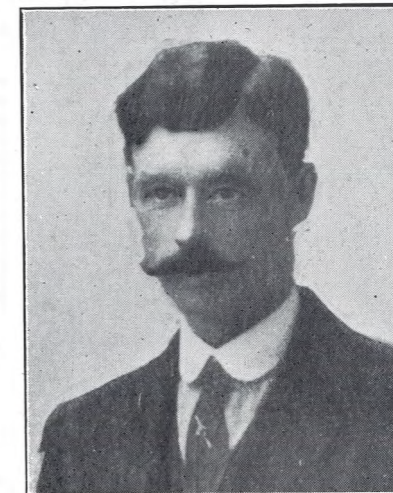

Hasfield is a secluded but pretty village on the west bank of the Severn, about six miles from Tewkesbury. Atkyns, in 1700, says there were 230 inhabitants, Rudder, in 1779, says there were then 175, and at the 1921 census there were 169; so that the population is decreasing. In mediæval days the village belonged to the Pauncefoot family. It was given them by Henry III. in the 33rd year of his reign, and was held by the family till about 1600. One of the Pauncefoots (Sir John) was sheriff of the county several times. Mr. W. M. Baker, J.P., of Hasfield Court, is now lord of the manor.

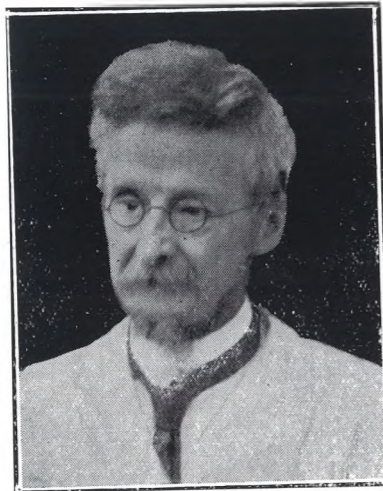
**MR. T. C. WEATHERHEAD,**

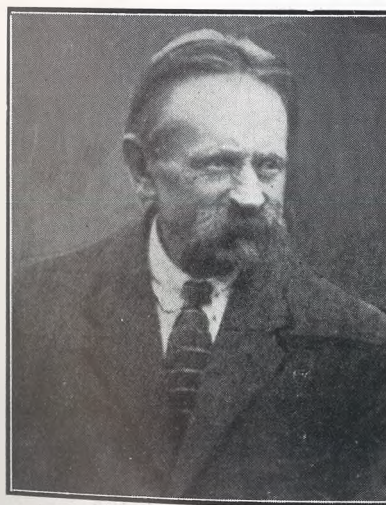

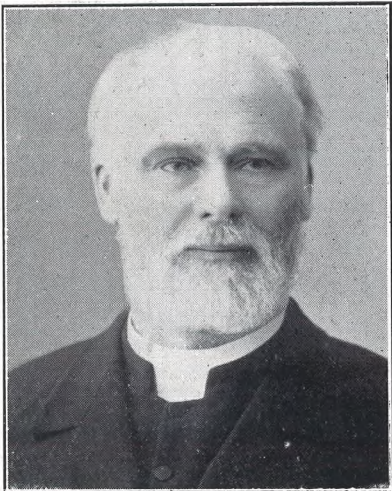

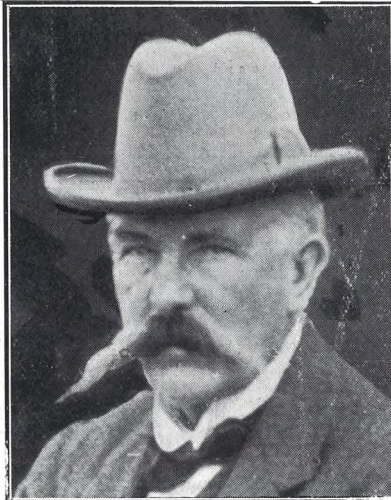
