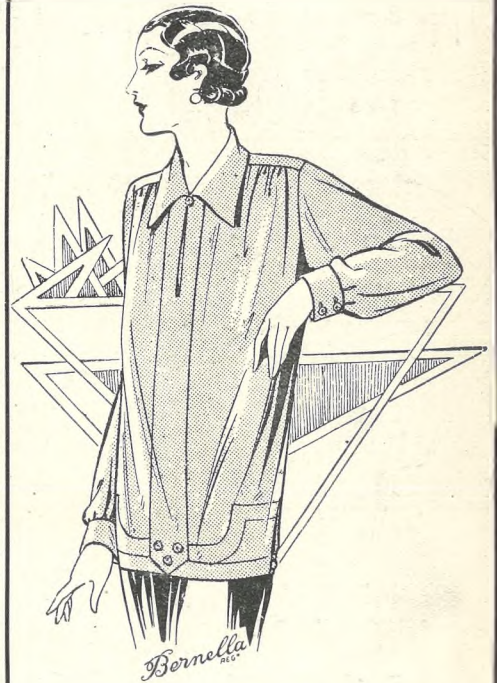

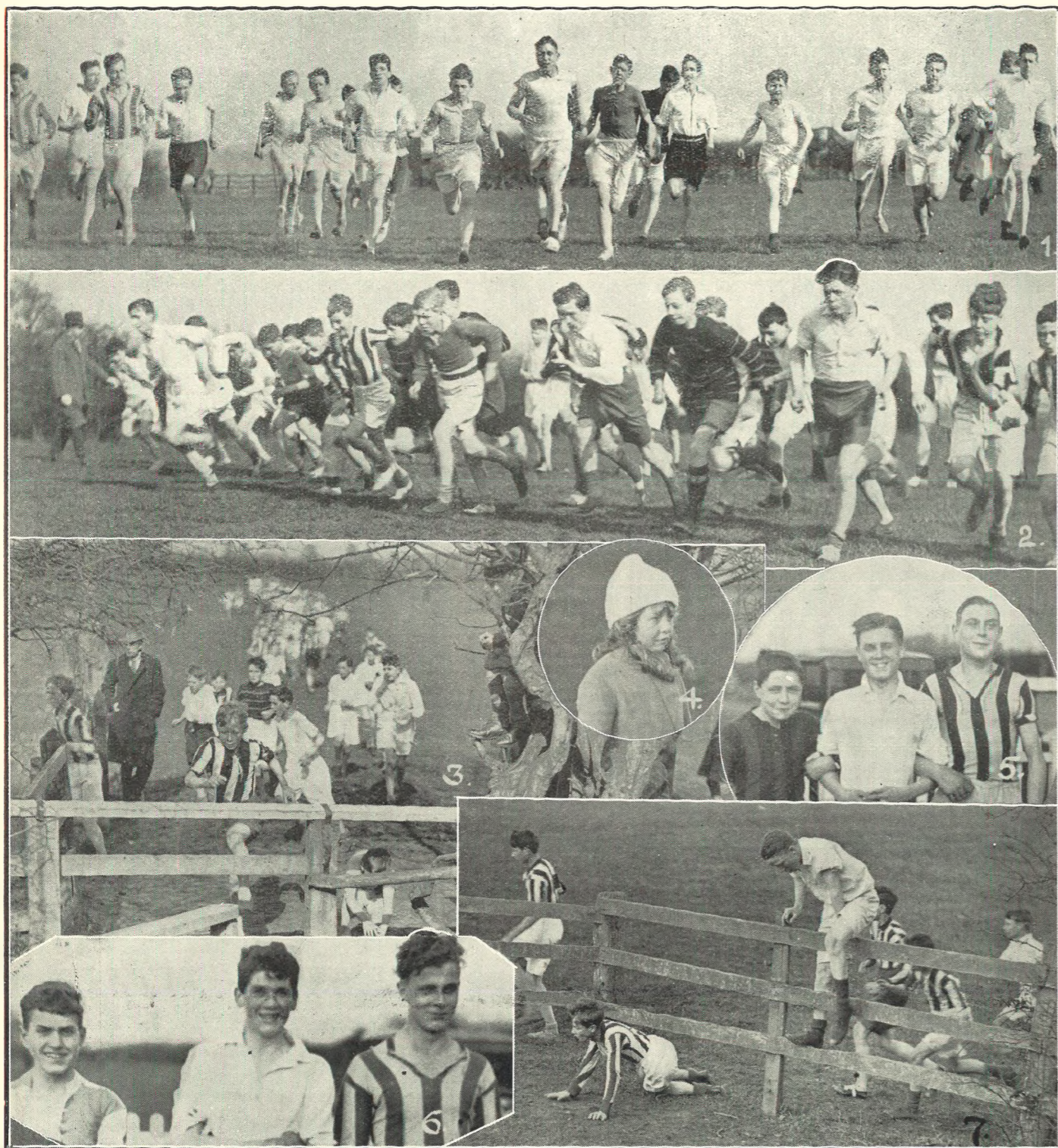

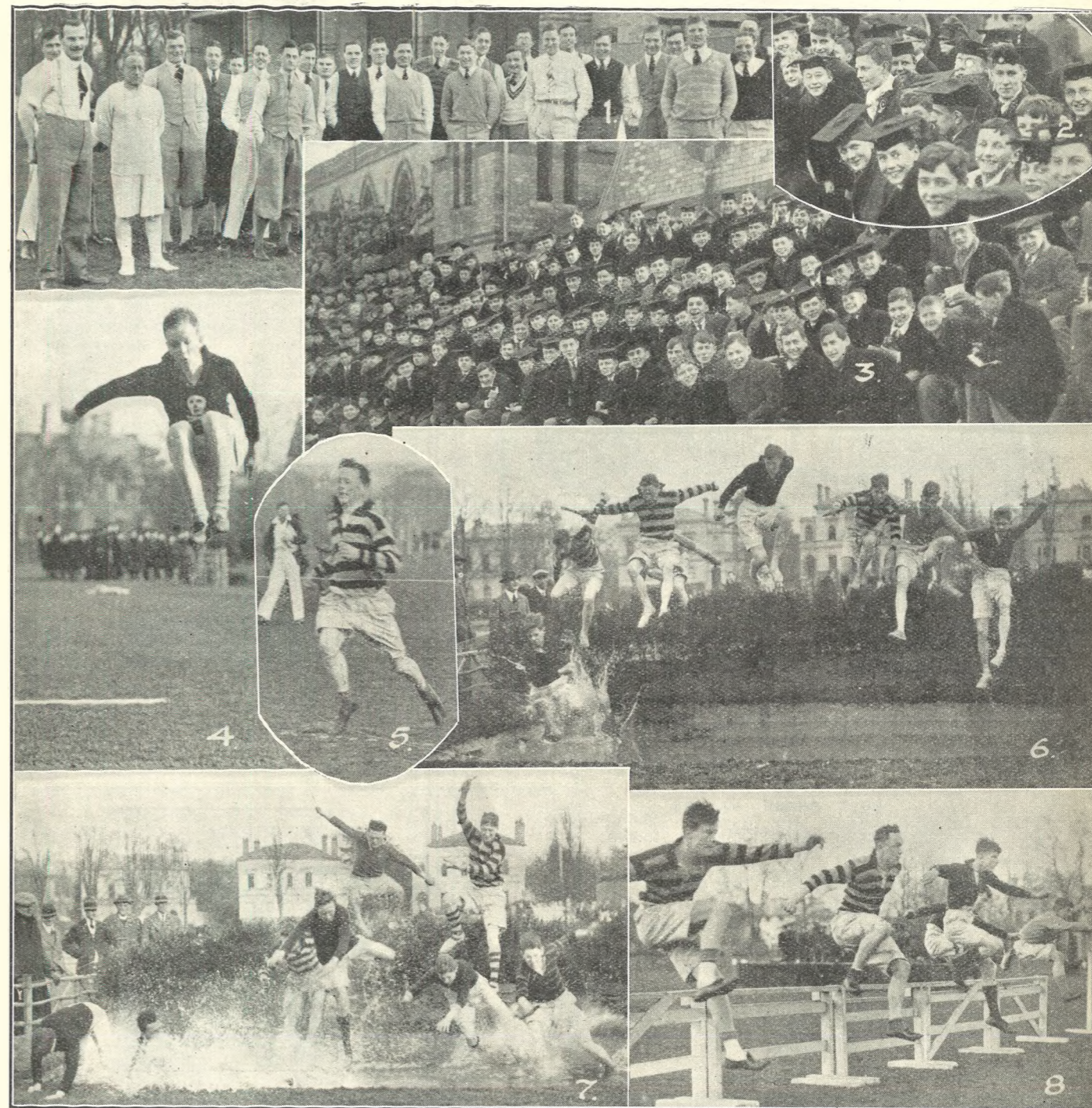

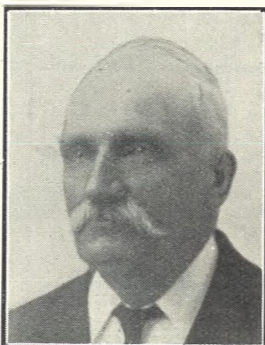
REMOVING CHELTHENHAM TRAM LINES.

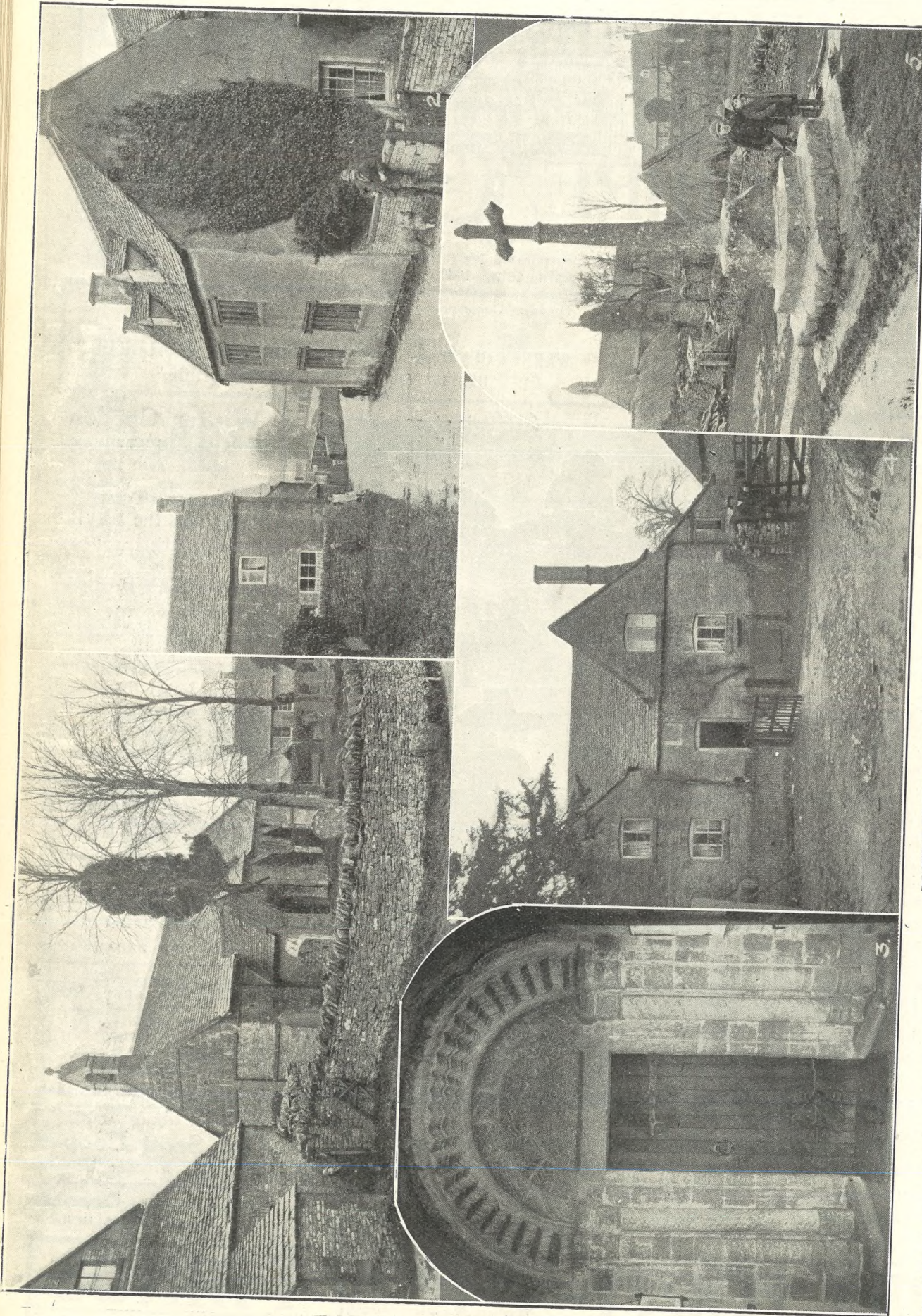

Condicoe is one of the Hill villages, four miles from Stow, off the road from Stow to Tewkesbury, and is one of the most isolated and quiet on the Cotswolds. The Church of St. Nicholas is very small, but very ancient, of Norman building with a fine Norman South doorway and Chancel Arch. In 1128 there is a record of a "Robert, son of Erkenbald," giving half a hide of land in Condicoe to St. Peter's Abbey and in the records of Feet of Fines in 41st year of Elizabeth at the Easter Courts at Westminster Thos. Machin gave £300 to hos. Parke and Sibil, his wife, for the manor of Condicoe, and the advowson of the Church of Condicoe.

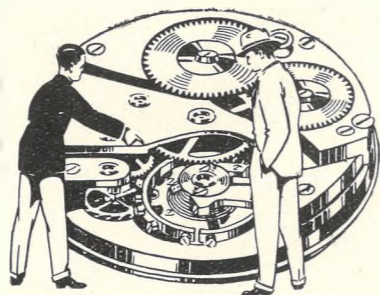
