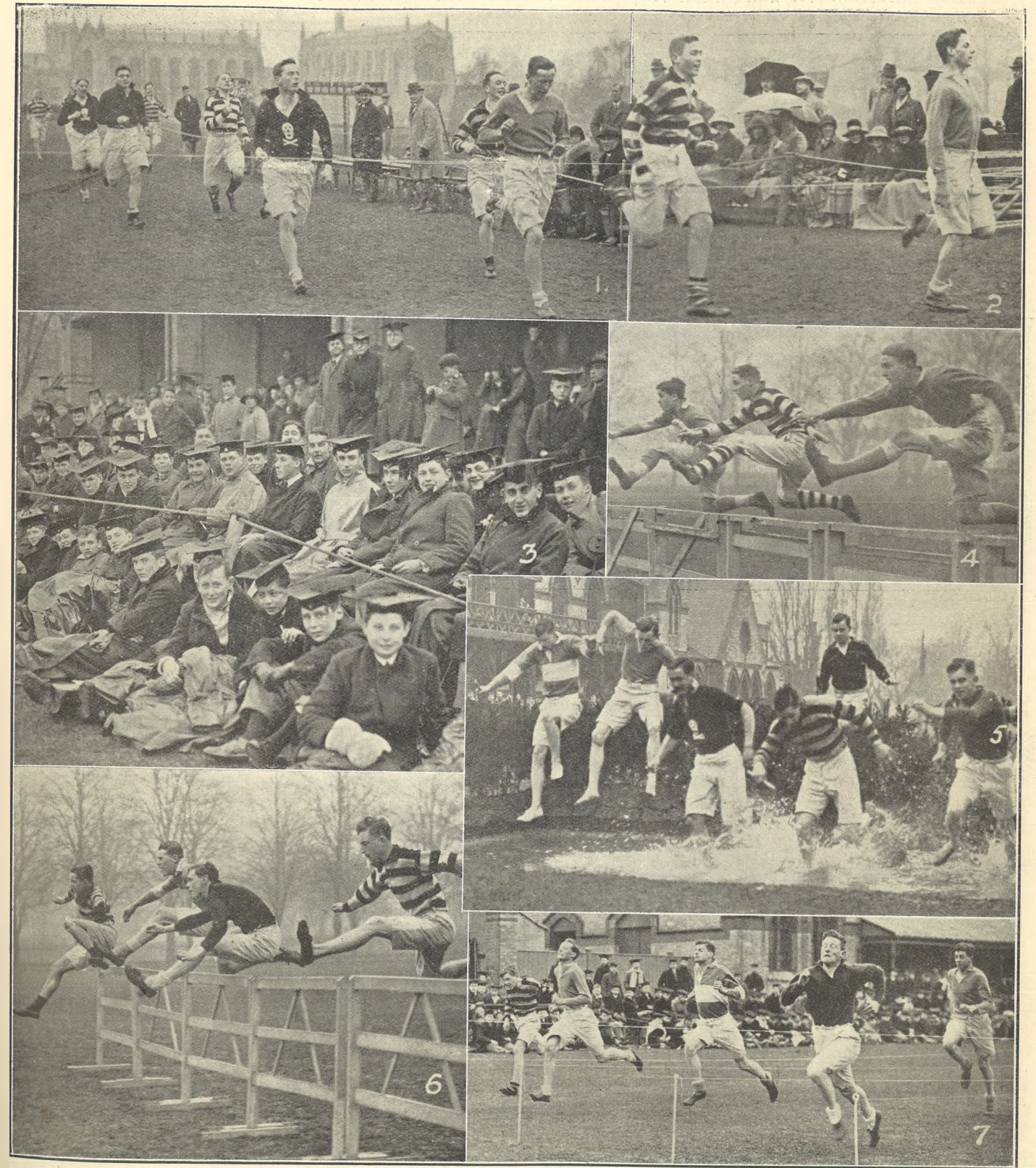

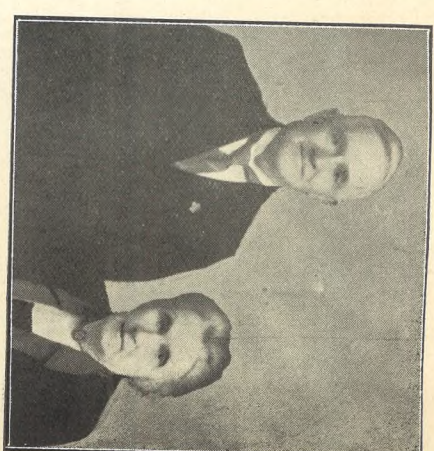

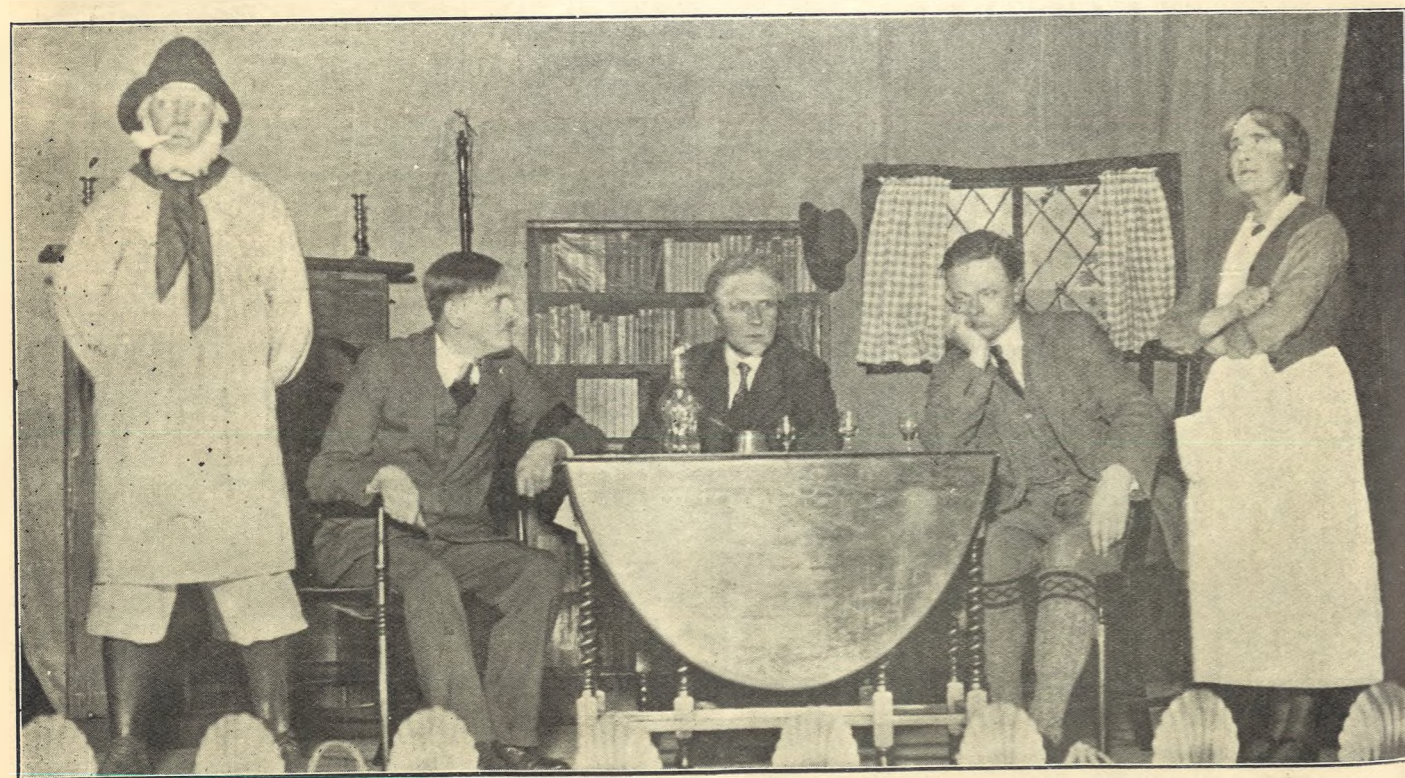

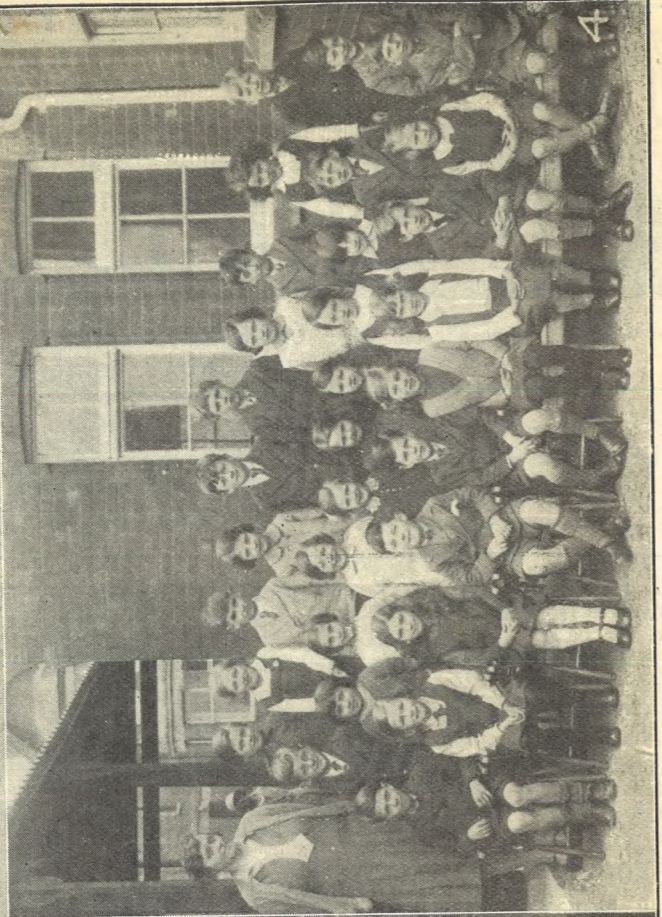

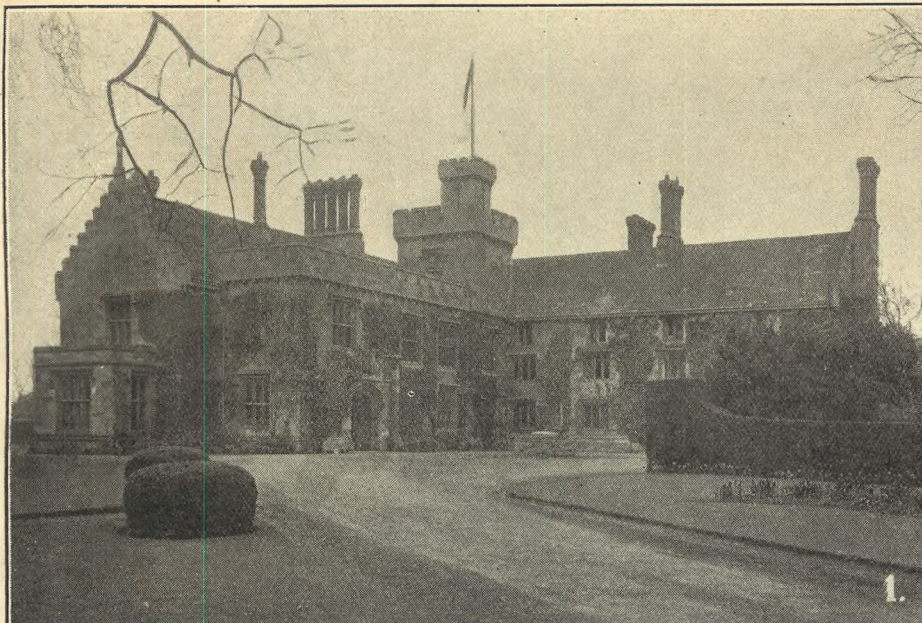

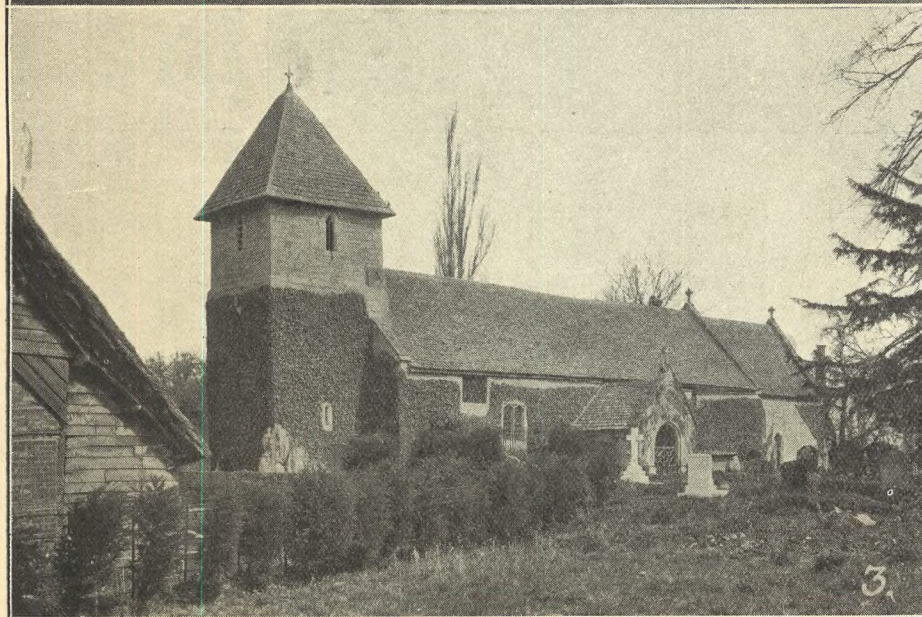

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—BODDINGTON

Boddington is a scattered parish about four miles from Cheltenham on the main Cheltenham-Tewkesbury road. There has been a house of considerable size there from very early ages, for Leland says, "There is at Boddington a fair manor place and a park." In Rudder's day (1779) the park was a farm, and a farmer lived in the manor house. The house was occupied by a Parliamentary force in the Civil War, and withstood a Royalist attack.

4.—A picturesque cottage in the lane near the manor.



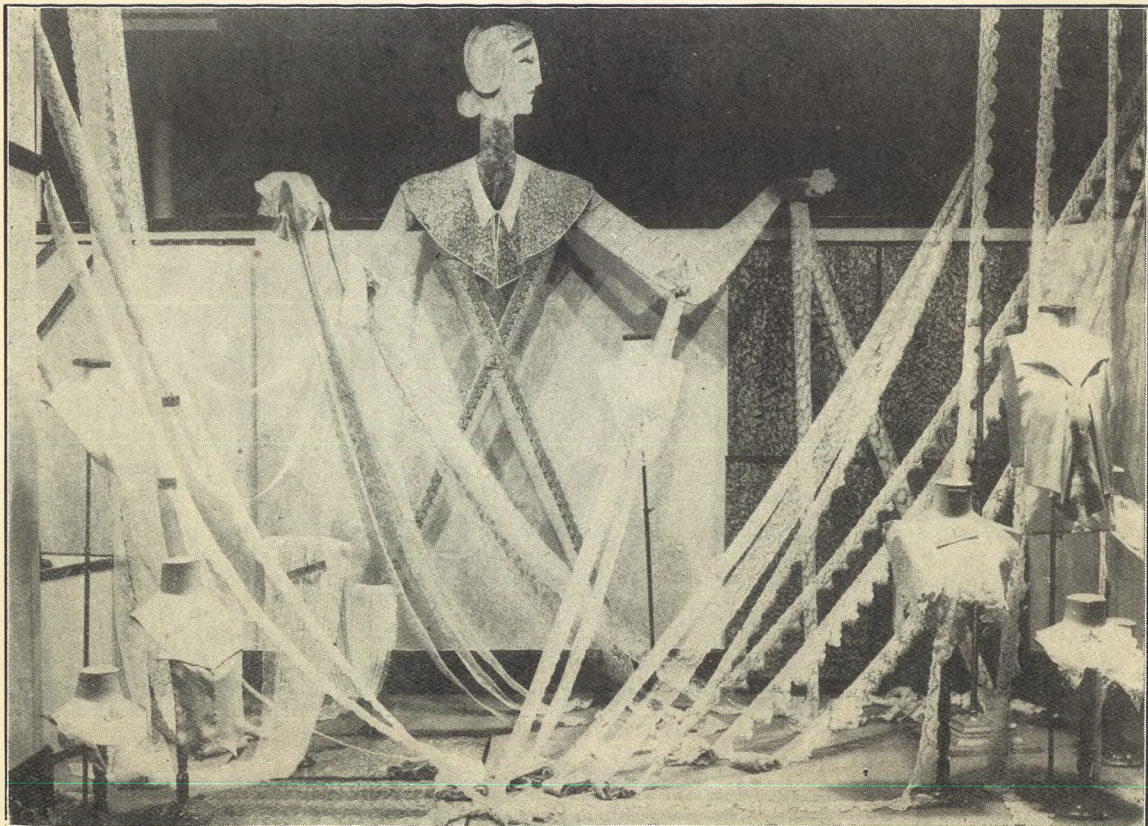

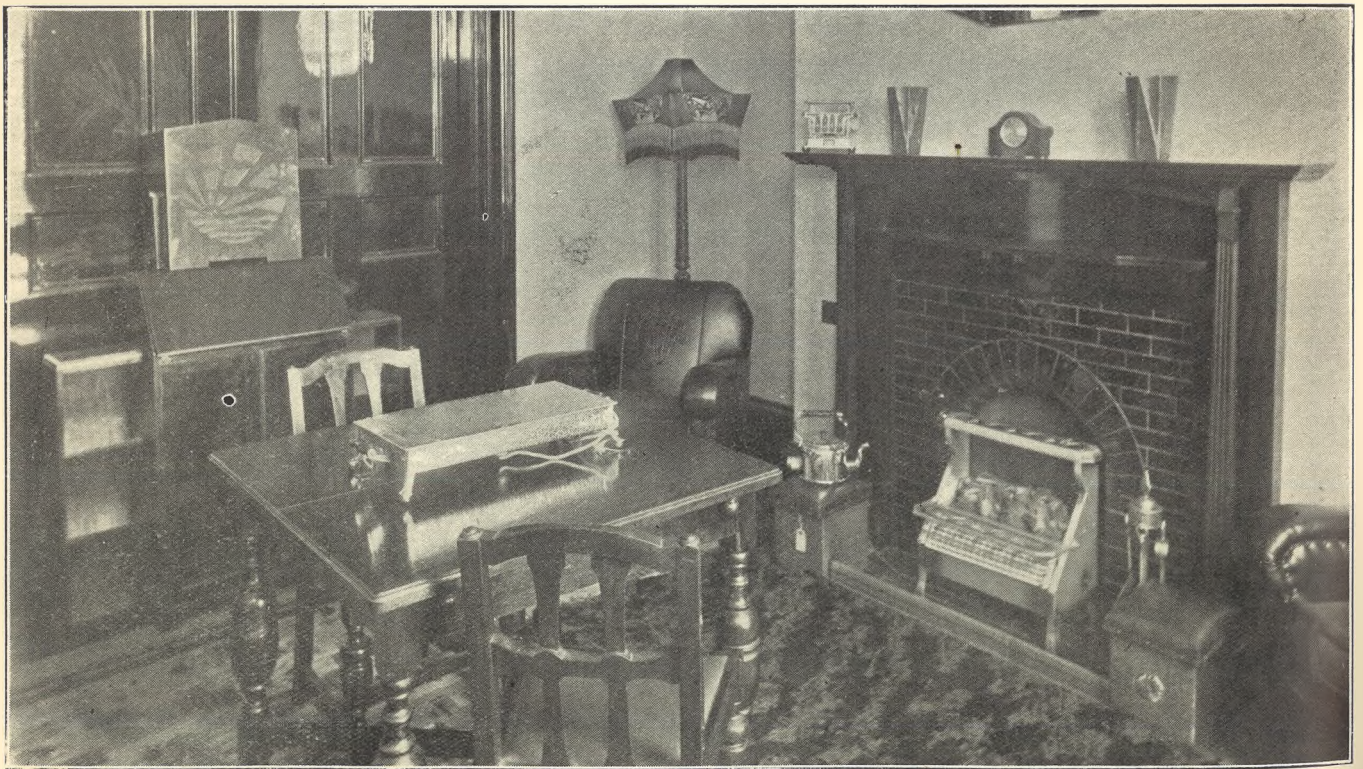
