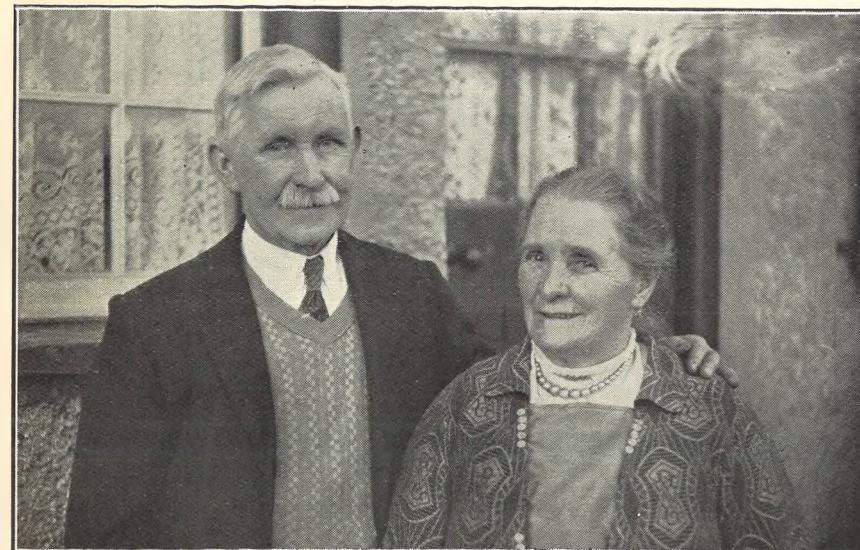

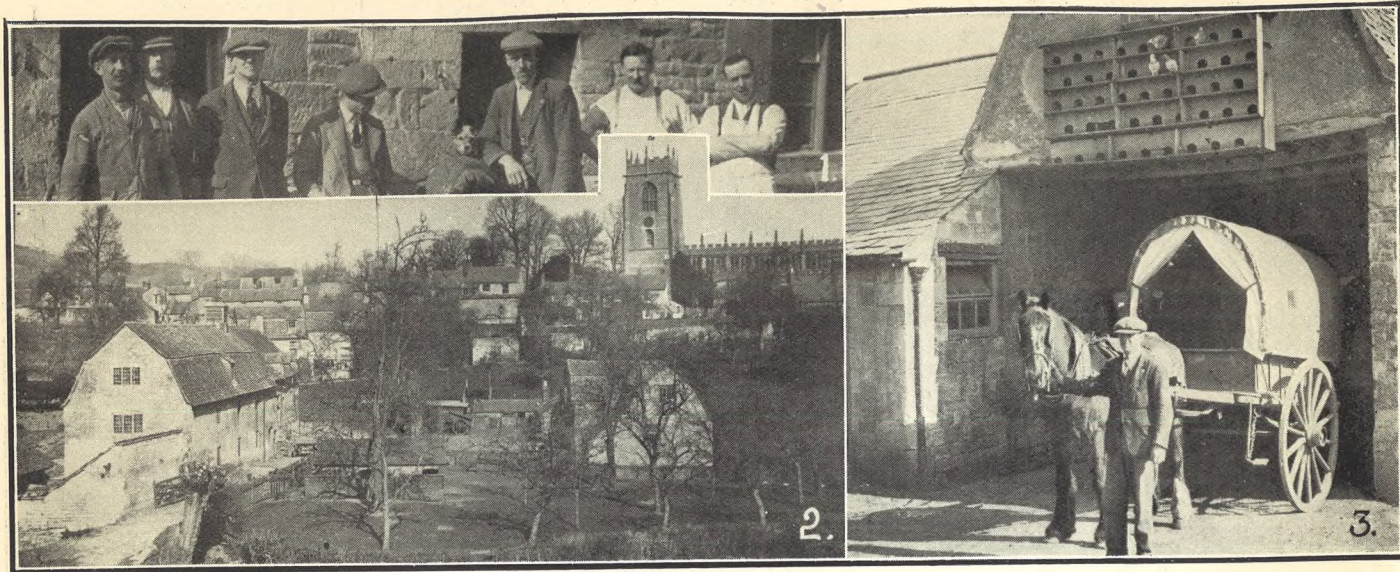


CHELTENHAM COLLEGE CROSS-COUNTRY RUN AND MATCH WITH CHELTENHAM AND COUNTY HARRIERS

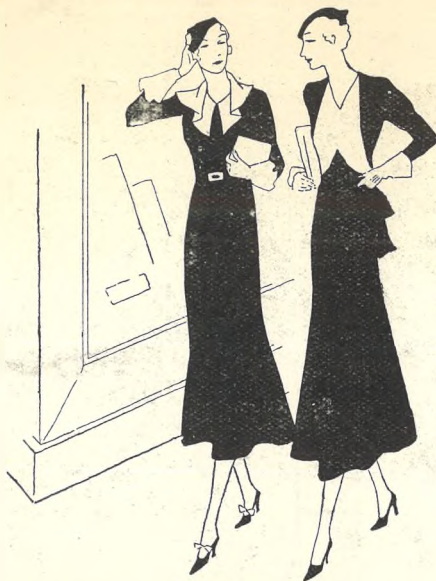

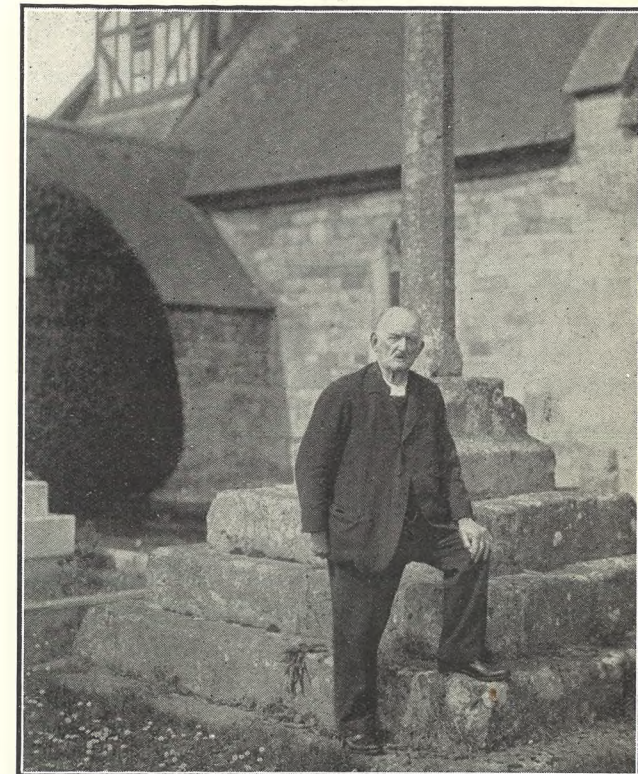

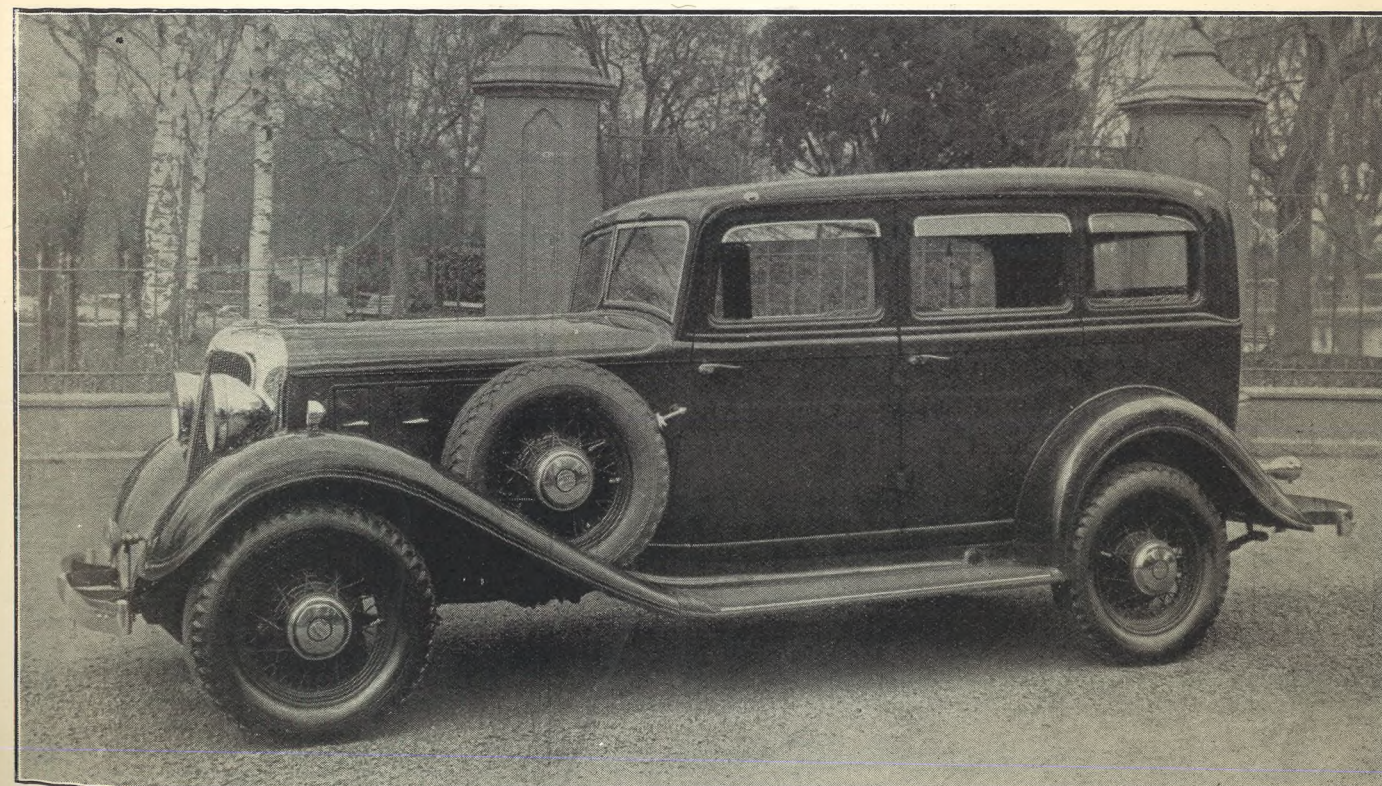
NEW WEST WINDOW TO DEAN CLOSE SCHOOL CHAPEL

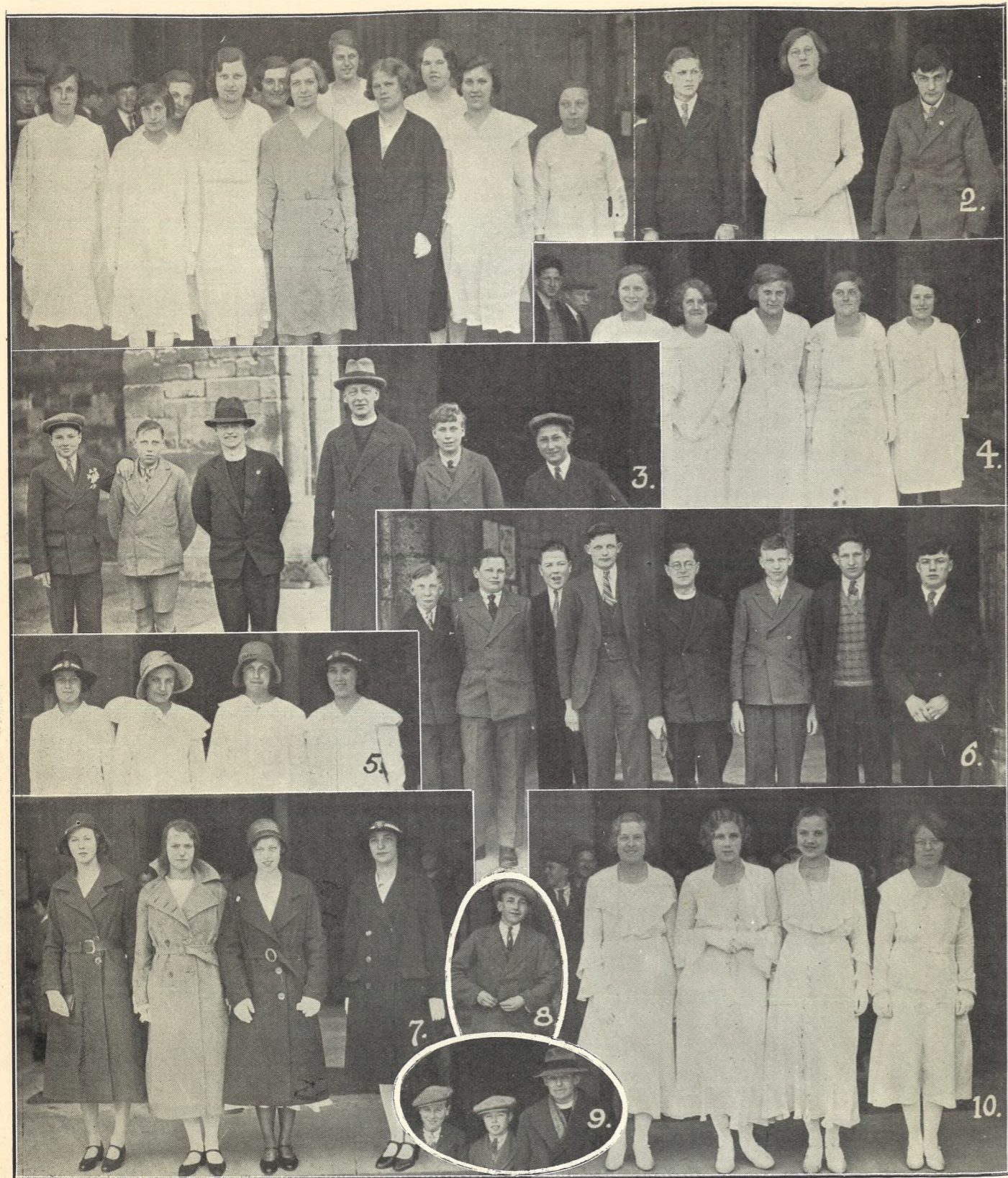

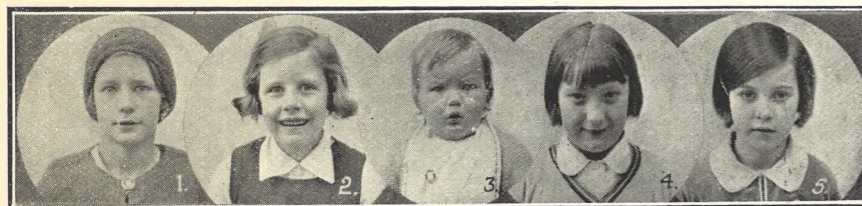

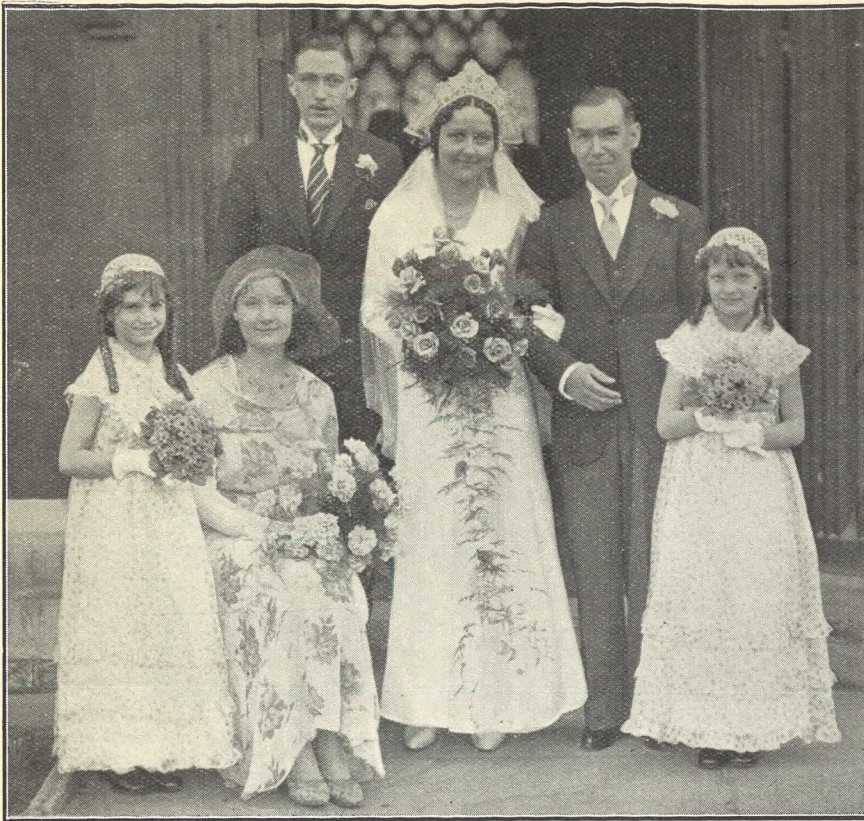

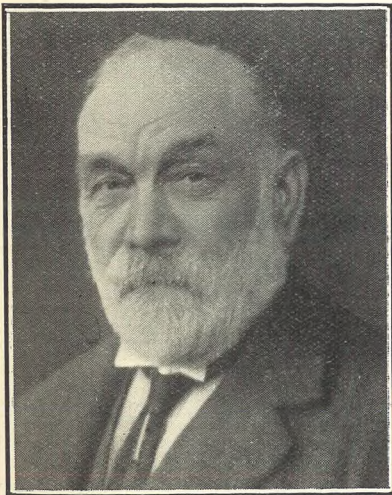

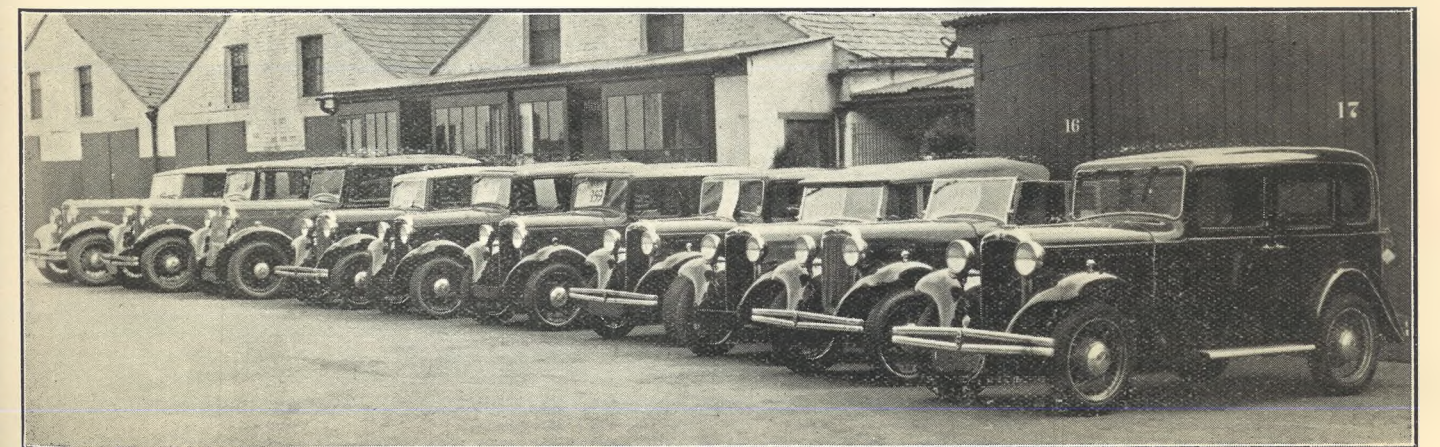


FUNERAL TRIBUTE TO YOUNG CHELTENHAM POLICEMAN

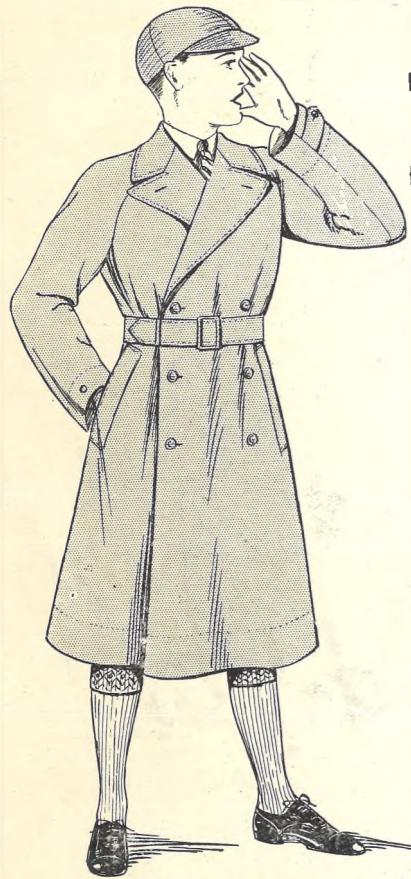

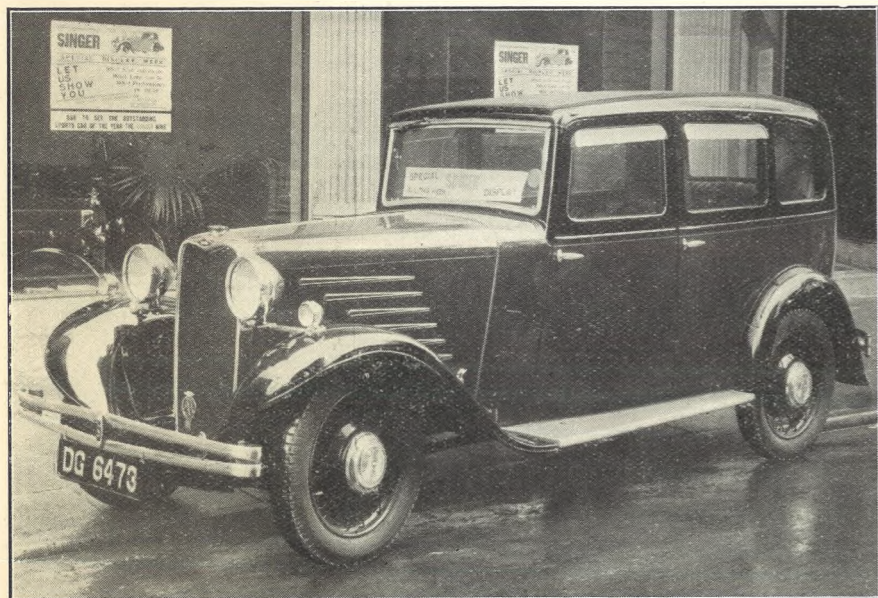
