
"TOM JONES" BY CHELTENHAM AMATEUR OPERATIC SOCIETY

THE PICTURESQUE COTSWOLDS-BURFORD TOWN

Burford has a most interesting history, and many famous names in "our wild island story" are connected with Burford. Charles I. often came here, and Charles II. twice visited Burford.. Squire Lenthall, afterwards Speaker of the Long Parliament, hought Burford Priory from the famous Lucius Cary(second Lord Falkland) in 1636, and the Priory remained in the hands of the Lenthall family till 1829. When the famous Bibury Club Race Meeting was held at Aldsworth, Burford was the rendezvous for all the sporting bloods of England.






