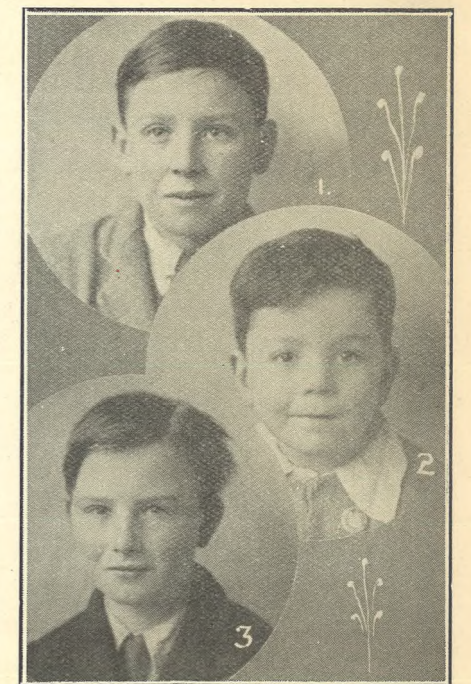

The blizzard that raged all over England and Wales throughout last Friday, Friday night and Saturday, was especially severe in the West of England and in Wales.

FURTHER SCENES OF THE GREAT BLIZZARD

- Extraordinary scenes were witnessed on Friday and Saturday, when vehicular traffic was held up completely on many of the main roads and cars had to be dug out of enormous drifts of snow.
- 14.—At this spot near the Oaklands on Prestbury-road, there was a deep drift on Friday and cars were stuck until dug out. On Saturday the road was flooded.
 - 15.—The Cheltenham 'bus could only get as far as Haymes-road on Cleeve Hill on Saturday afternoon. Passengers had to walk from there.
 - 16.—Cars in the snow on London road near the Dowdeswell Viaduct.
 - 17.—The only way to get up and down Leckhampton Hill on Saturday and Sunday was to walk!
 - 18.—A car in a snowdrift on the Shurdington-road near Brockworth.
 - 19.—The road from Cheltenham to Birdlip was impassable until Monday.

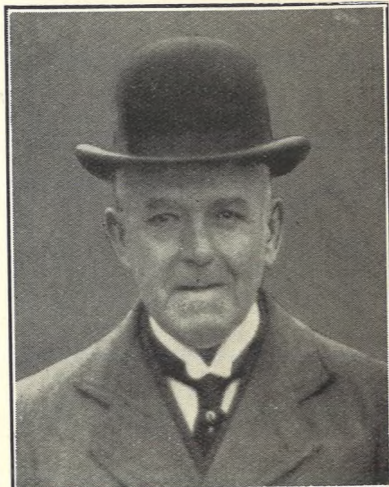


NEW CAR PARK AT TEWKESBURY

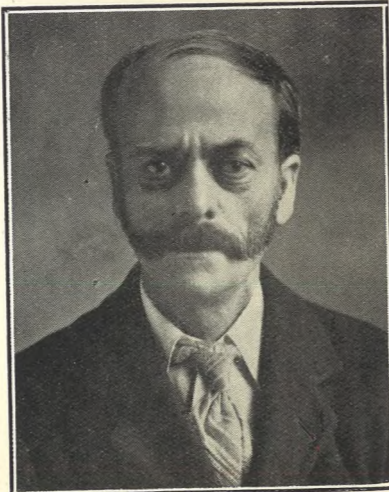
A fine new car park is now being constructed just at the entrance to Tewkesbury. A number of unemployed men have been put on the work.

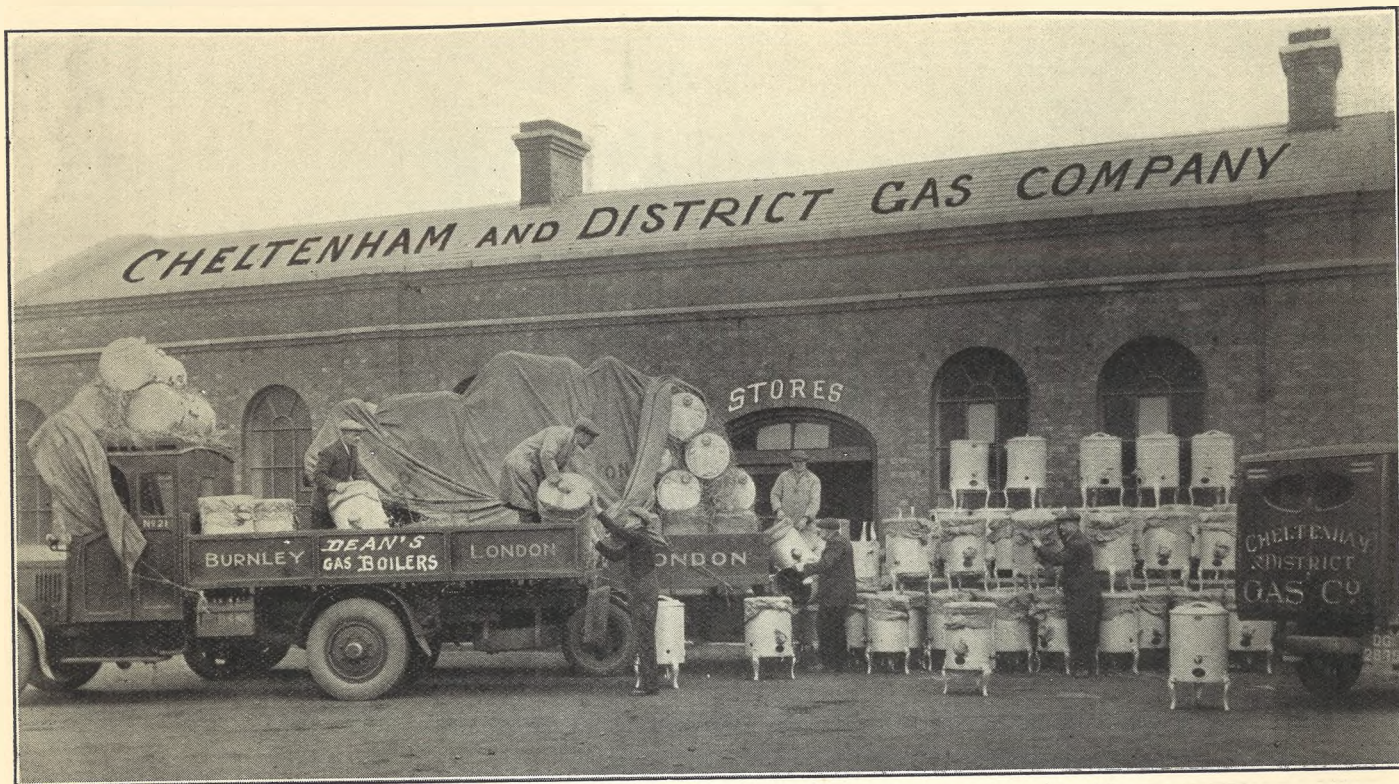

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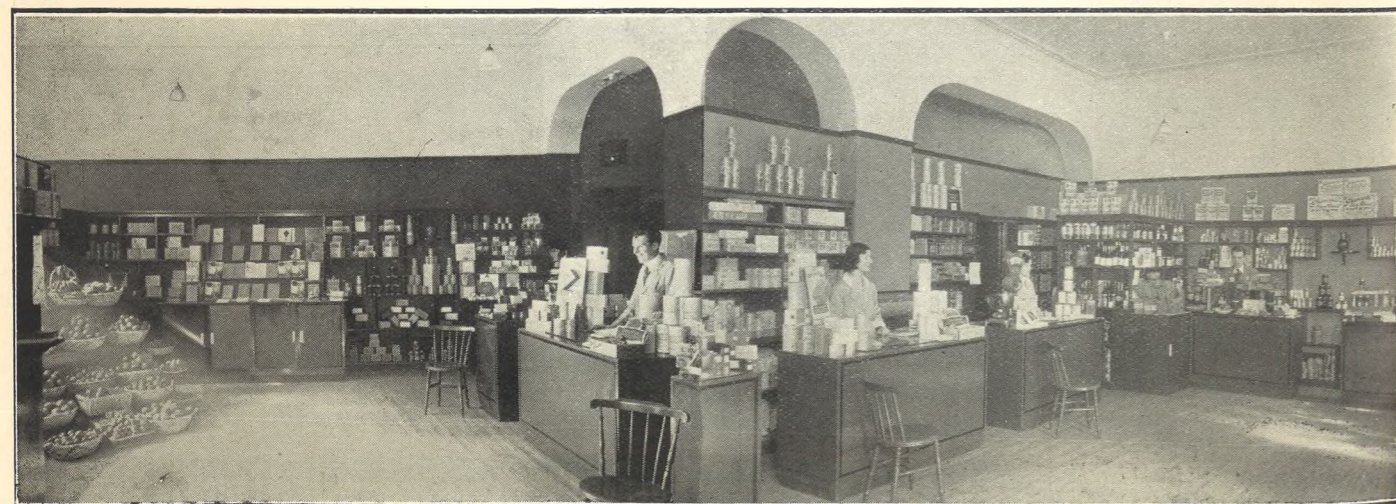

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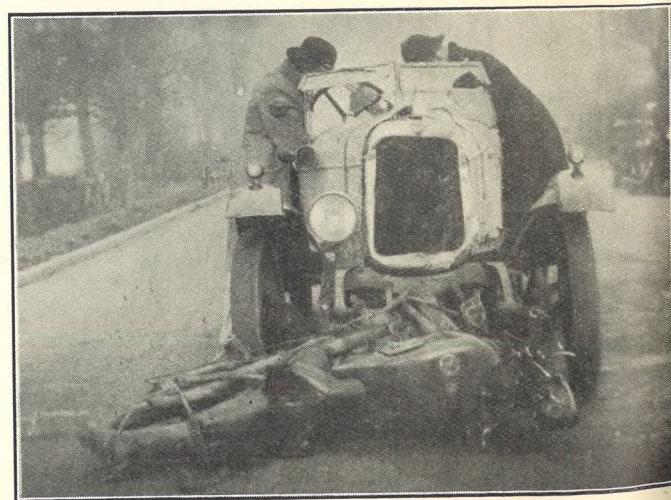

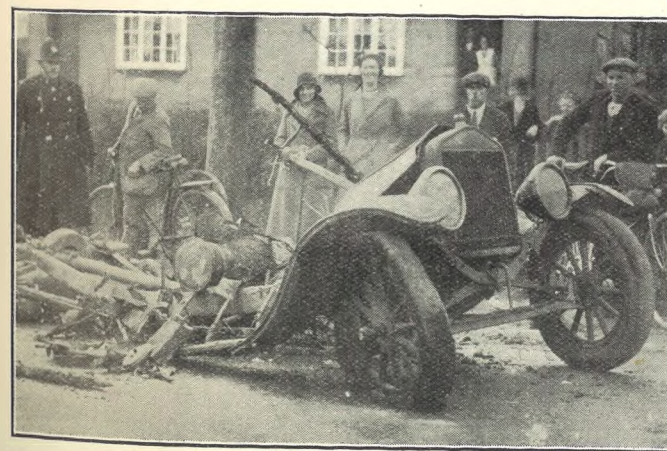

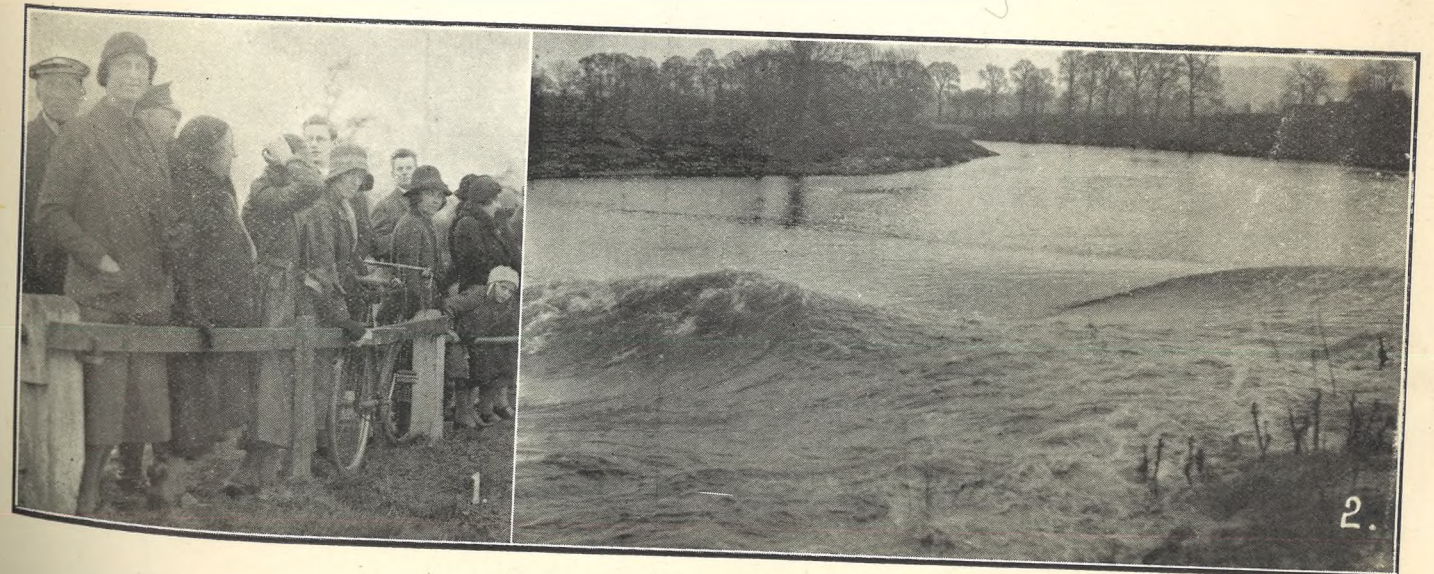
