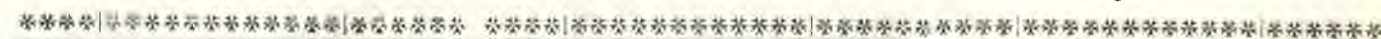

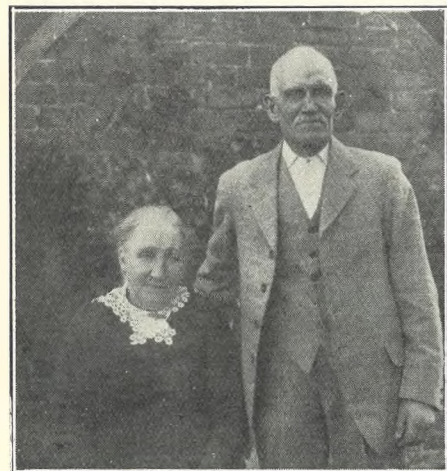

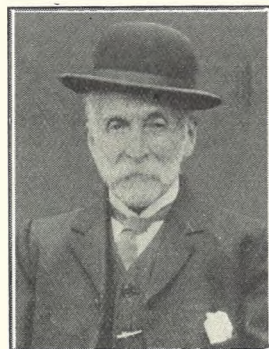
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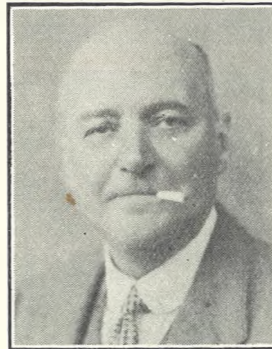
A TEWKESBURY GOLDEN WEDDING.

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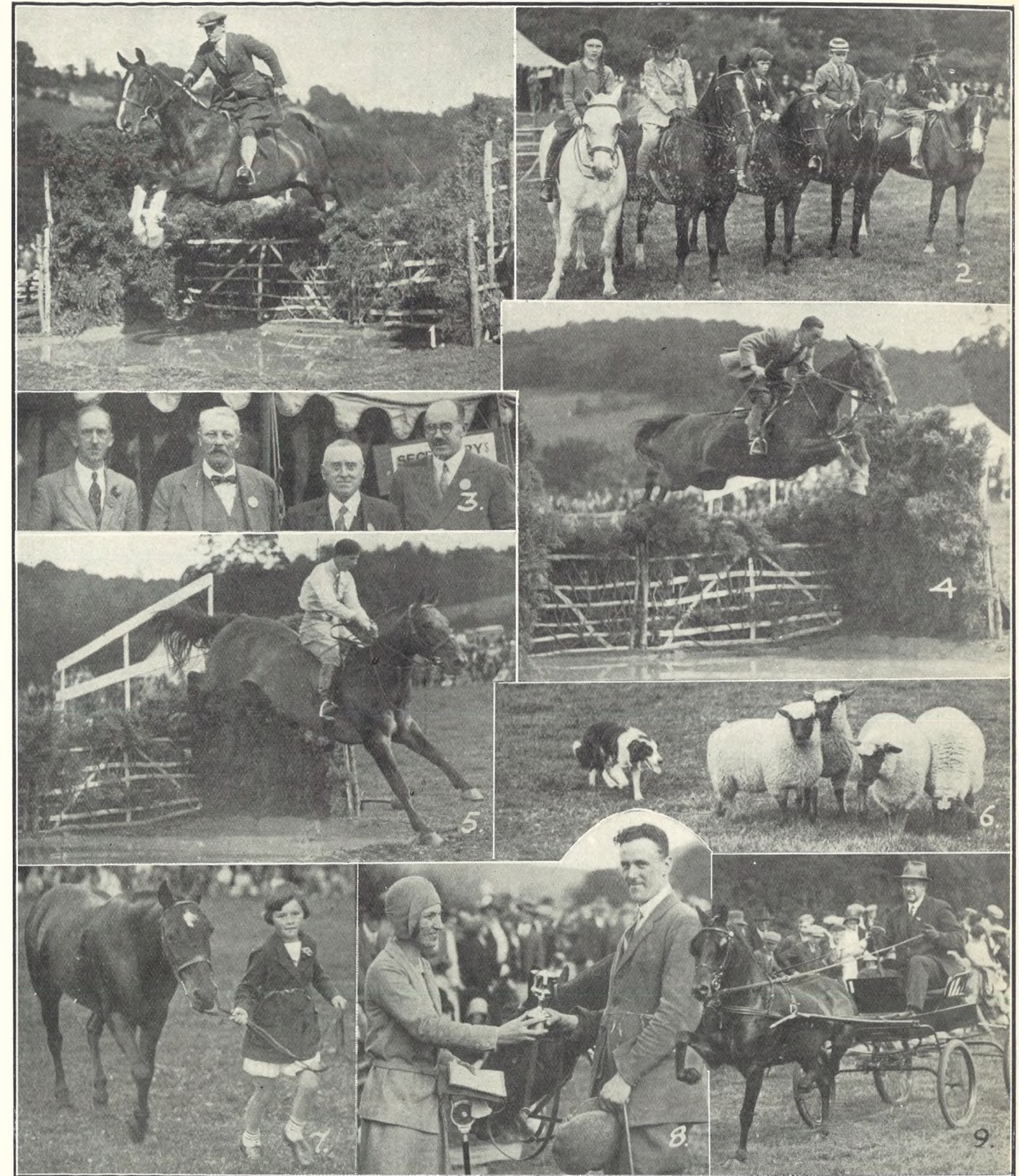

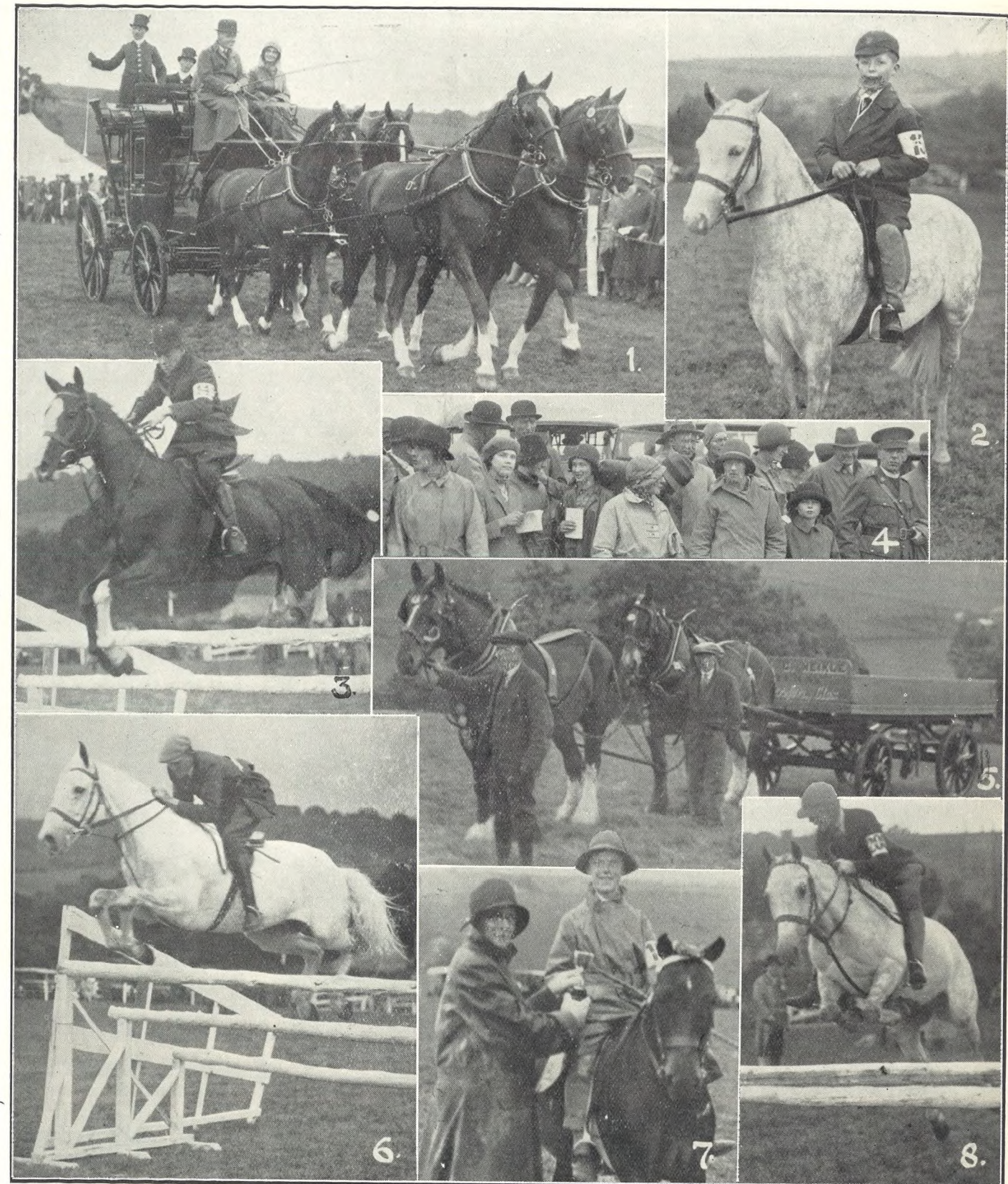

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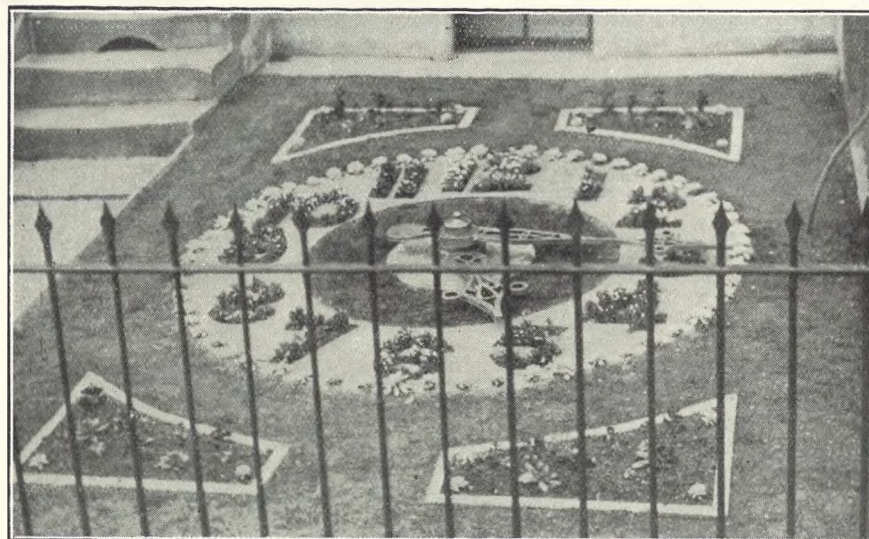


CHELTHENHAM MINISTER'S DAUGHTER WEDS.

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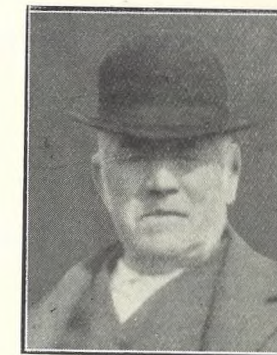

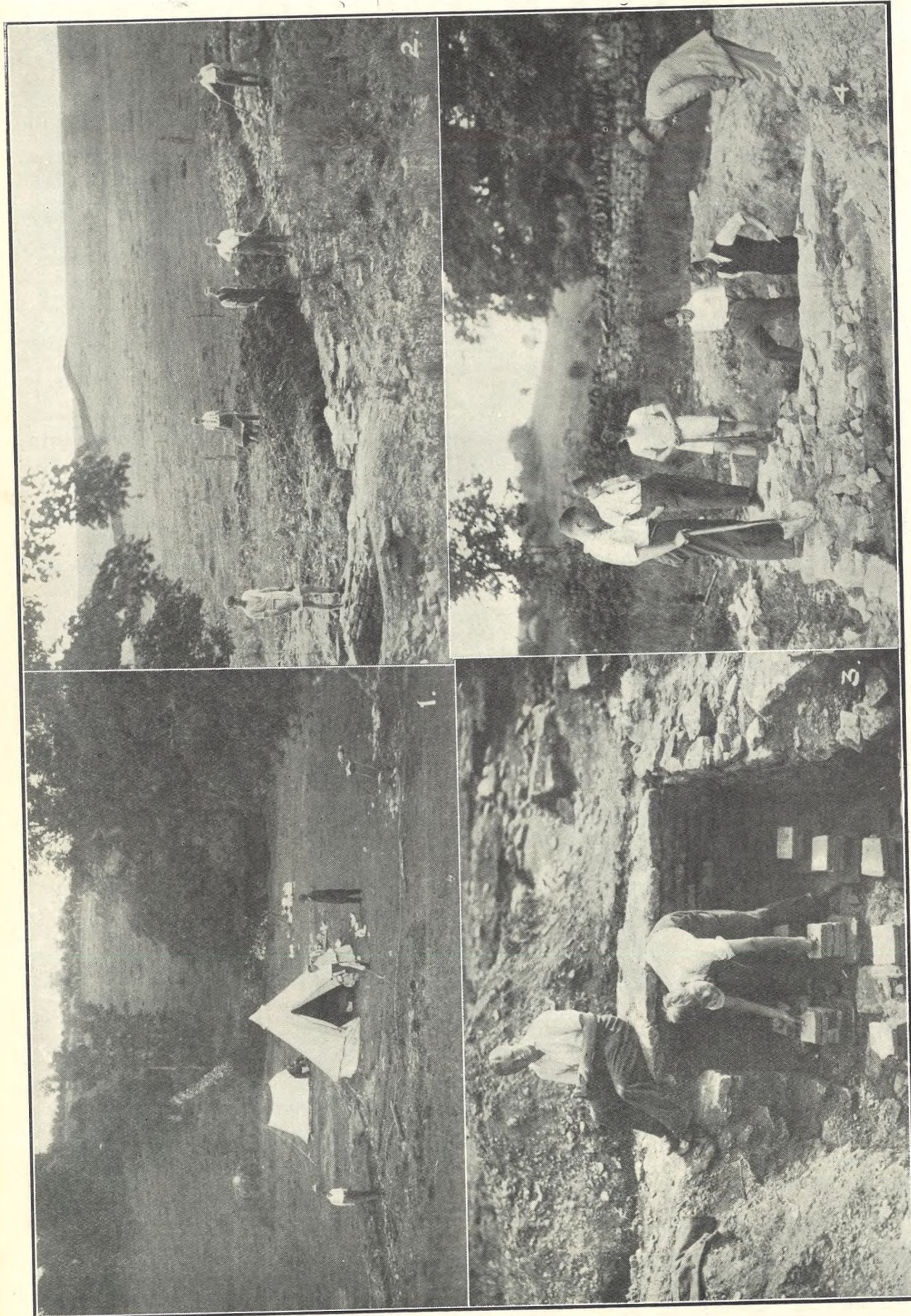
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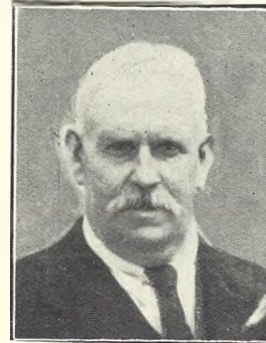
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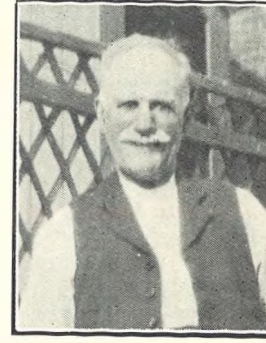
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ROMAN DISCOVERIES AT CHEDWORTH.

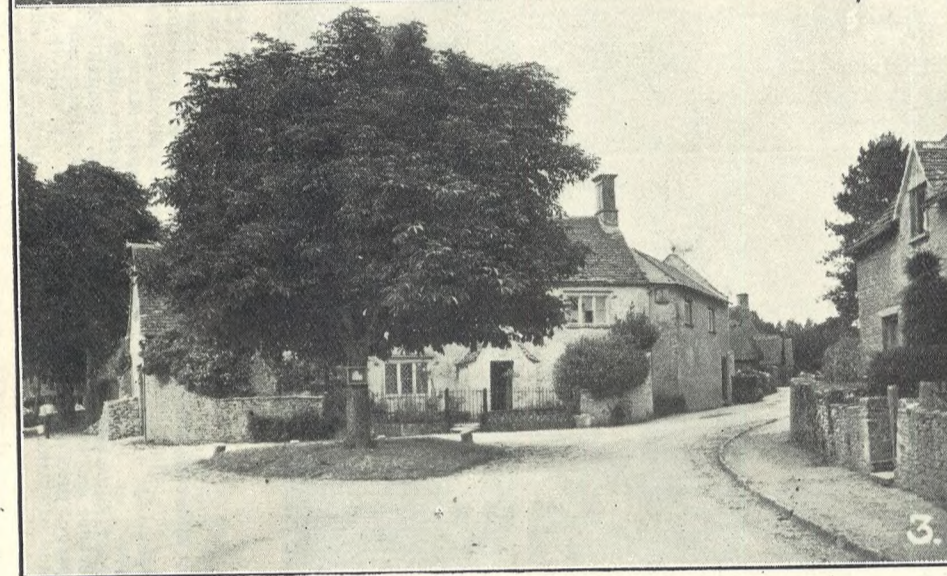
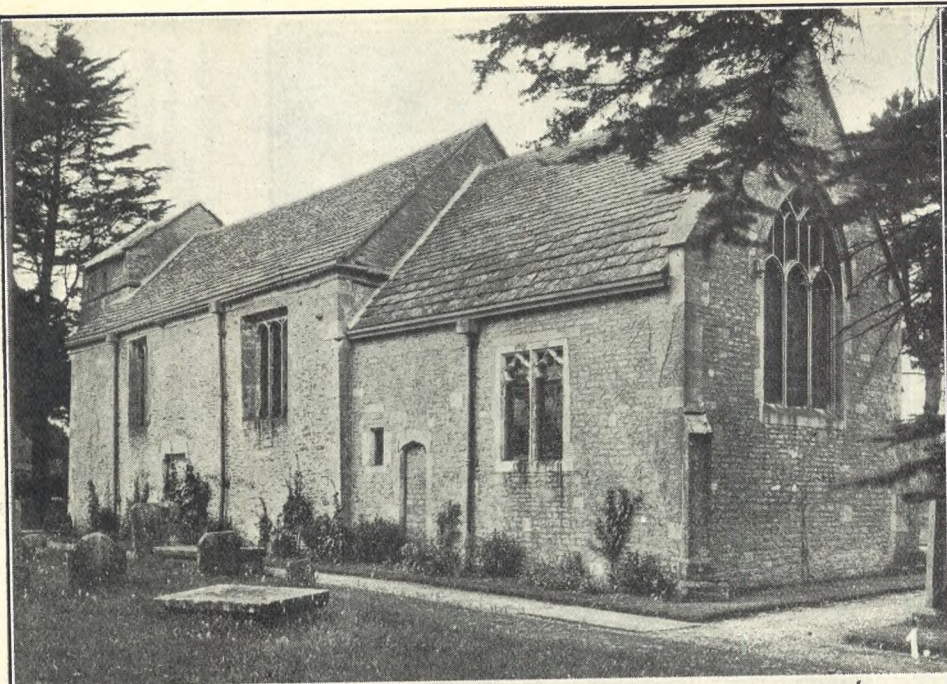

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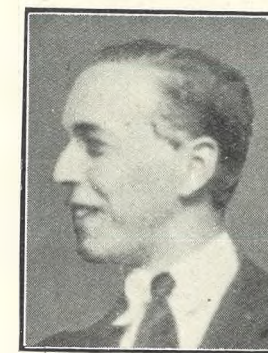

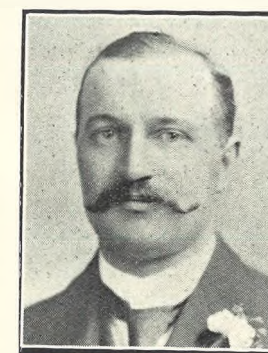

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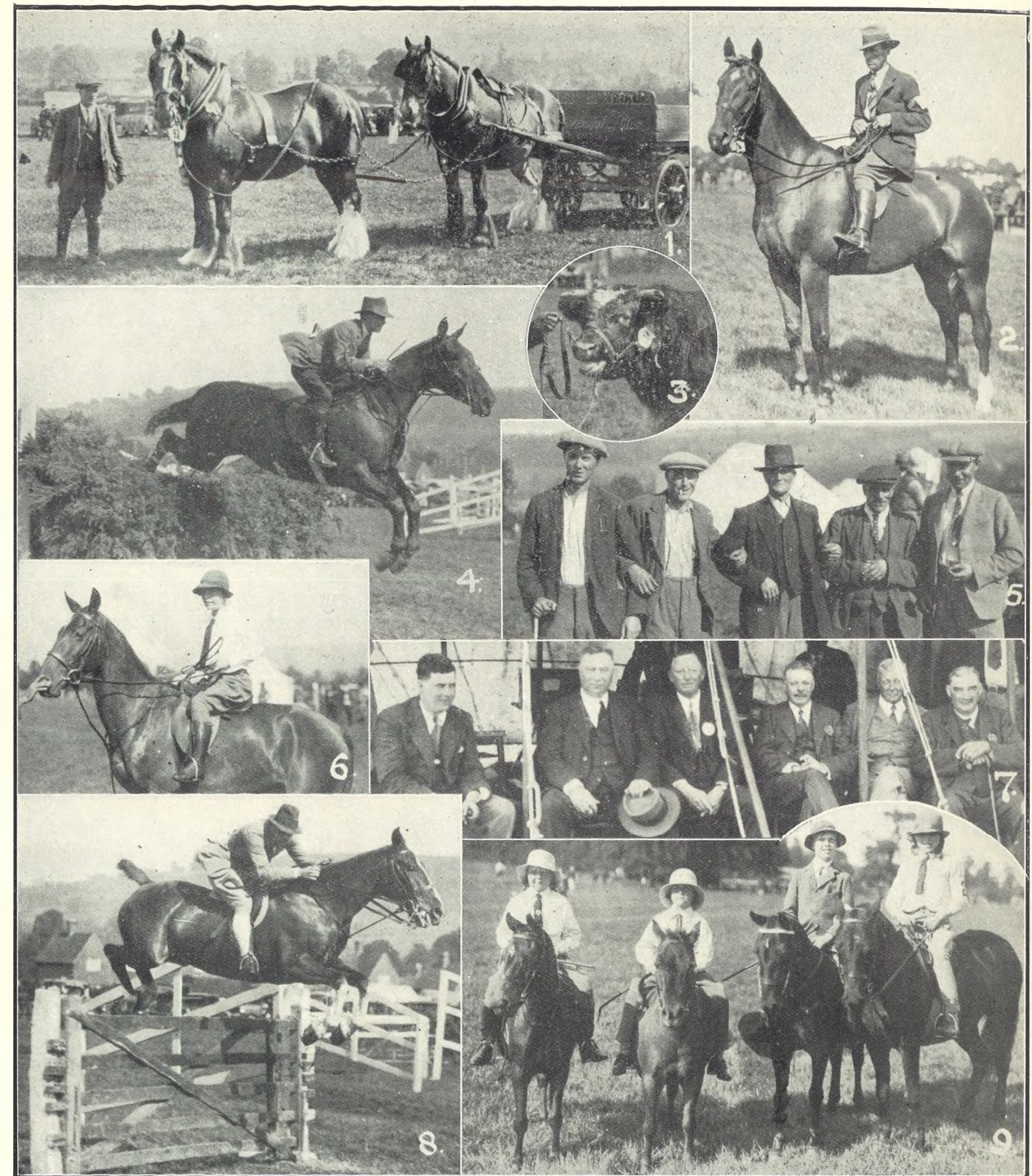

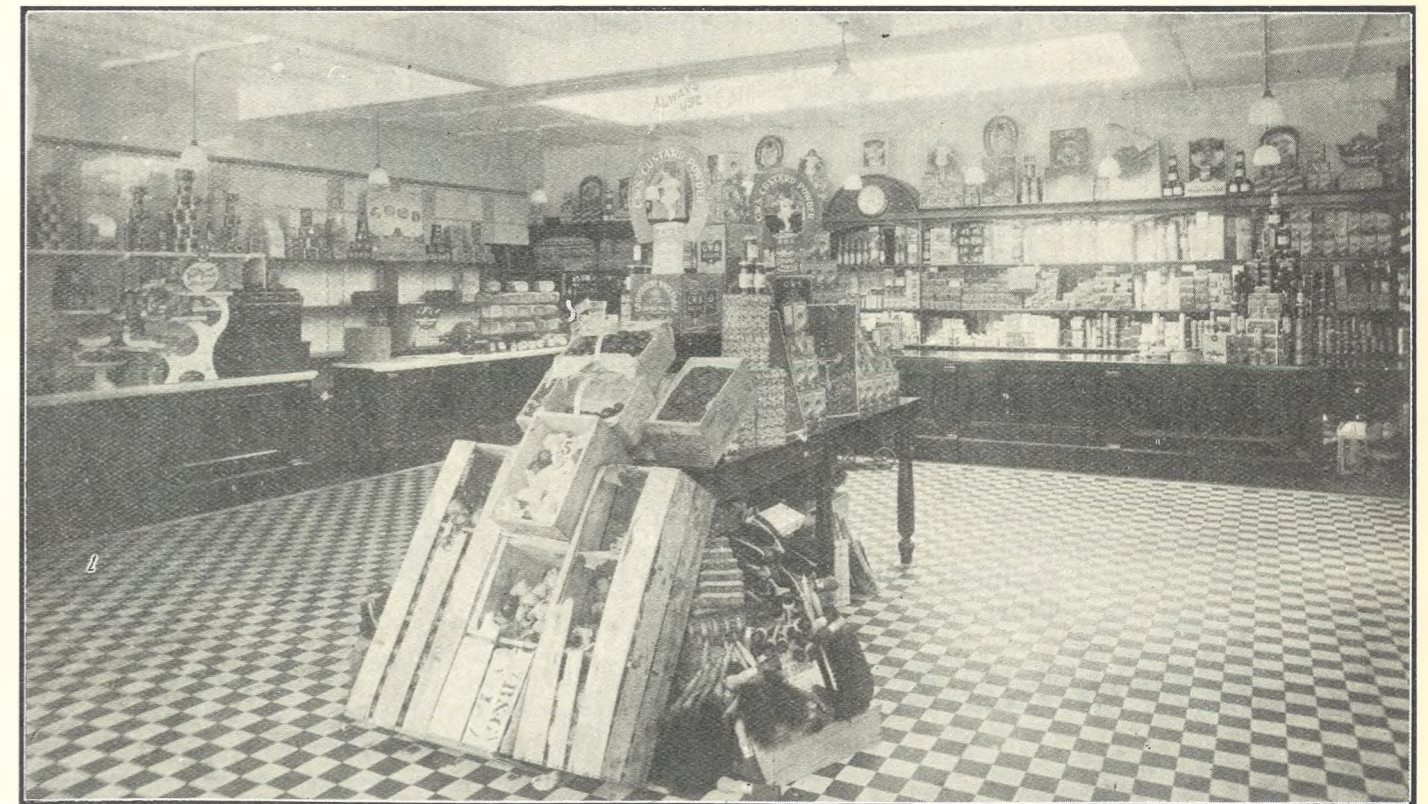
