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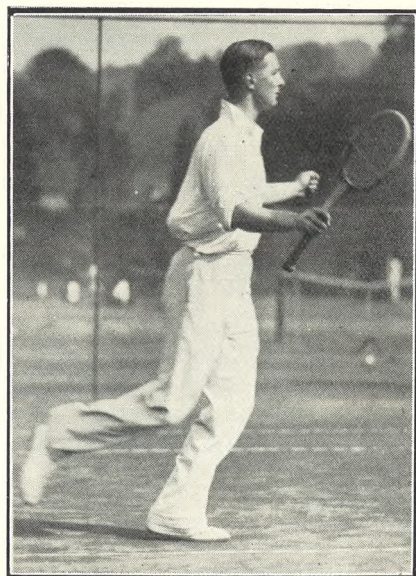

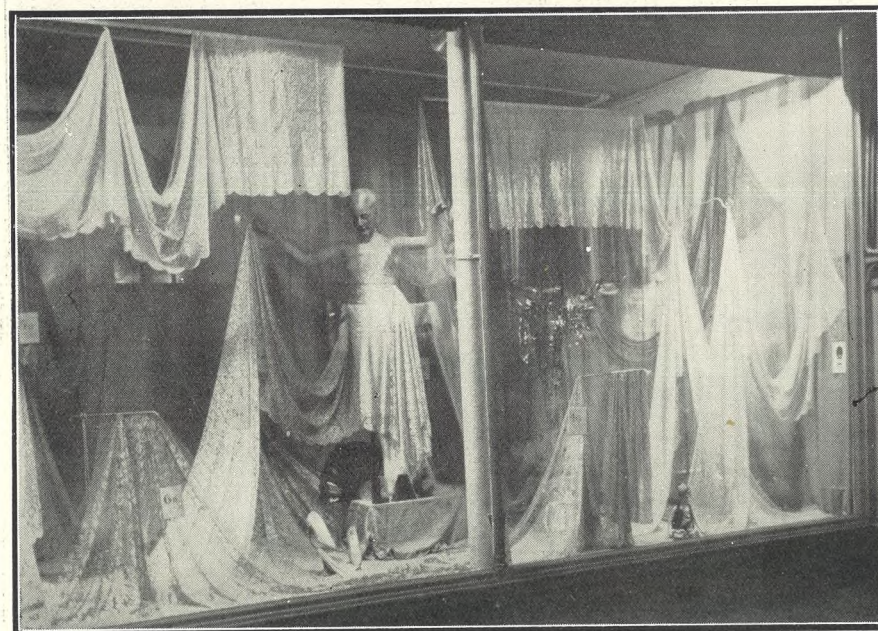
INTERESTING CHELTENHAM WEDDING.

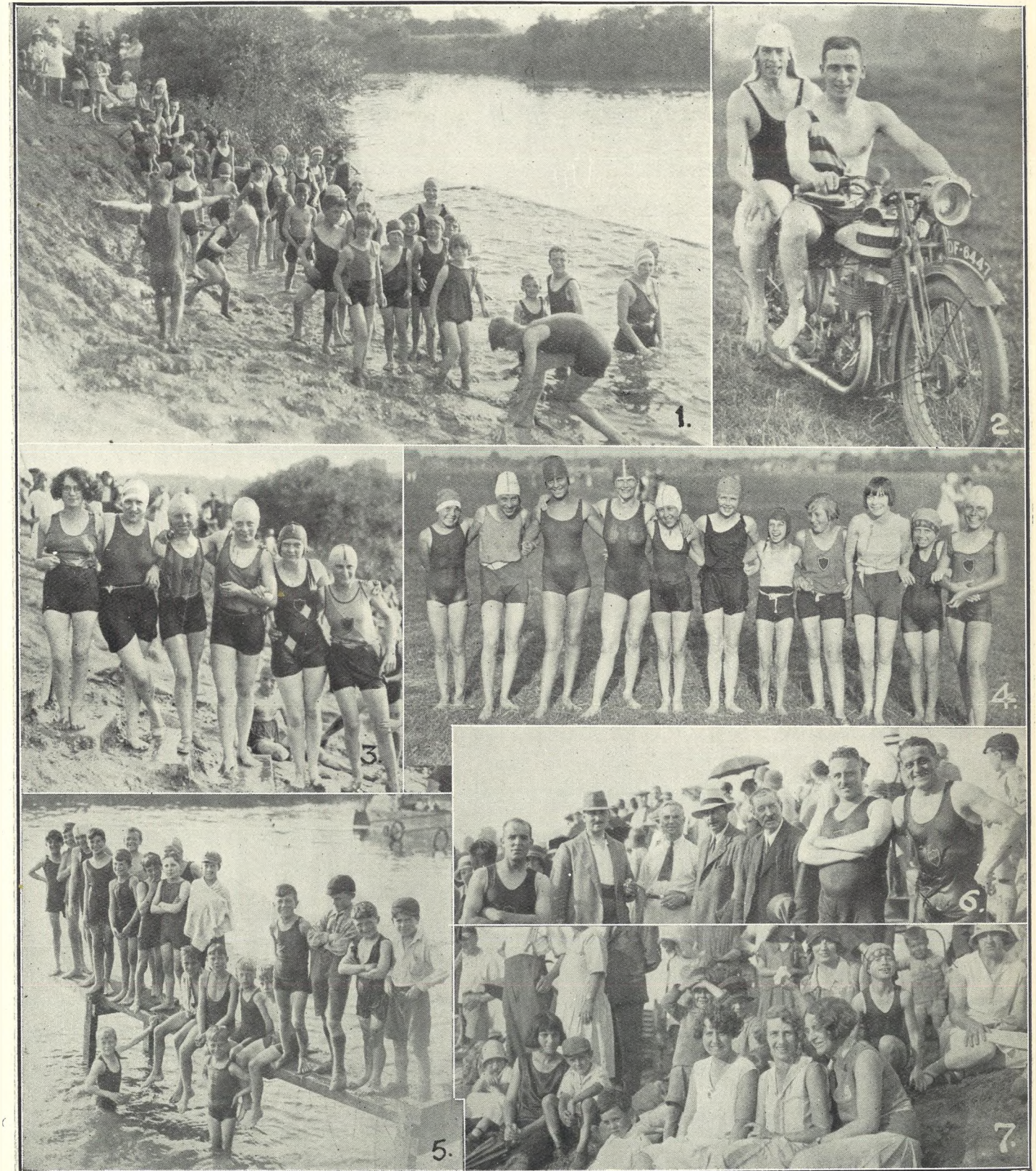

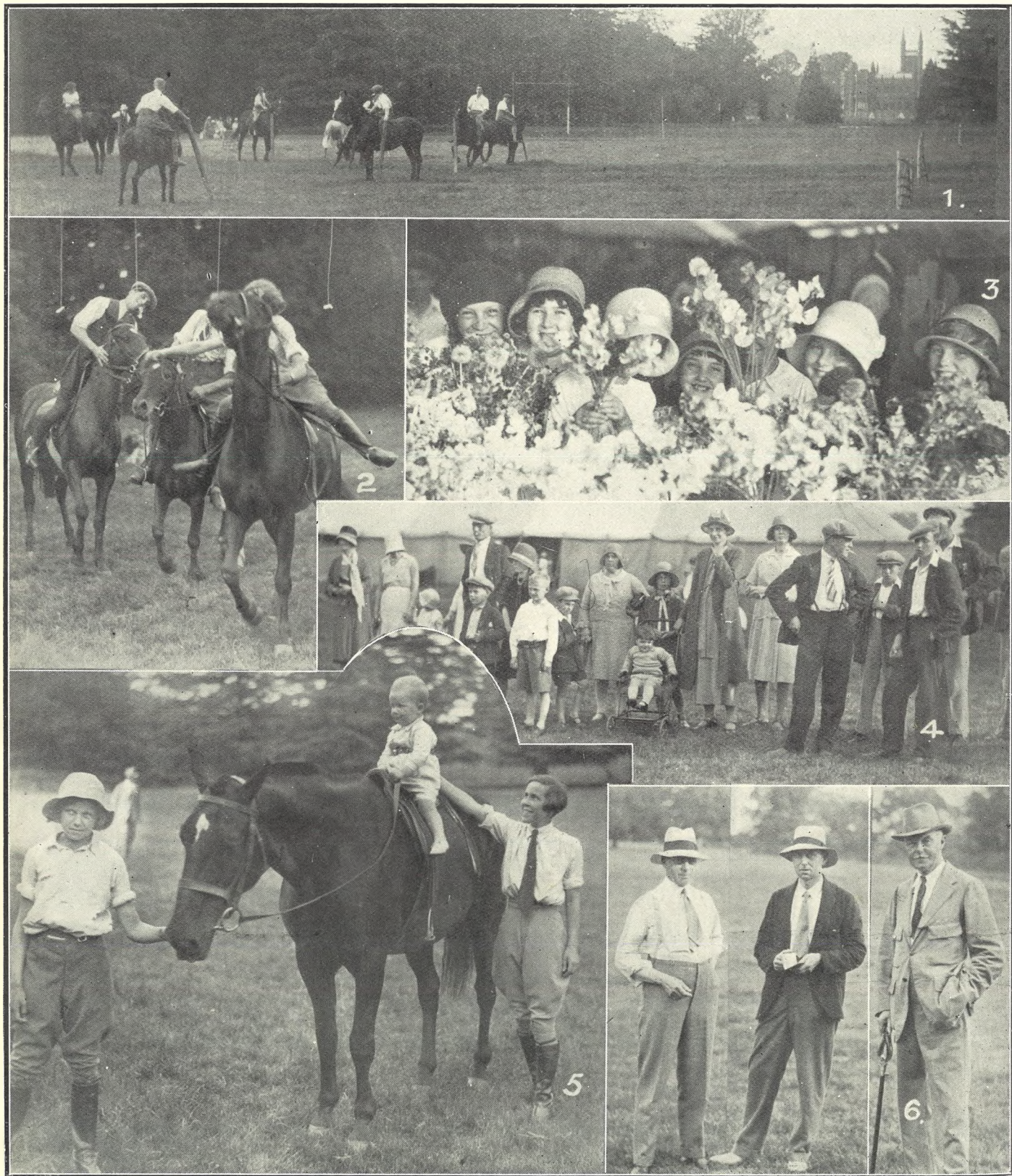

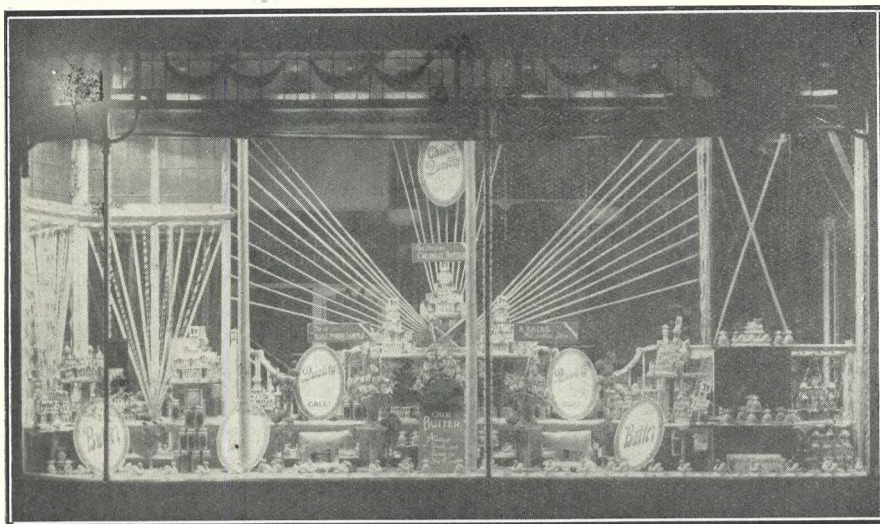
CHELTHENHAM SHOPPING DISPLAY DAY.

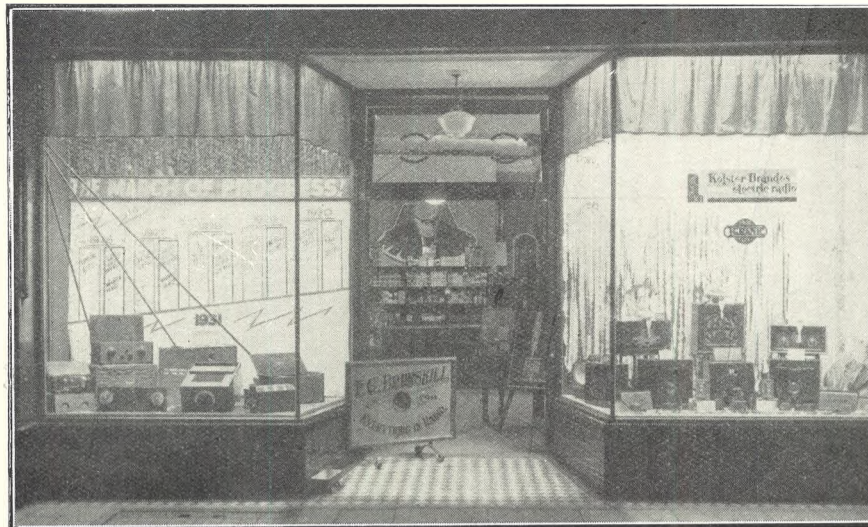

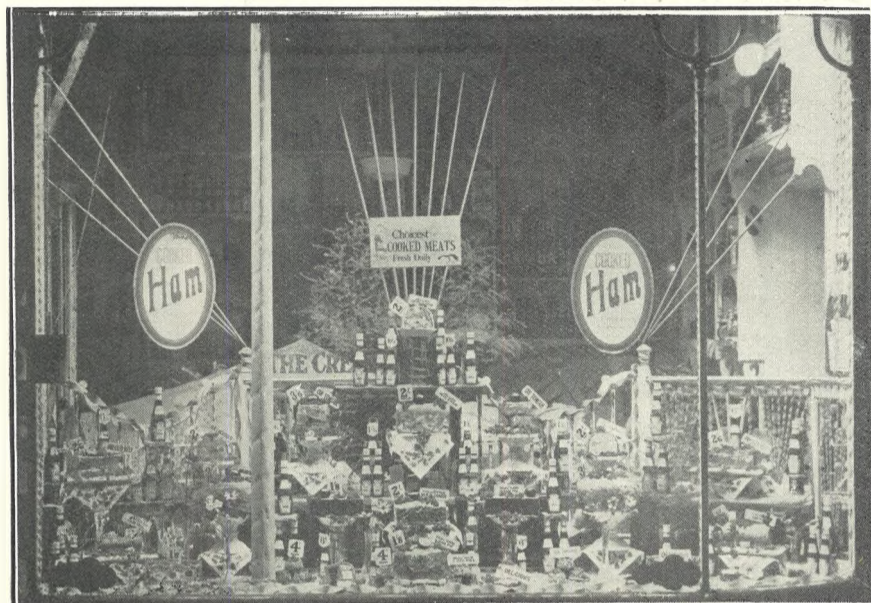

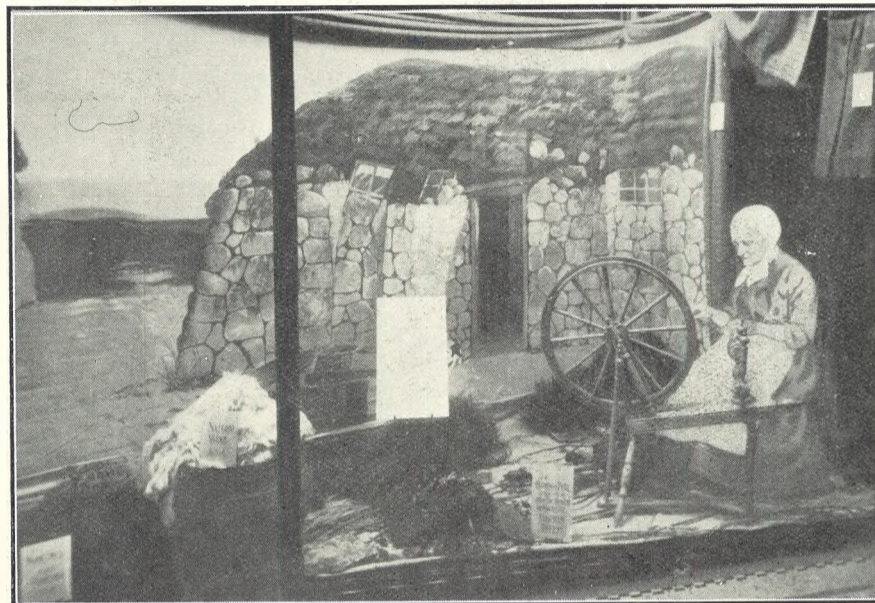

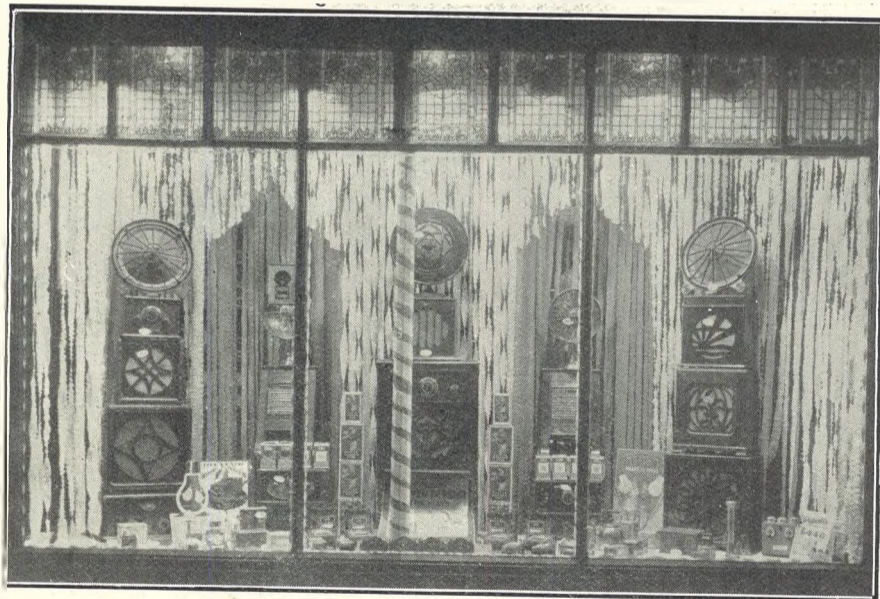

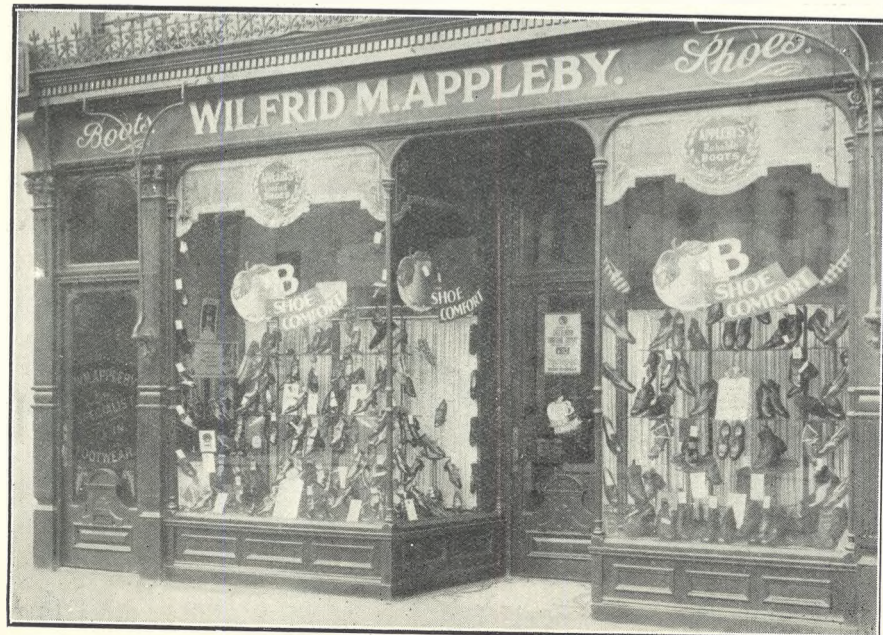

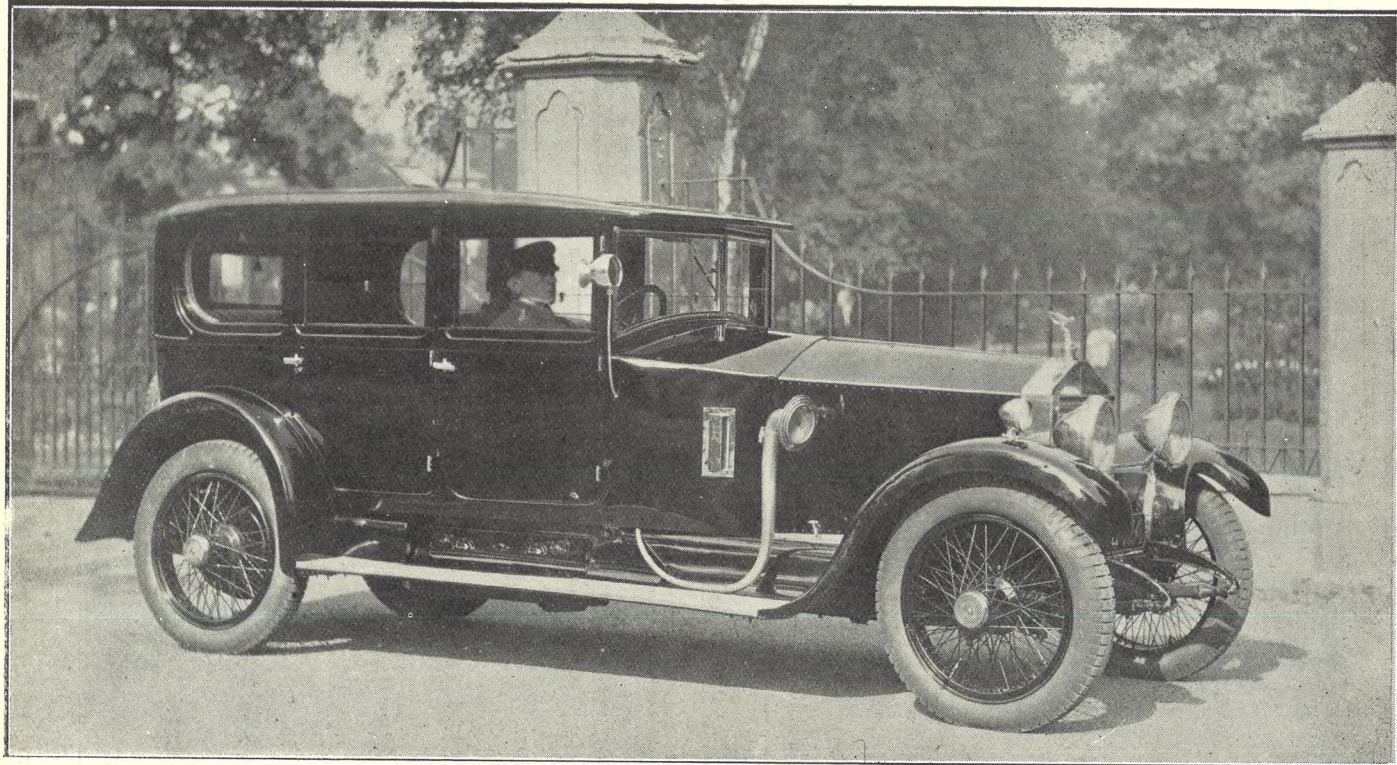

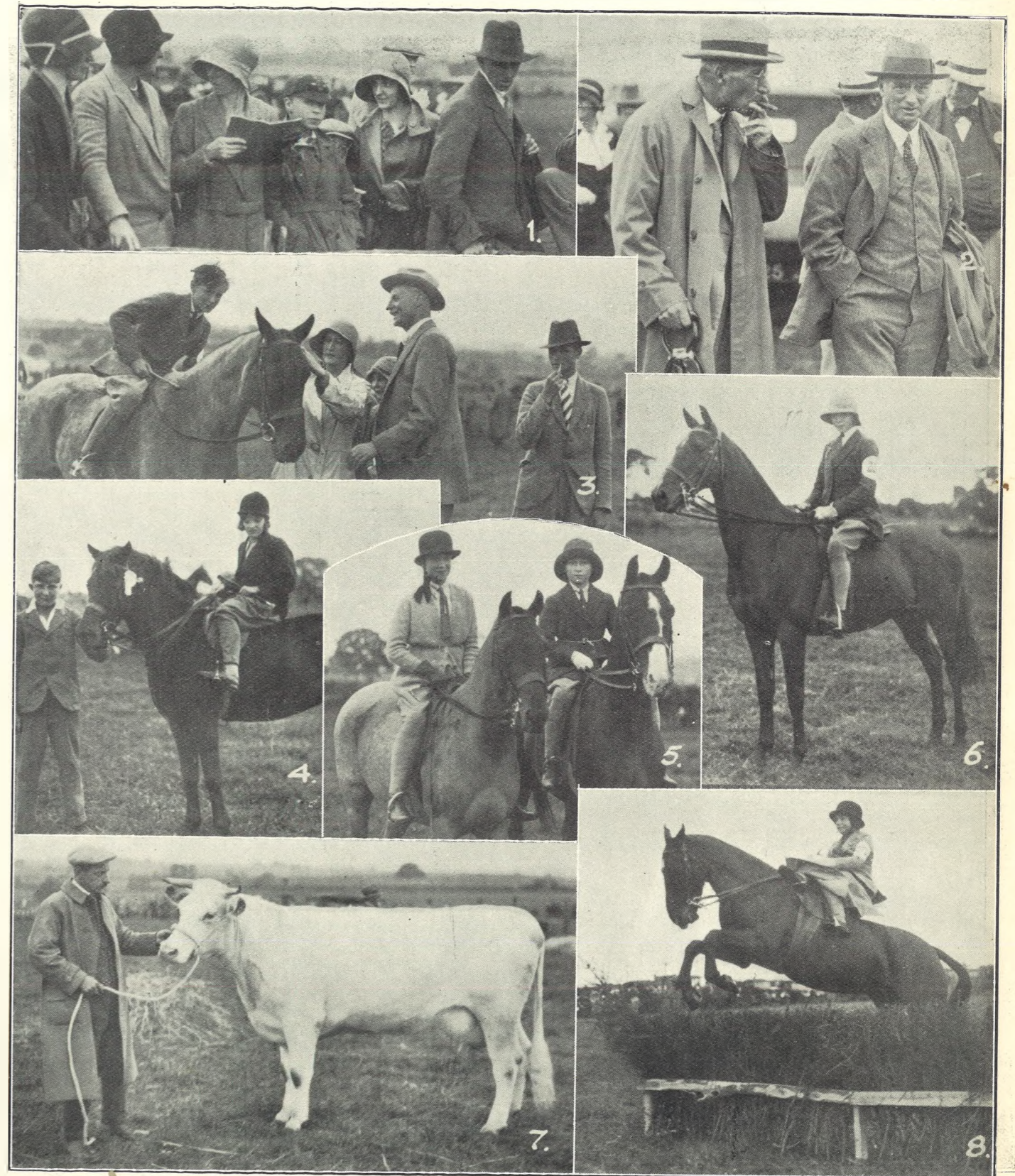


FUNERAL OF THE LATE ALD. J. D. BENDALL.

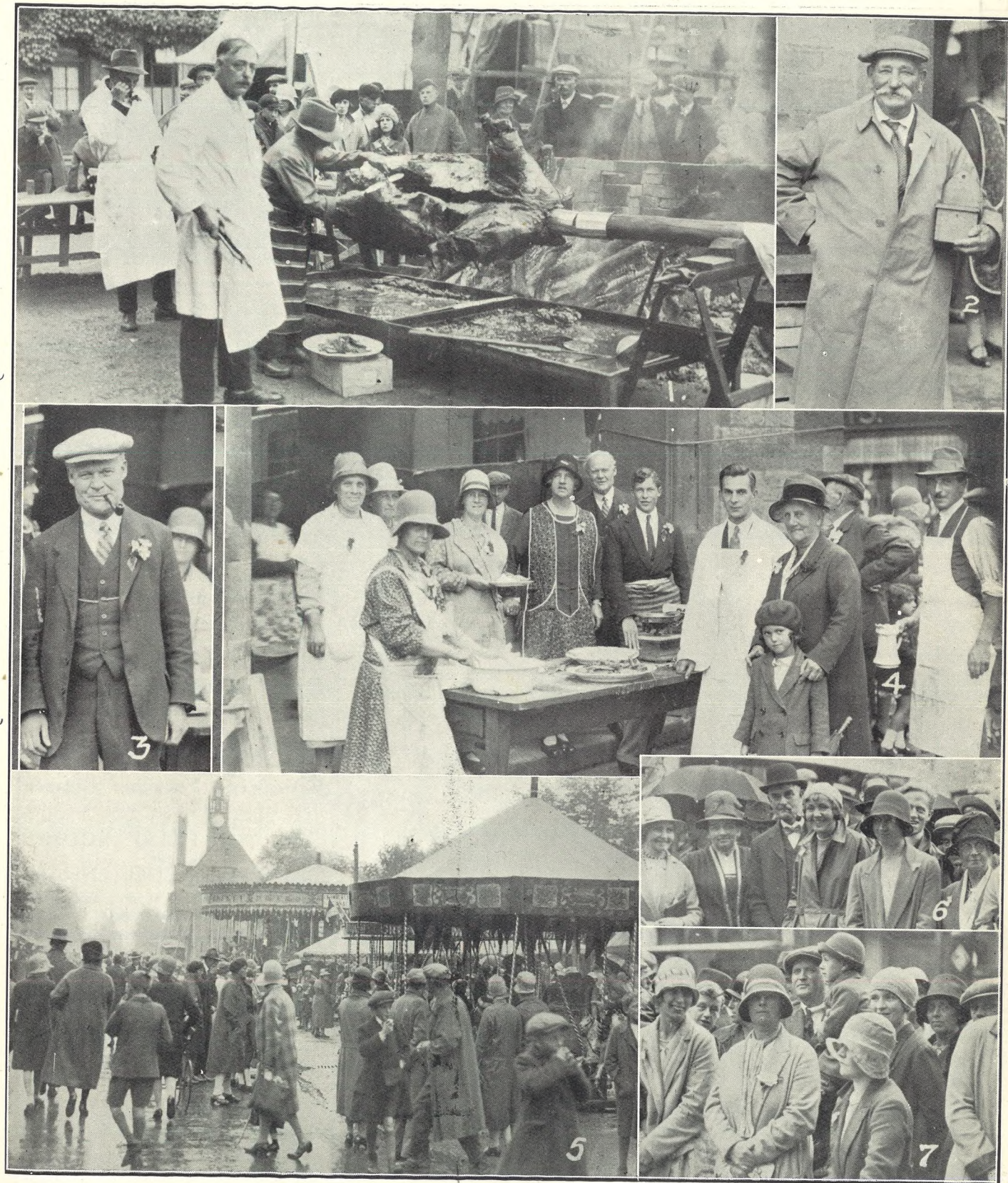

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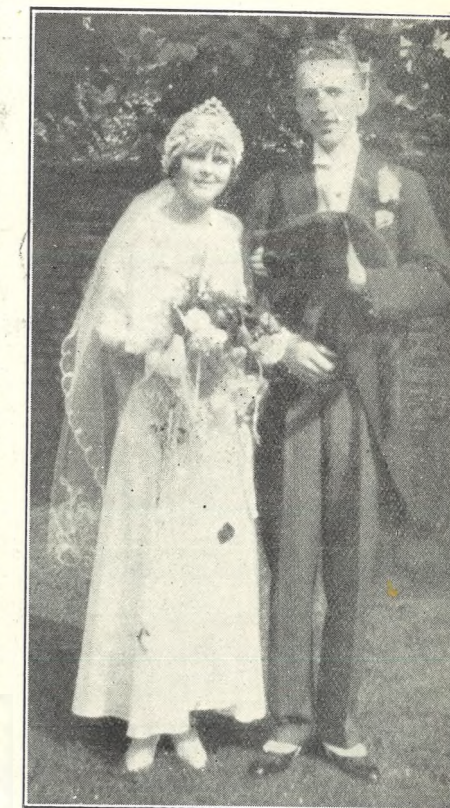

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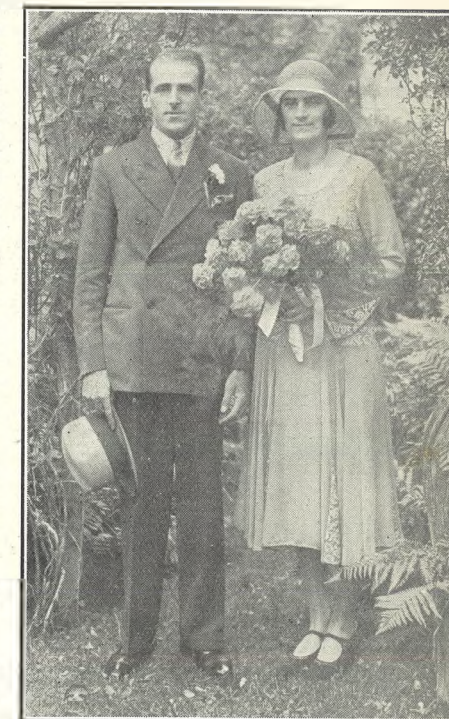
