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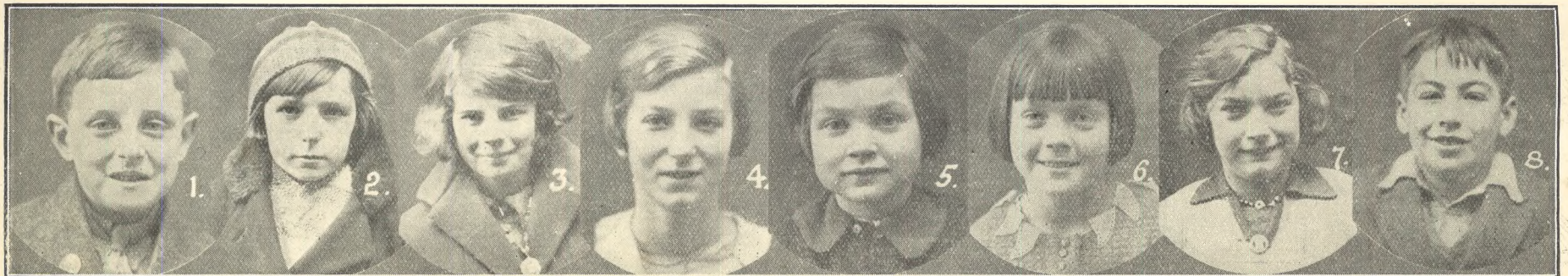

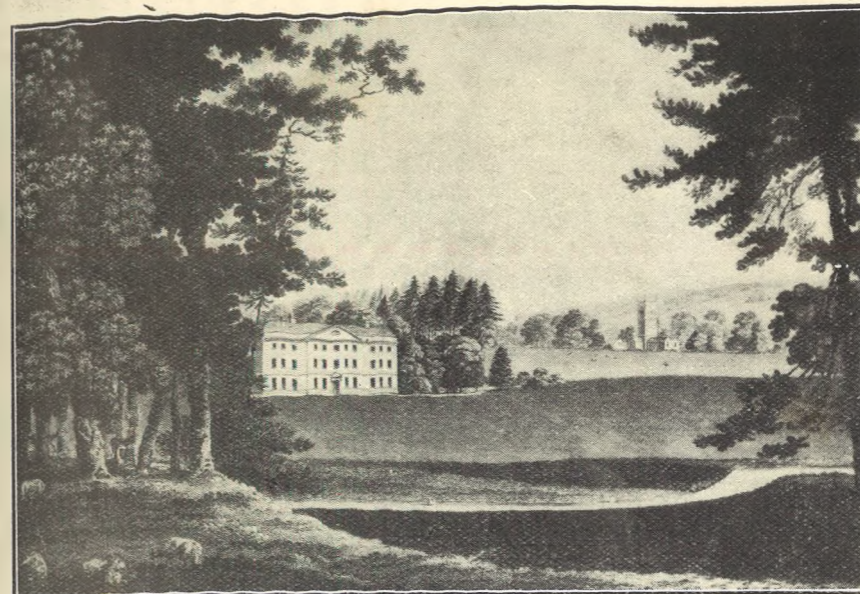
TWO CHELTENHAM NEW YEAR GOLDEN WEDDINGS.

A view of Charlton Park with Church in distance.

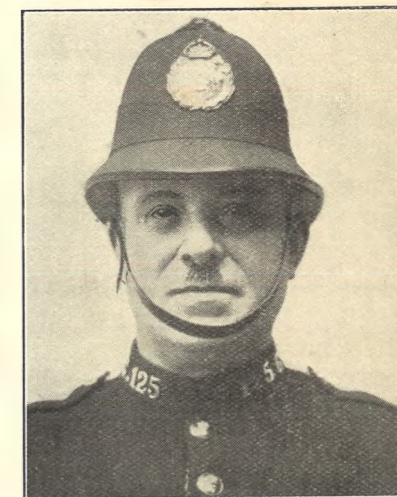

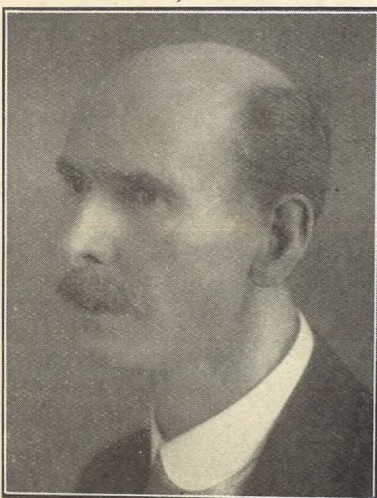


WELL-KNOWN POLICEMAN RETIRES

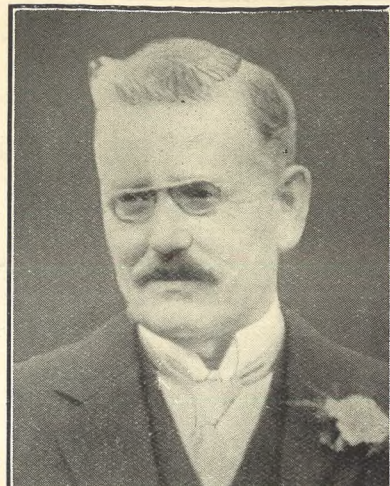

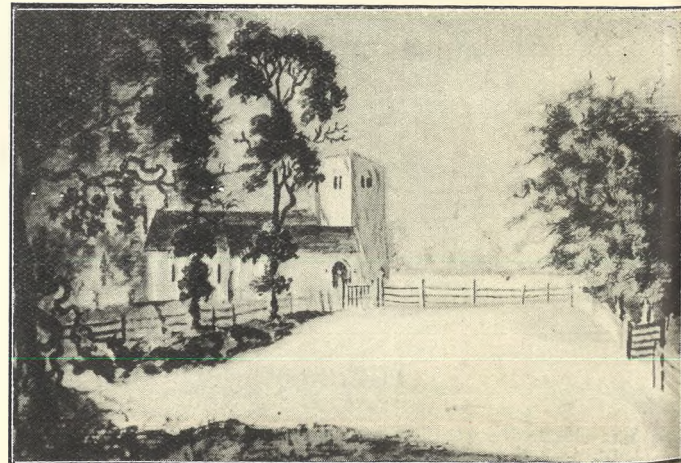

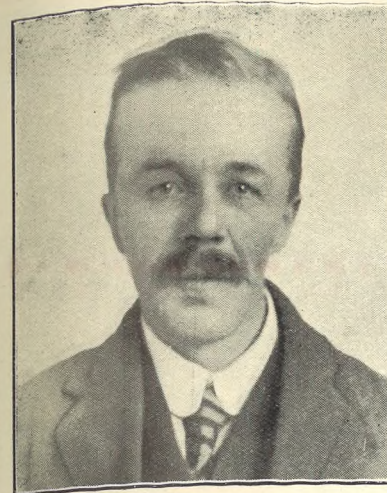

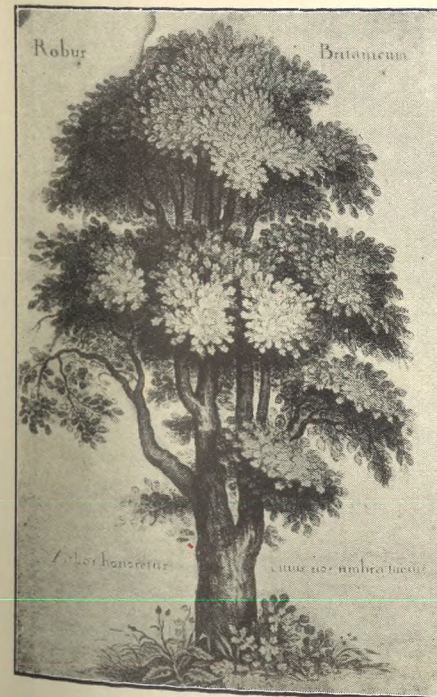

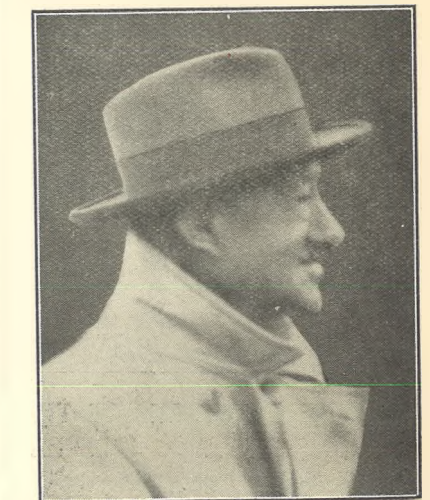

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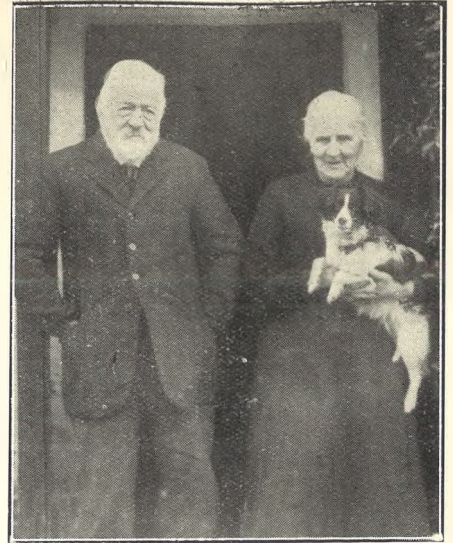
