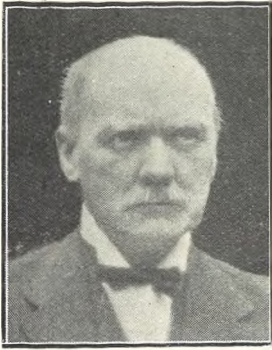

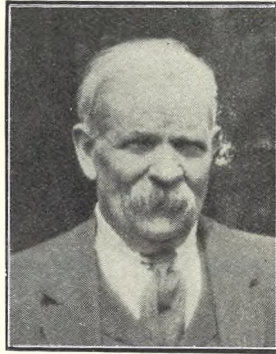

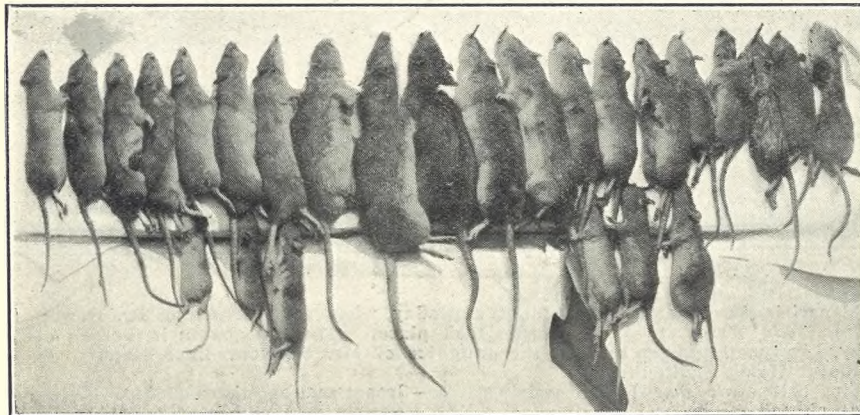

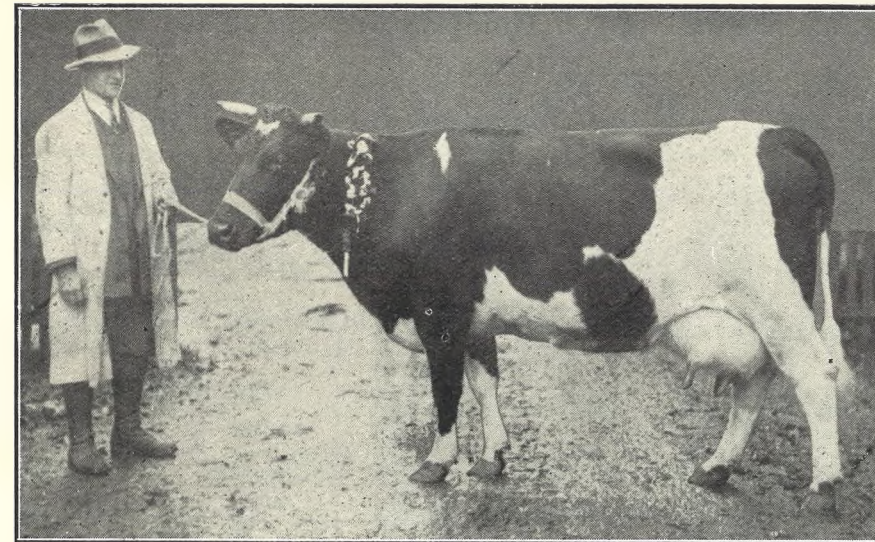

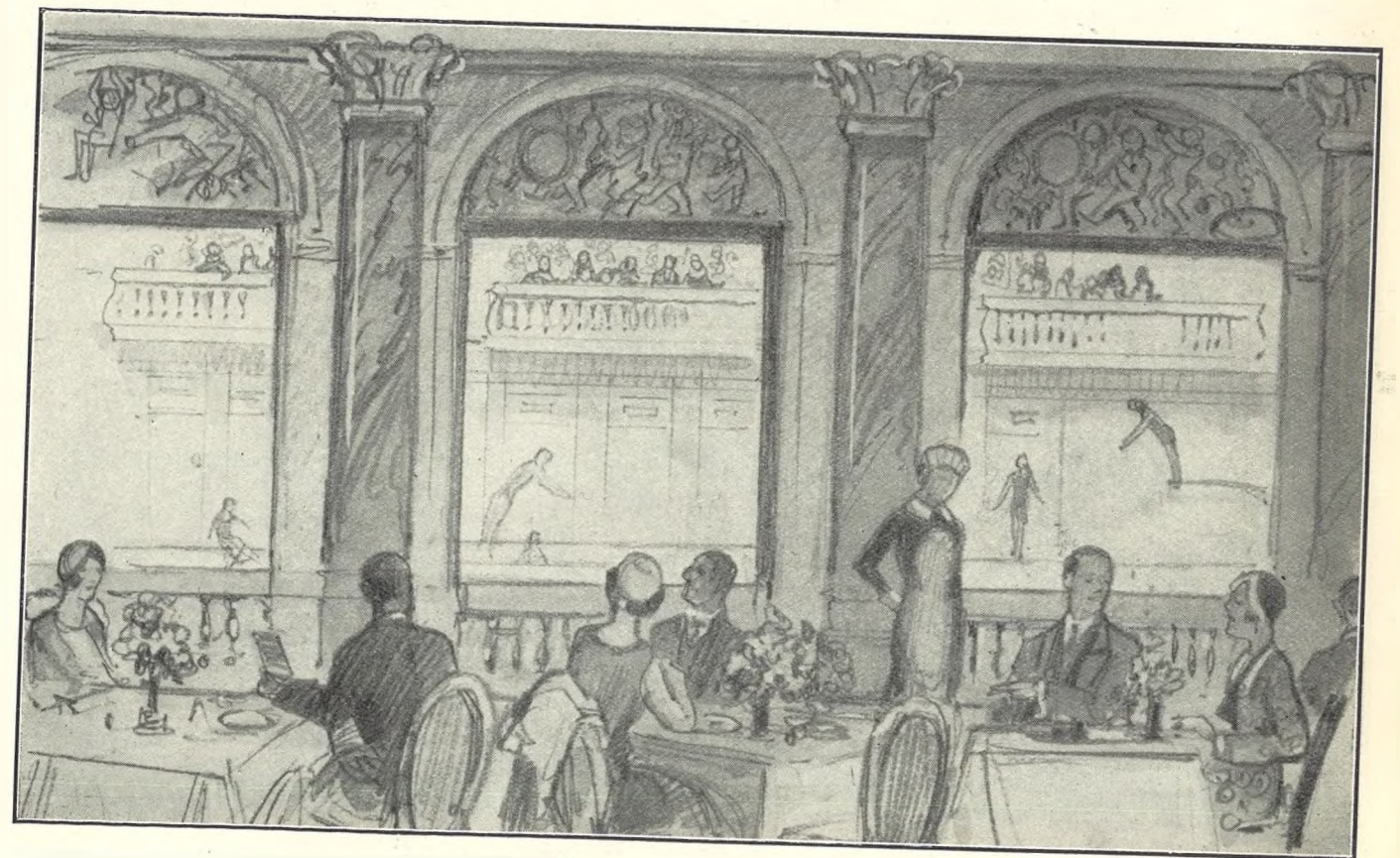
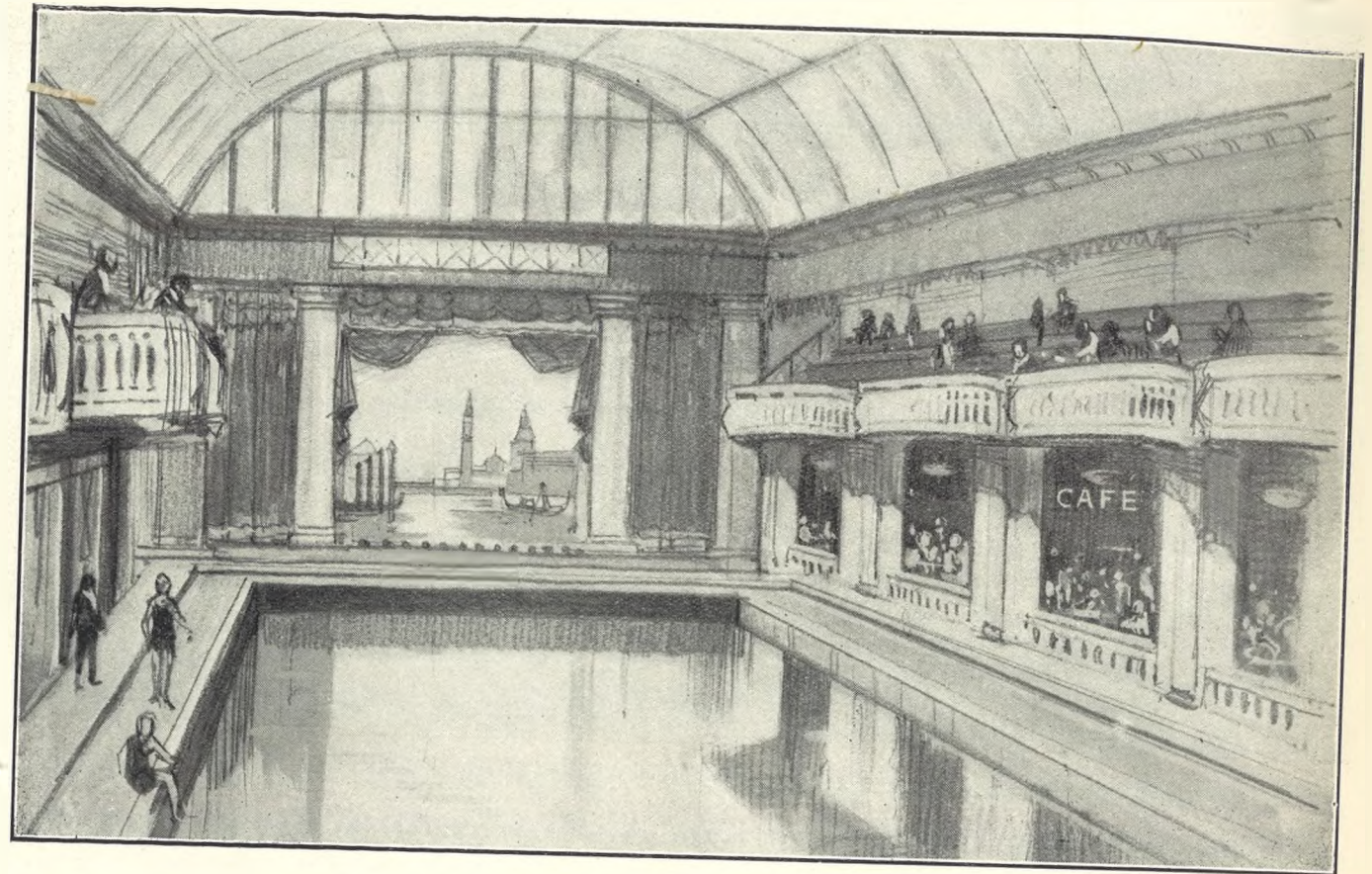


OPENING MEET OF V.W.H. (EARL BATHURST'S) HOUNDS AT BIBURY

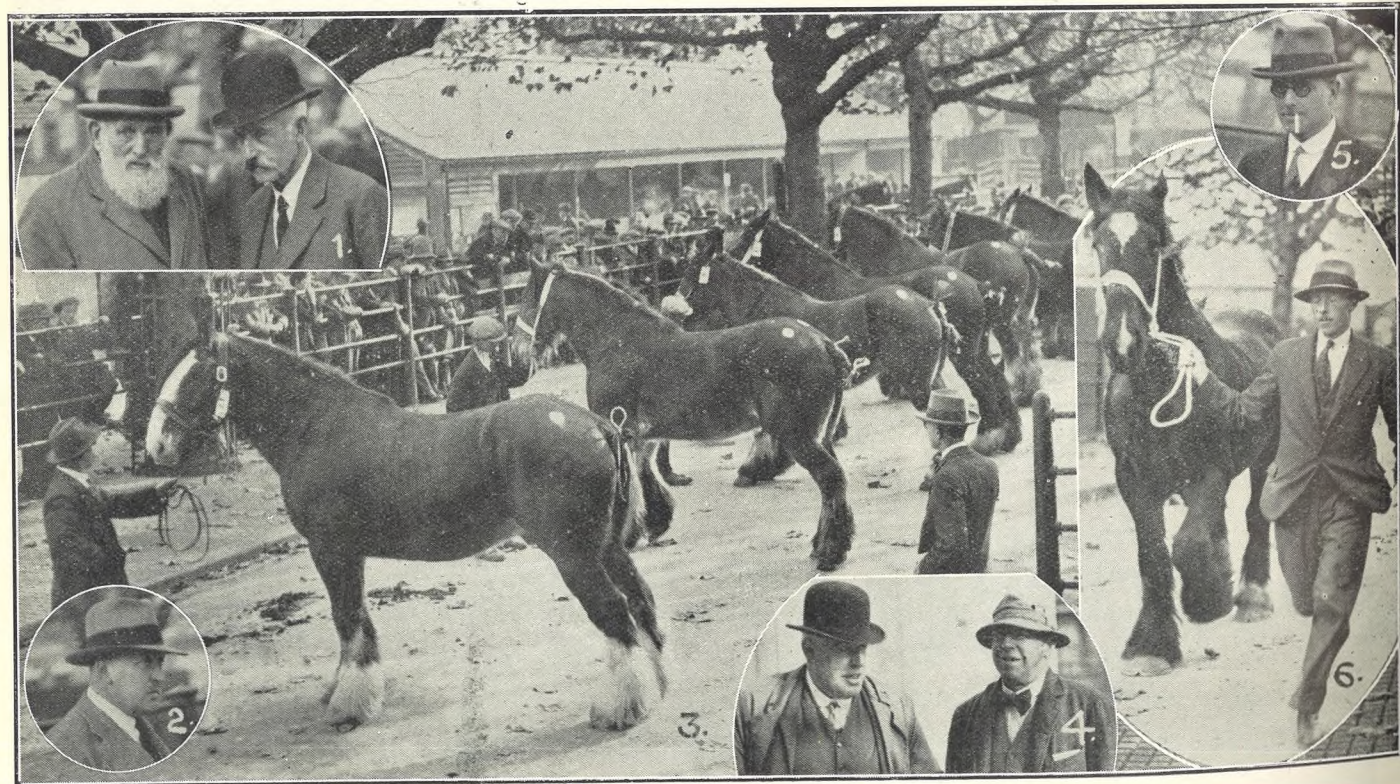

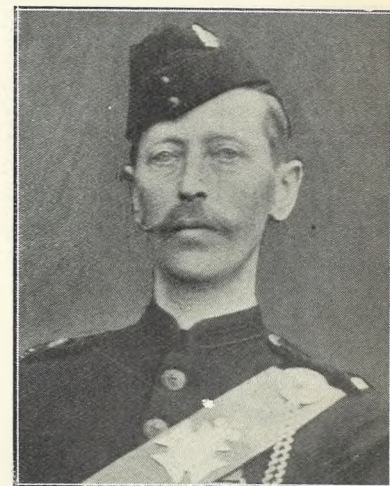

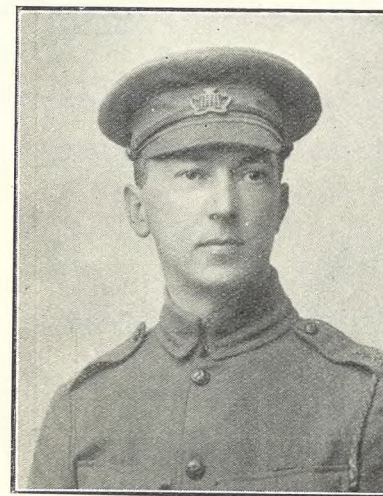

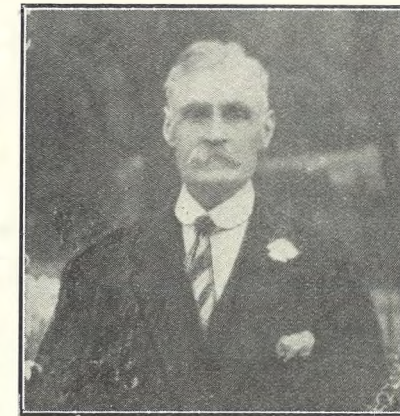


BOXING AT CHELTENHAM COLLEGE

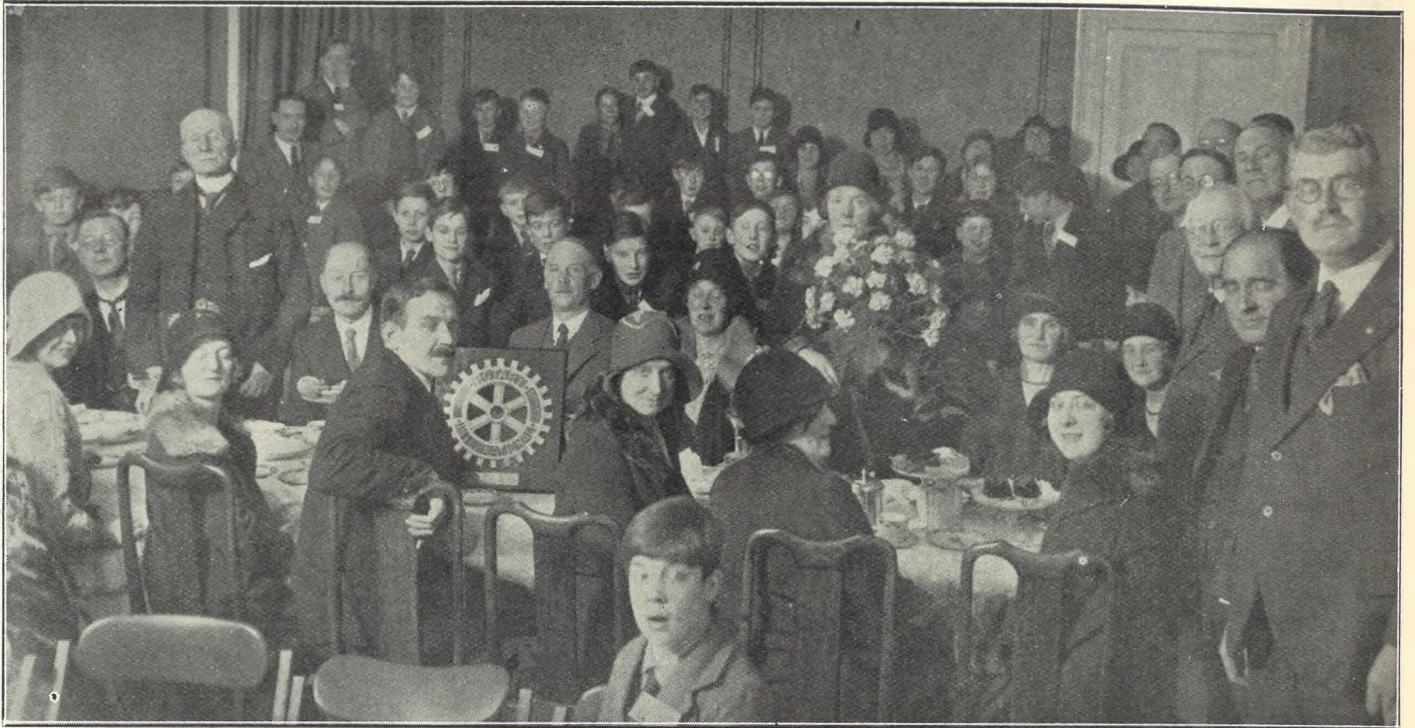

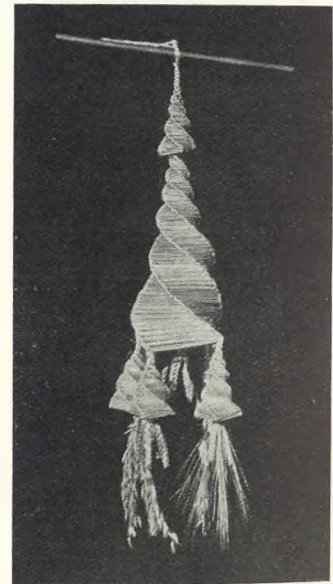
