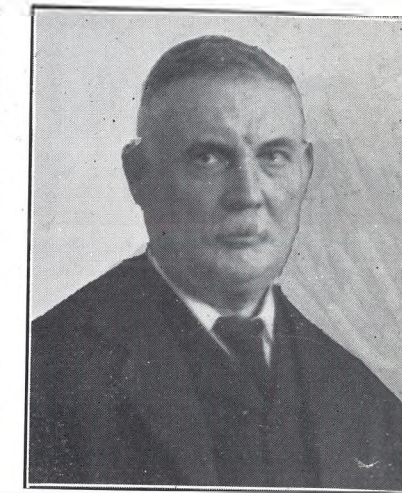


MOTOR-CYCLE FOOTBALL

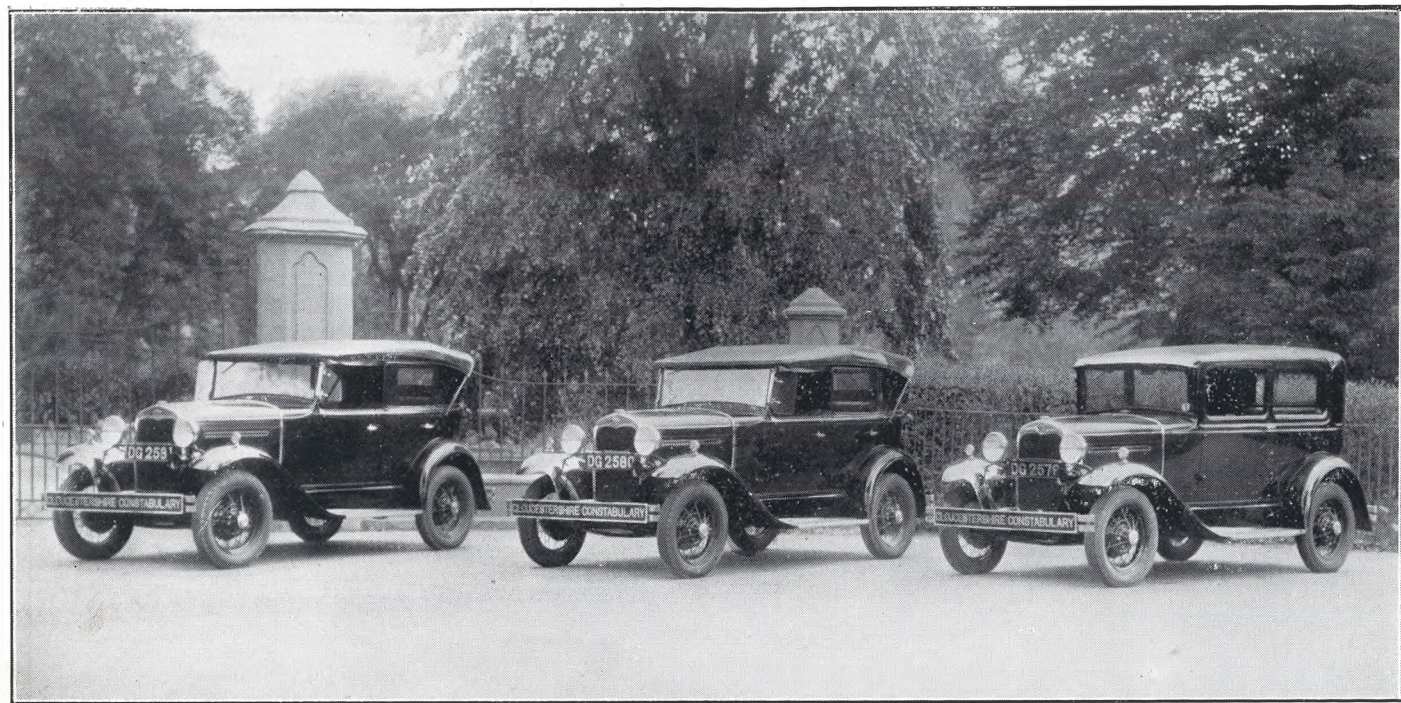

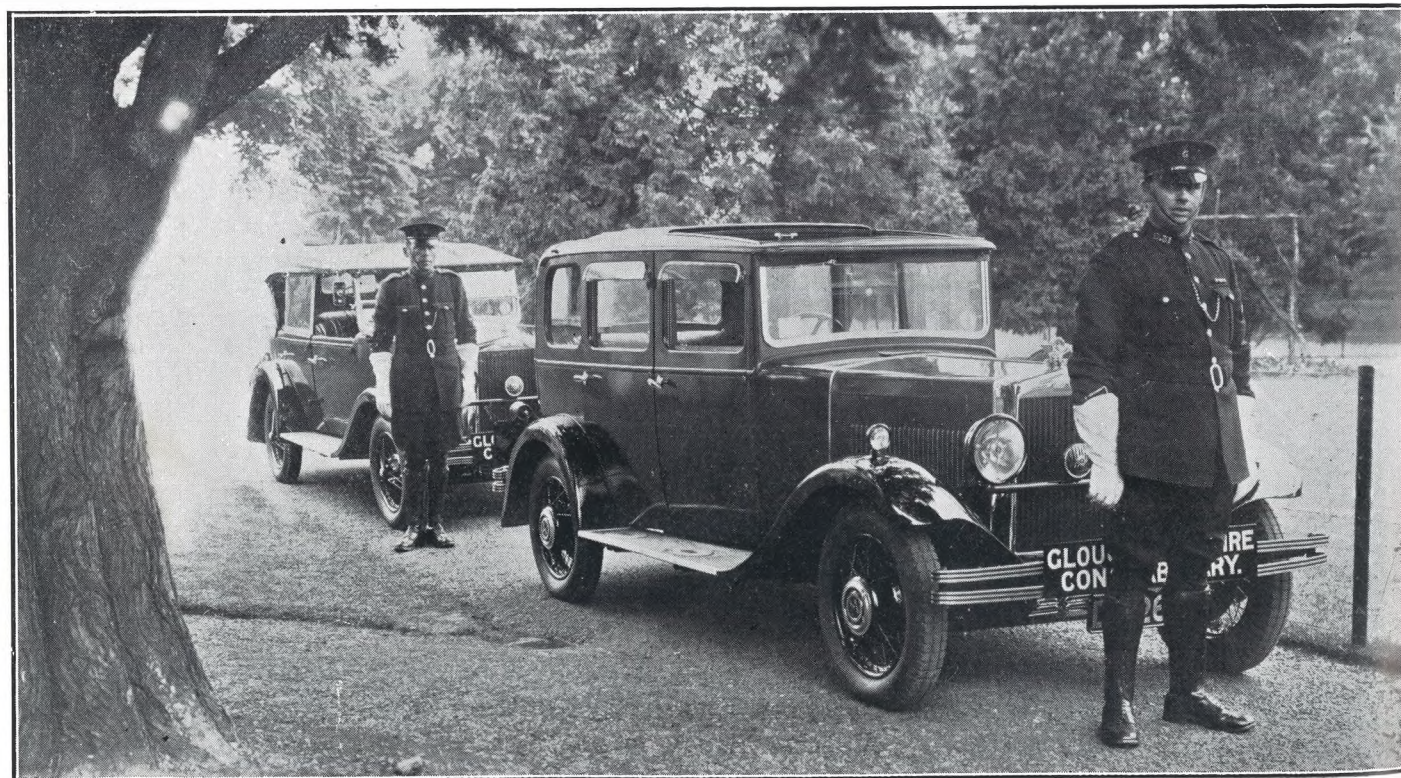

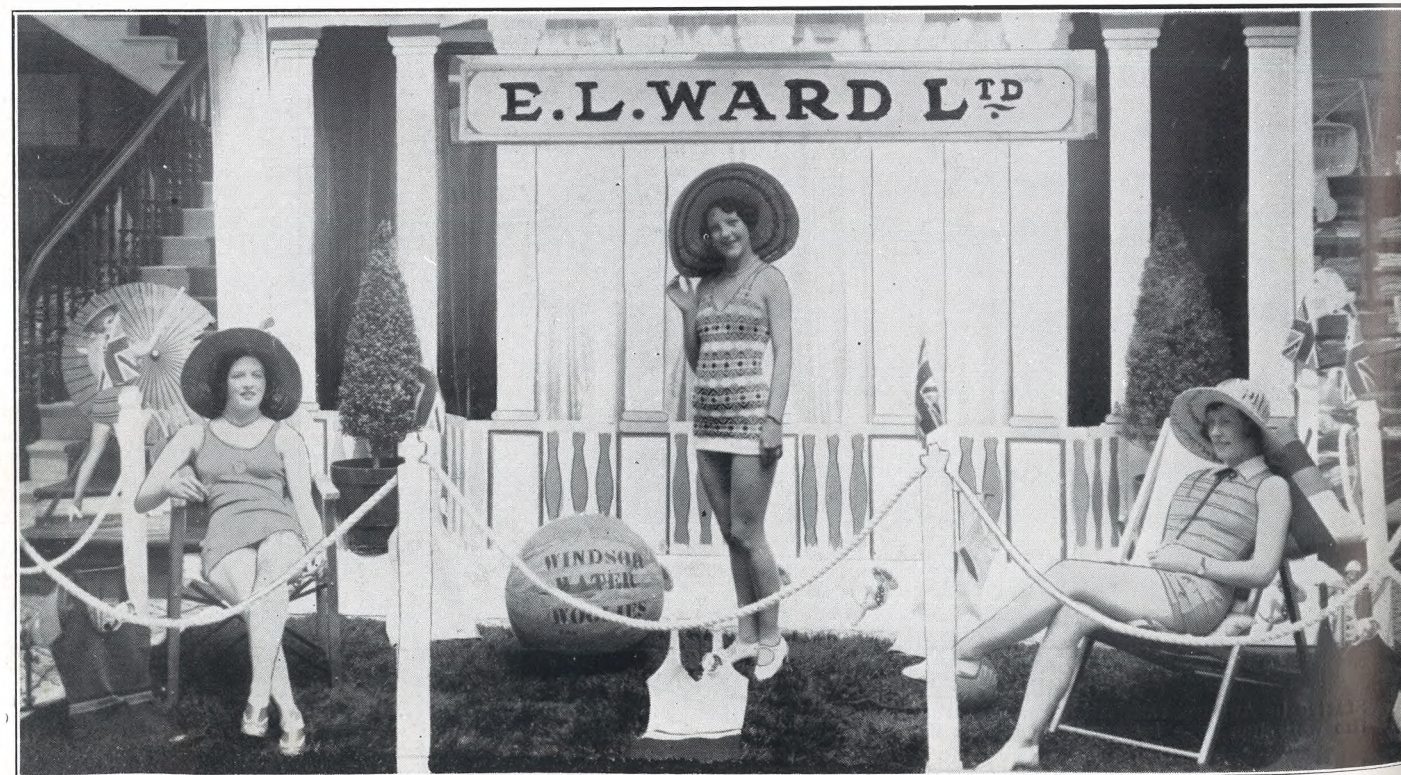

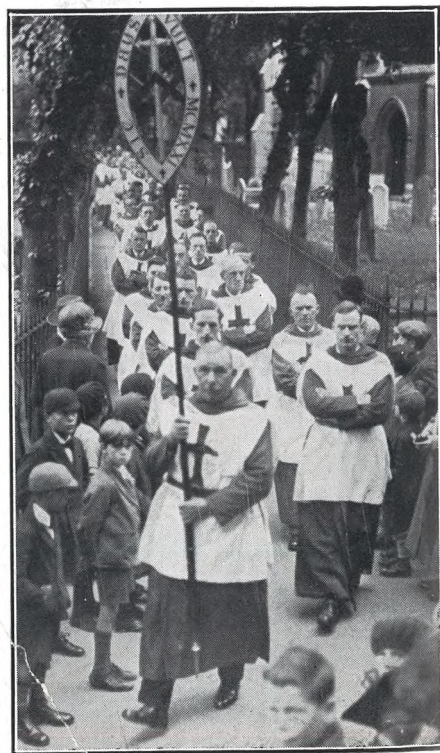

The Society has now a Membership of over 27,000, and a Share Capital of £665,256. It carries on business in 26 shops in Gloucester and 17 in Cheltenham, and one Branch Store each in Sharpness, Tewkesbury and Newent. It has over 600 employees, and pays in wages and salaries over £74,000 annually, and about £5,000 in rates and taxes. It owns and operates two machine and three smaller bakeries, and produces and delivers to its Members 5 million 2lb. loaves annually. It sells and delivers over 26,000 tons of coal yearly, owns and keeps fully employed 66 horses and 100 road vehicles, together with 61 railway coal wagons and 27 motors, and two pneumatic-tyred charabancs (to hold 28 and 19 persons), which are let out on hire. (For particulars enquire at the Office, Brunswick Road, Gloucester).

It owns all of the shops in which it carries on business, as well as as an estate of eight-and-a-half acres of land at India Road, Gloucester, on which is erected extensive stabling, garage, abattoirs, and pork factory, dairy and warehouse accommodation, works department, consisting of carpenters', painters', wheelwrights', blacksmiths', plumbers', and electricians' shops. It also owns twenty-seven dwelling houses let on rental, and two farms situated at Badgeworth and Churchdown, with an acreage of 394.

Its business for the year ending March, 1931, amounted to £788,457. The profits divided amongst its Members for the year amounted to £93,459, in addition to £24,239 as interest on their Share Capital. Since it was established it has lent its Members to purchase their own houses nearly £443,700, representing over 1,072 properties fully purchased and 687 partly purchased.

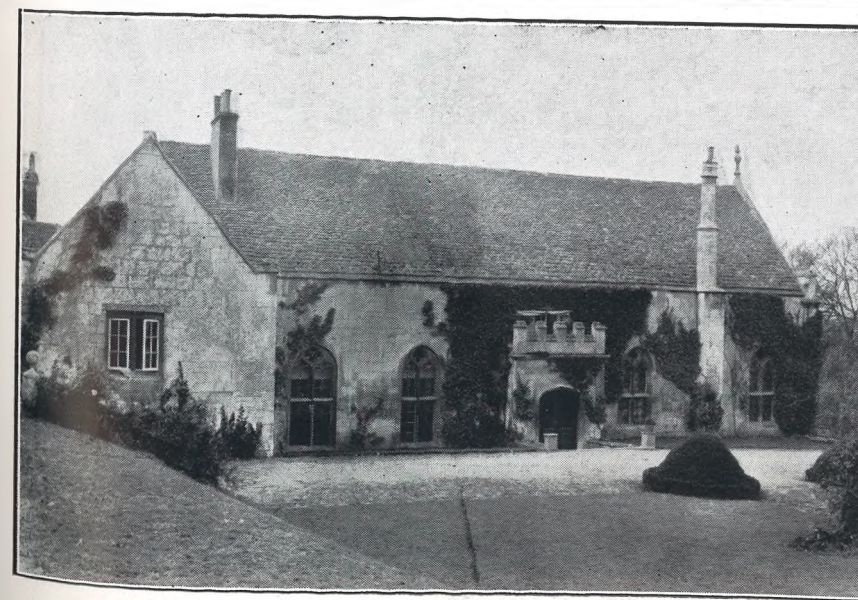

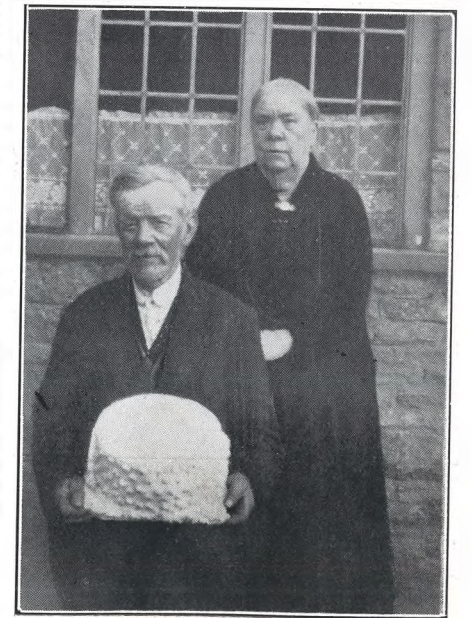

THE GREAT STORM IN CHELTENHAM

On Sunday afternoon Cheltenham and district was visited by a deluge of rain, about one and a third inches falling in little over two hours. The sewers and the River Chelt were alike unable to carry off the rush of water, and extraordinary scenes were witnessed in the streets, many of which were flooded to a considerable depth.

- 1.—All basements of houses in Bath-parade were flooded, and the residents were working up to a late hour baling out with buckets.
- 2.—Sandford Mill-road was absolutely impassable for a time, and the motor-car on left was stranded until hauled out by ropes.
- 3.—A resident (in oil-skins) in Old Bath-road, is probing for the grating to see if it was blocked. This water came from the Chelt.
- 4.—A motor-cyclist going through water in Old Bath-road. Note the flood of water pouring out of Charlton Park, on left.
- 5.—Mr. Leslie Paynter emptying his gum boots after wading in to rescue a motor-car.
- 6.—The Salvation Army Barracks were flooded out, and no service could be held. Here are members of the congregation, after sweeping the water out.

Floods occurred in places where none had previously been experienced. Harp Hill, Battledown, was like a river; Bath-parade at one time was completely swept by water; and Prestbury-road, near the borough boundary, was submerged to a considerable depth.
