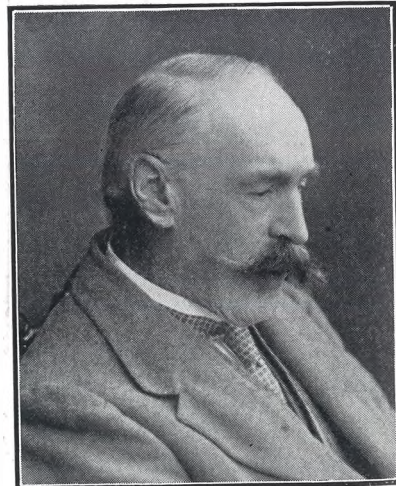

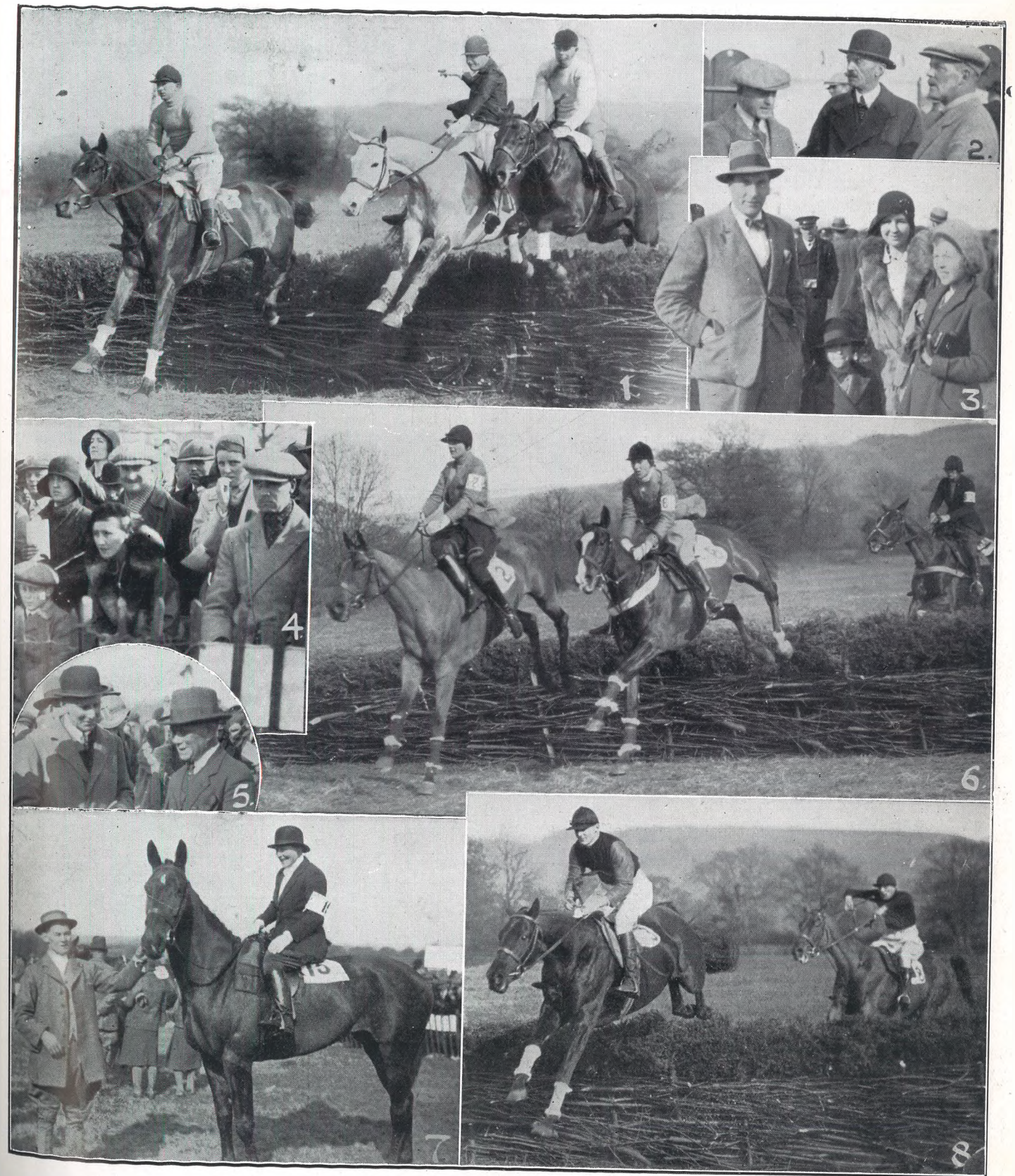

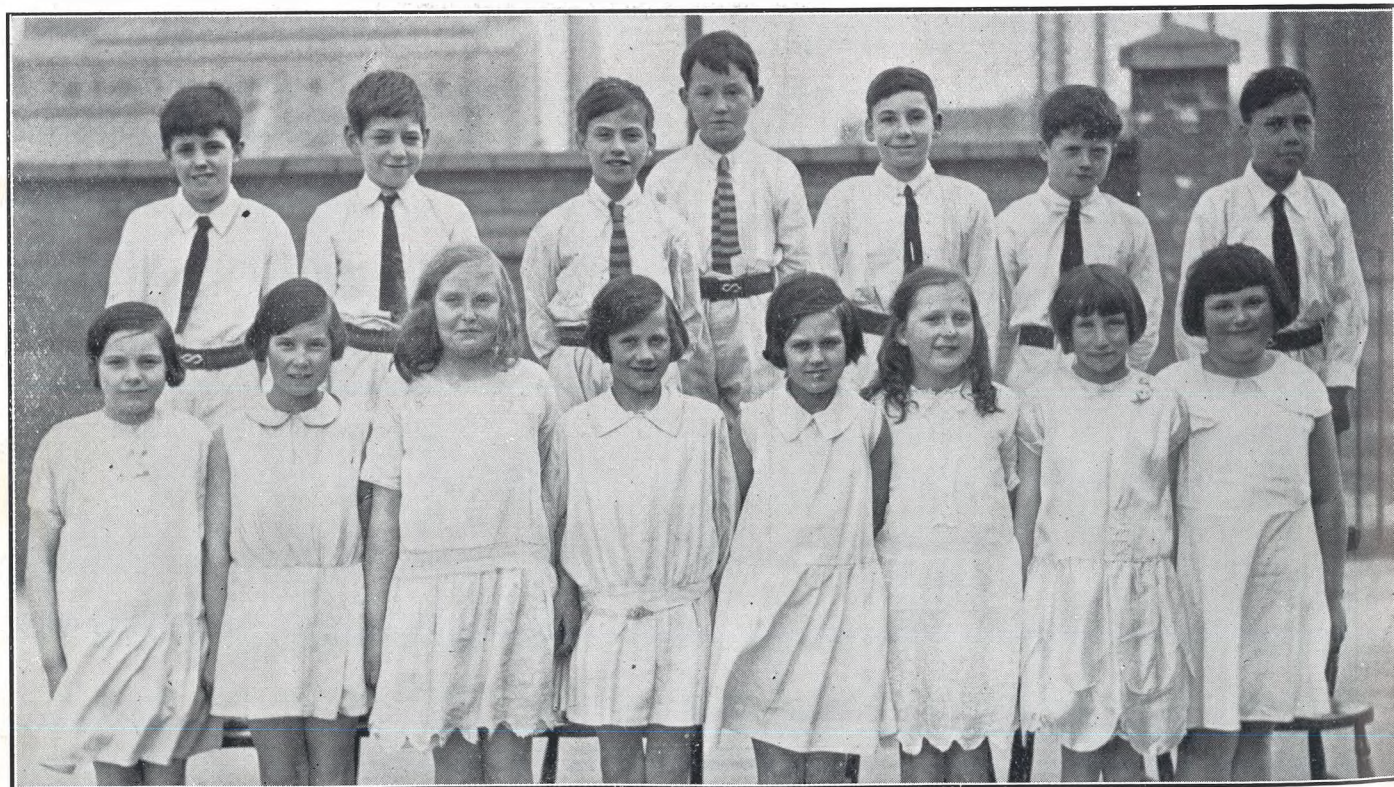

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—COWLEY

Cowley is a Cotswold village, situate about 5½ miles from Cheltenham on the Cheltenham and Cirencester-road. The glory of the parish is the magnificent manor. The mansion, which is built of stone, alongside the ancient church, is delightfully situated on the slope of a hill, and the pleasure grounds are beautifully laid out. A trout stream runs through the park and grounds, which also contains a series of lovely lakes. It is now unoccupied, but is the property of Mr. Sidney Allen.

A Mr. Henry Bret was lessee of the manor about 1700, and it is stated by Rudder (1779) that he was so passionately fond of ringing that he dissipated a fortune travelling about the country with a company of ringers at vast expense.

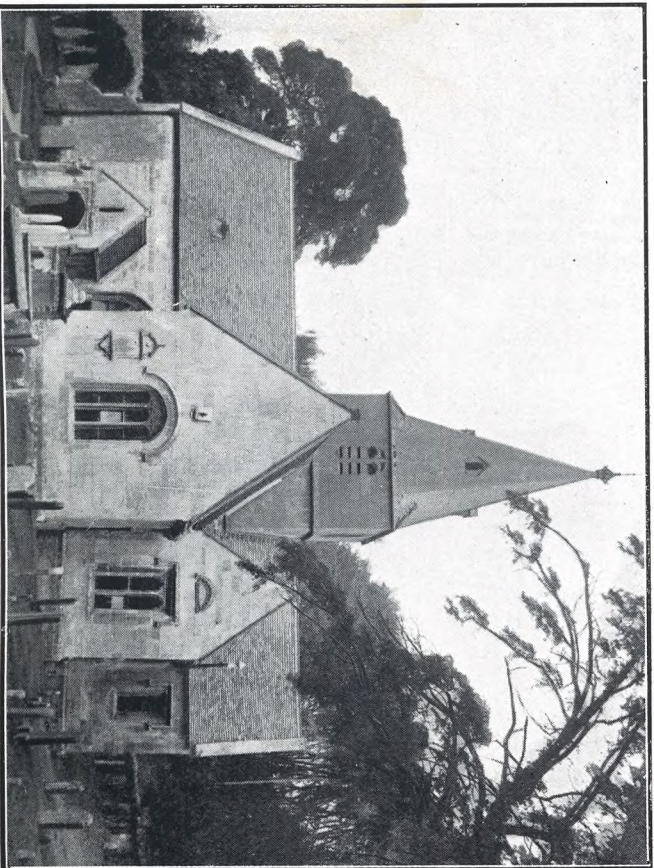

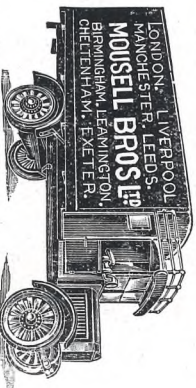
