



THE PICTURESQUE COTSWOLDS — BURFORD On the lead of the font in Burford Church, rudely cut with a dagger, are the words "Anthony Sedley, Prisner, 1649." This was inscribed by one of the 400 mutineer soldiers who were captured in Burford in that year by General Fairfax and Cromwell, as they were marching from Salisbury to Worcester during the so-called "Leveller" movement. These mutineers were imprisoned in the church, and four ringleaders were taken out and shot whilst their companions looked on from the roof of the Sylvester Chapel.

9.-- A wonderful old stone and half-timbered house in Sheep-street known as The Calendars. It has a beautiful old courtyard.

10.—The Vicarage, a handsonne stone house, built in 1672. It is at the bottom of the town close to the



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






