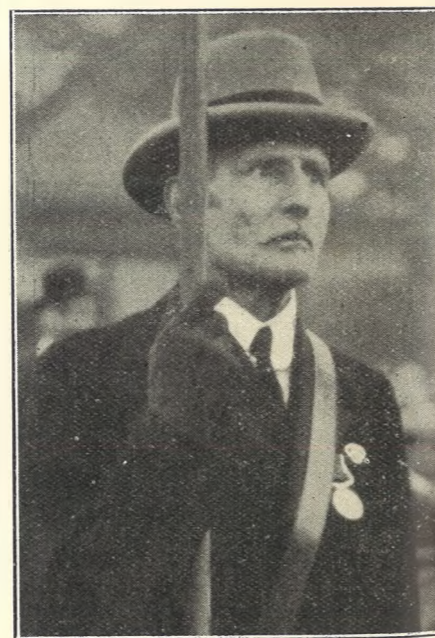

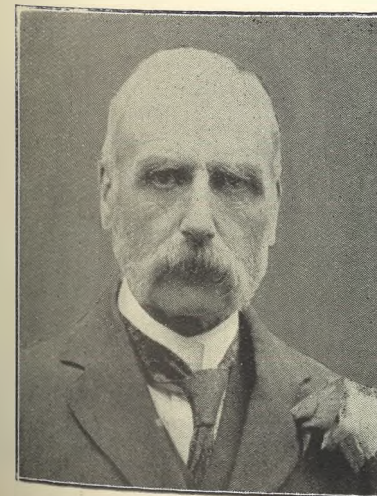


TEWKESBURY BUFFS' TRIBUTE AT FUNERAL OF BRO. T. W. MAXWELL, R.O.H.

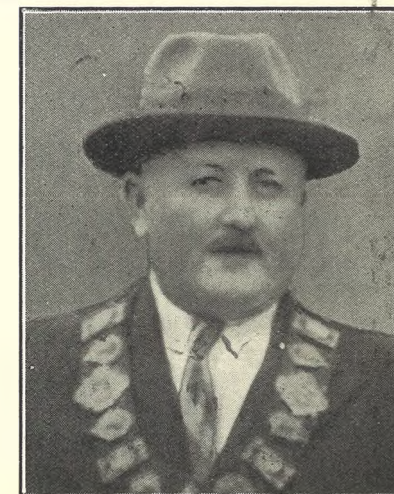

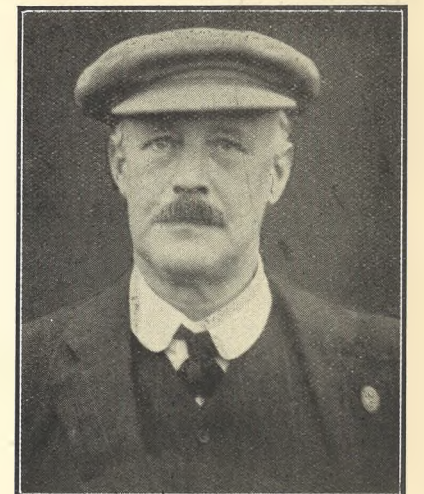


MR. W. STODDART HUDDART,

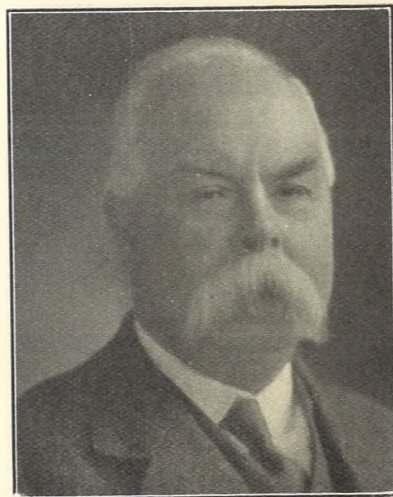

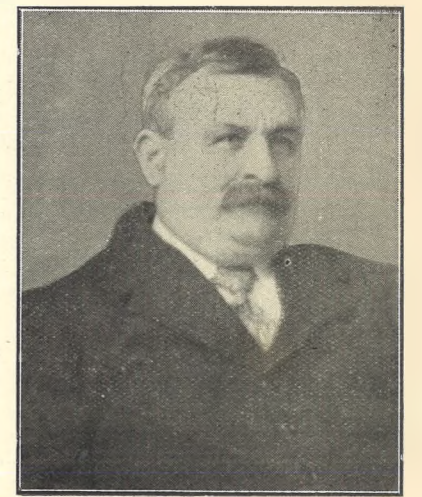

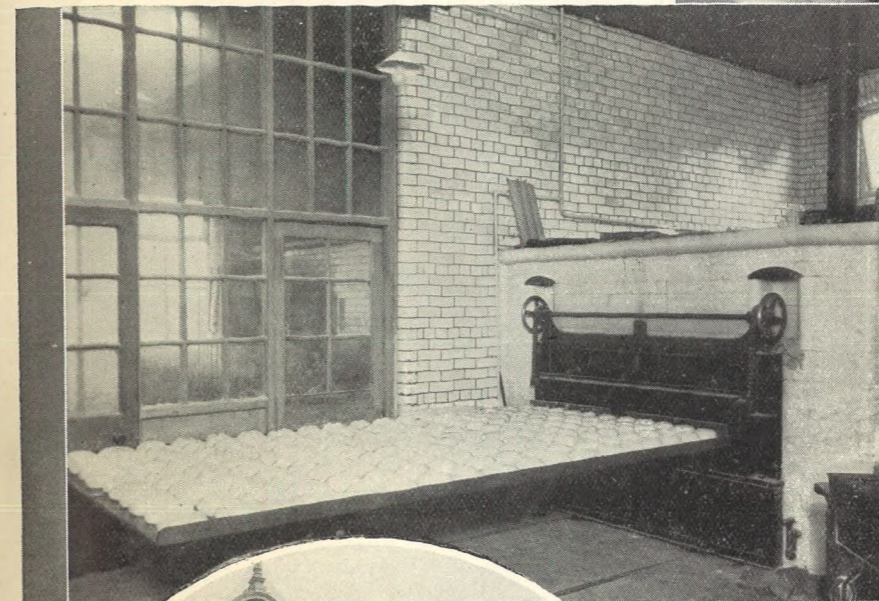
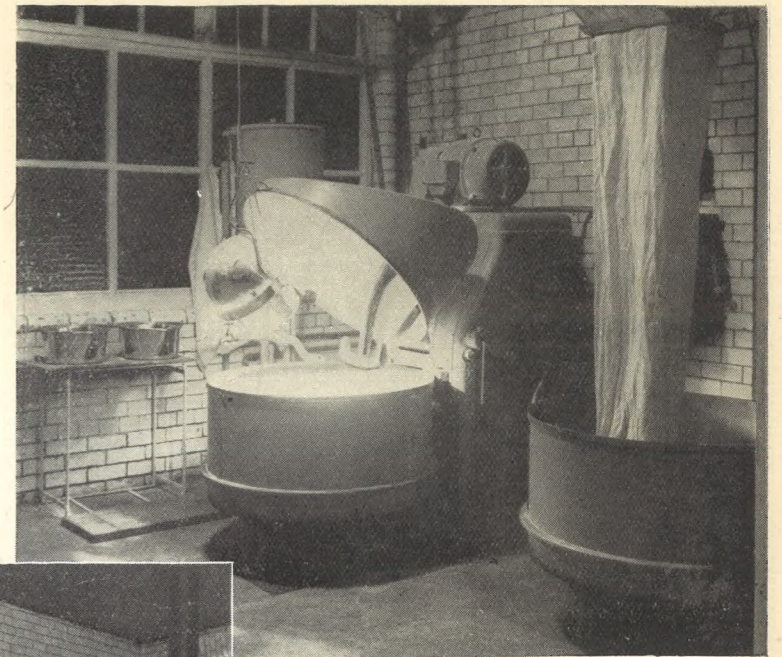
