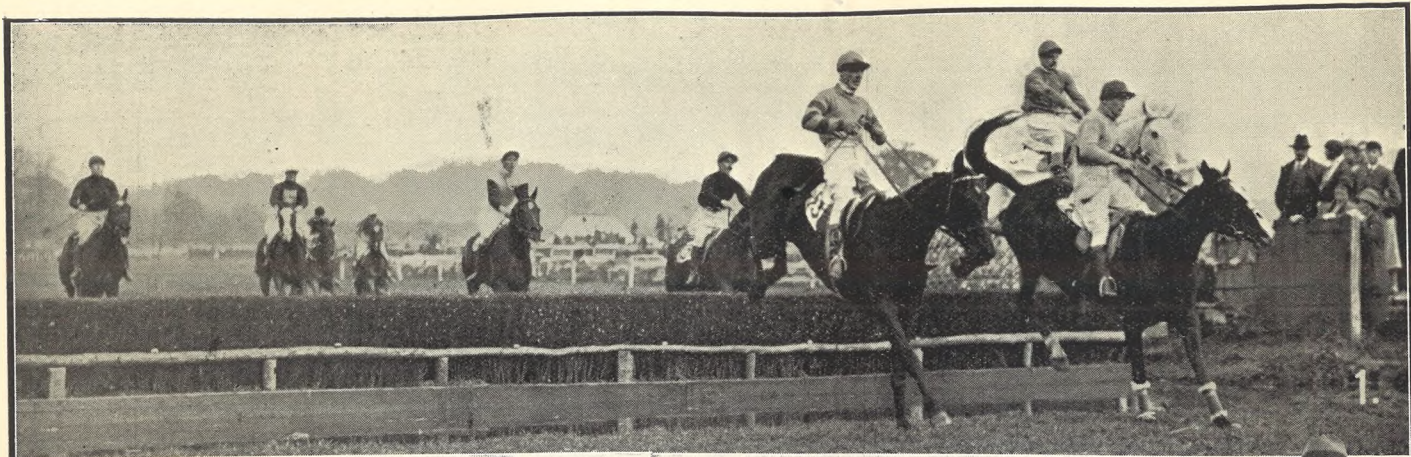

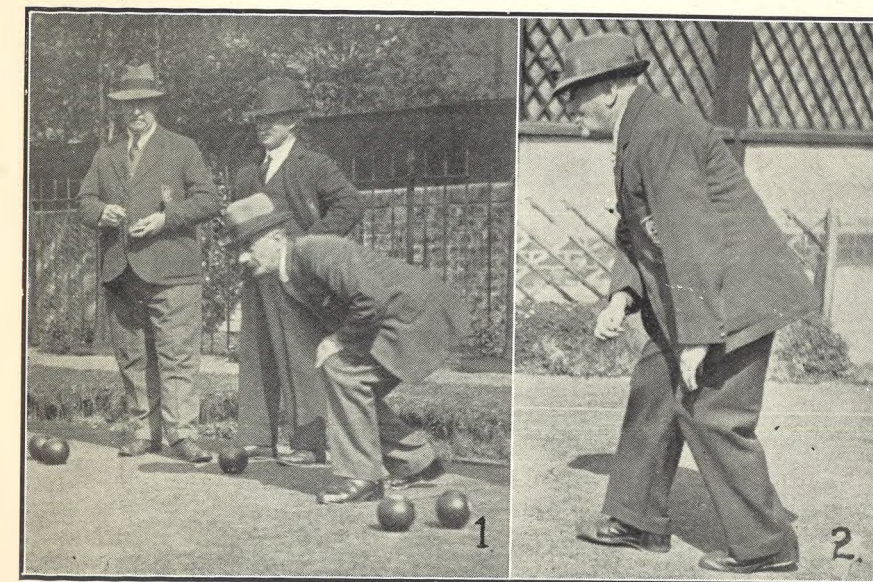

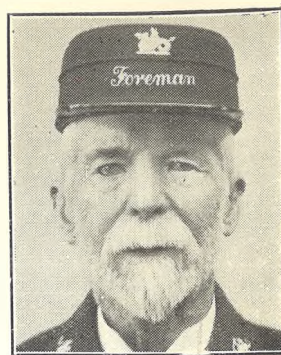
NOTED SWIMMERS' WEDDING

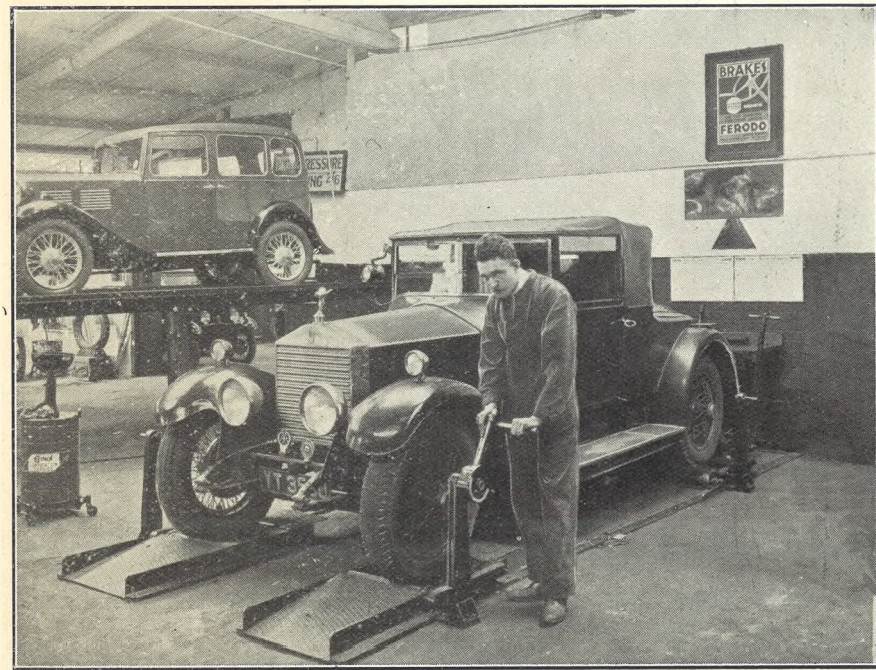

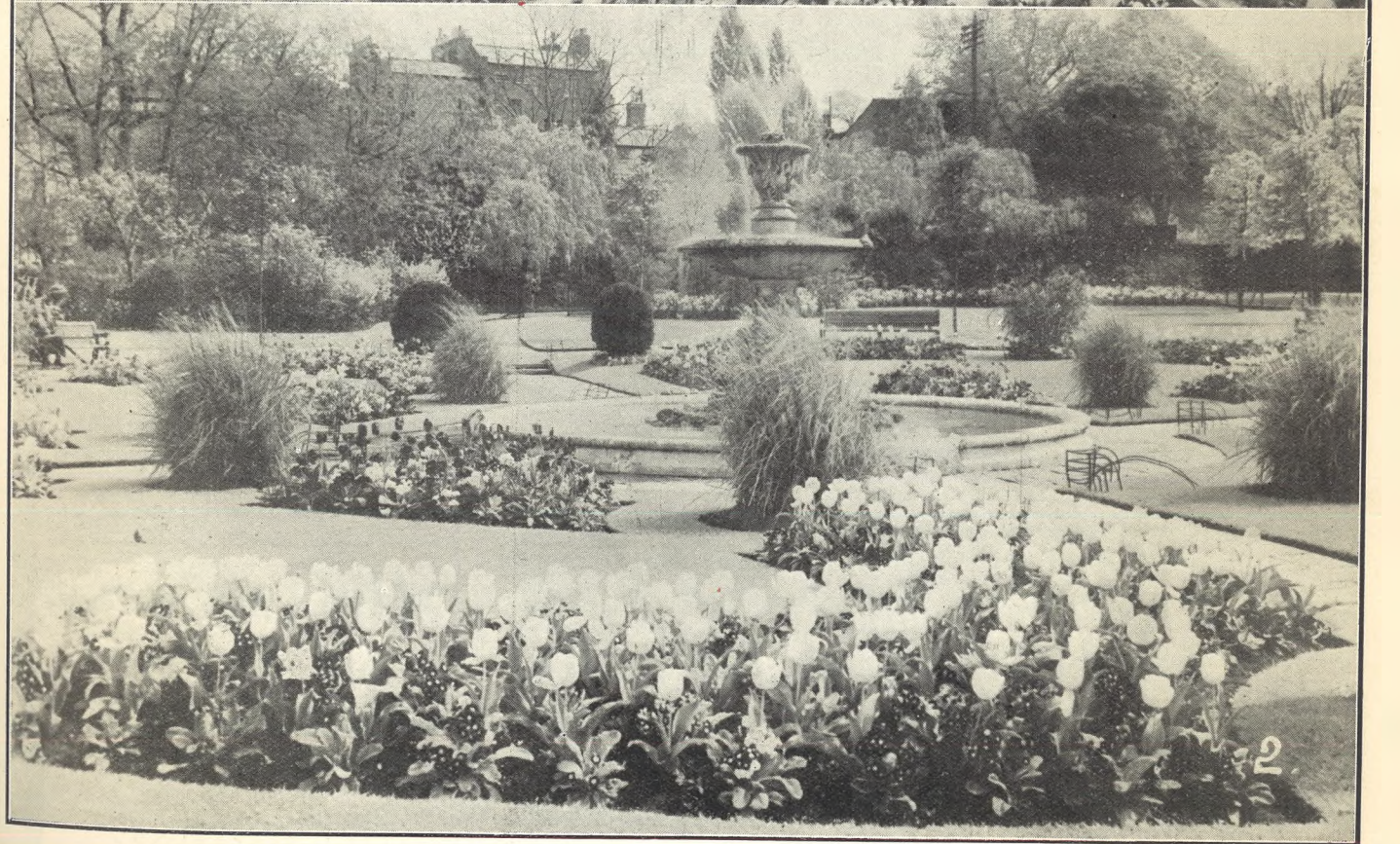
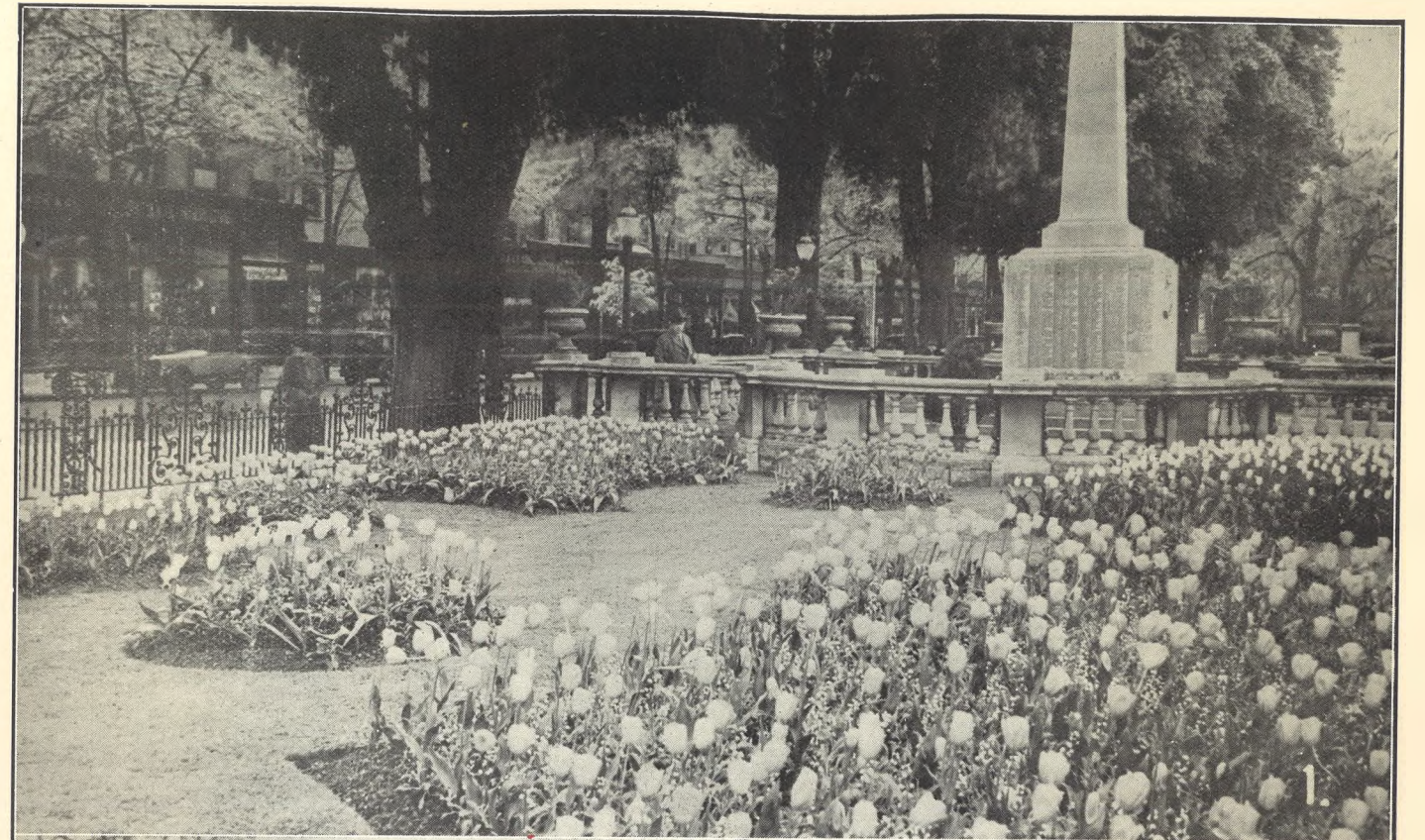


MRS. M. A. MILNER,

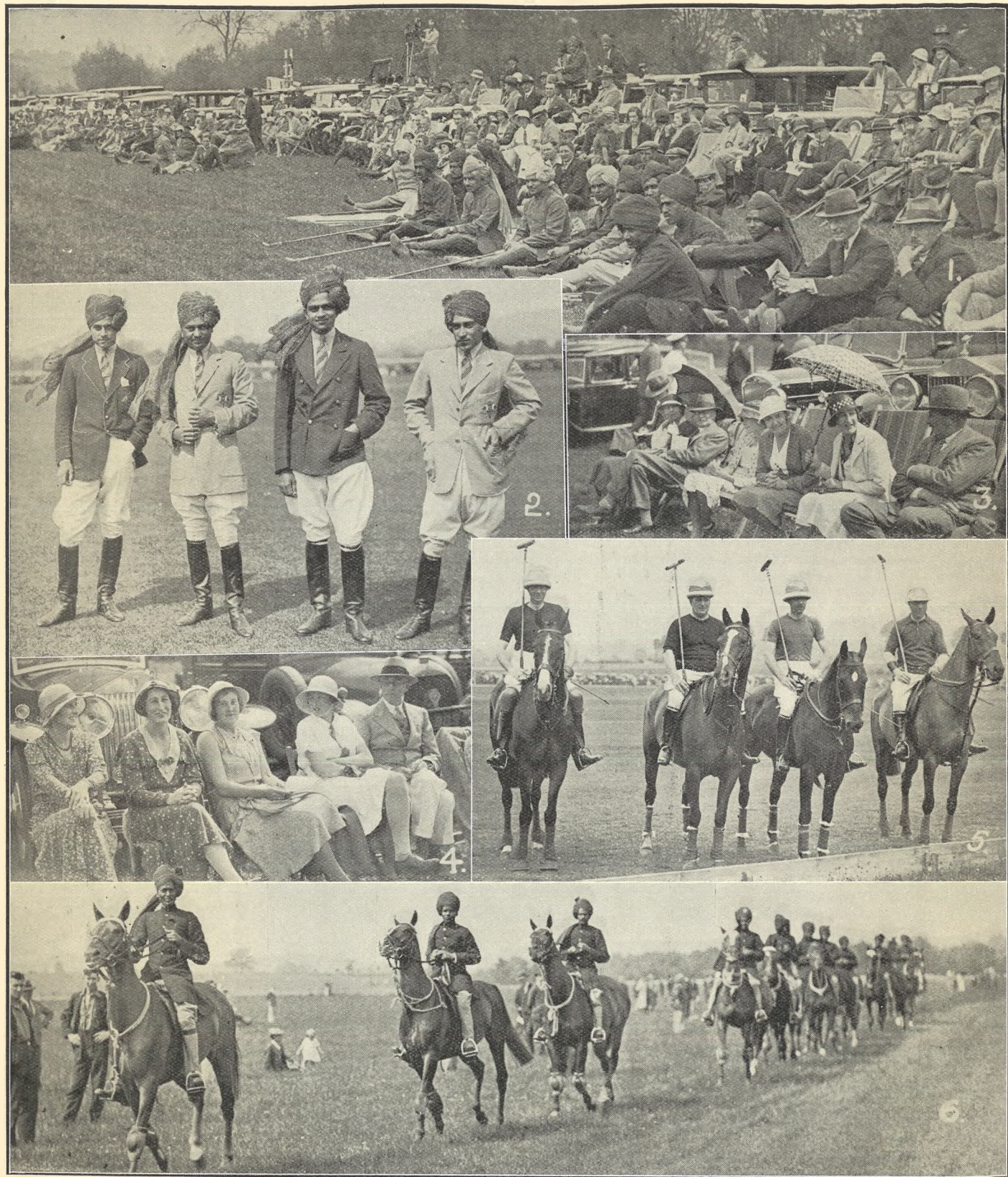

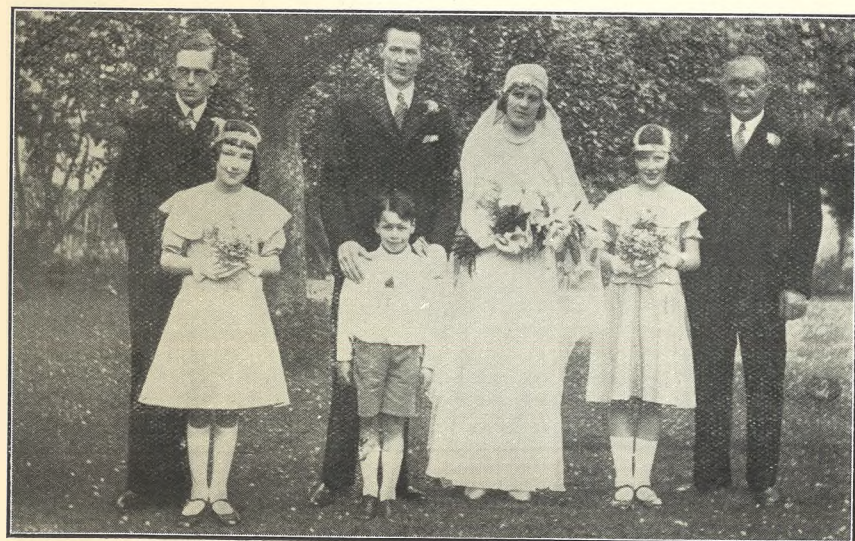
