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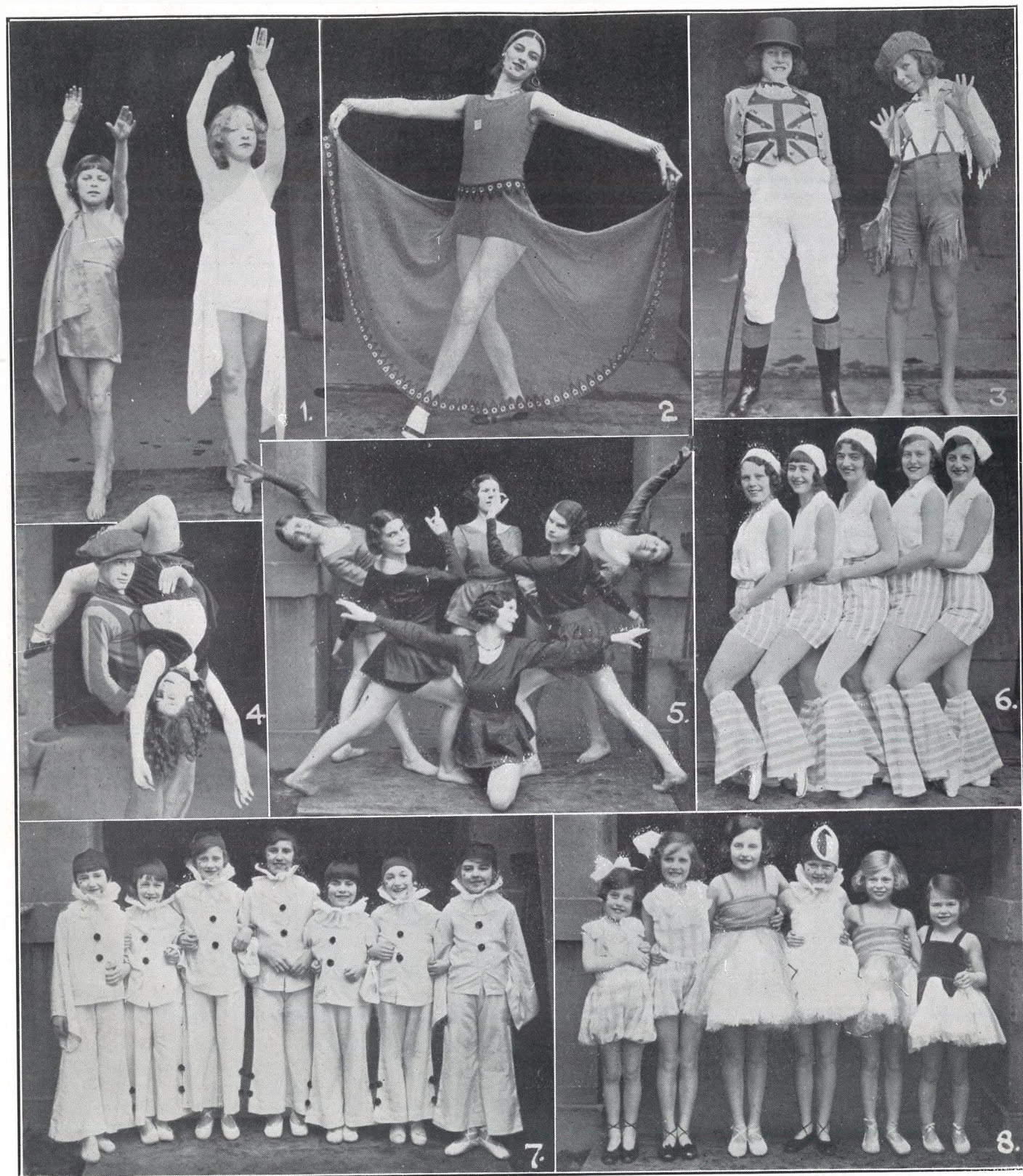
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**SOLO DANCING EXAMINATION IN CHELTENHAM**

**PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE: SALPERTON**

- Salperton is one of the most secluded villages on the Cotswolds, being right away from any main road, and lying about half-way between the Cheltenham to Stow and Cheltenham to Northleach-roads. The church is interesting, with many Norman features.
- 1.—A glimpse of the centre of the village. The grey stone houses and grey stone roofs seem to merge naturally into the landscape on a grey day, and give one the feeling about these Cotswold villages that "as it was in the beginning, so it is now, and ever shall be."
  - 2.—Salperton Church.
  - 3.—A quaint huddle of cottages beneath the railway embankment. A little trout stream flows between the wall and the cottages.
  - 4.—A striking memorial crucifix in the village to Lieut. Foster Harter.

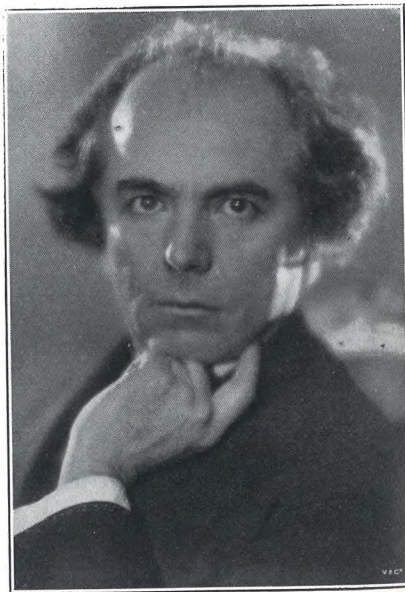

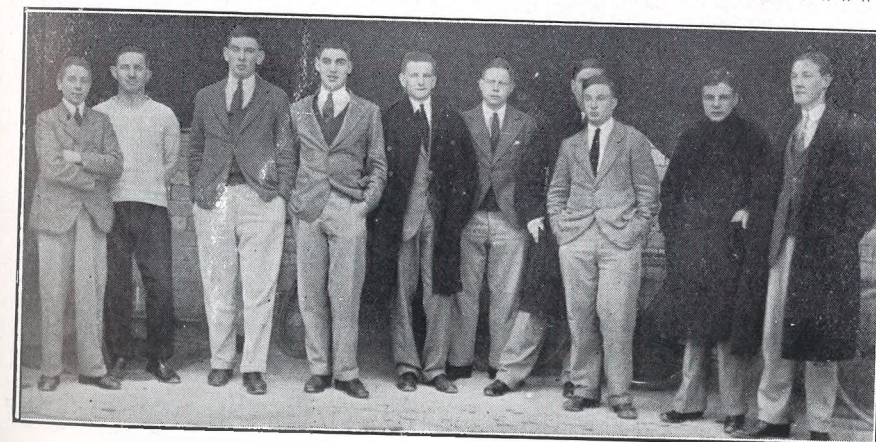

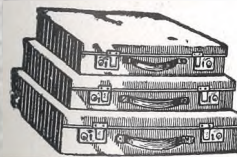

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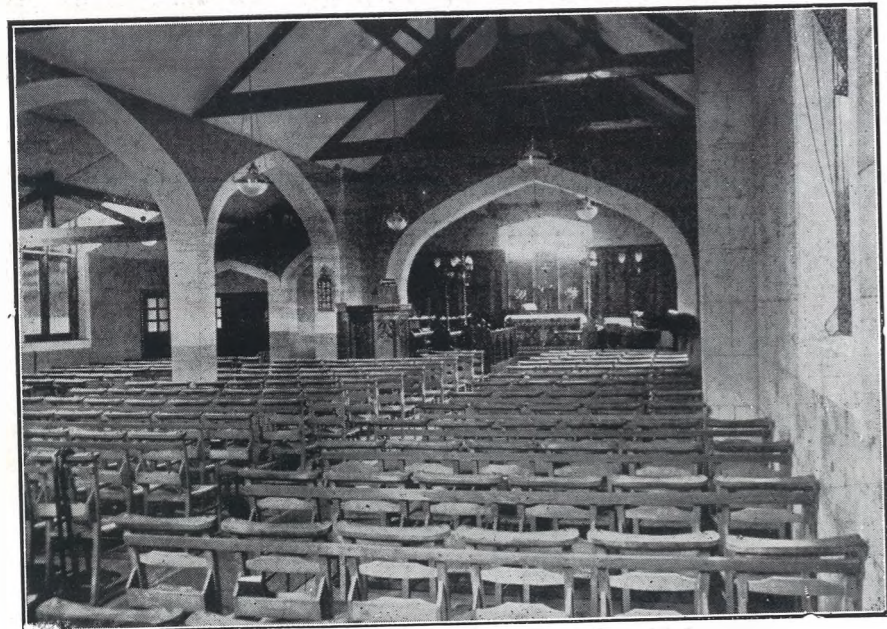

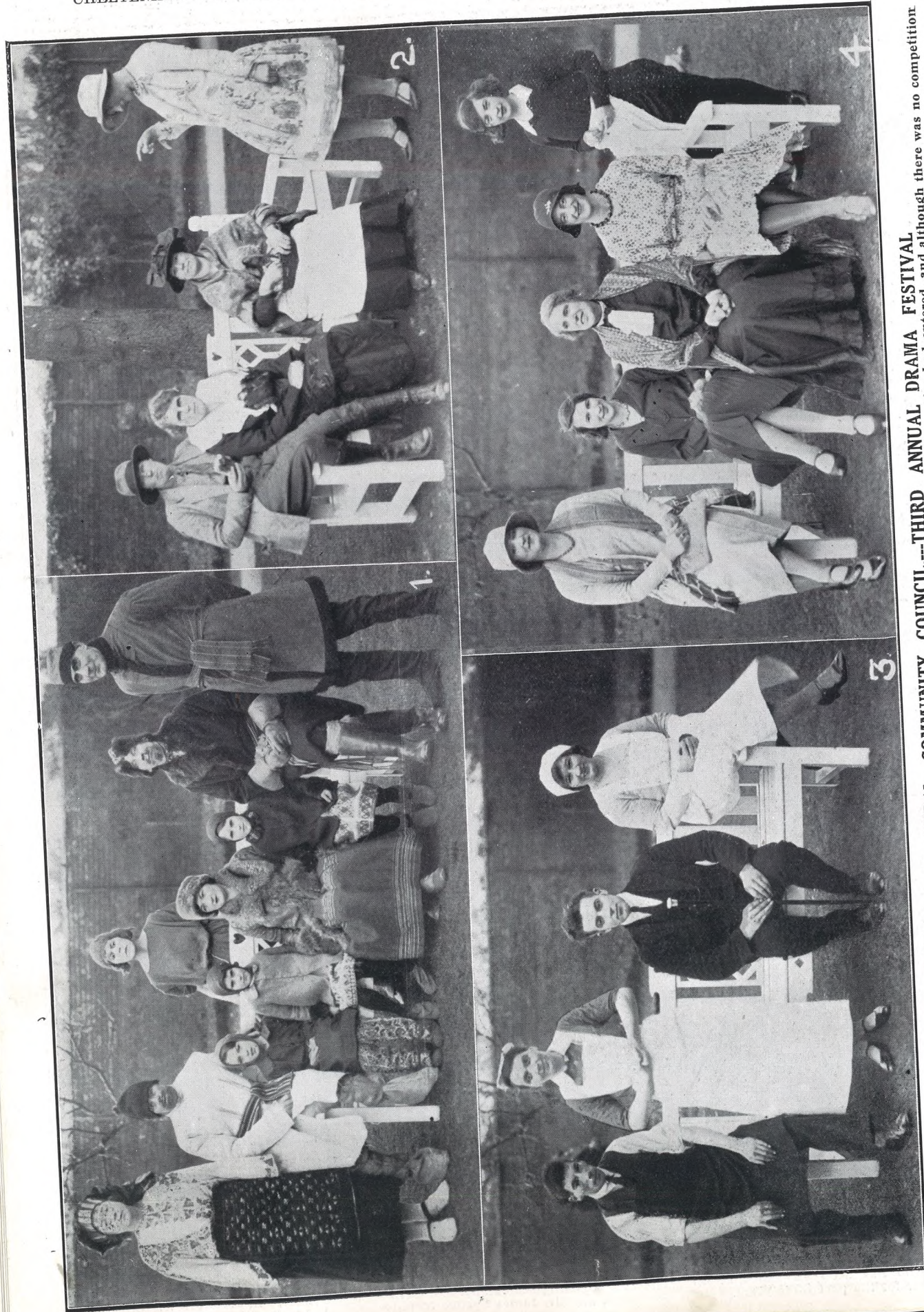


**OPENING OF NEW BON MARCHE BUILDING IN GLOUCESTER**

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**PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—PRESTON**

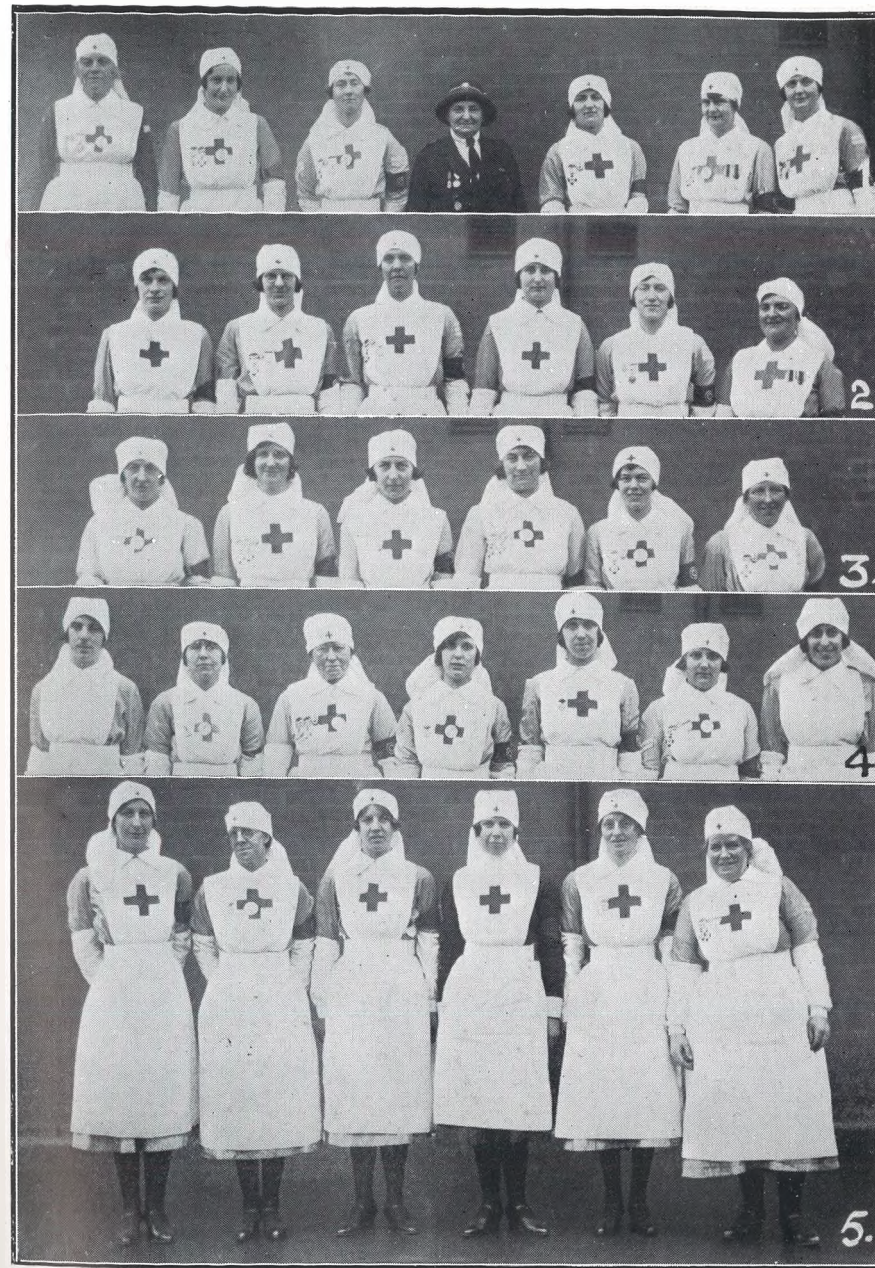

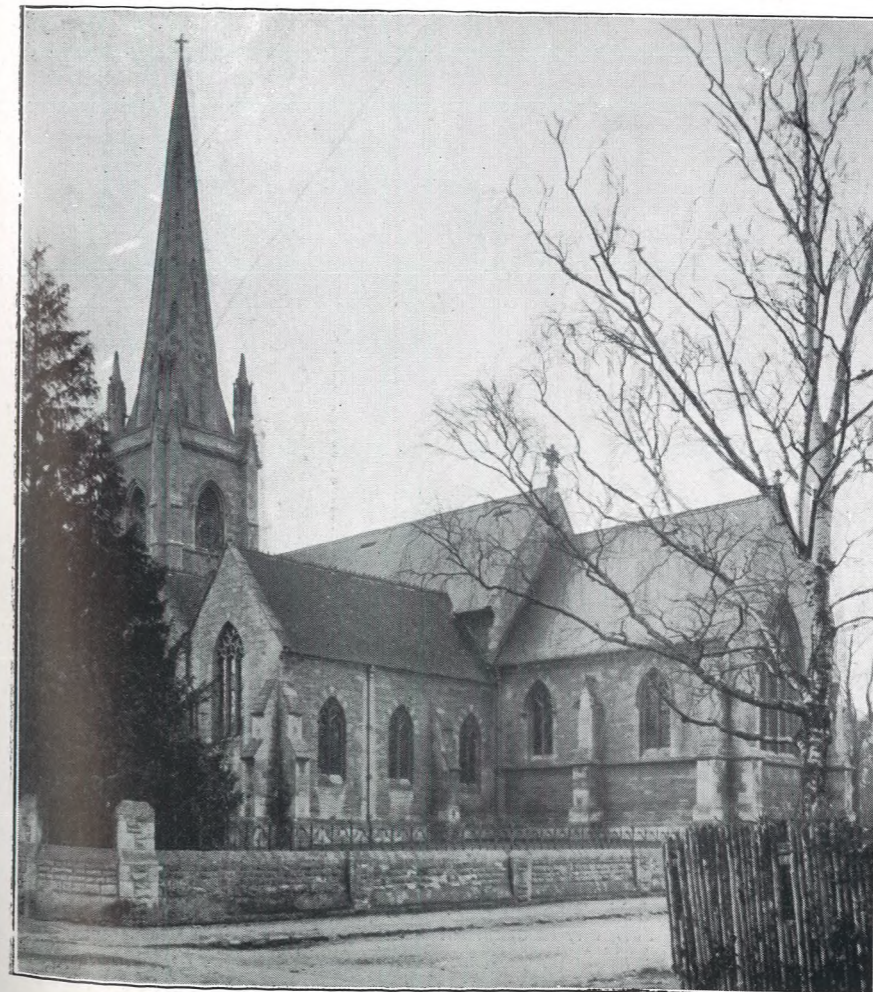
