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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—FORTHAMPTON

Forthampton is a most interesting village on the west side of the Severn, and bordered on the other three sides by Worcestershire. There is an ancient ferry over the Severn here, known as the Lower Lode, to which the survivors of Queen Margaret's army fled after the Battle of Tewkesbury. The village contains many picturesque and ancient houses. The Abbey of Tewkesbury held the Manor of Forthampton from the time of Henry II. until the dissolution, when it was granted to Giles Harper, and afterwards to Robert, Earl of Salisbury.

1.—Hill Farm, a fine old Tudor farmhouse, now occupied by Mr. Guilding.
2.—The Sanctuary cottages.

3.—Another old Elizabethan farmhouse now known as the Cottage Farm, formerly known as Alcock's Farm.

4.—A picturesque old thatched house, for many years the village shop and in occupation of the Dutton family.

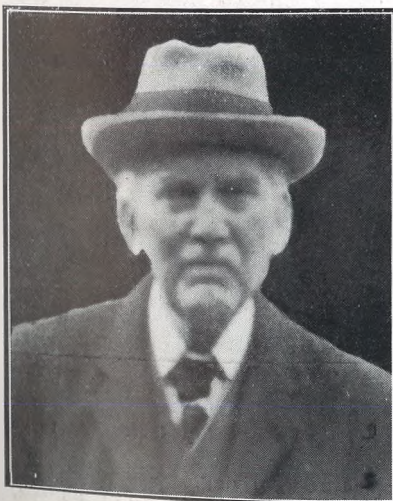
MISS MABEL C. MALLESON, J.P.,

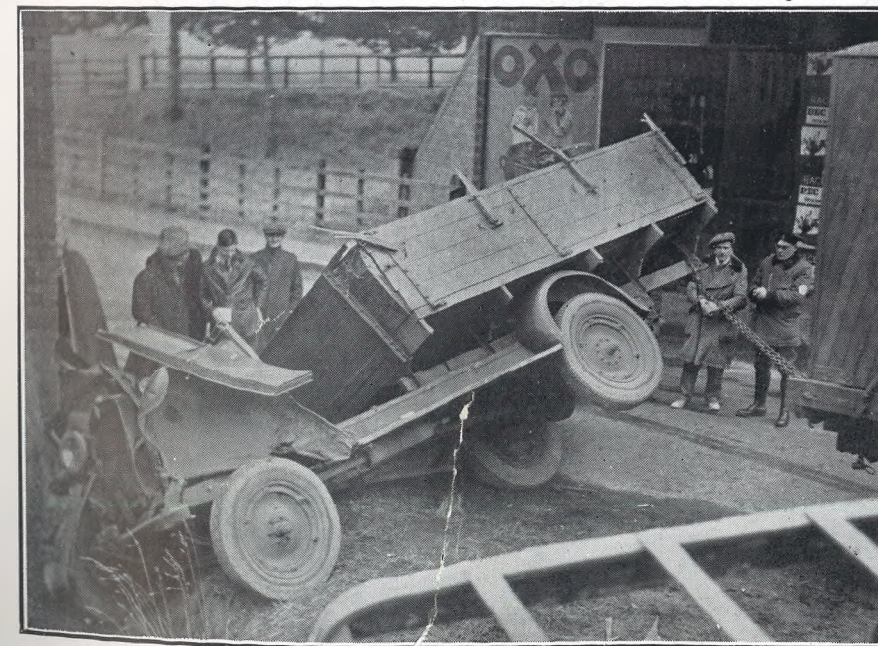

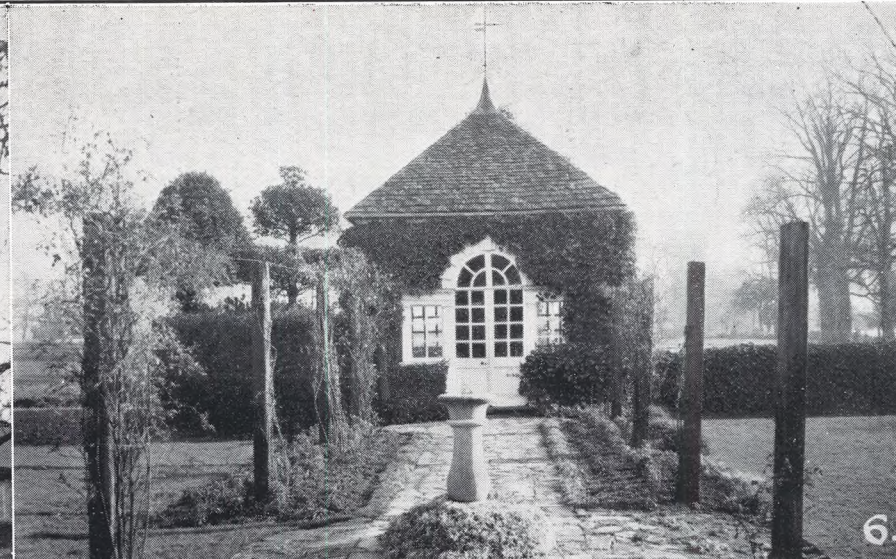

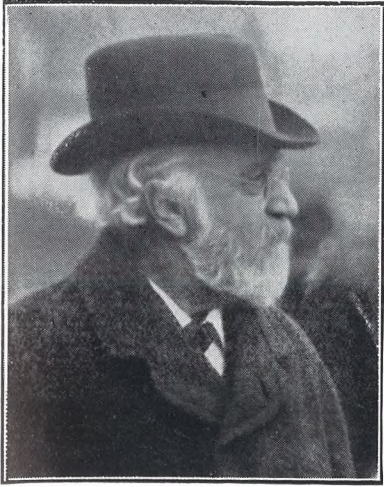
There are many interesting relics of ancient years in the secluded village of Forthampton, amongst them being the old oak stocks and whipping post, still in situ just outside the churchyard gate. The church itself is most interesting, and it is believed that John Wiche, or Wakeman, the last Abbot of Tewkesbury and first Bishop of Gloucester, is buried here, although his grave has never been found. The church contains an original High Altar of stone of 13th Century date, one of only three left in England.

MR. EDWIN LEA,

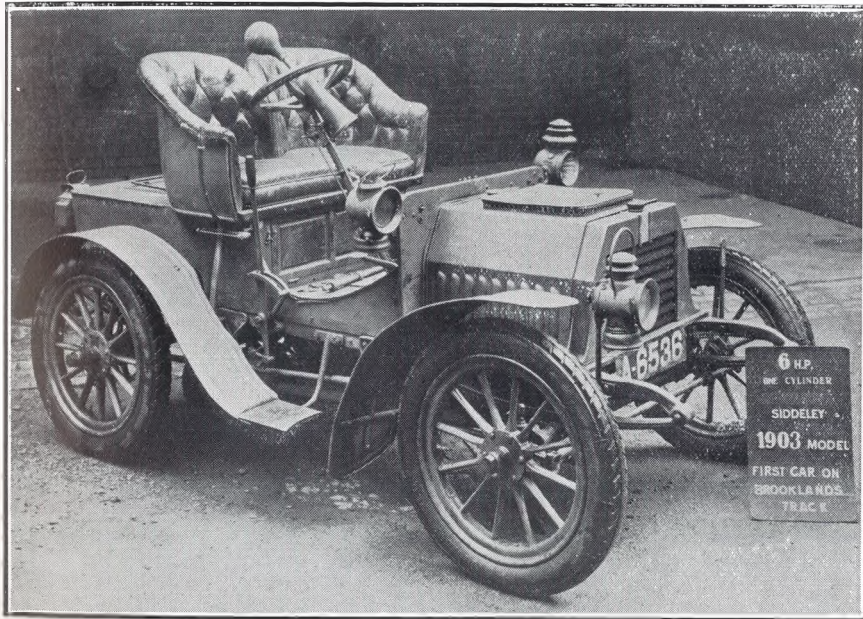

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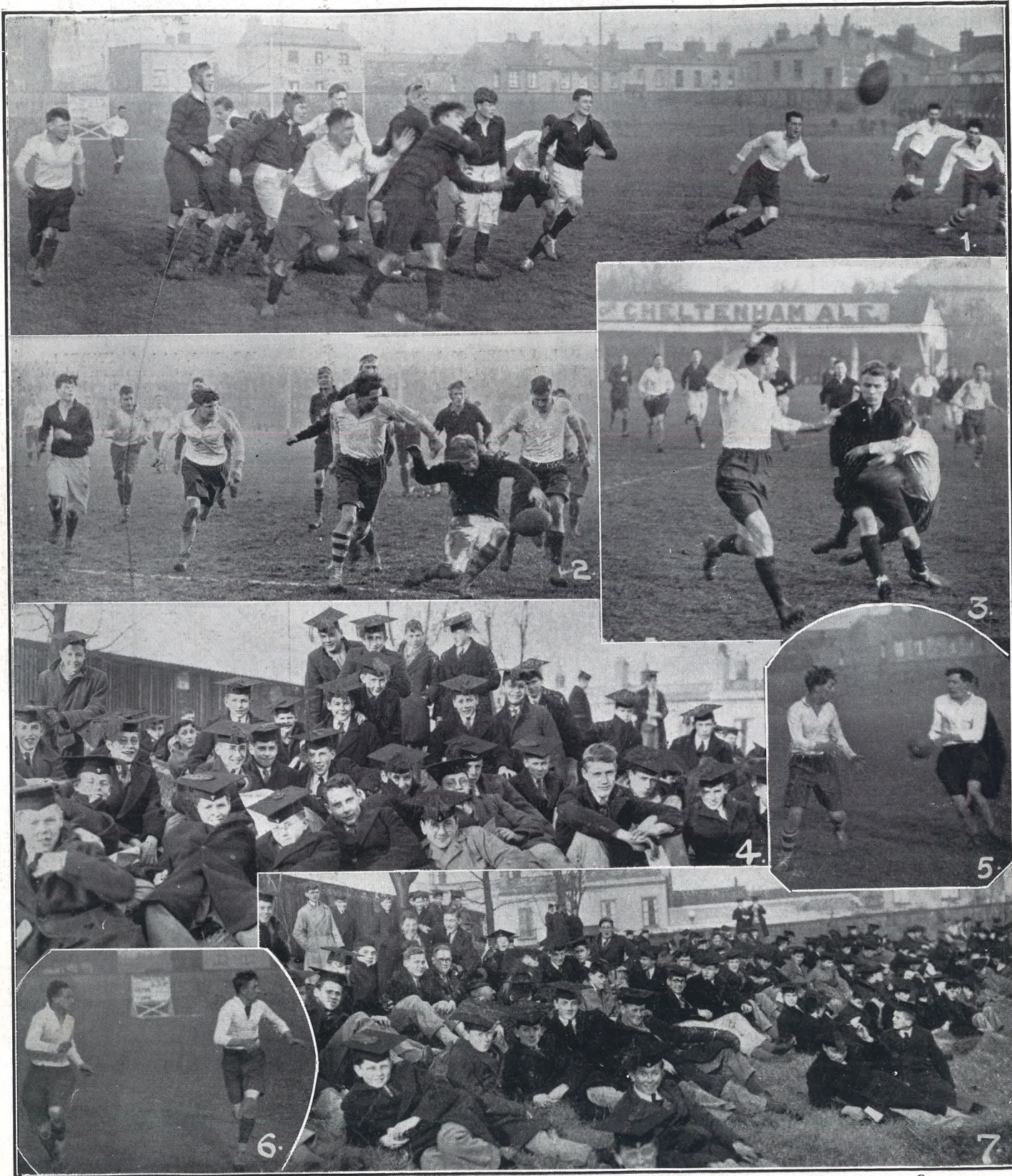
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CHELTENHAM TOWN V. CHELTENHAM COLLEGE

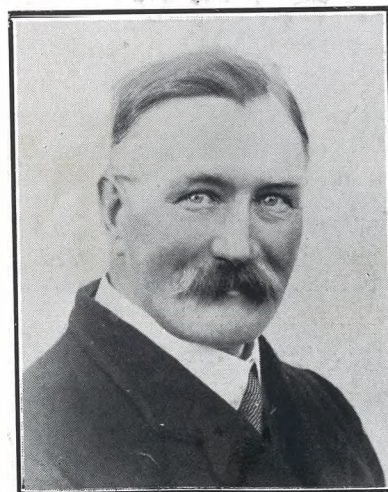

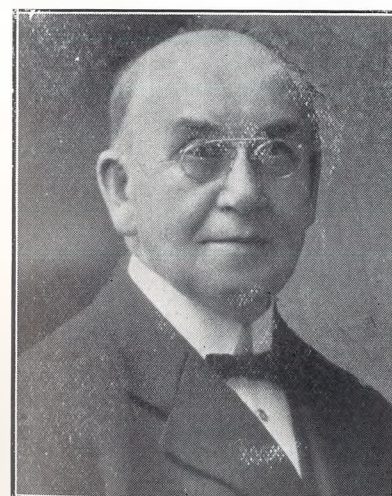
The church from north-west, showing lych-gate and parish war memorial. For article see main sheet of "Chronicle," page five.

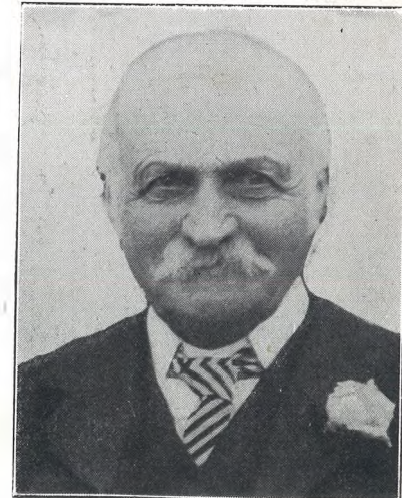

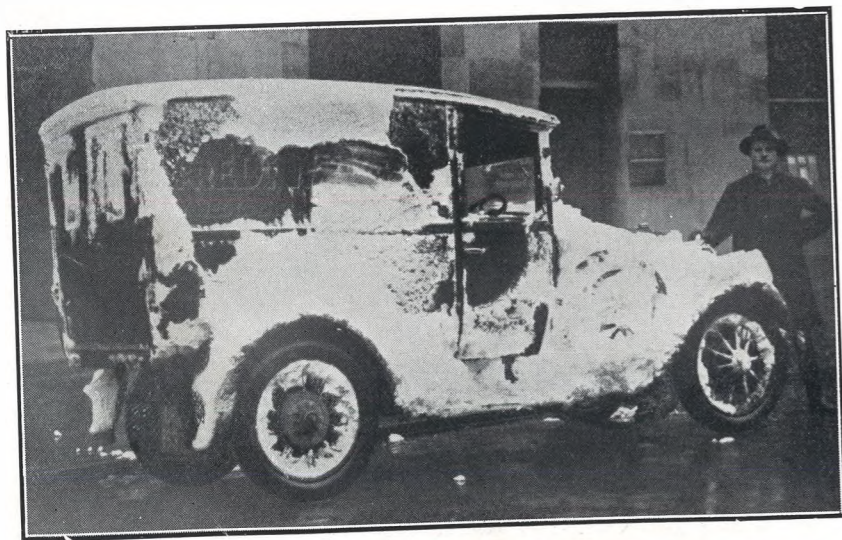

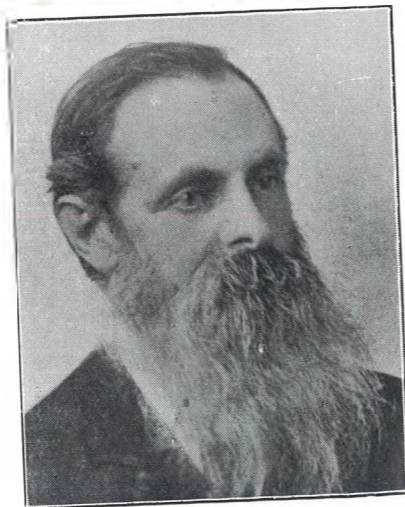

 2—Cheltenham attacking. The Bristol goalkeeper runs out to save from Gregory, who misses the ball altogether.

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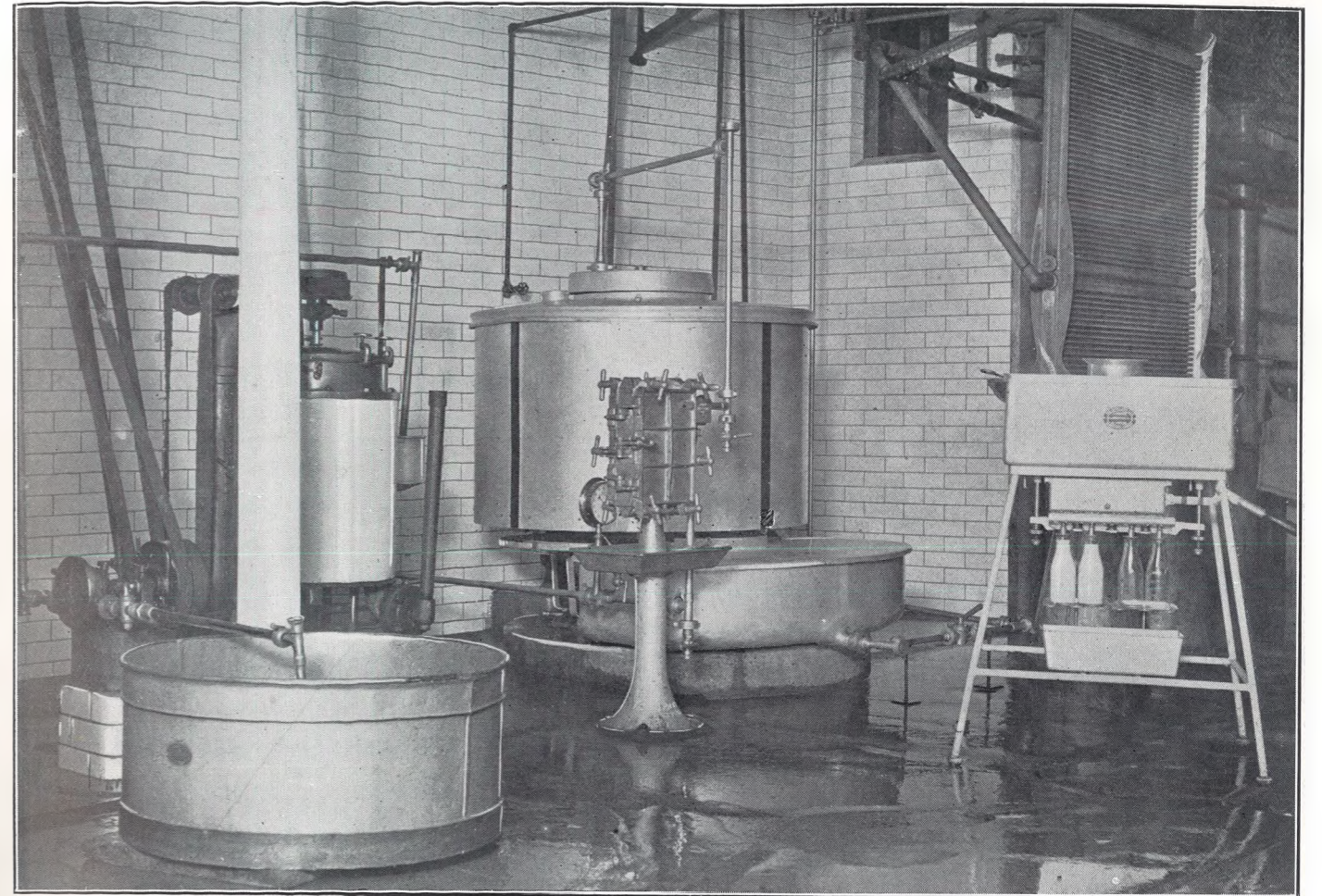


DUG OUT OF THE SNOW

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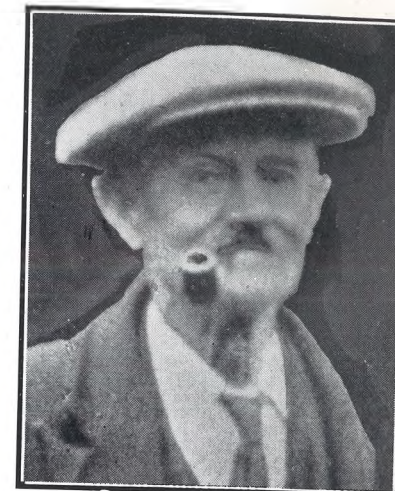

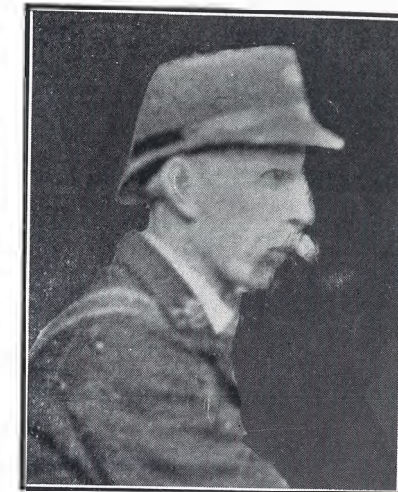

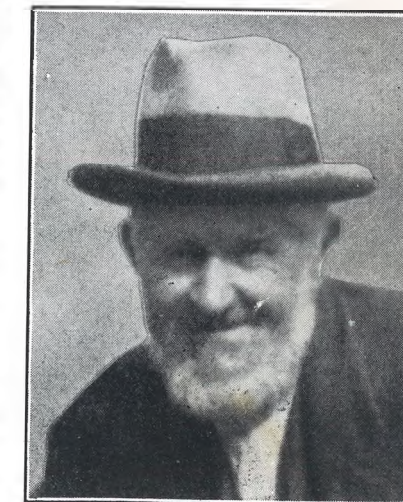

Domesday Book says "it was formerly worth £8, now £7." The manor was given to the Abbey of Winchcombe by Robert Gyves in the 35th year of Henry III.'s reign, and the Abbey held it until dissolution.

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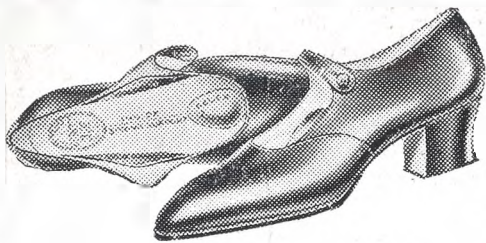

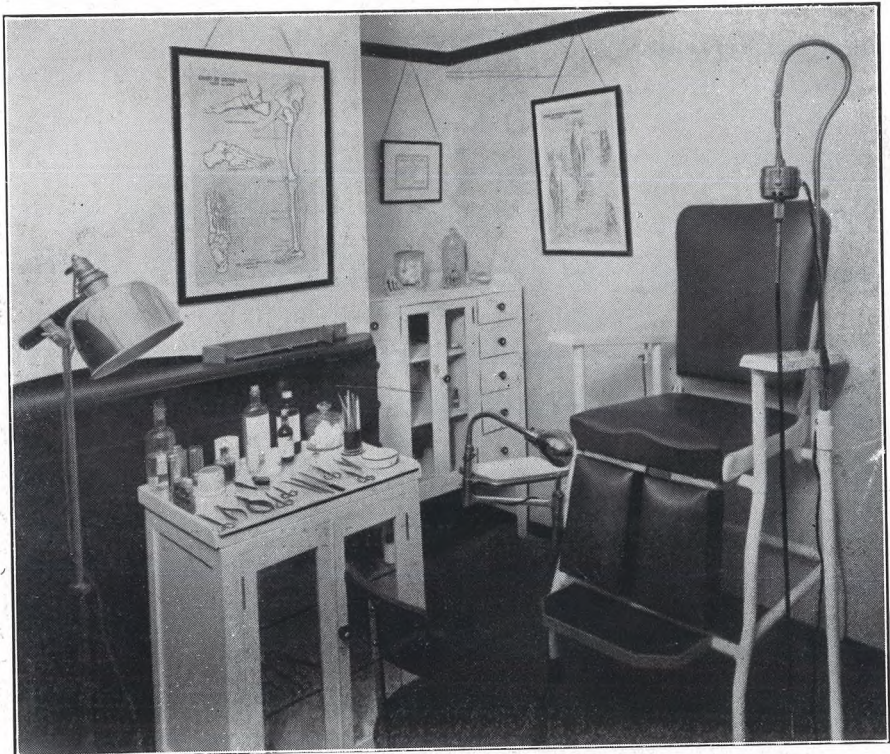

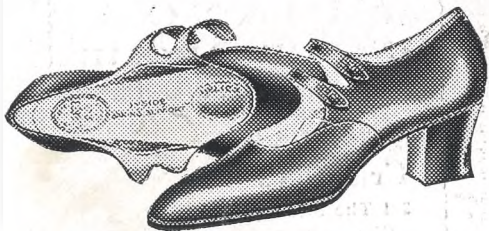
