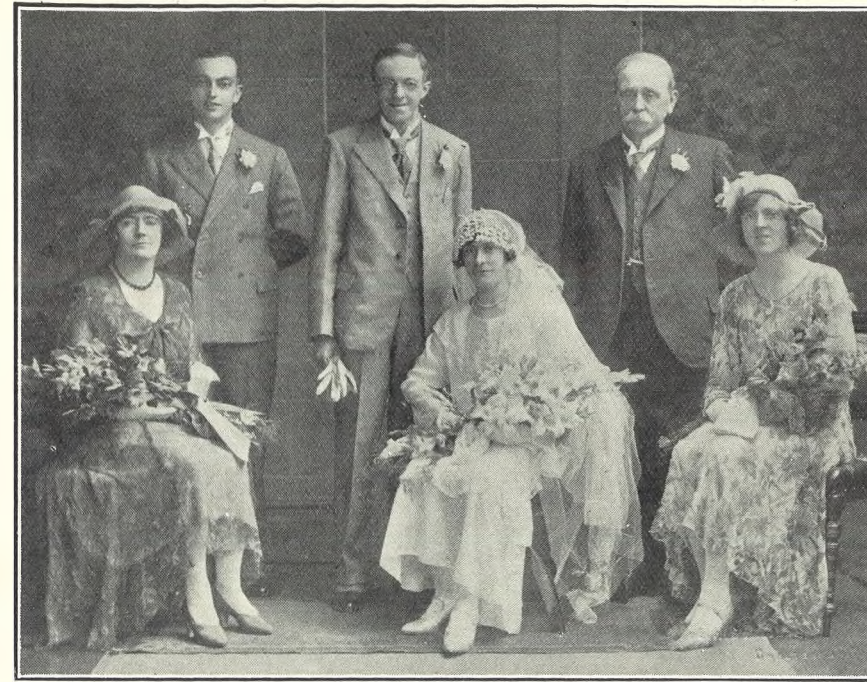

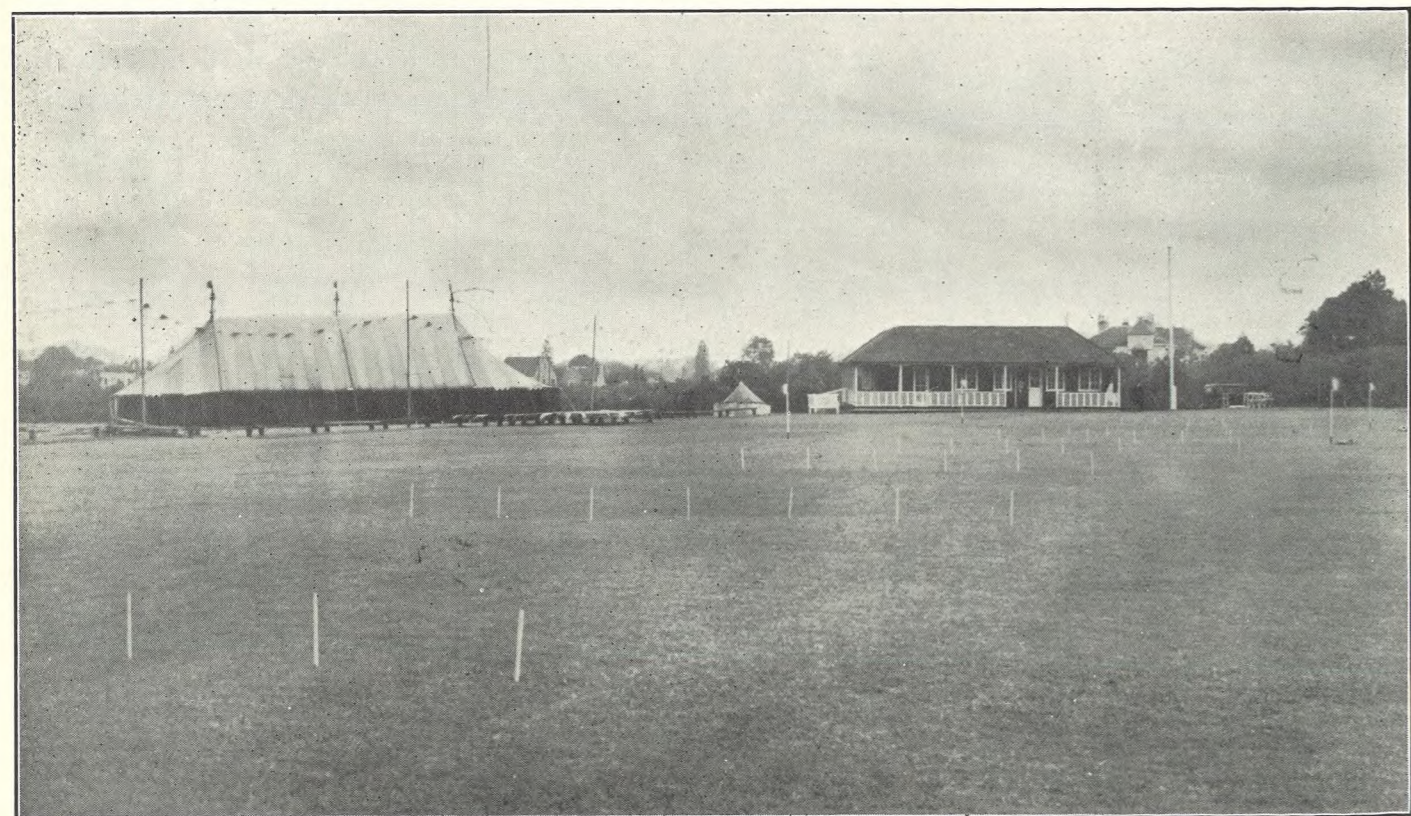

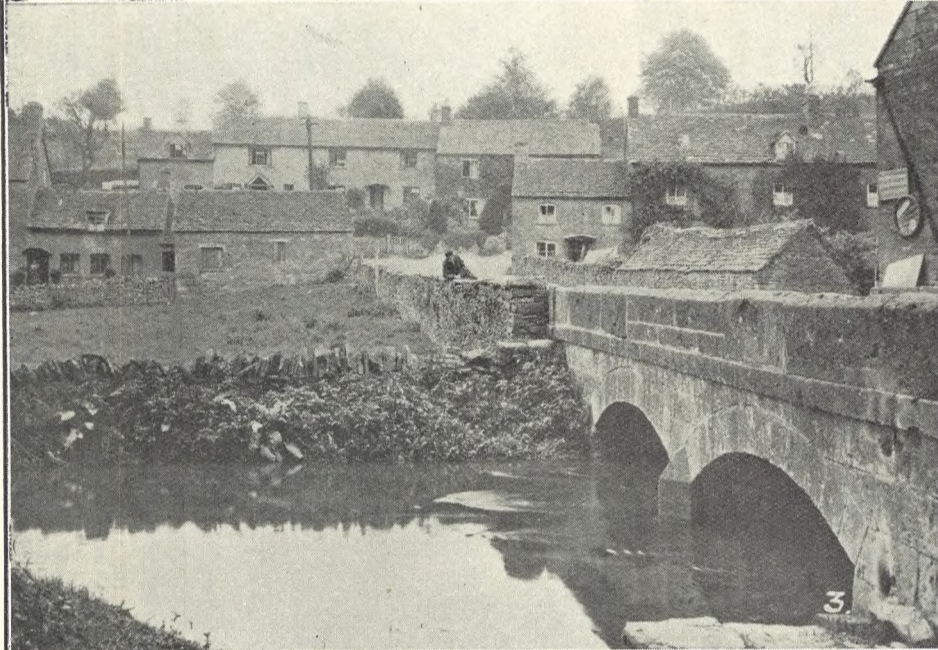
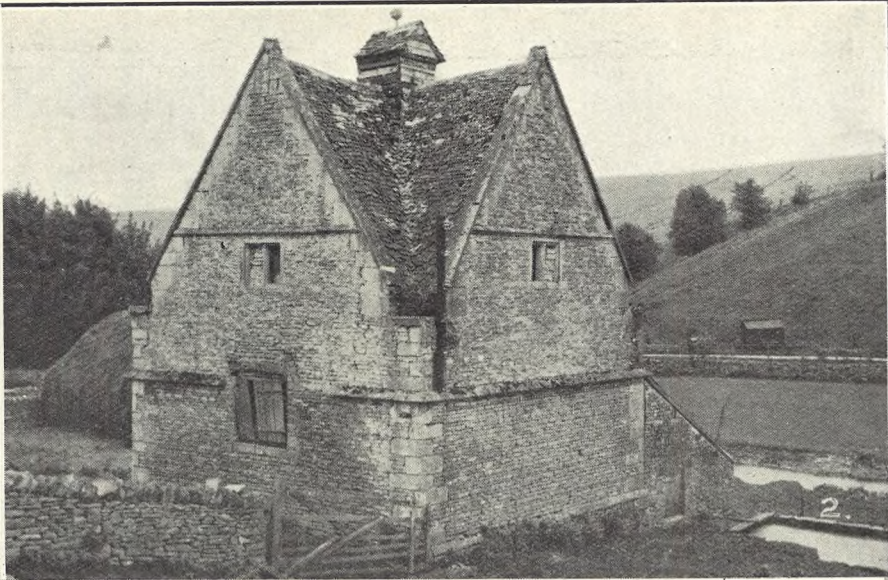

ANOTHER PICTURESQUE COTSWOLD VILLAGE.

Naunton is a long straggling village lying in the valley of the small river Windrush, adjoining the road from Cheltenham to Stow-on-the-Wold, and about twelve miles from the former place. From the main road, the whole village lies far below, every house being visible, with the pretty little trout stream meandering through the meadows. It has many picturesque features. Rudder said in 1779 that the turnpike road from Stow-on-the-Wold to Gloucester ran through the parish near four miles in length. It is not as big as that now.

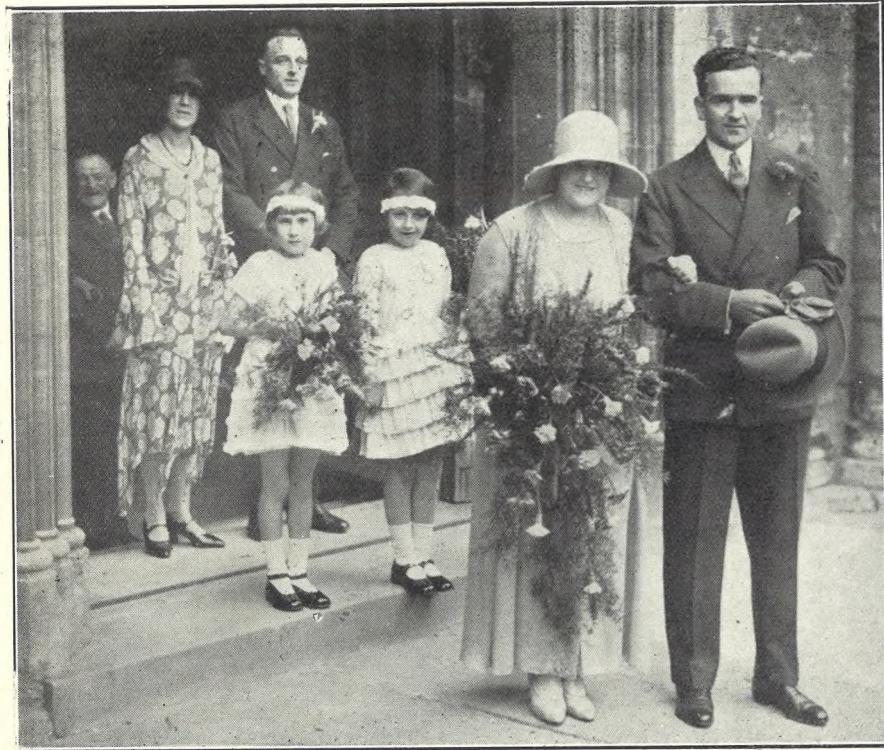

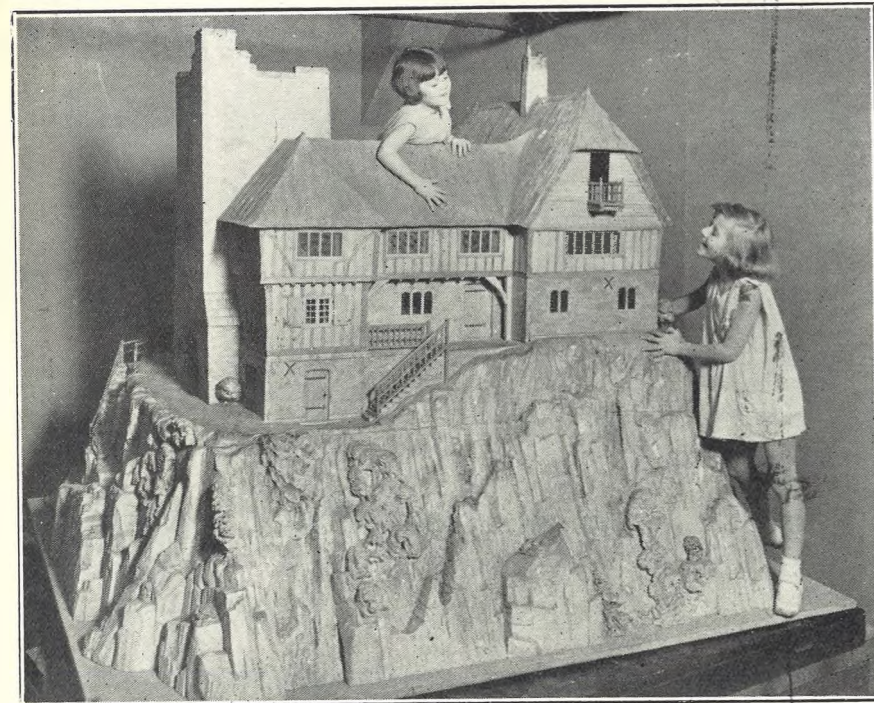

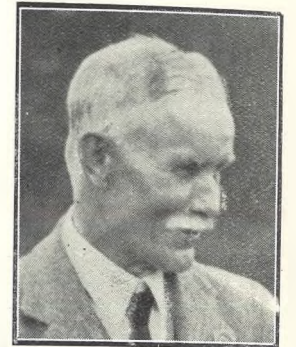

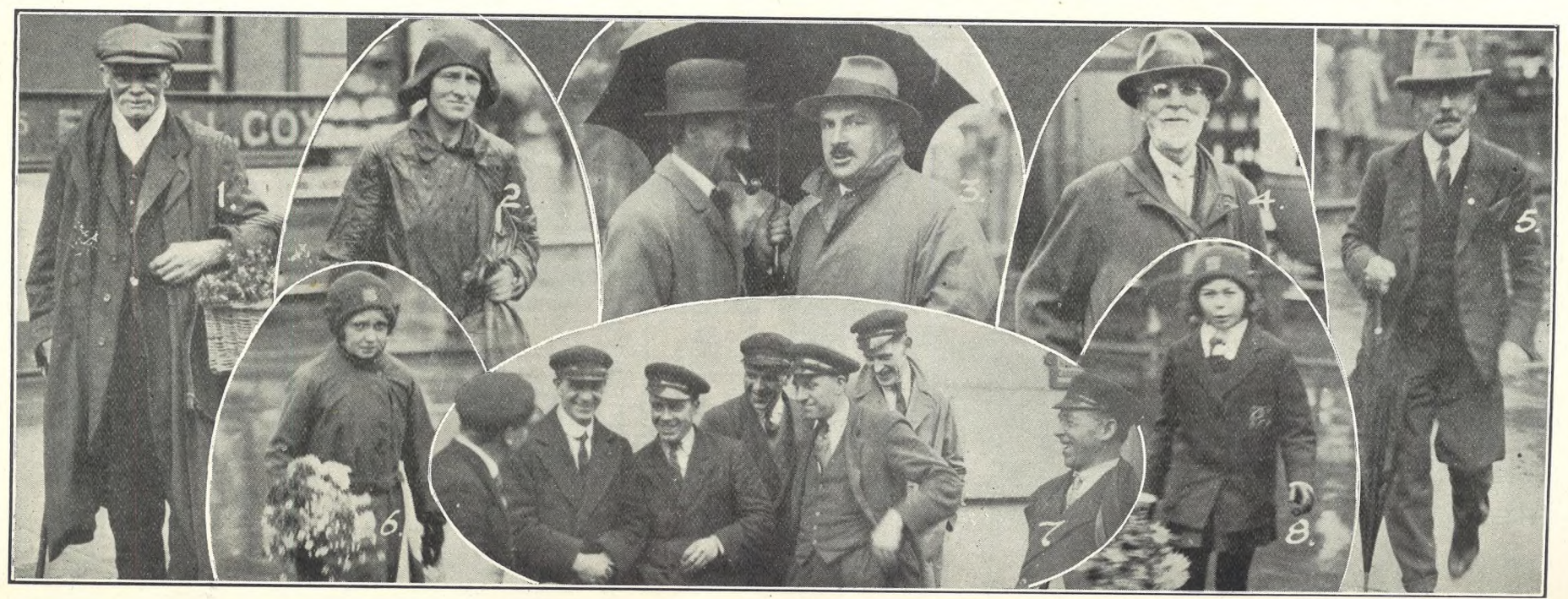
