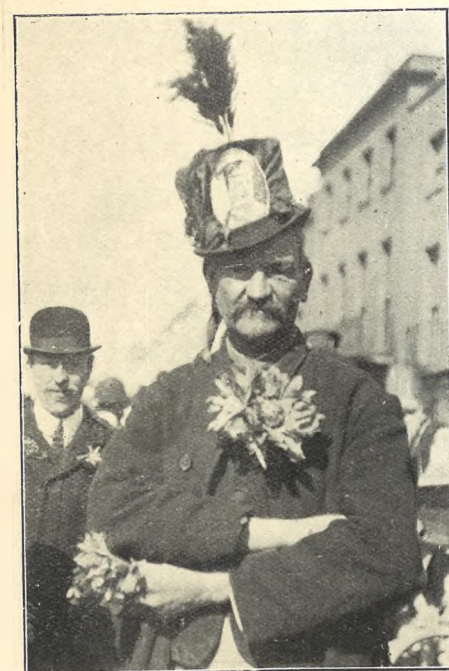


Electric Saw cutting marble tiles from slab. Just one of its uses.

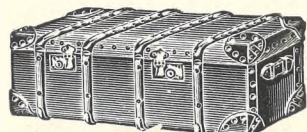

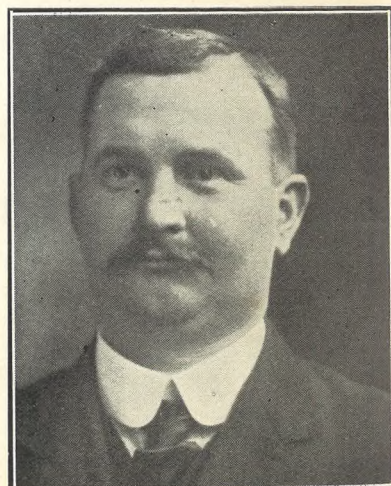

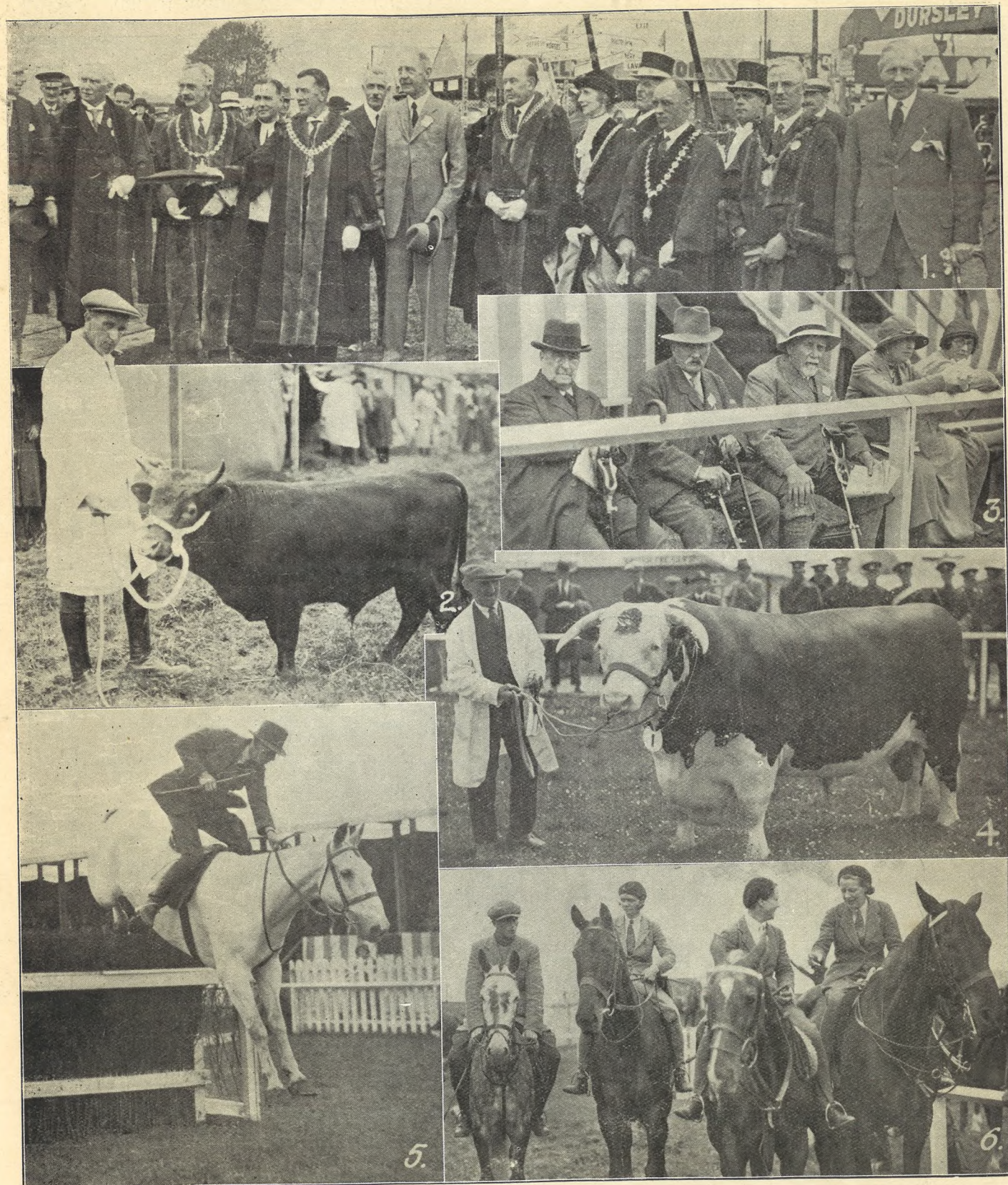


BAKERS' CONFERENCE IN CHELTENHAM

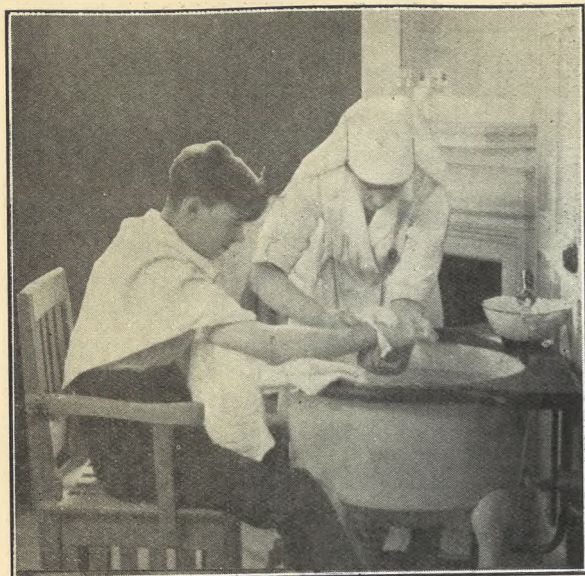

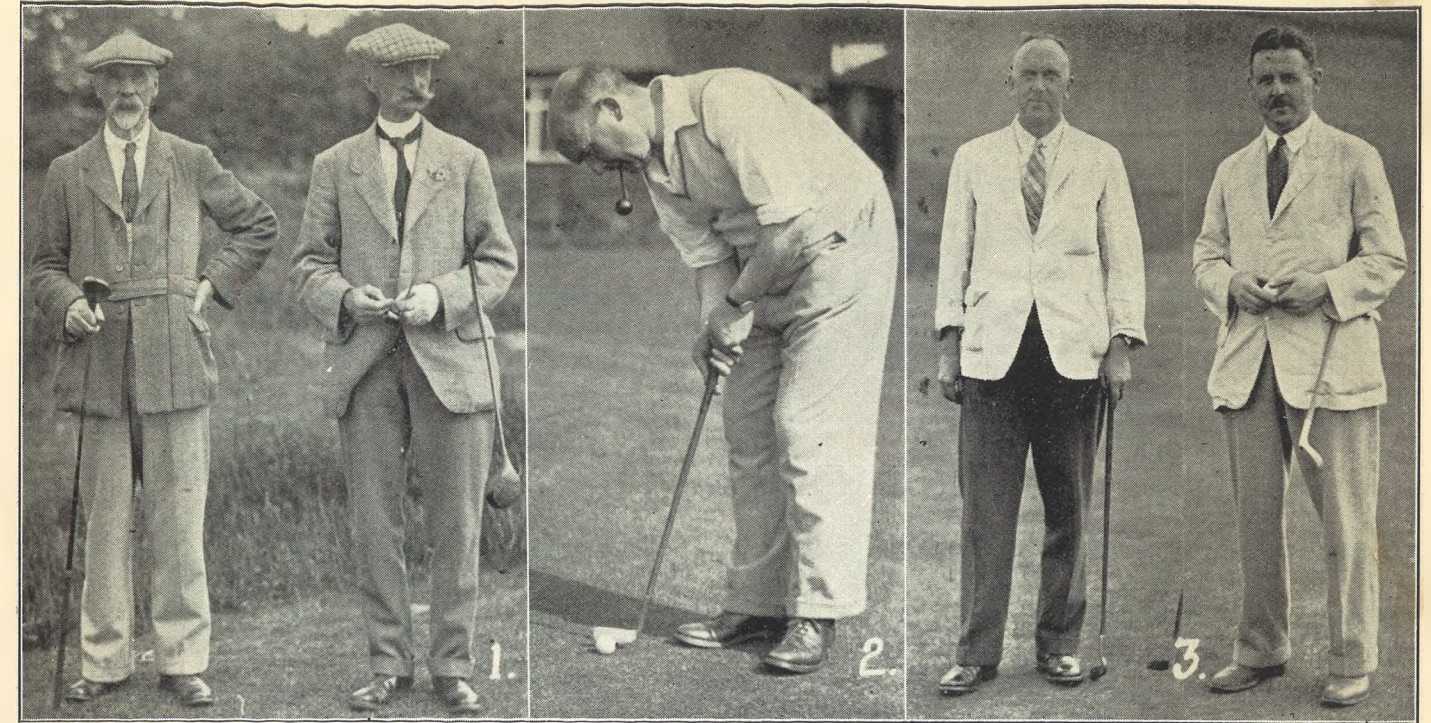

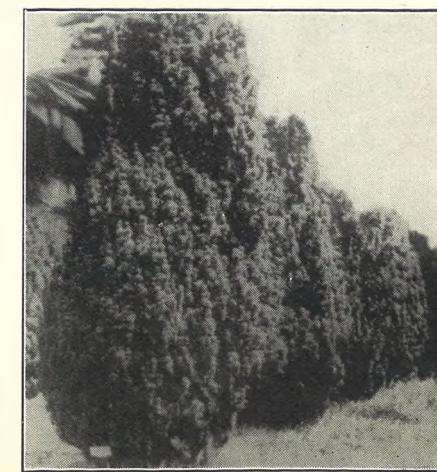
