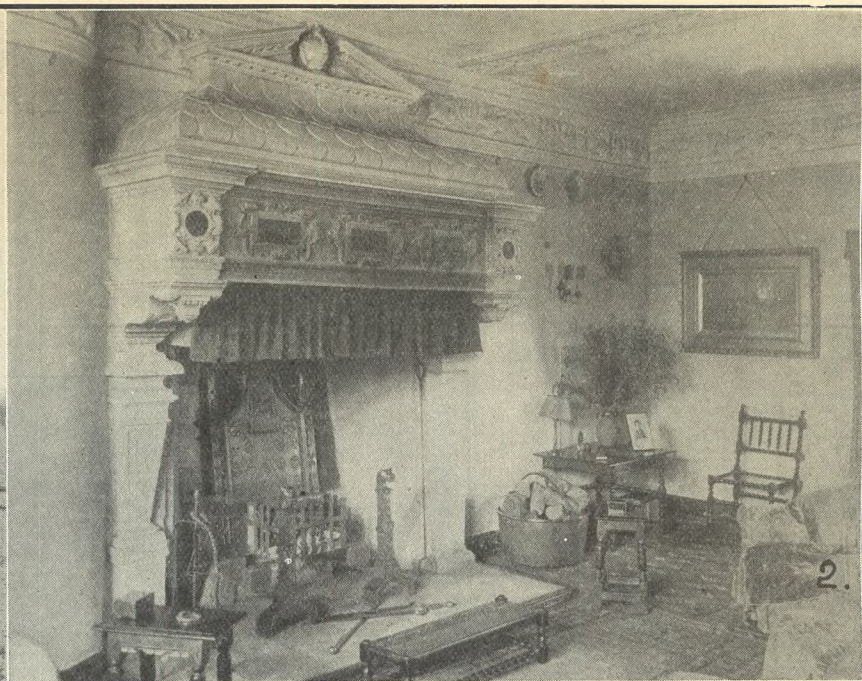

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—UPPER SWELL.

Upper Swell is a village on the high road from Stow to Tewkesbury, and about two miles from the former. Rudder gave in 1779, "There is nothing in it worthy the traveller's notice," but he must have overlooked the beautiful old manor house adjoining the church, in which is a particularly fine fireplace, almost unique in a house of that size. At one time (about 1700) it belonged to Sir James Rushout, of Northwick, Worcs. In 1709 there were 82 inhabitants in the village, in 1779 only 69, but at the last census 111.

1.—The Manor House adjoining the church. It is a beautiful old house, with an almost unique porch with a room built over. There is a lovely room in the house with a fine plaster ceiling and a glorious stone fireplace.

2.—The carved stone fireplace. It is in a room on the first floor.

3.—A large lake in the Manor House grounds.

4.—The Church of St. Mary. It is partly Norman, but very small.

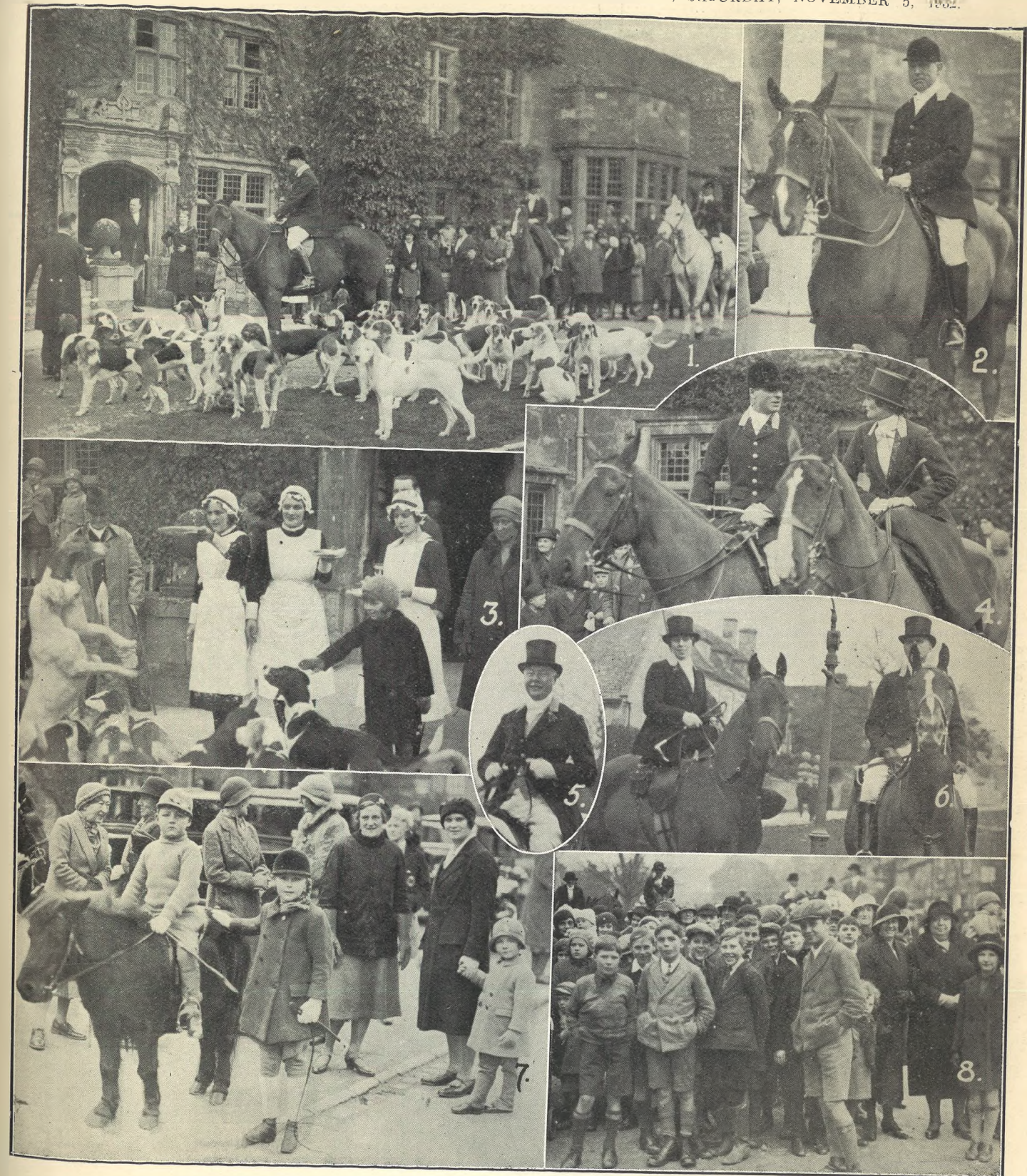


COMMEMORATION DAY AT DEAN CLOSE SCHOOL

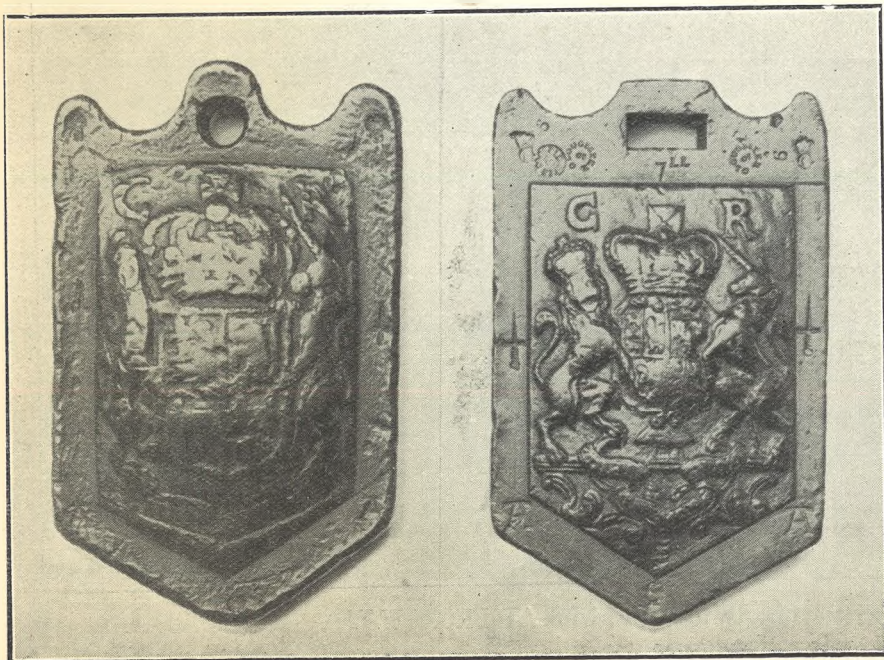


FASHION DISPLAY IN CHELTENHAM

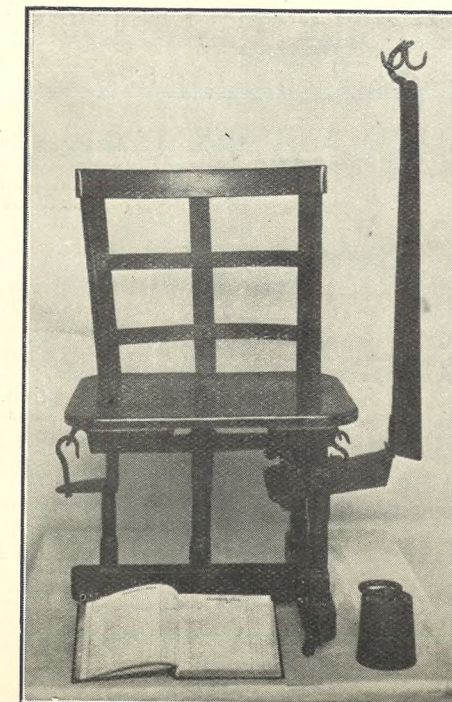

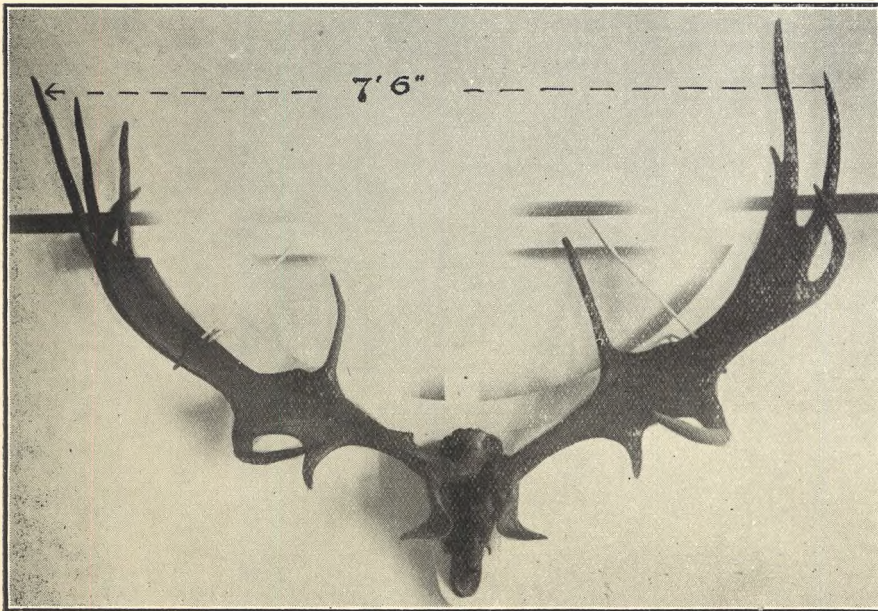

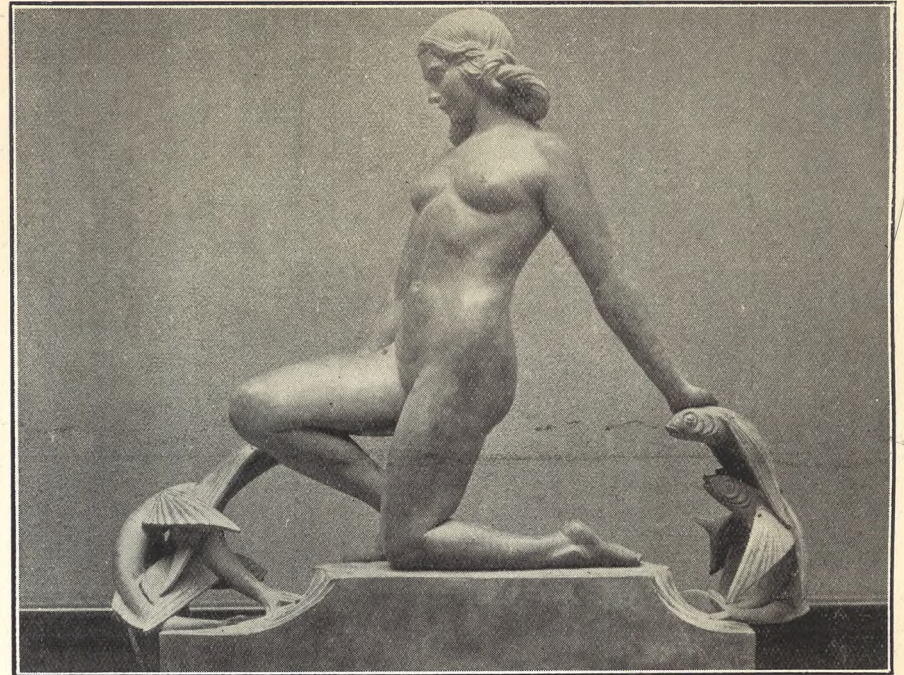
