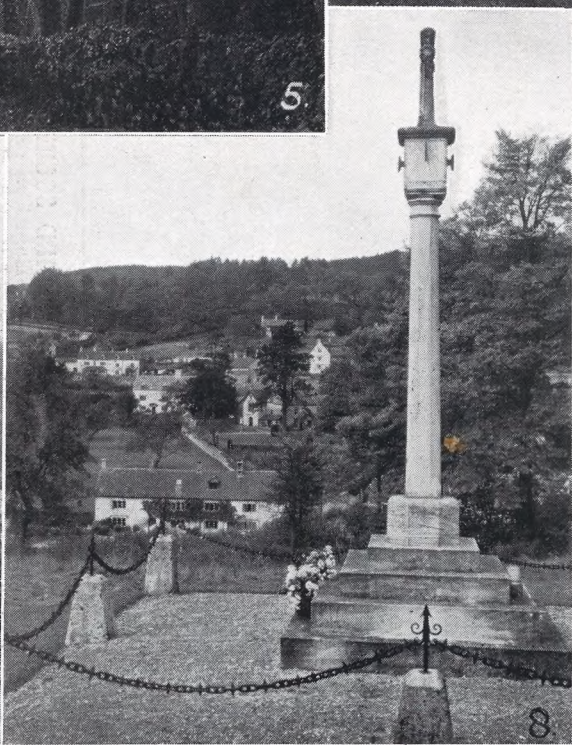

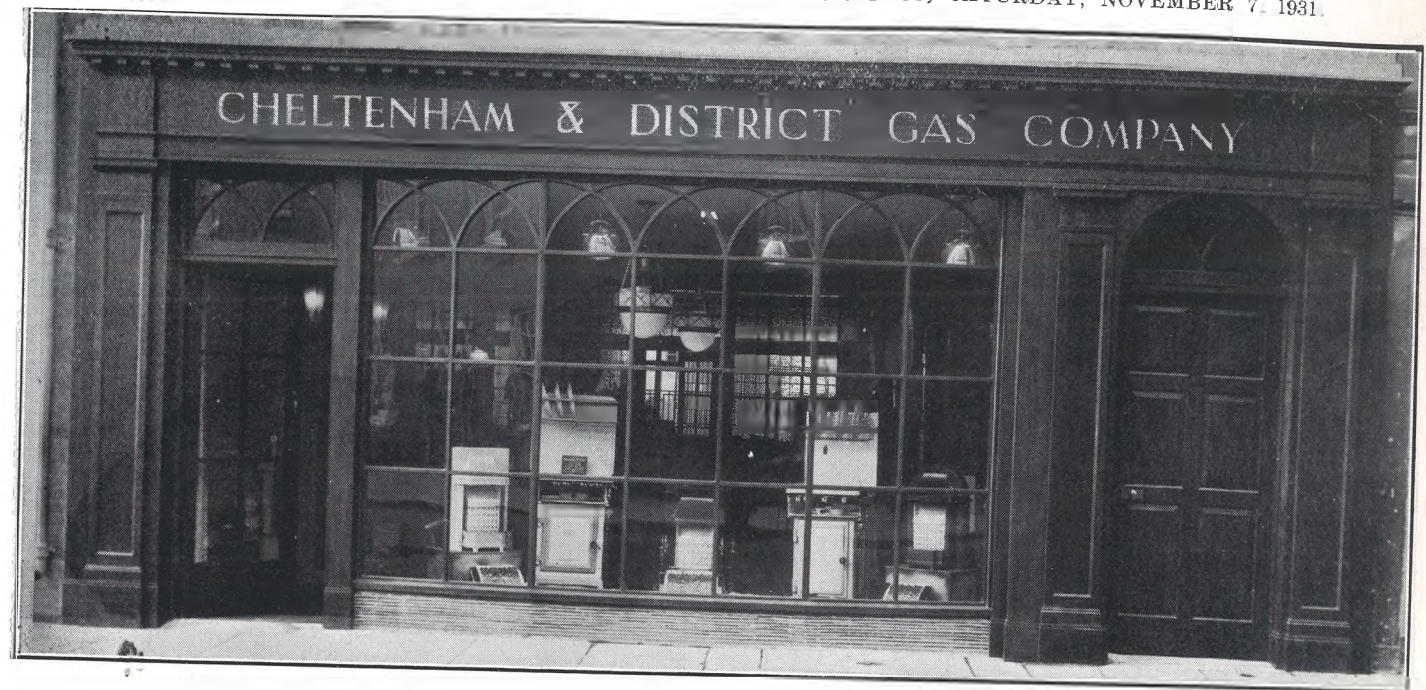

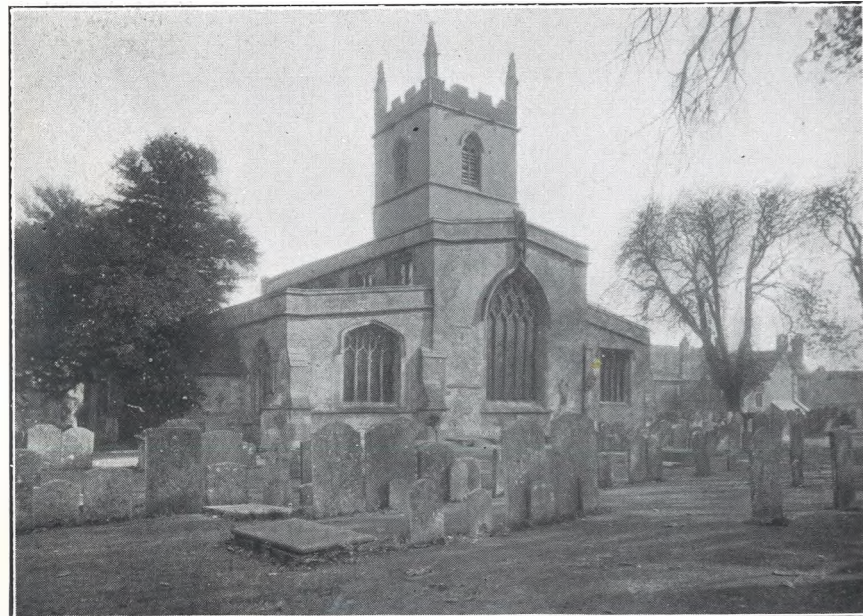

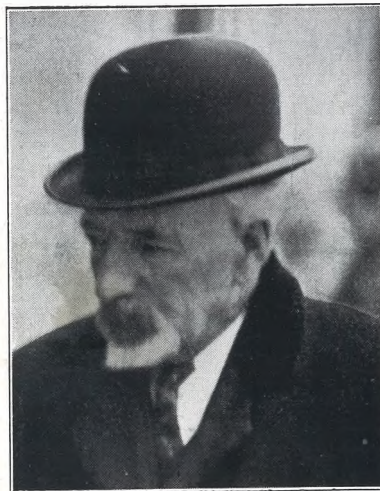

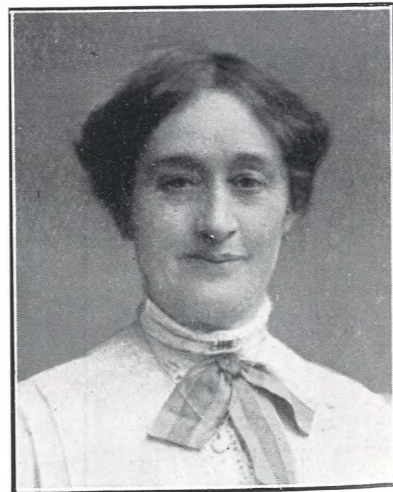

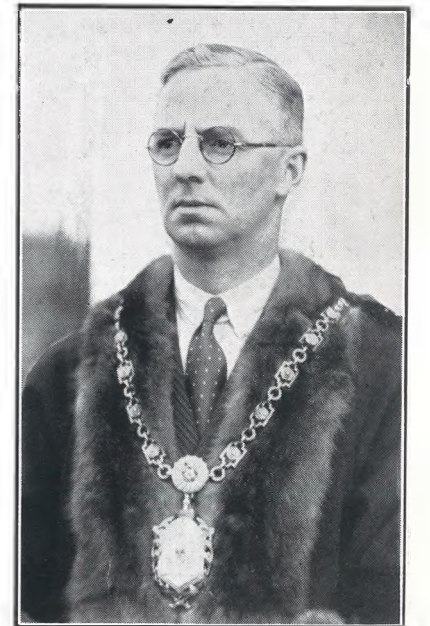

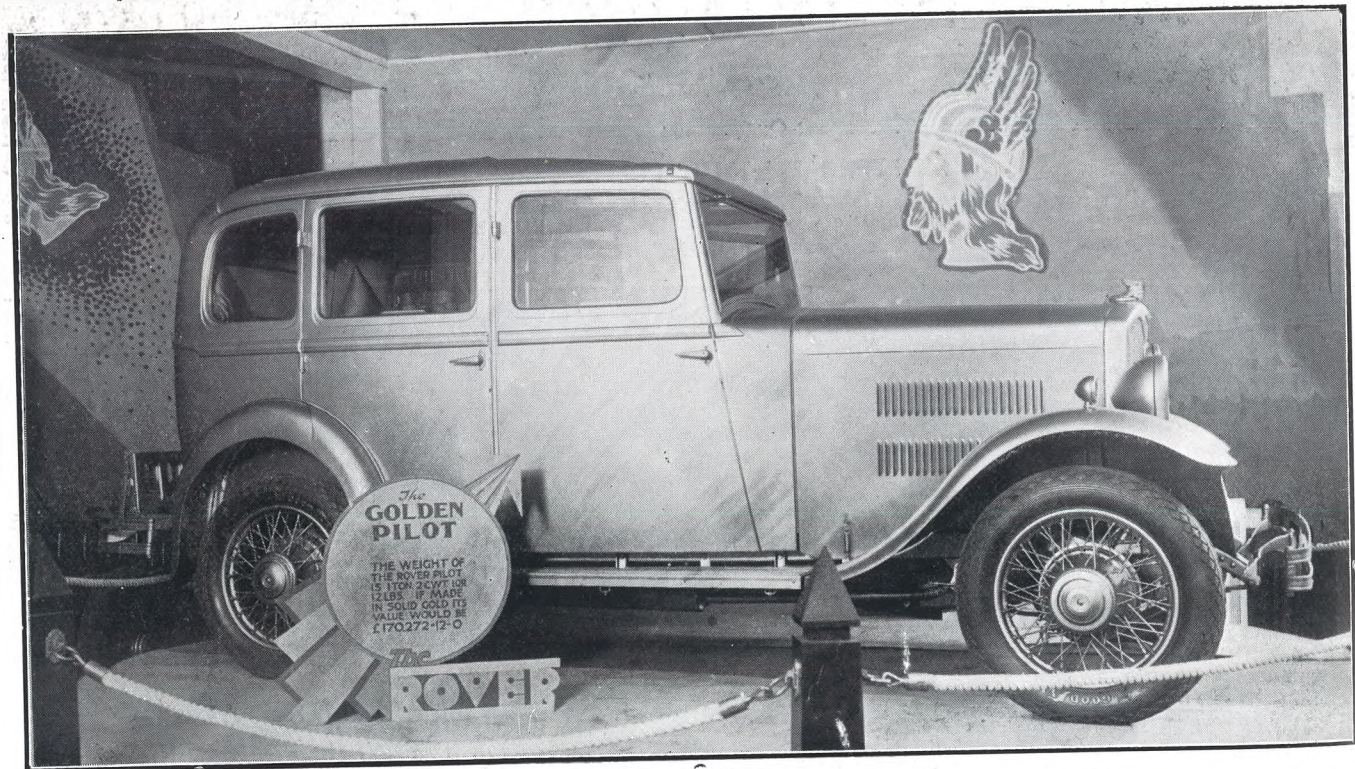

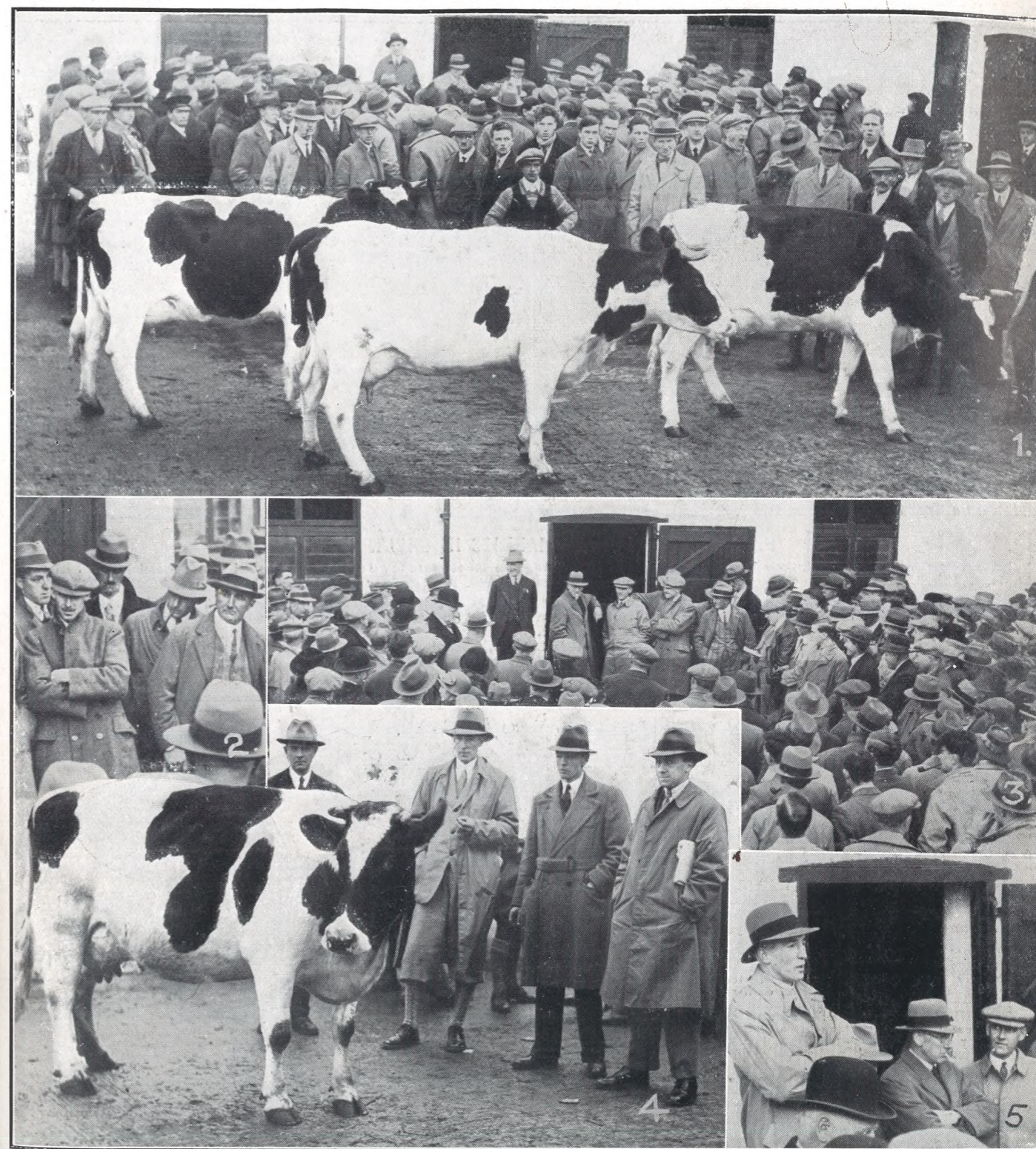


CHELLENHAM TOWN V. CHELTENHAM COLLEGE

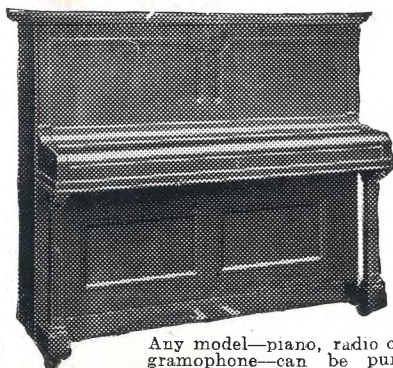

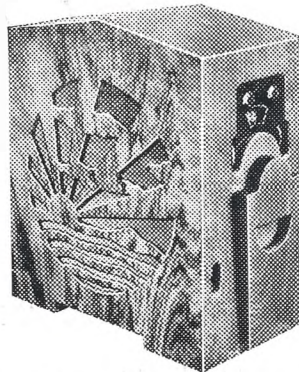
