In connection with the three days of carnival held at Evesham during the week-end in aid of the hospital, sports for children and adults and a great baby show were held in the Abbey Park.

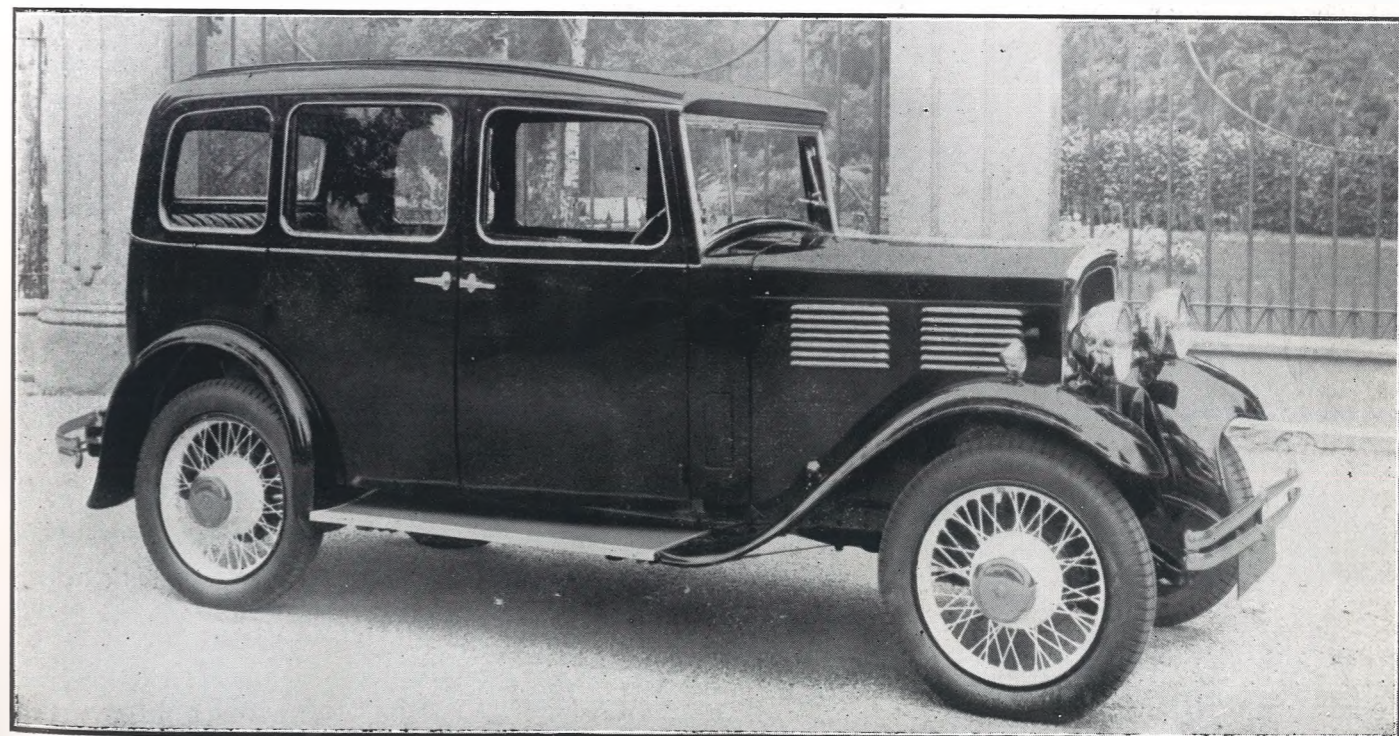

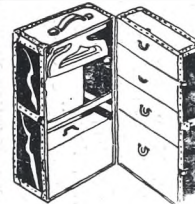

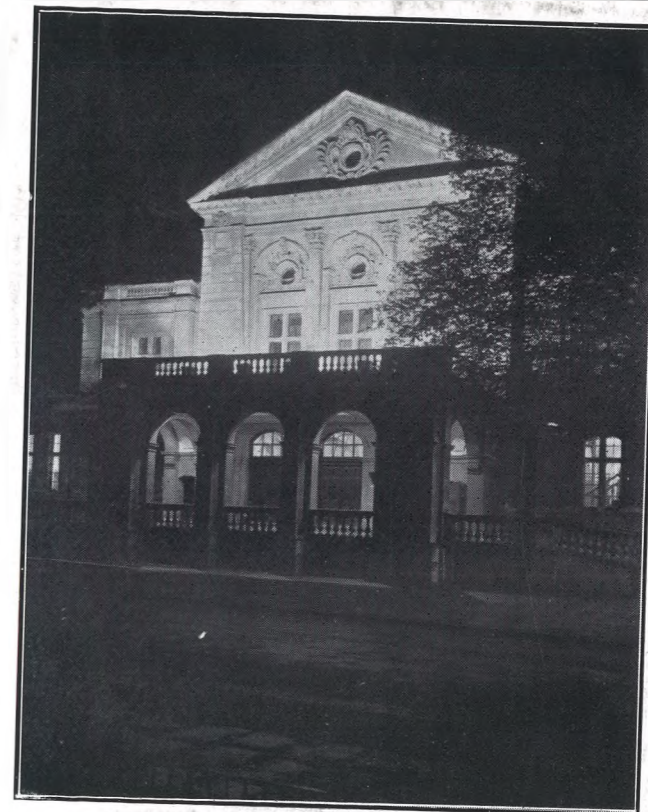

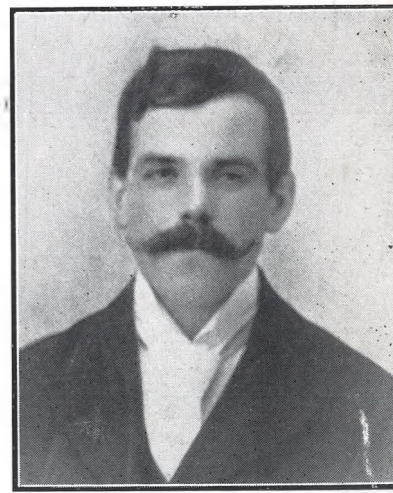
MR. W. H. R. PEACEY,

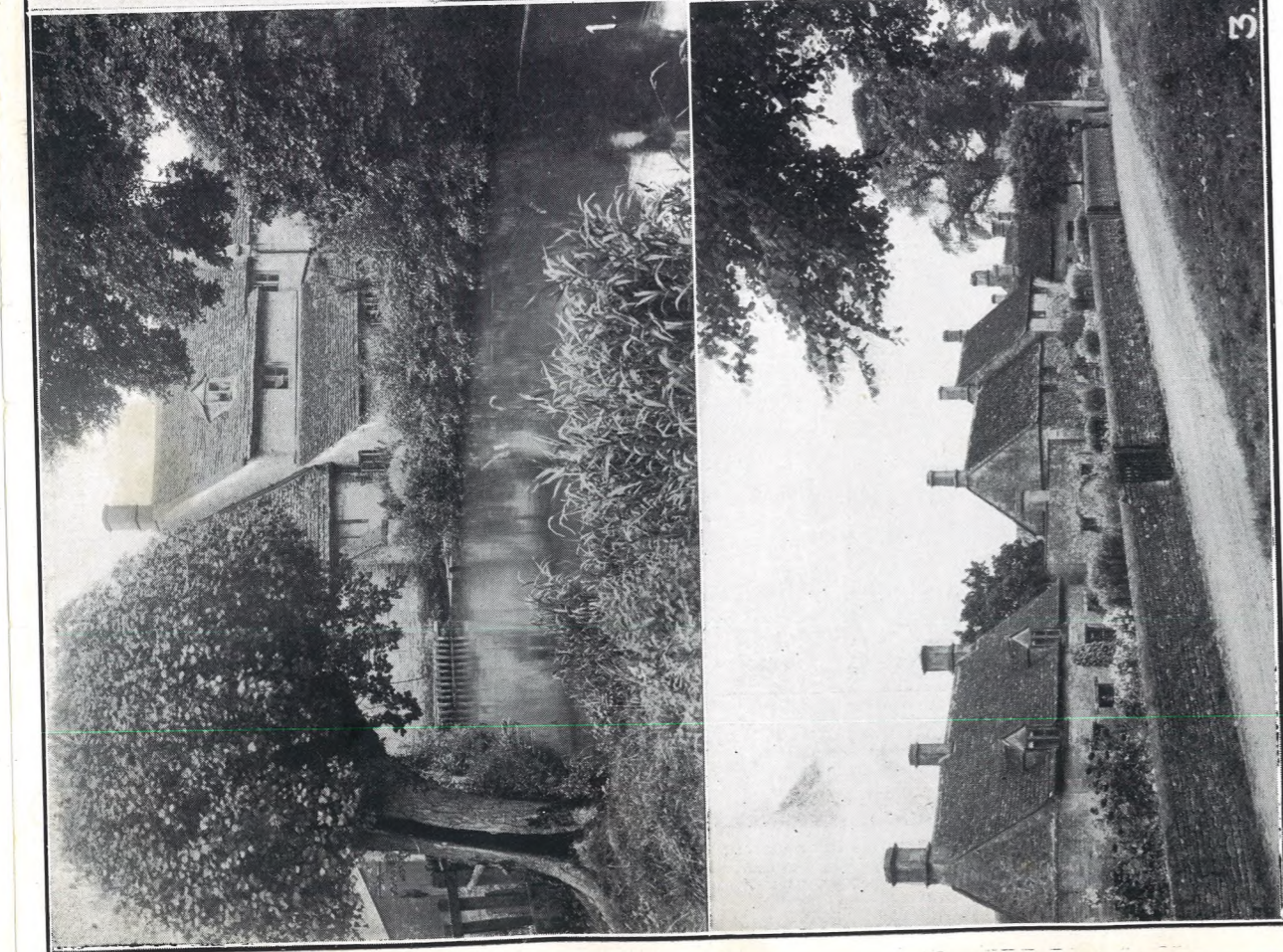
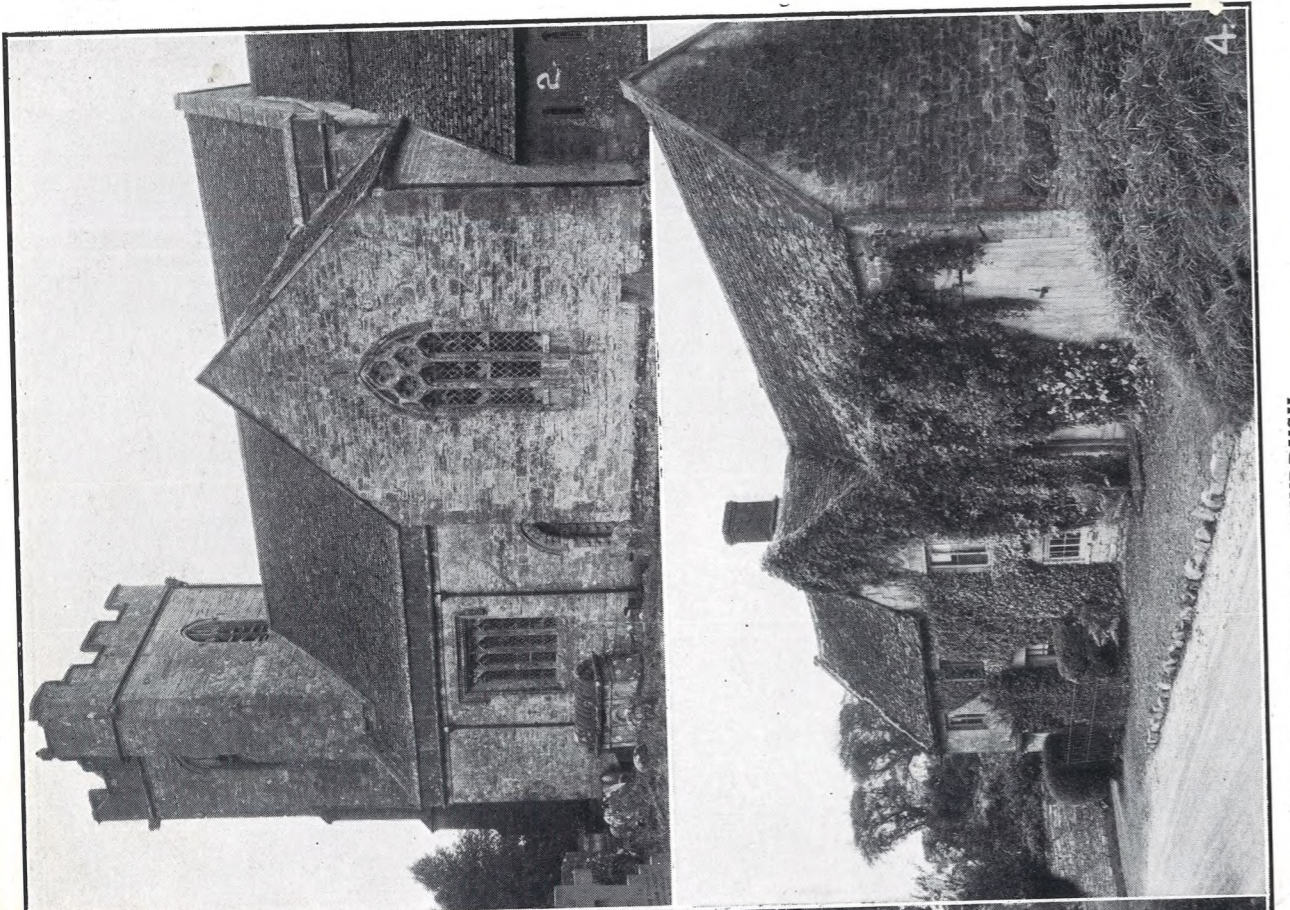

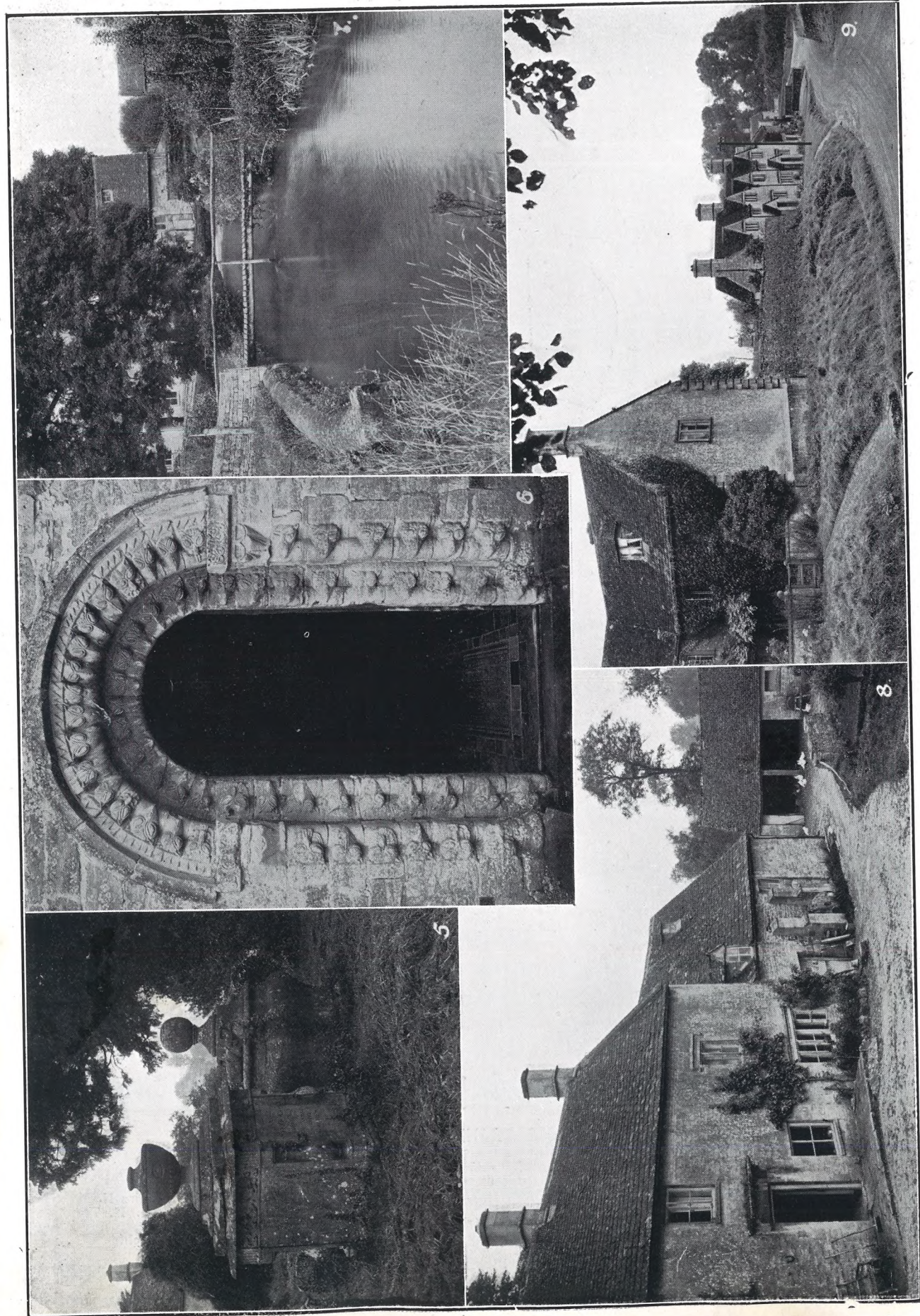


FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. FRANK M. LIDDON VINES
