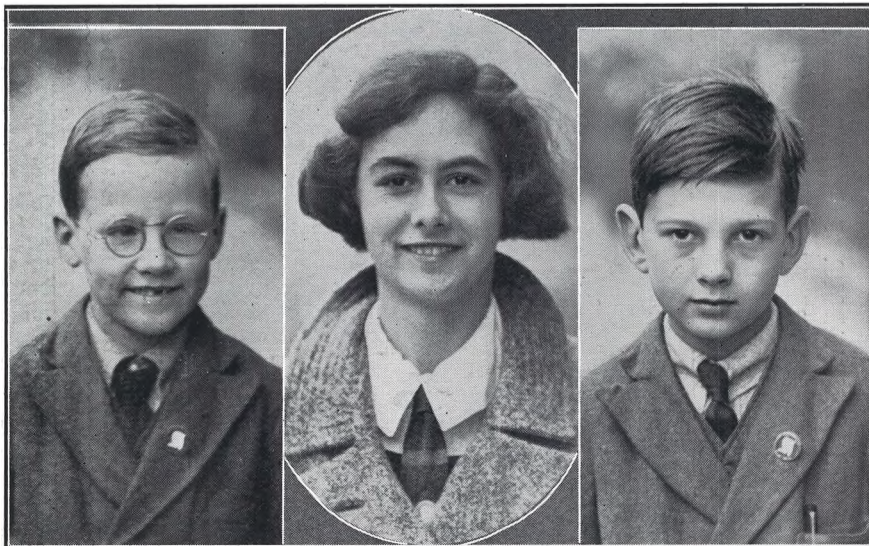

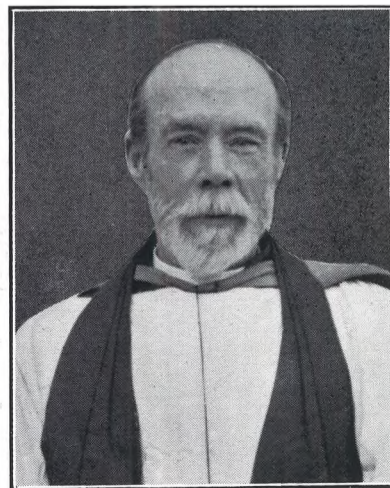
**MR. CHARLES ADDISON HALL,**

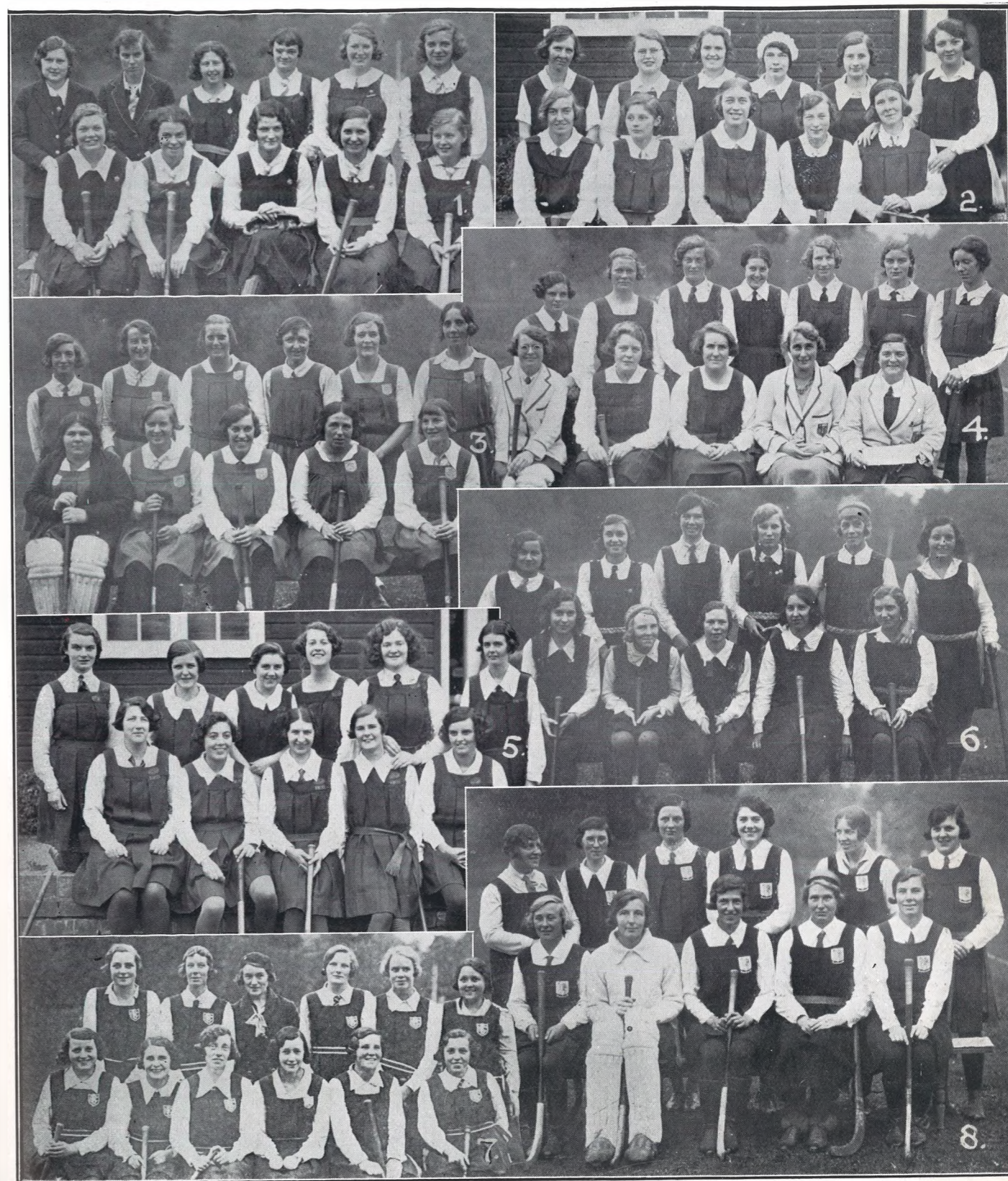

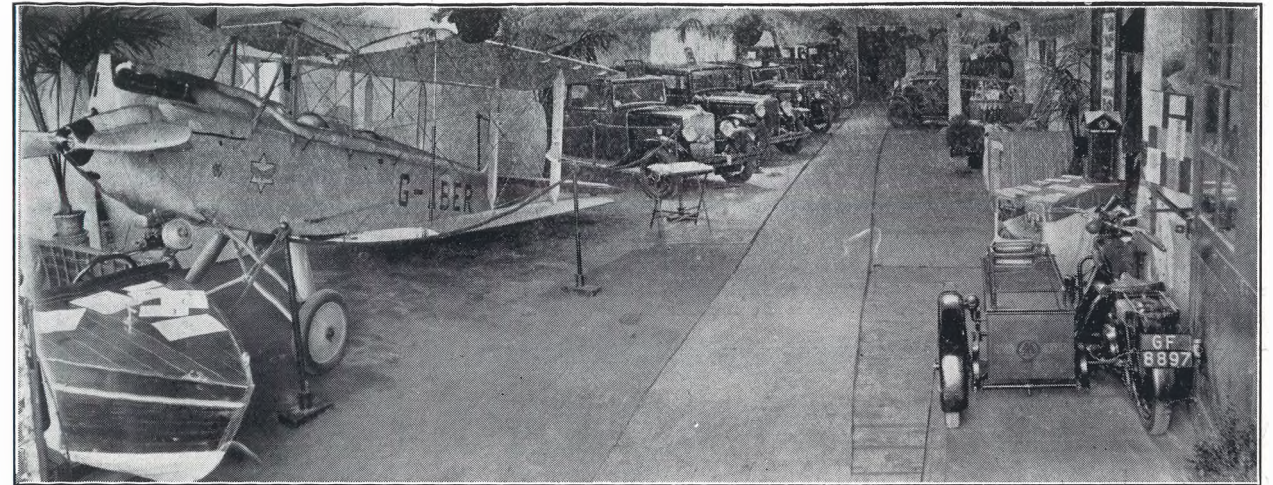


**RECORD GLOUCESTER BARTON FAIR**

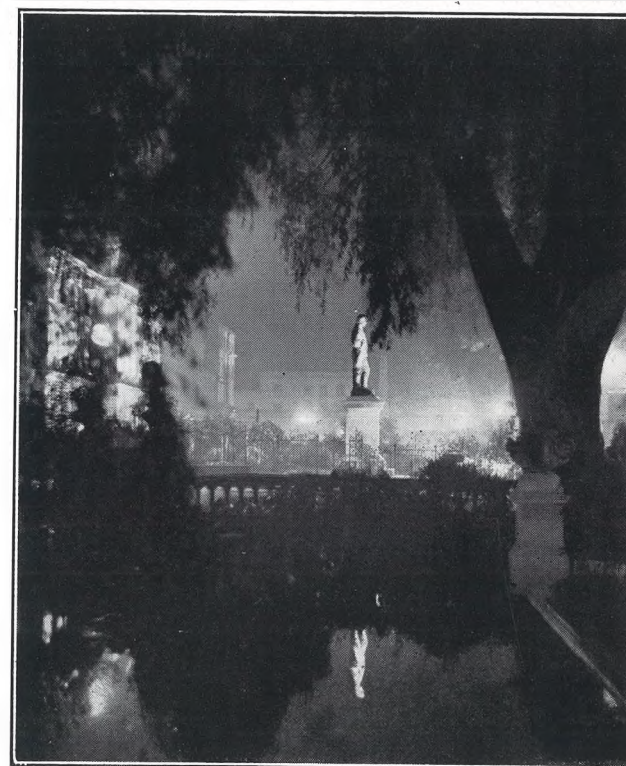

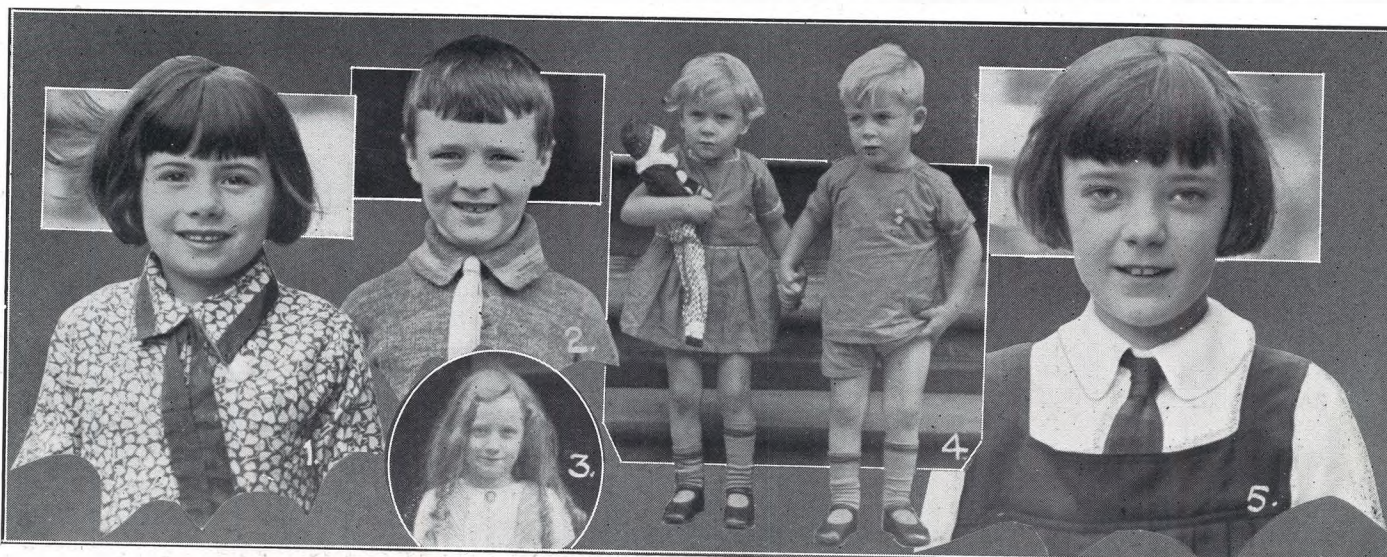

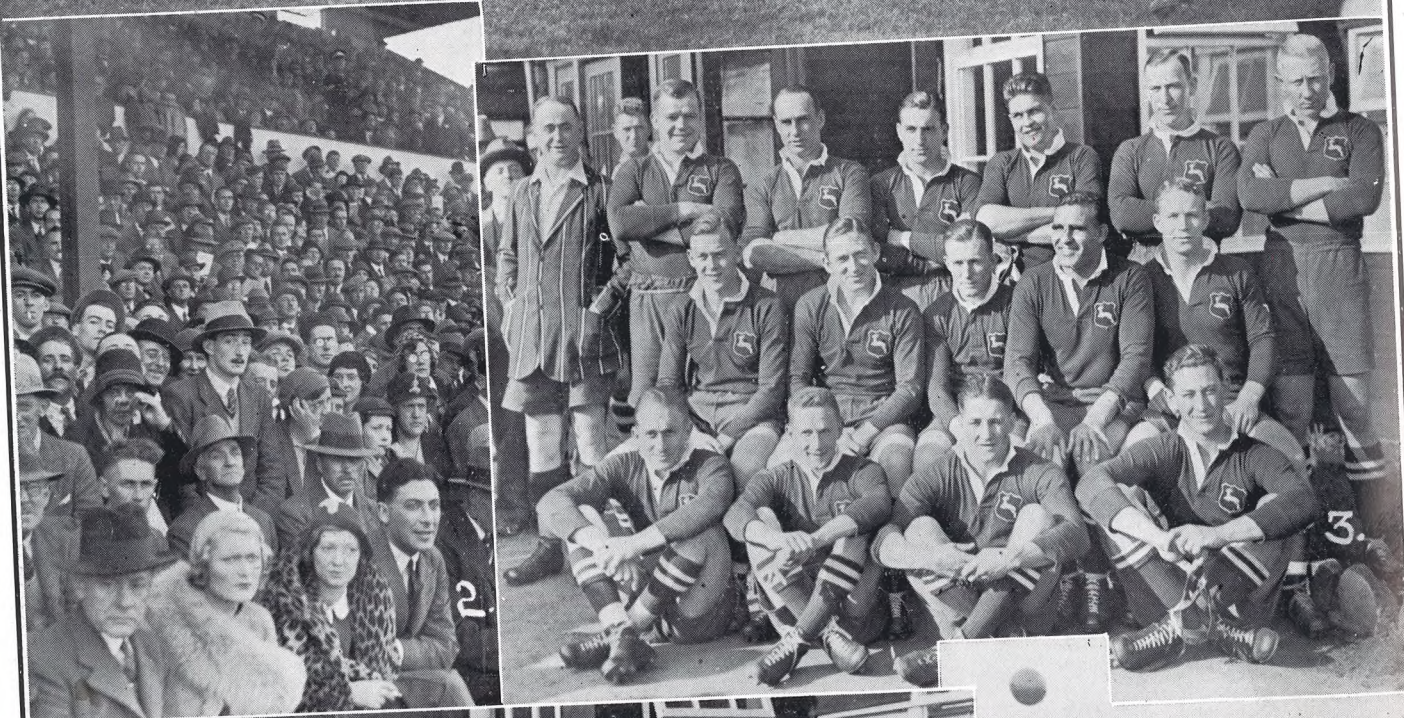


**GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY PAGEANT IN CHELTENHAM**

**PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—SHEEPSCOMBE**

Sheepscombe is a village in the parish of Painswick, and is most picturesquely situated on the two sides of the Painswick Valley, with beautiful wooded scenery all around. Rudder, in 1779, says: "In the reign of King Edward VI., Sir Anthony Kingston caused a gallows to be erected on Shepscombe Green, and supposing they might be useful to posterity, he gave three estates, since called gallows-lands; one always to maintain the gallows, a second to keep two ladders in readiness, and the third to provide halters; and that the tithing man of Shepscombe should be hangman; he should enjoy an acre of land for his service." He says, "Many people now living remember the gallows, and a piece of ground there is still known as Hangman's Acre."

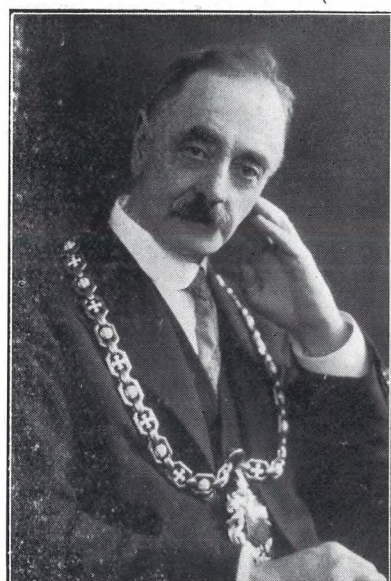

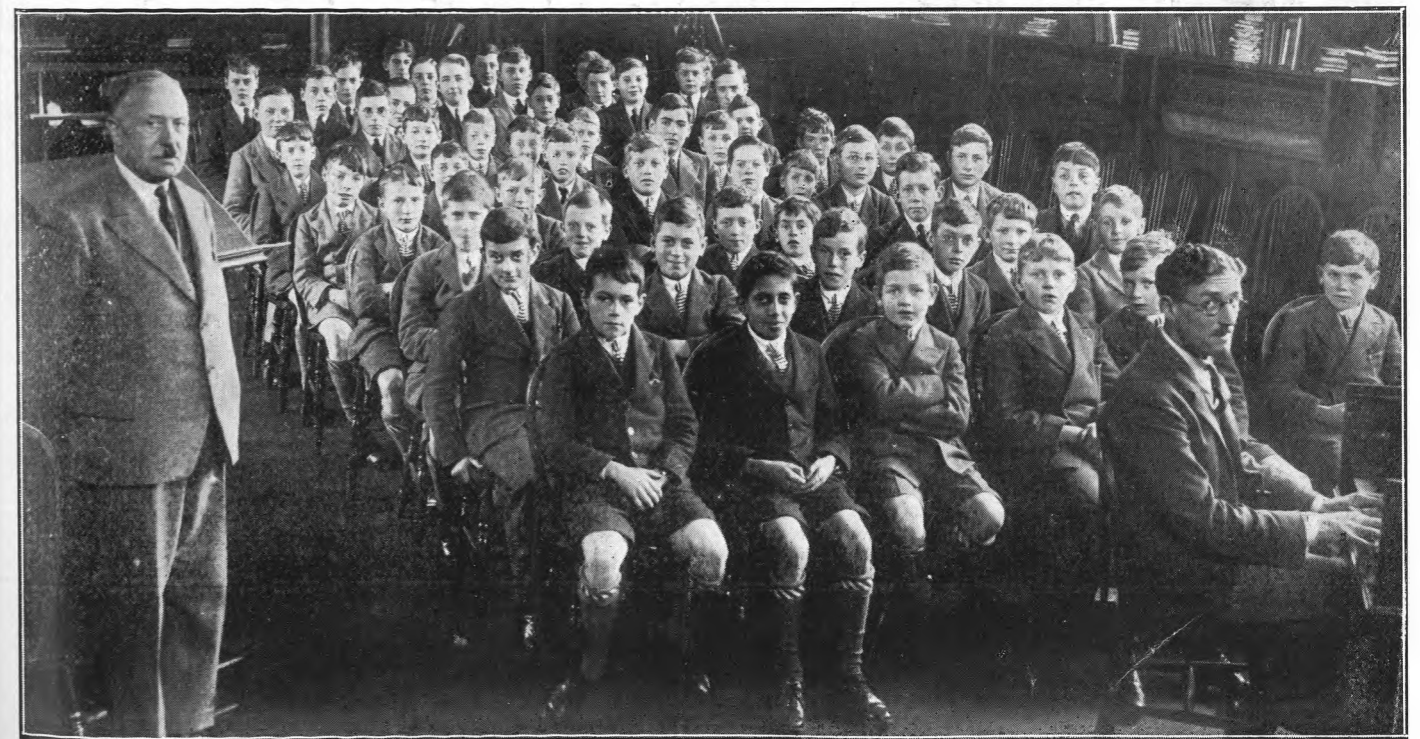
