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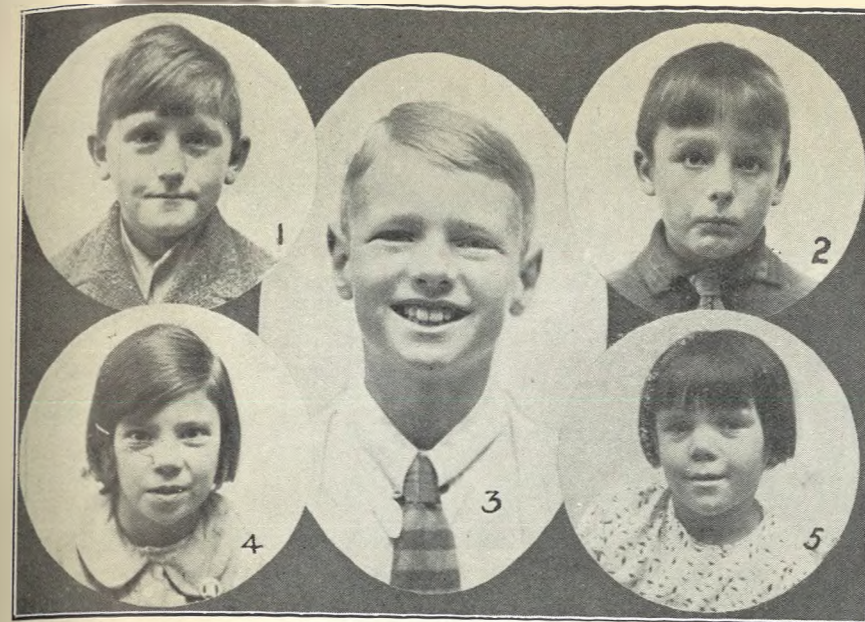

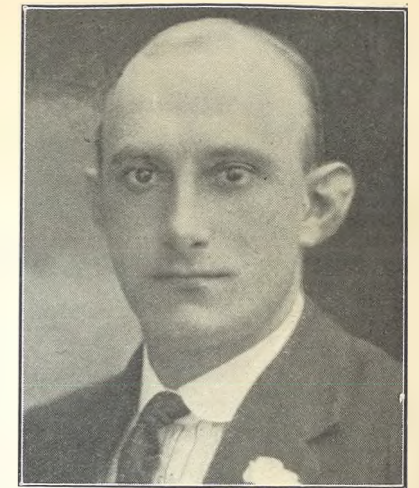

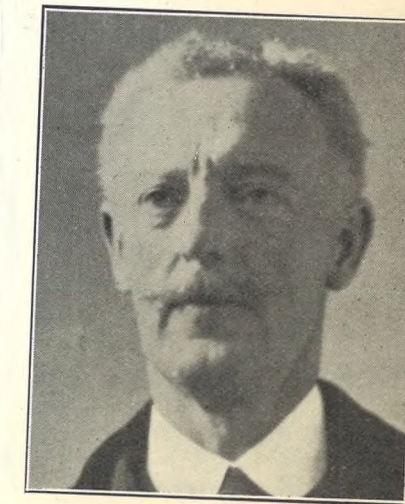

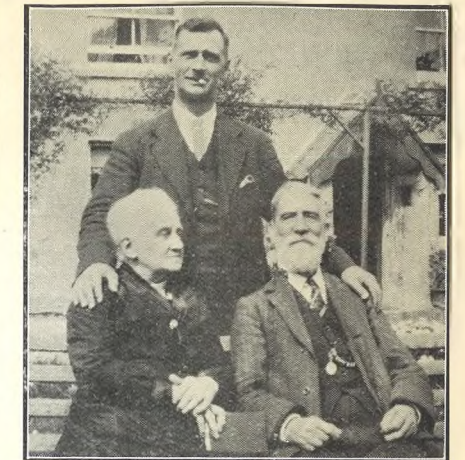

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—MATSON

An ancient family named Robins were tenants of Matson House for many generations under the Abbey of Gloucester, and gave their name to Robins Hood Hill adjoining. In 1597 the house was sold to the Selwyn family, of whom George Augustus Selwyn, the famous wit and representative of Gloucester in many Parliaments, was one of its most notable sons. He died in 1791 and it passed by marriage to the Townshend family. Richard Pate was seized of Matson in the reign of King Edward VI., he was probably the Pate connected with the founding of the Grammar School in Cheltenham.

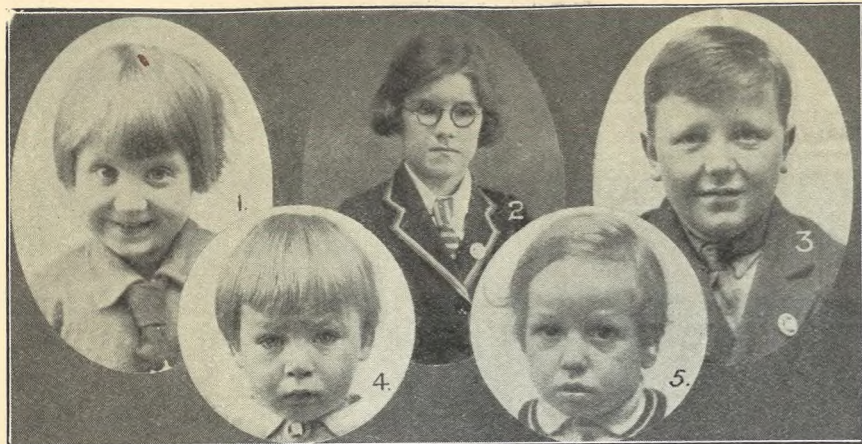

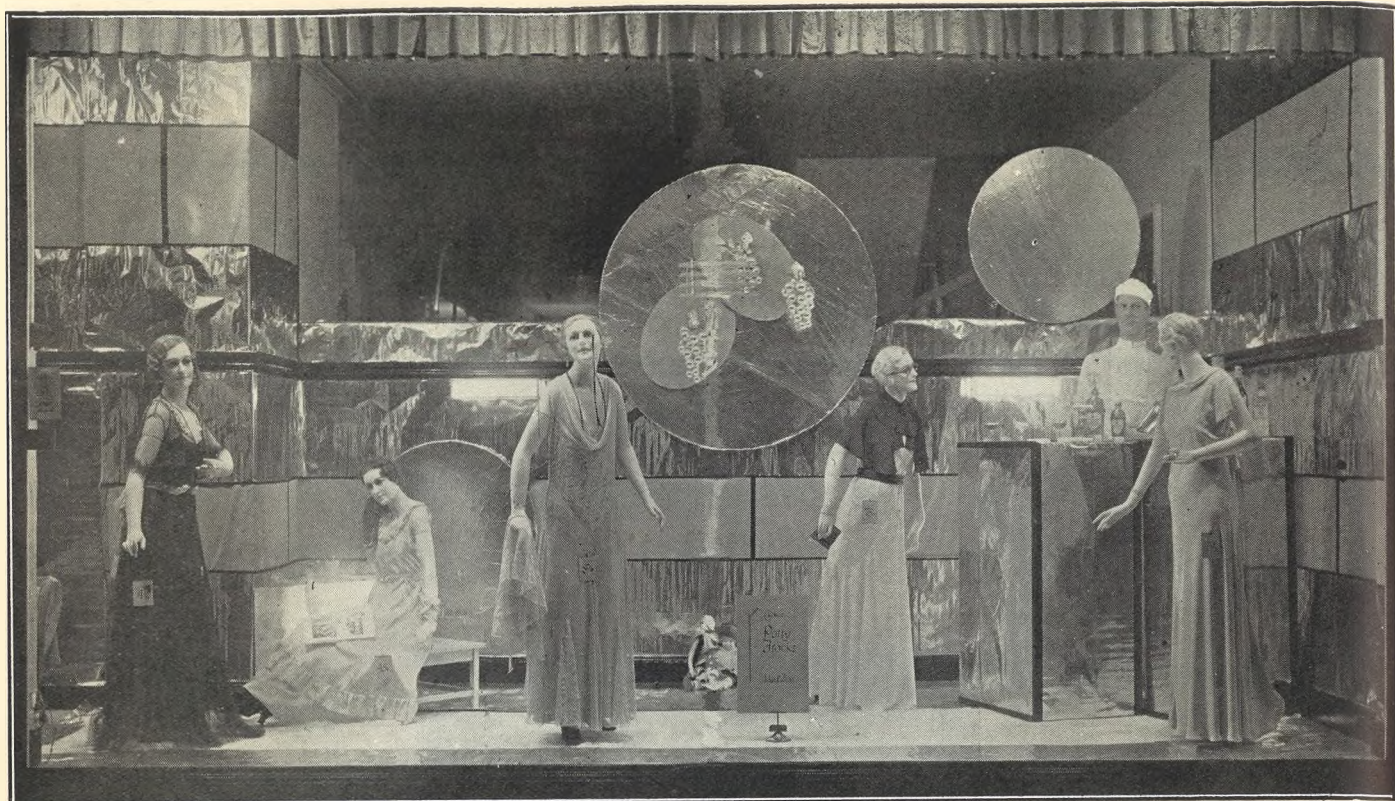

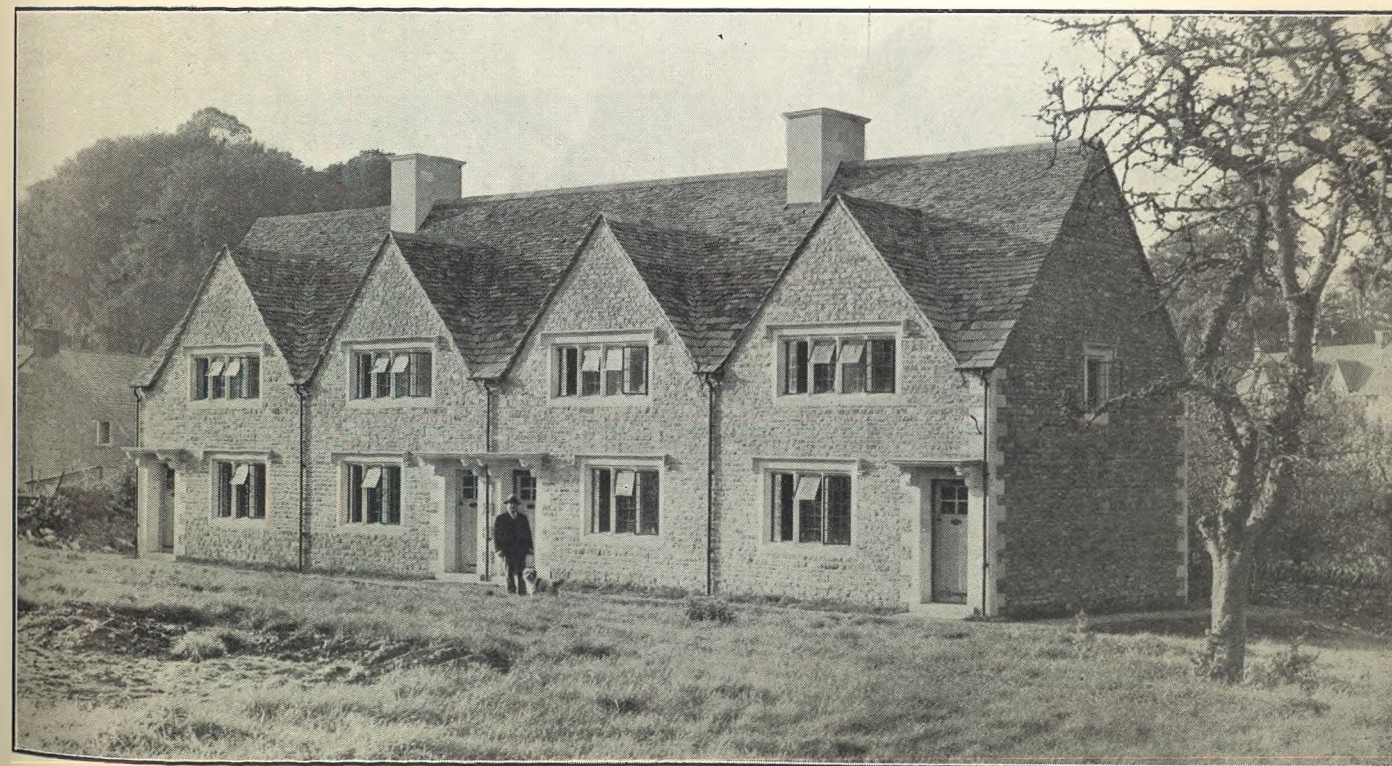

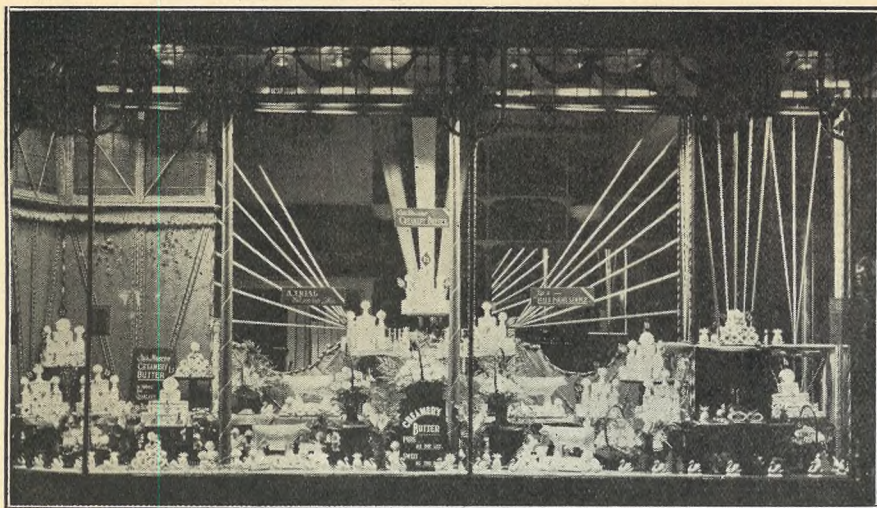

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SOME BEAUTIFUL NEW COTSWOLD COTTAGES

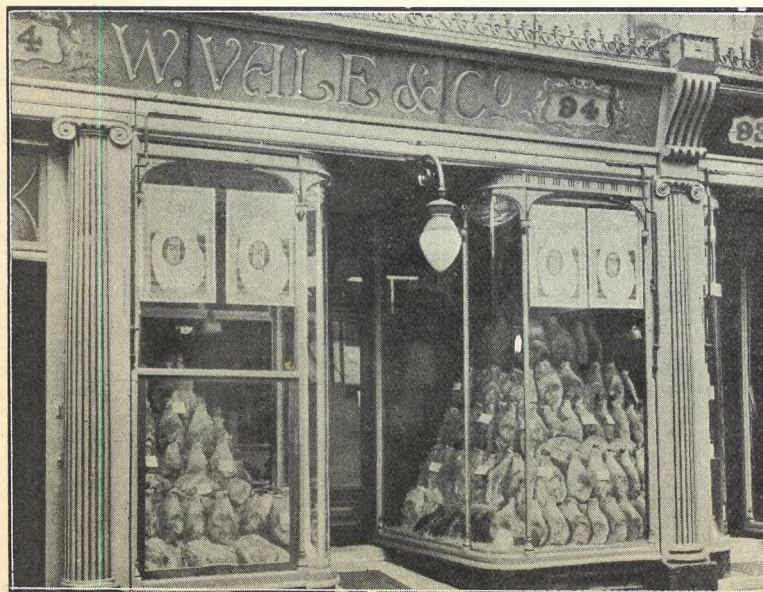

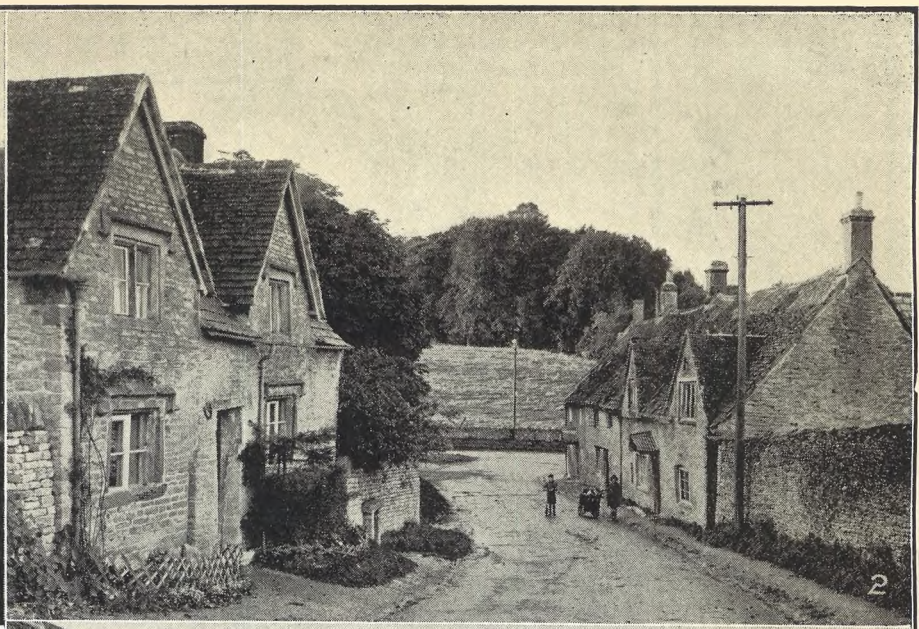
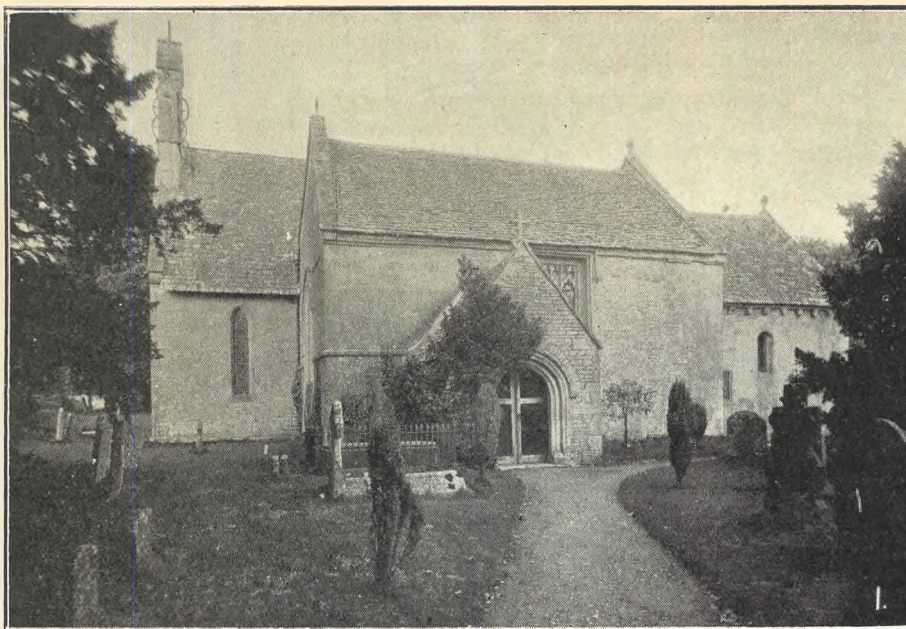

About the year 1659 it came into possession of the Atkyns family, and was held by Sir Robert Atkyns of Sapperton, the Gloucestershire historian, who lived here at a house named Swell Bowl. 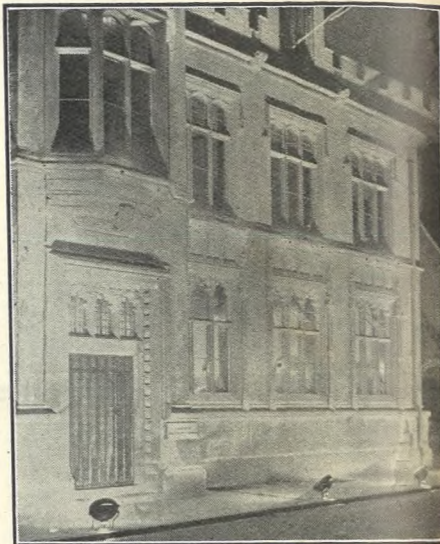

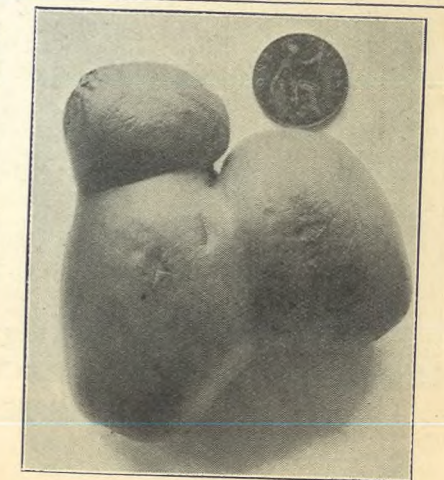

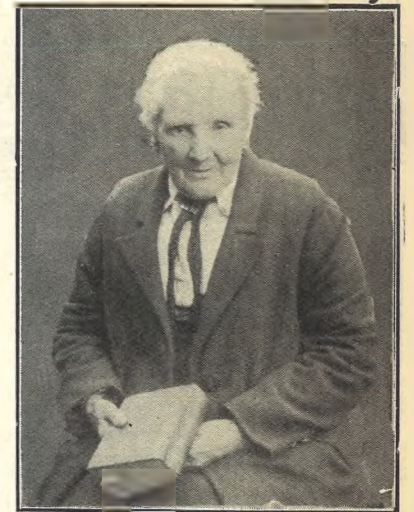


NURSES AT THE NETS
