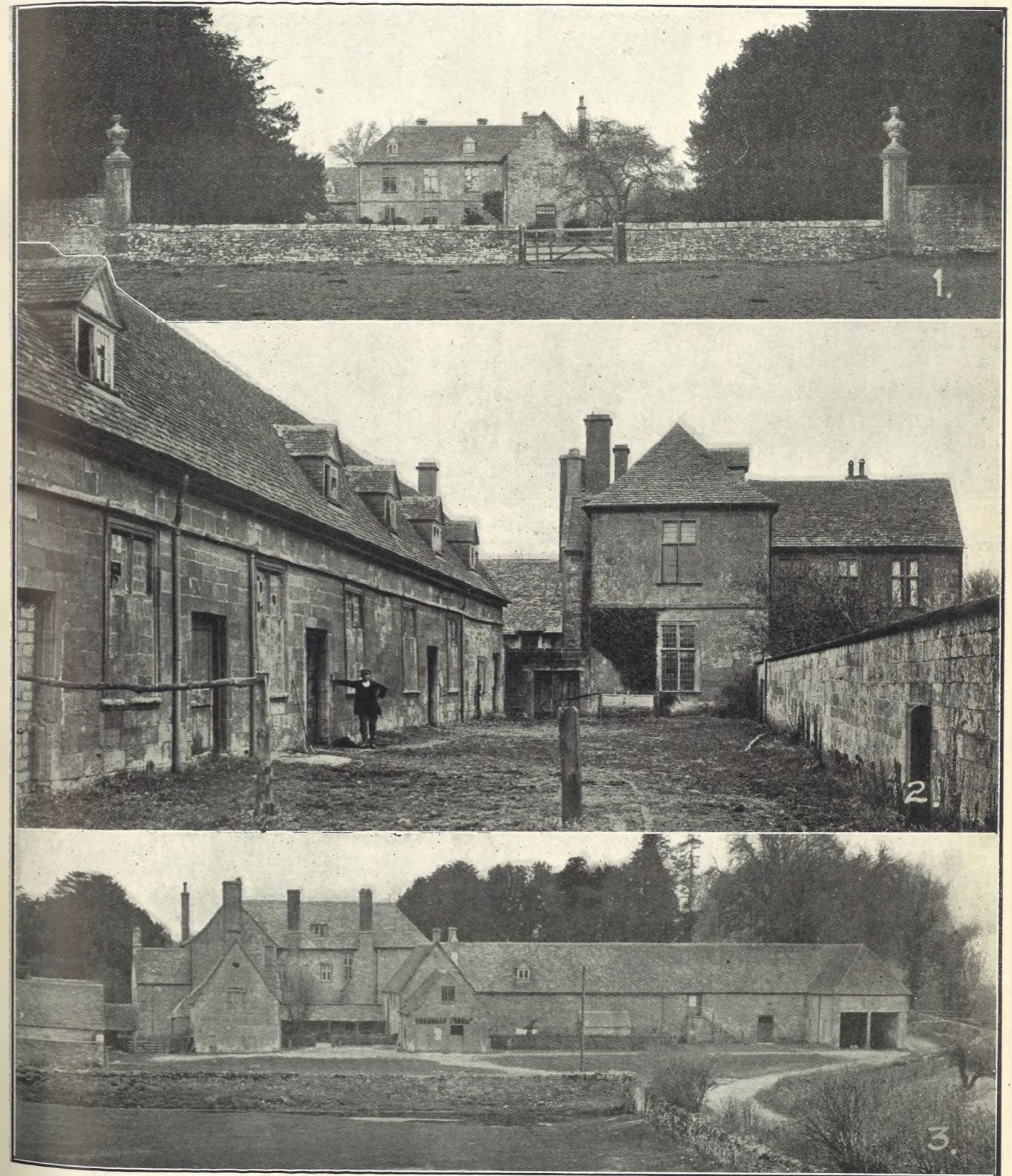

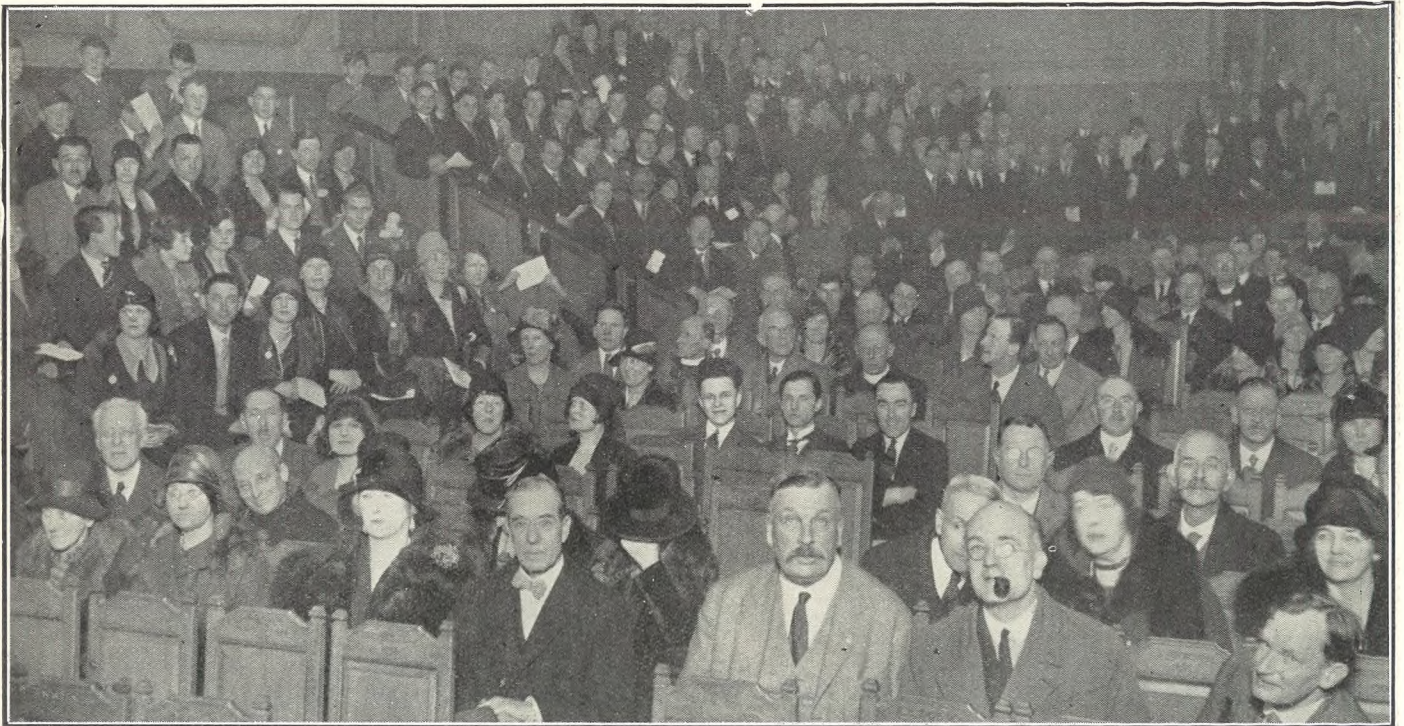


PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—COMPTON CASEY.

Compton Cassey, or Little Compton, is a fine old manor house that stands on a bye-road between Withington and Chedworth. It is now used as a farmhouse in which the bailiff of Hon. S. Vestey resides, but it has had its glories and was formerly the manor house of the Cassey family of Whitefield, Deerhurst. John Cassey, junr., who died January 17th, 1507-8 was seized of the manor of Compton Cassey. He was one of the supporters of Lord Berkeley at the battle of Nibley Green, 1481-2. The Casseys were Lords of the Manor for nearly 300 years.

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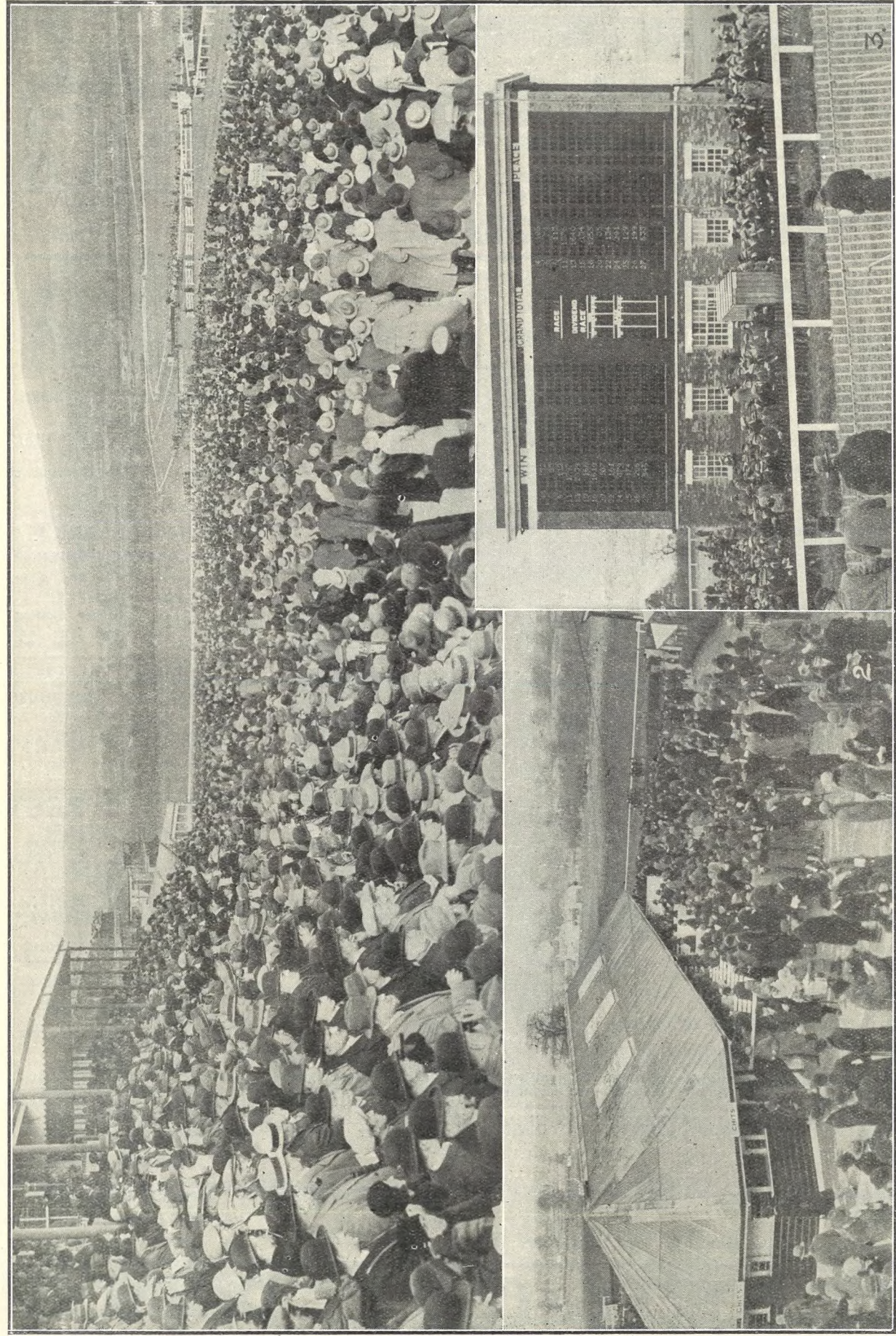

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—CALMSDEN AND DAGLINGWORTH.

Daglingworth is a delightful village about 2½ miles from Cirencester with a general air of prosperity and an appearance of being well-looked after. It is first mentioned in 1200-1 (2nd year John) when Robert Bloet paid 40s. for a hide of land. It stayed in the Bloet family till the end of the 14th century. Calmsden is a small hamlet of North Cerney, deriving its name from the Saxon Calmundesdene (Ceolmund's hollow, or valley). Its chief interest is a Wayside Cross of early 14th century work, with a beautiful spring of clear water coming from its base.

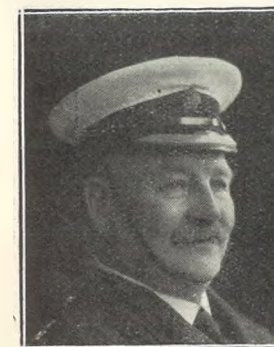

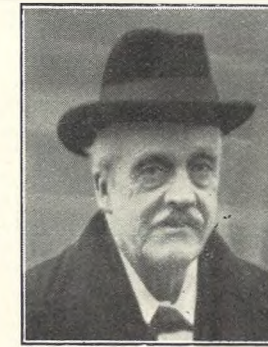

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—ODDINGTON.

Oddington is a small but interesting parish on the Oxfordshire border, two miles east of Stow-on-the-Wold. It is divided into two distinct villages, upper and lower, the latter much the more picturesque and interesting. Rudder says in 1779 there were about 60 houses with 338 inhabitants, and that the air was remarkably healthy. In 1734 none were buried, and only three very ancient people died in 1773. The ancient church of St. Nicholas is extremely interesting. It is used in the summer, while the new Church of the Ascension (erected 1852) is used in winter.

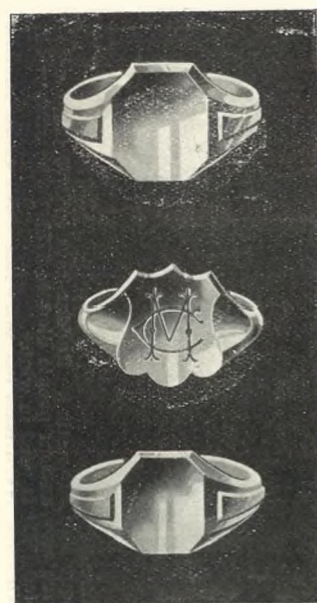

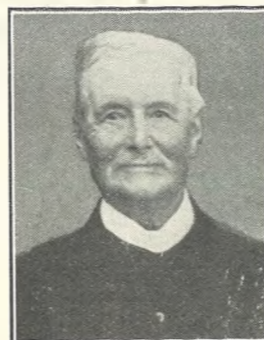

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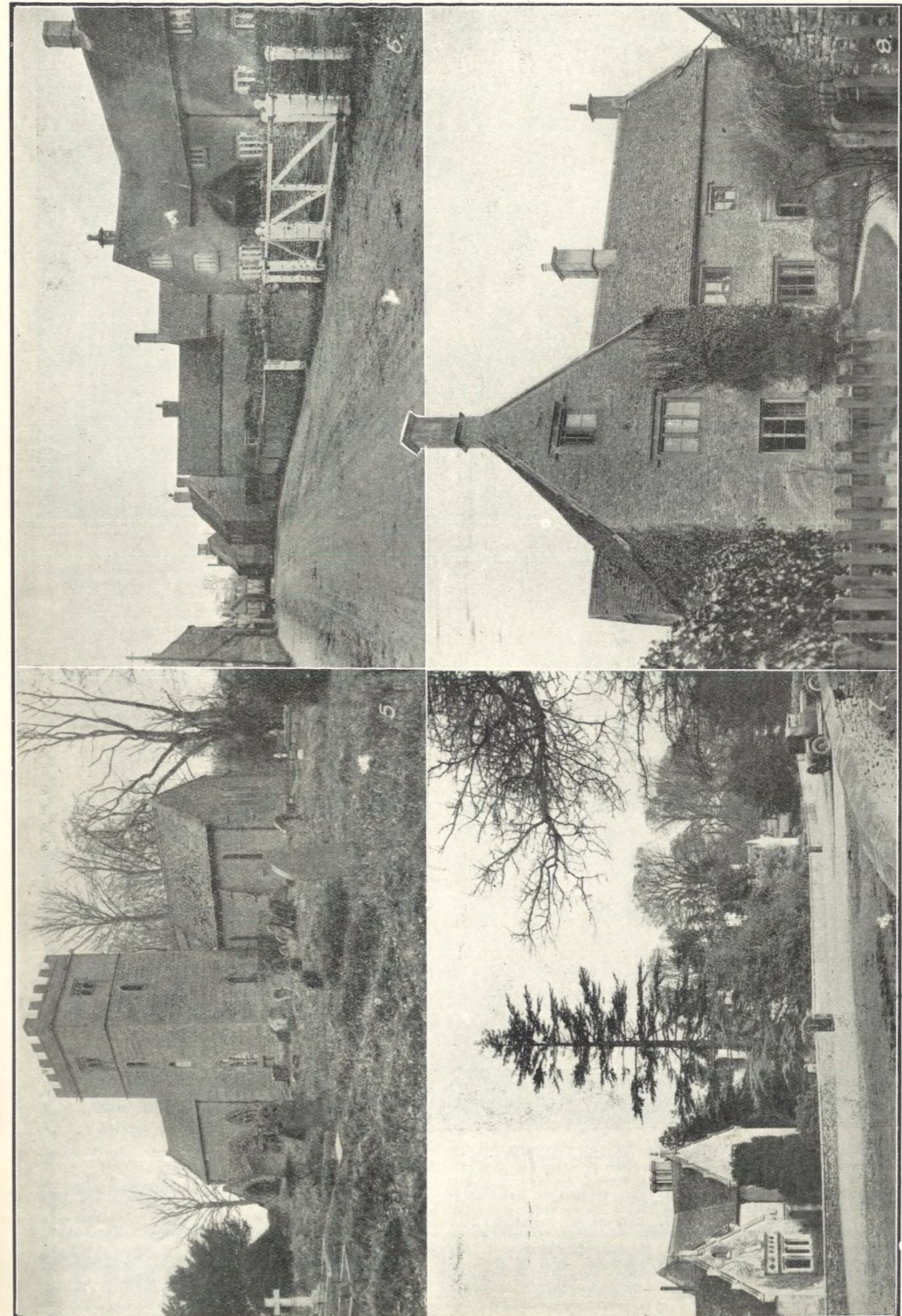
