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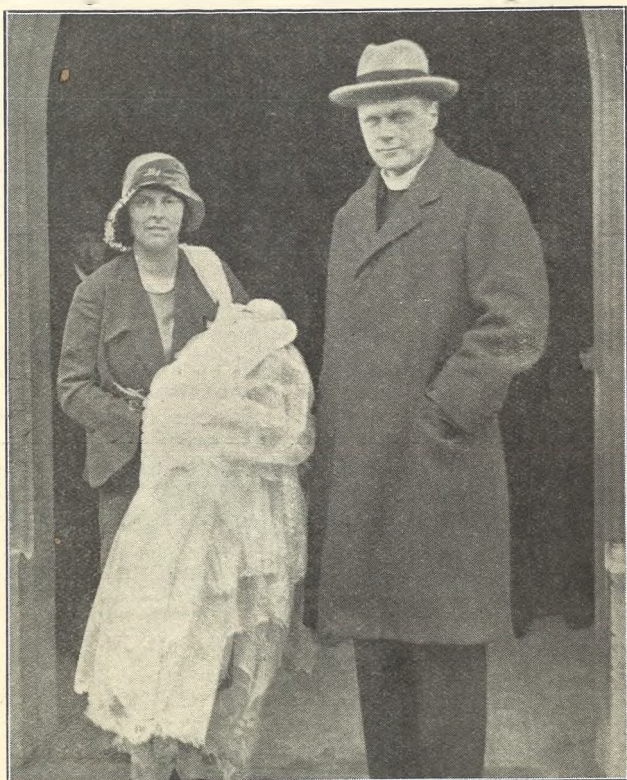

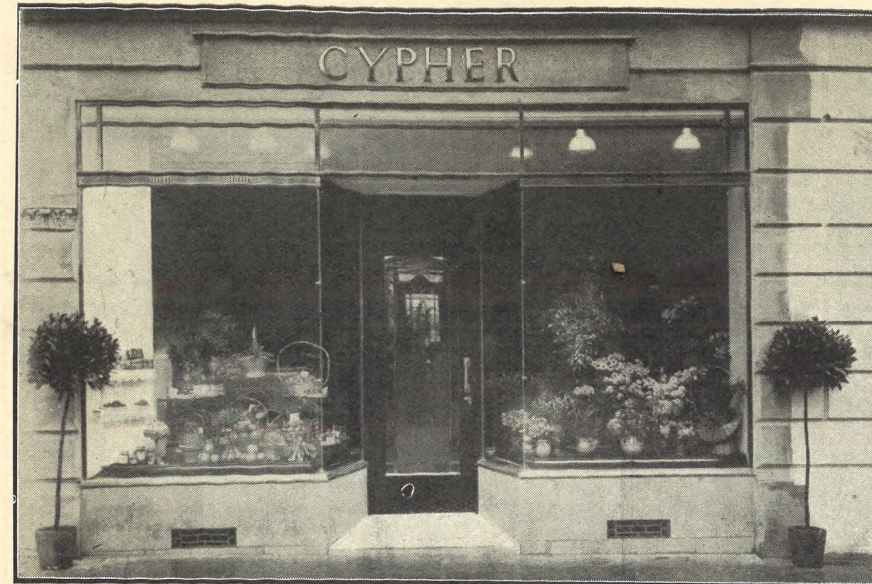
OPENING OF ELECTRIC HOUSE IN CHELTENHAM

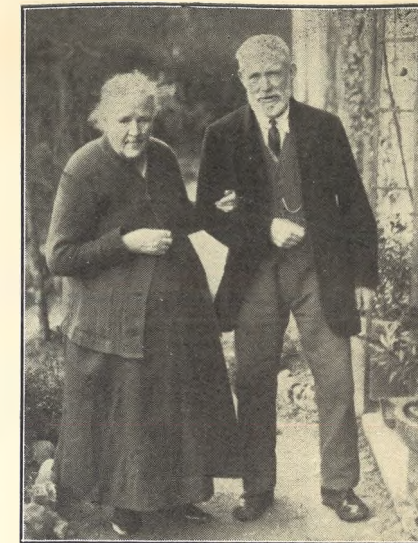

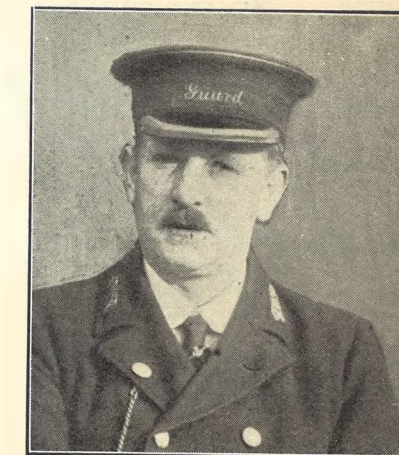
AN OLD FIRM IN A NEW PLACE

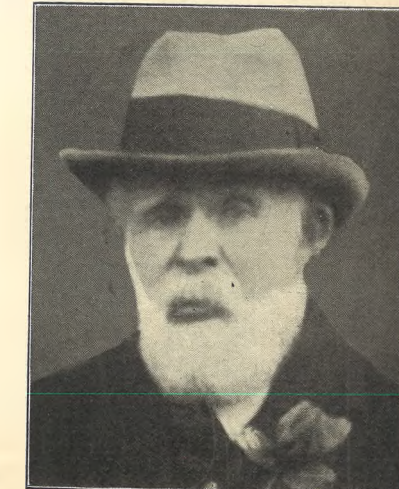


PRESTBURY GOLDEN WEDDING

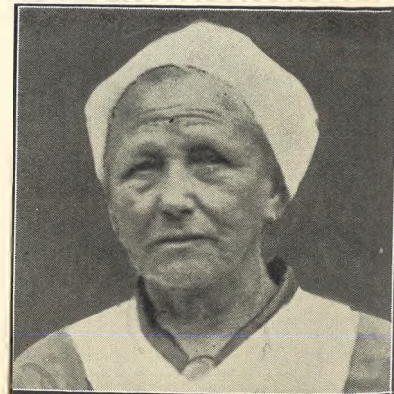

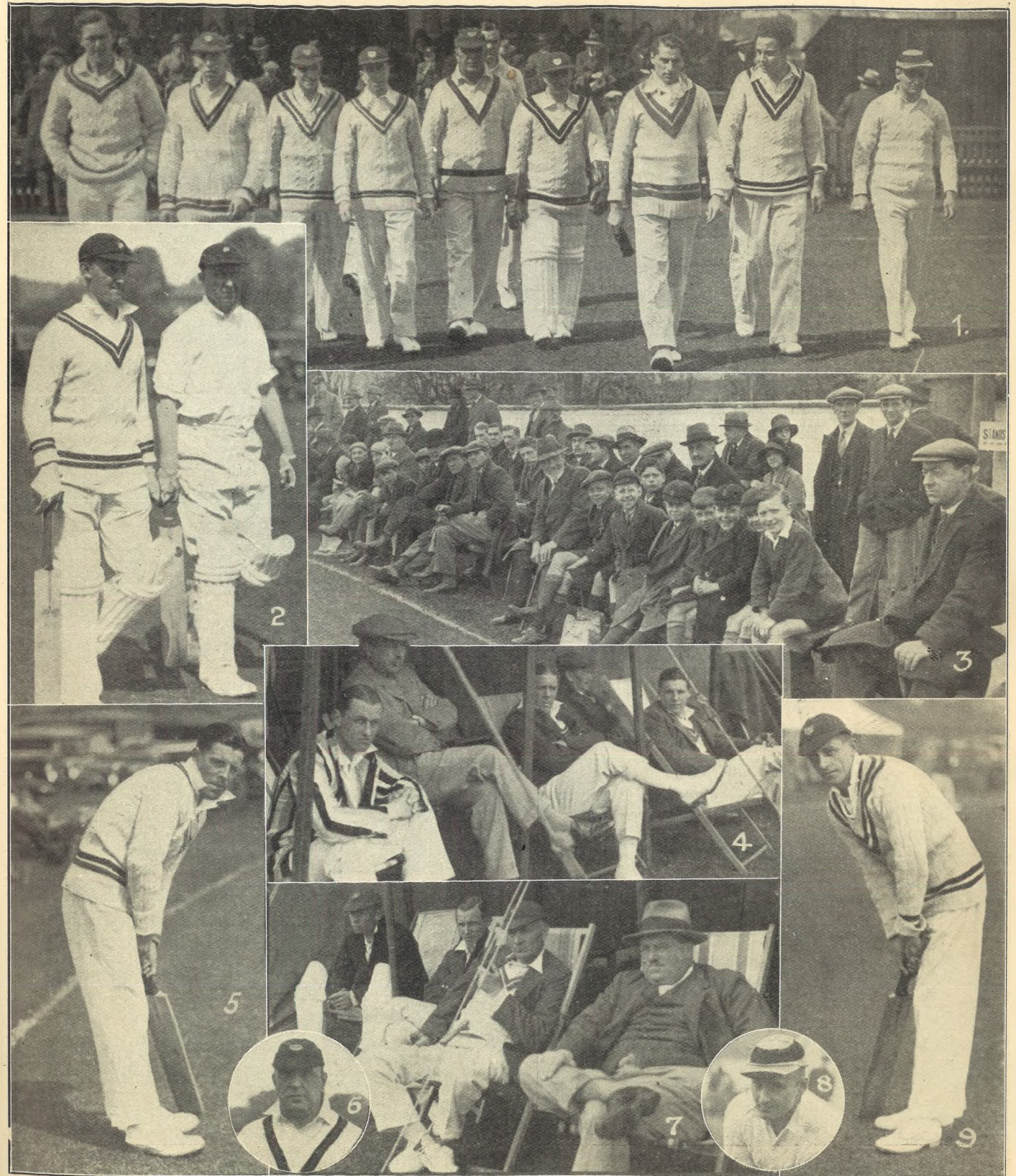


SIR ALAN COBHAM'S FLYING CIRCUS AT CHURCHDOWN

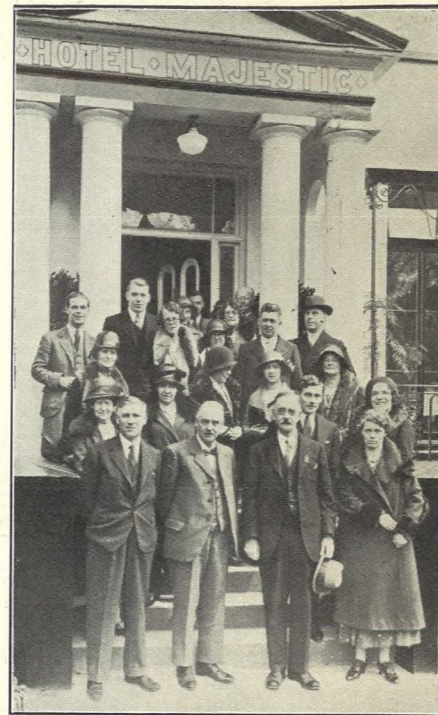

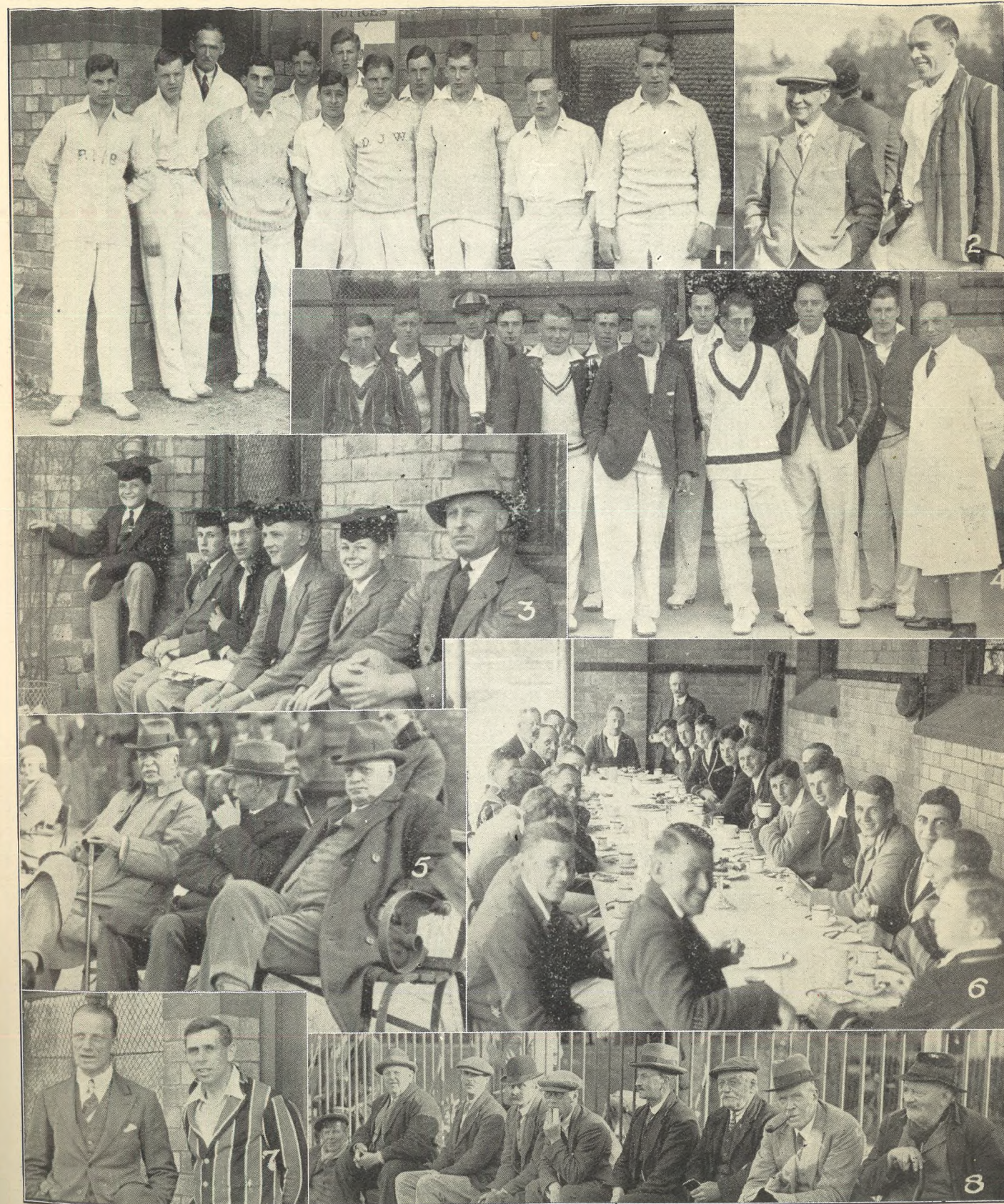

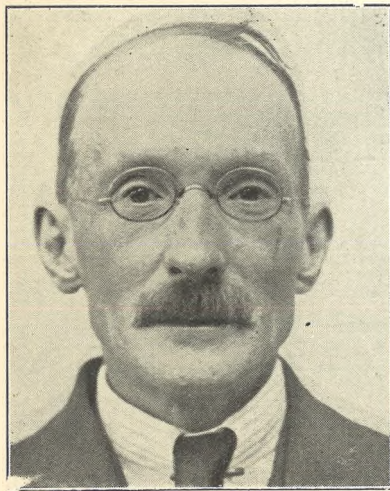

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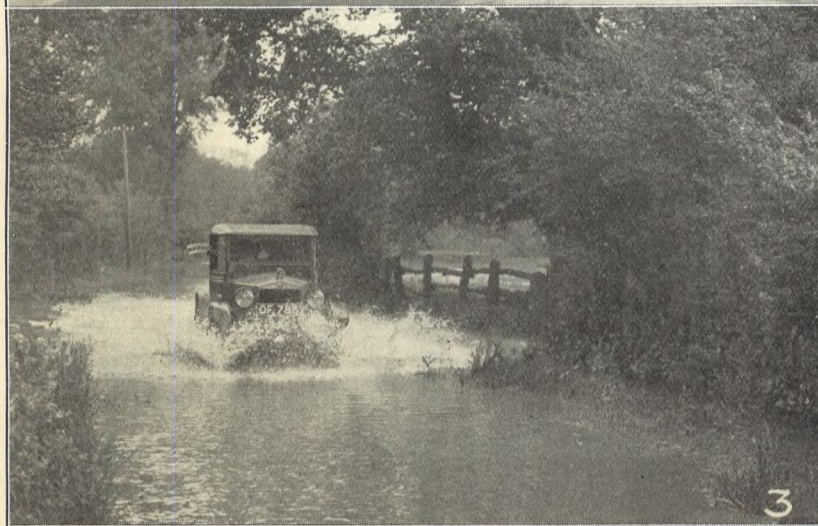

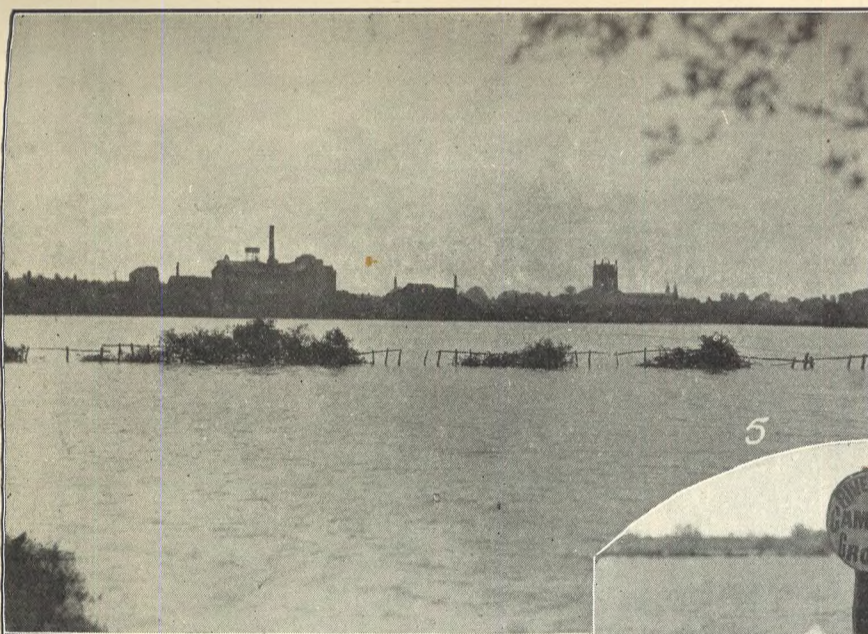

FLOOD SCENES IN EVESHAM AND SEVERN-SIDE PARISHES

The abnormal rainfall of this month has caused serious flooding in the towns and villages adjoining the Severn and Avon, and during the early part of the week a great part of Evesham was seriously flooded, it being impossible to get to Bengeworth except through deep water.

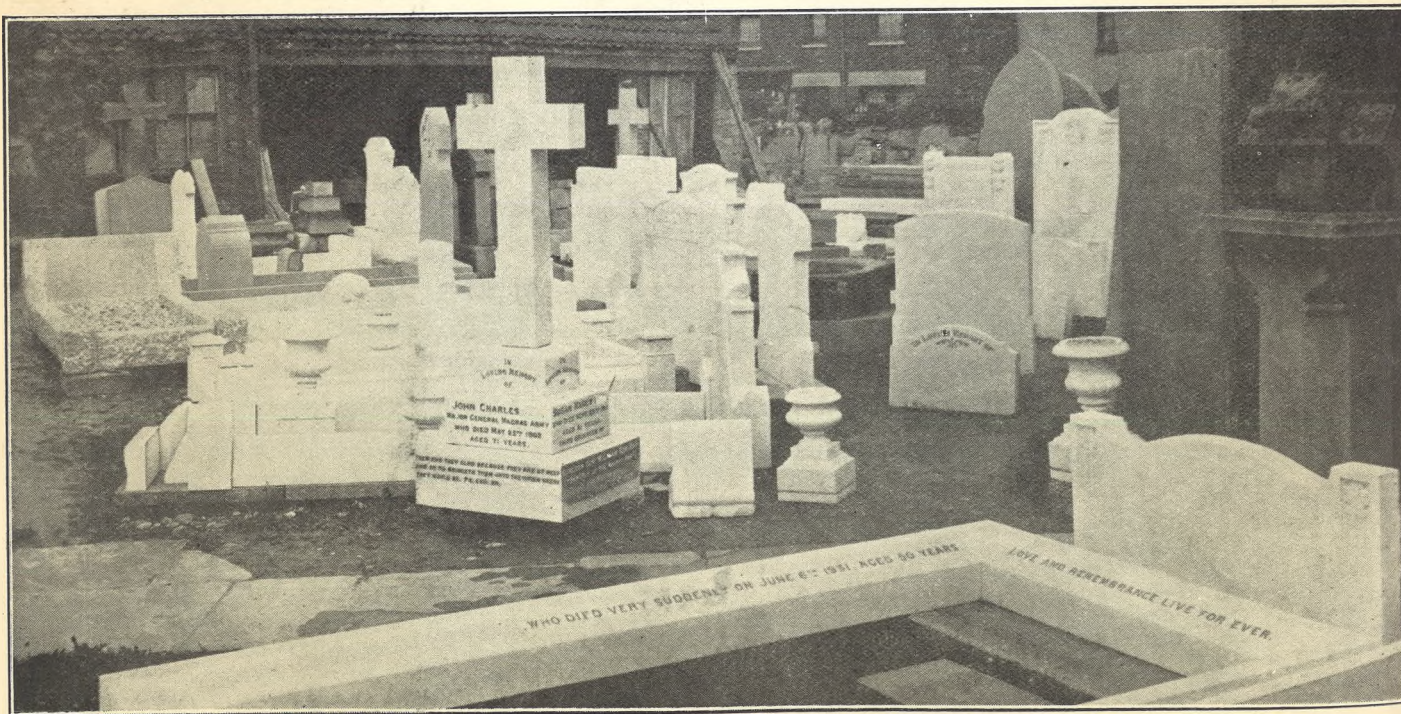

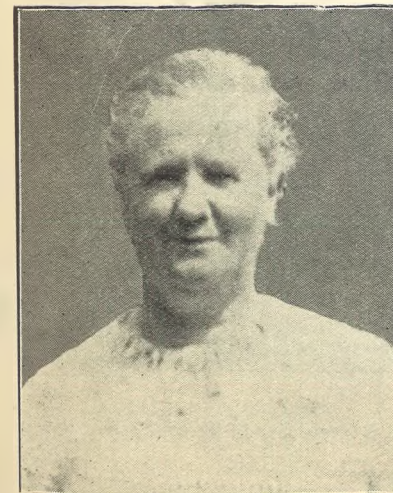

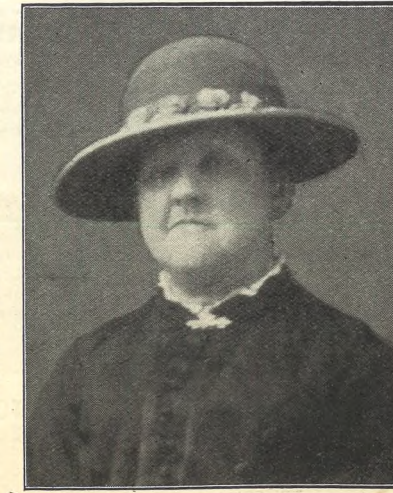
PREPARING FOR THE PAGEANT AT BODDINGTON MANOR

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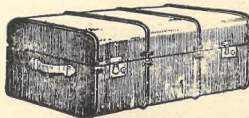
