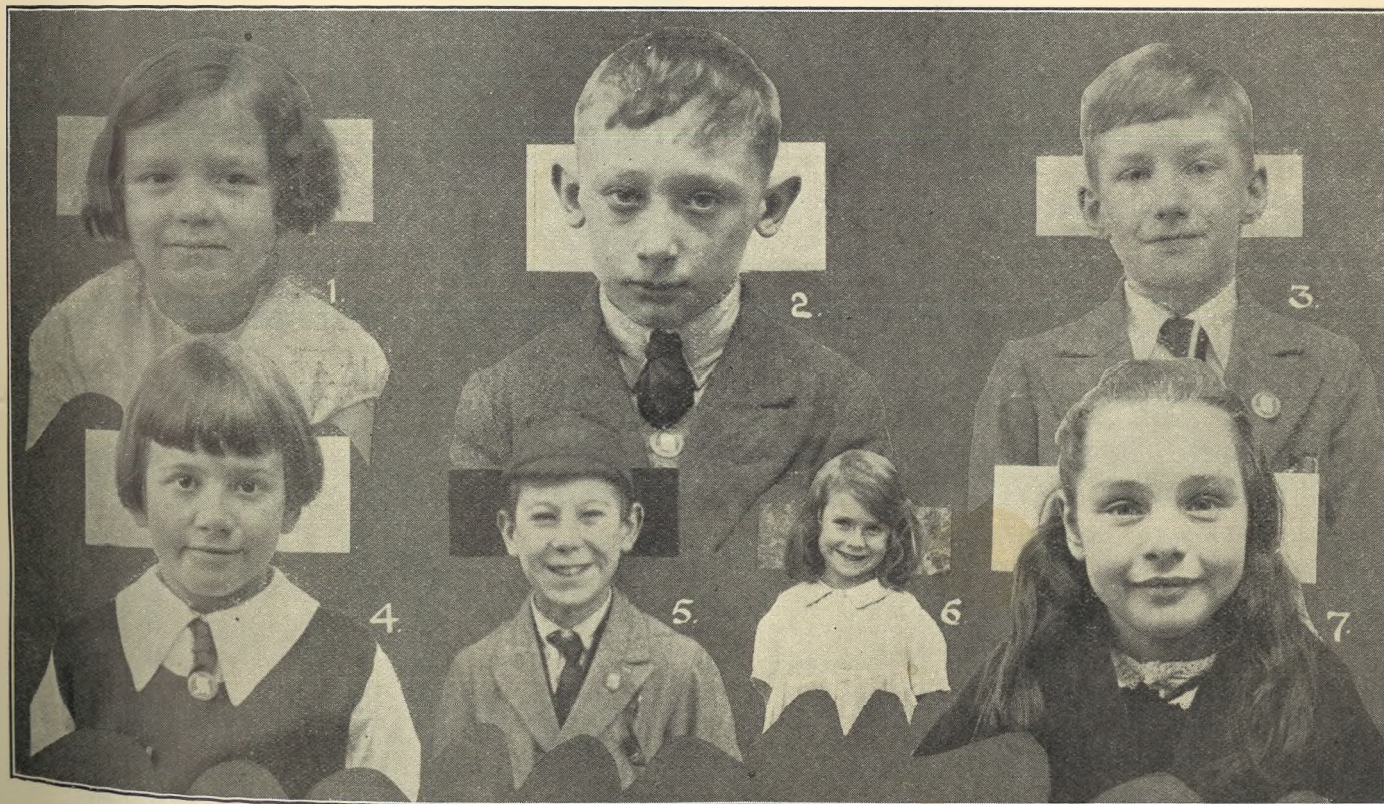

THE PICTURESQUE COTSWOLDS—BROADWAY

The old parish church of Broadway is situate one and a half miles from the village, and is an interesting Norman building of the 12th and 14th centuries. It is dedicated to St. Eadburgha. Services are held in it on Sundays during the summer, but the modern church in the village is now the parish church. "The Lygon Arms," formerly the "Old Whyte Harte," is a good example of 17th century architecture—over its doorway is the date 1620. It is a very fine hotel and is widely known.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—BUCKLAND

Buckland is a delightfully situated village, on a cul-de-sac off the Cheltenham-Broadway road about 13 miles from Cheltenham. Probably owing to there being no main road through it, it has remained unchanged through the centuries, and the church, manor and vicarage are buildings of great archaeological interest and beauty. The Abbey of Gloucester possessed the manor till the dissolution, and it was then granted to Sir Richard Gresham, Lord Mayor of London, whose son built the Royal Exchange, London, and for generations it continued in that family.

- 2.—The interior of Buckland Church. It is particularly interesting, and has a famous mazer bowl and very ancient tapestry, besides some wonderful old oak seating with canopies.

- 4.—The ancient porch, chancel, and part of nave of the church, with churchyard cross. The column and cross are modern, the base very old.

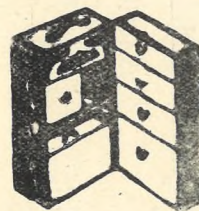

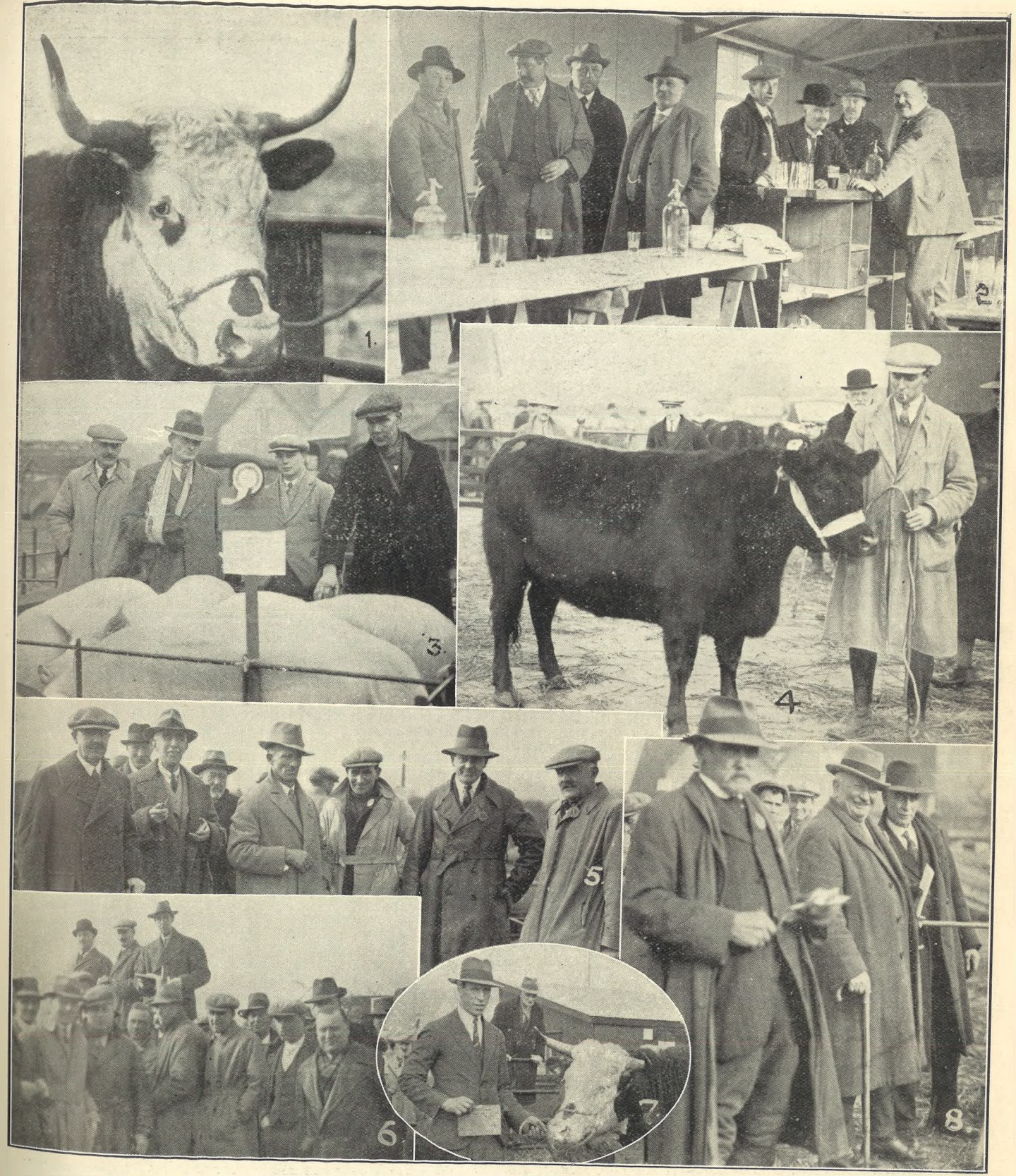


INTERNATIONAL LADIES' HOCKEY TRIAL IN CHELTENHAM

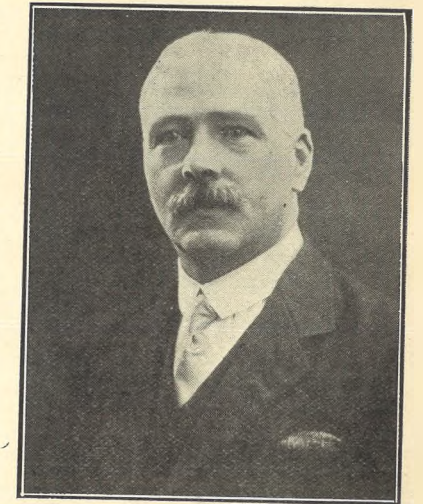
