RE-DEDICATION OF SHIPTON SOLLARS CHURCH.

Entirely due to the generosity of Mr. E. F. Fieldhouse, of Shipton Sollars Manor, and in memory of his father and mother, formerly of Wootton Warren, Warwickshire, the interesting little parish church of Shipton Sollars has been beautifully restored, and on Saturday last it was rededicated by the Bishop of Gloucester at a crowded service. The church had fallen into such a bad state that it was practically a ruin for the past twenty years.

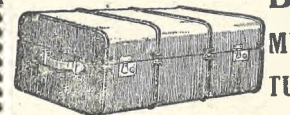

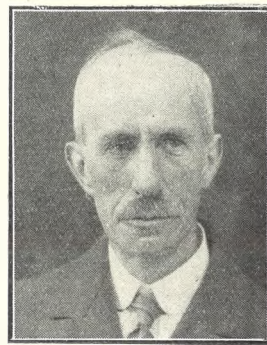

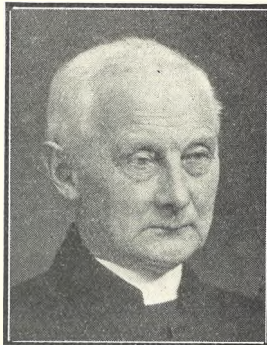


FORMER CHELTONIAN'S NEW RESIDENCE.

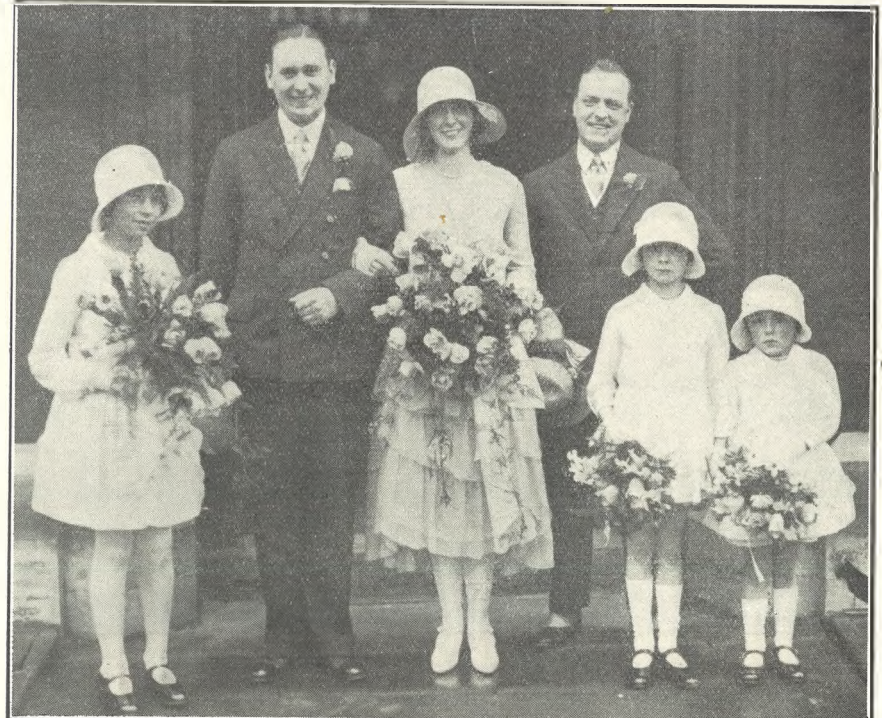

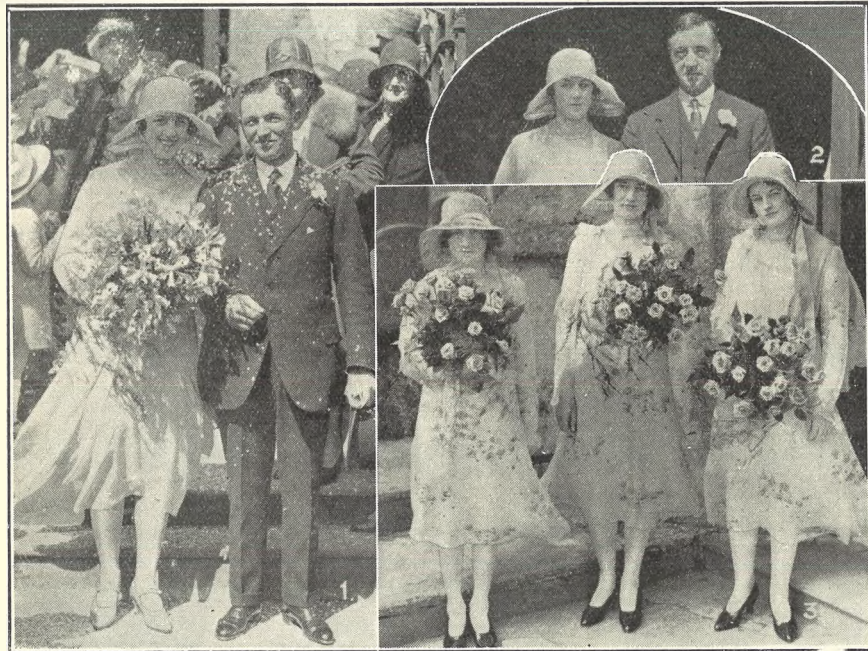
TEWKESBURY BROTHERHOOD ANNIVERSARY.

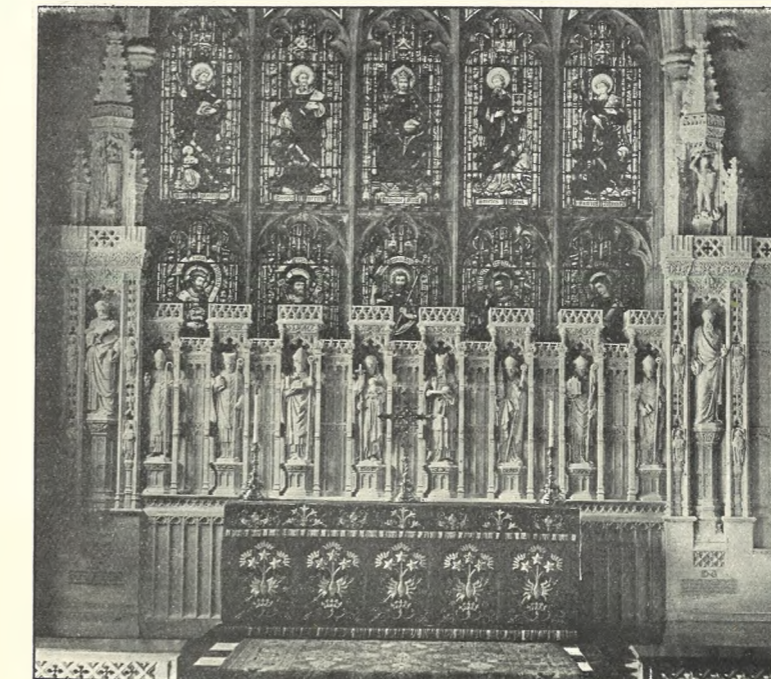


GLOUCESTERSHIRE COUNTY TRIAL MATCH IN CHELTENHAM.

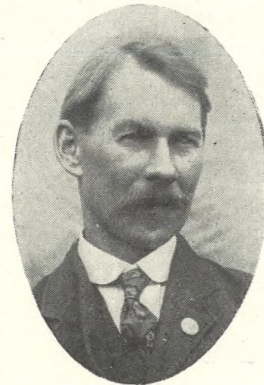

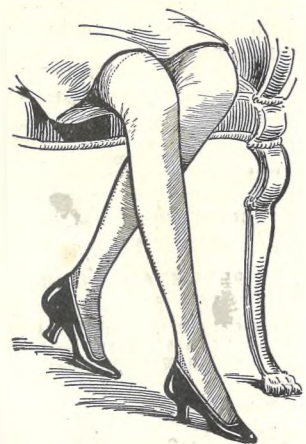

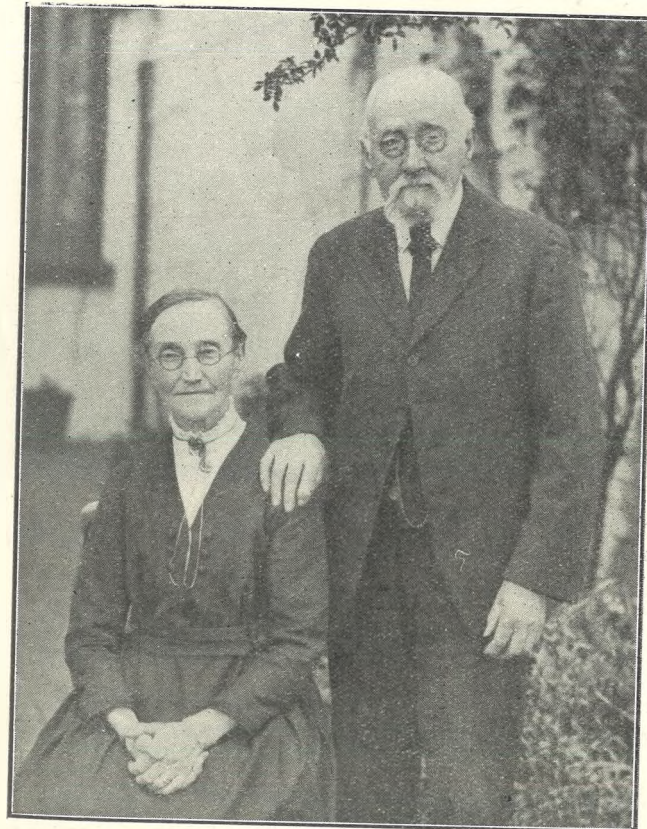

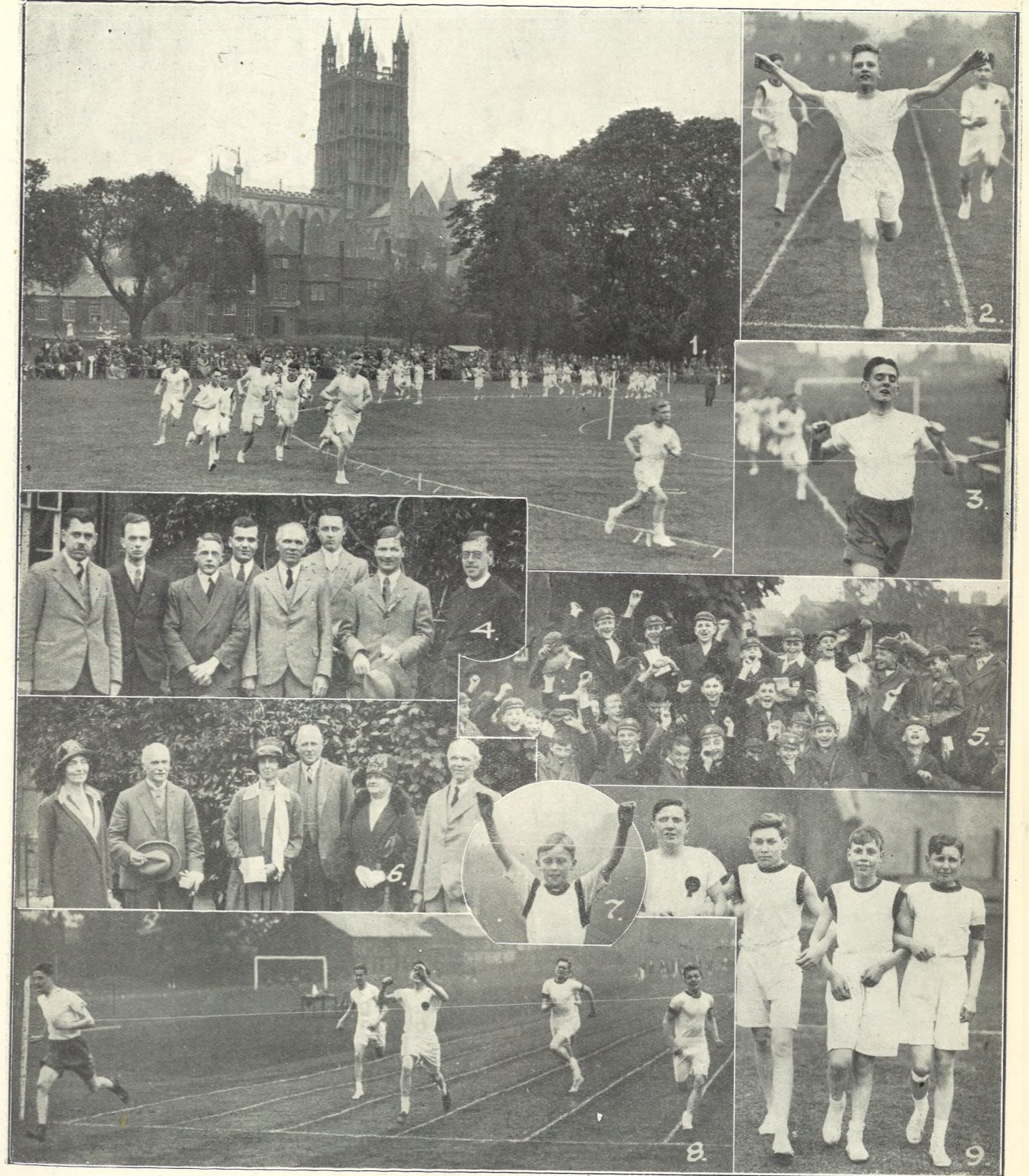

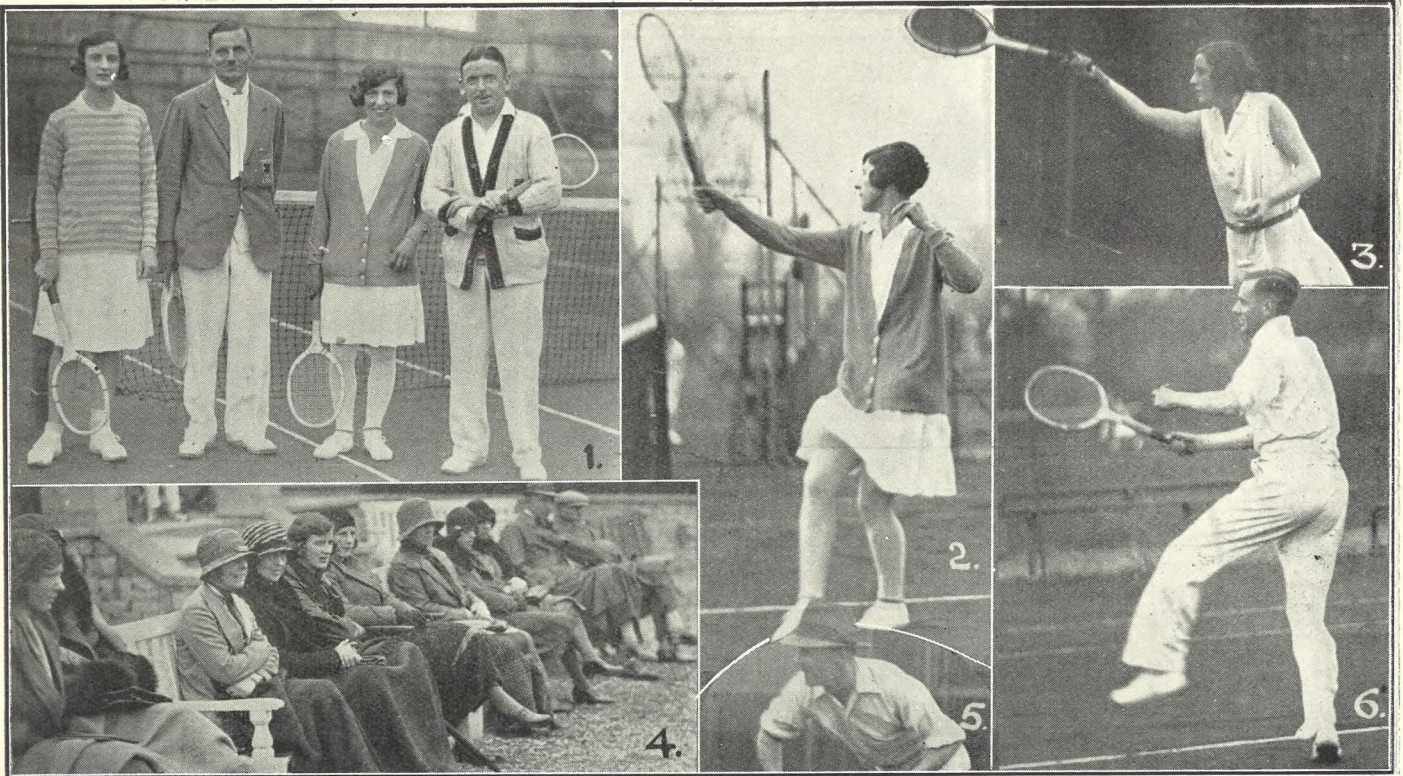

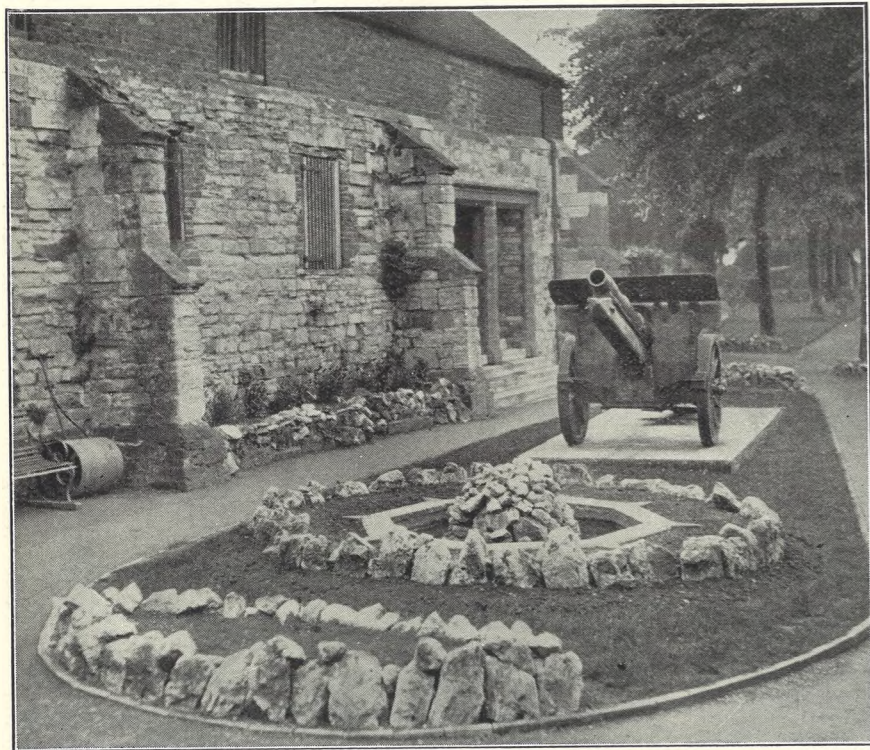


PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—COLN ST. ALDWYNS.

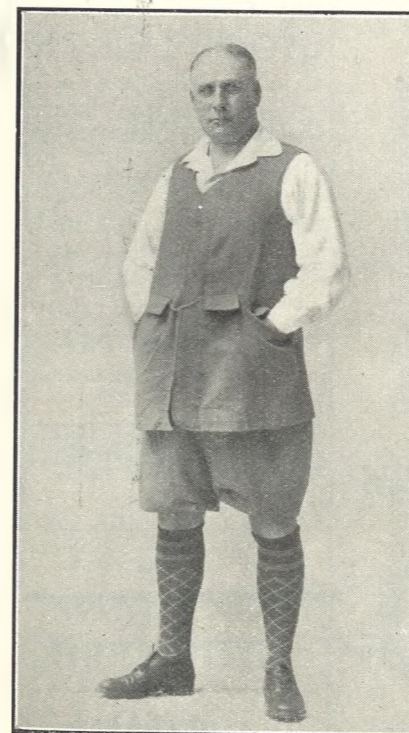

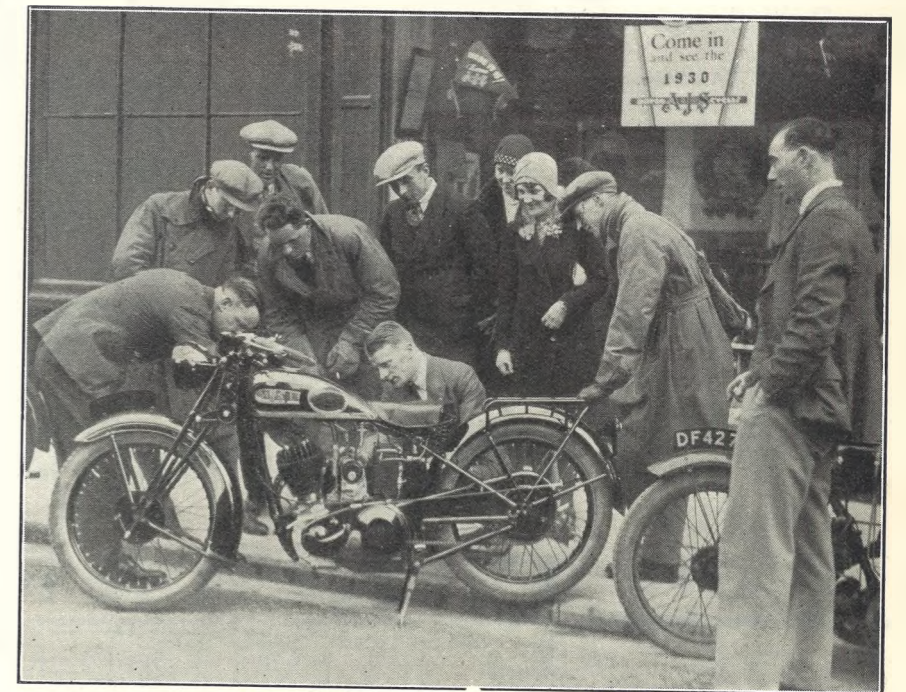

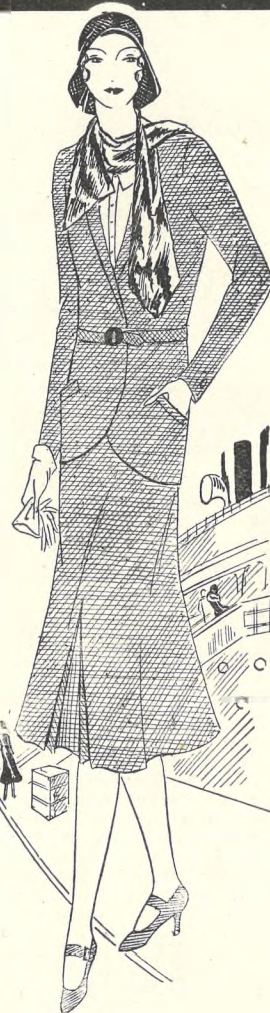
