A CORNER OF GILLHAM'S NEW TEA LOUNGE









GLOUCESTERSHIRE SCHOOLS AND SCHOLARS.—ANDOVERSFORD COUNCIL SCHOOL

This school, an entirely new one, was opened on May 1, 1928, under the present headmaster, Mr. R. B. Jones. It replaced the old Church School at Dowdeswell. Children attend from Dowdeswell, Andoversford, Foxcote, Whittington and Hawling, and seniors from Shipton Gilfe, the number on the roll being 136. The modern buildings are artistically planned with central heating, and the latest principles embodied in lighting and ventilation. Handicraft and cookery centres are features, and there is a fine school garden and a playing field. The school has a staff of five, a headmaster and four mistresses.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—COATES AND RODMARTON

Coates is an out-of-the-way village between the Stroud and Tetbury roads about 3½ miles from Cirencester. One of the sources of the Thames springs in this parish and is called "Thames Head," and the old Thames and Severn Canal passes through the village. The church is an ancient one with much Norman work. The late Major-General A. B. E. Cator was buried in the churchyard a week ago. The Manor formerly belonged to the Atkyns family, Sir Robert Atkyns, of Sapperton, purchasing it about 1660.











BROADWAY SENIOR COUNCIL MIXED SCHOOL




















MR. and MRS. J. HOLMAN,
