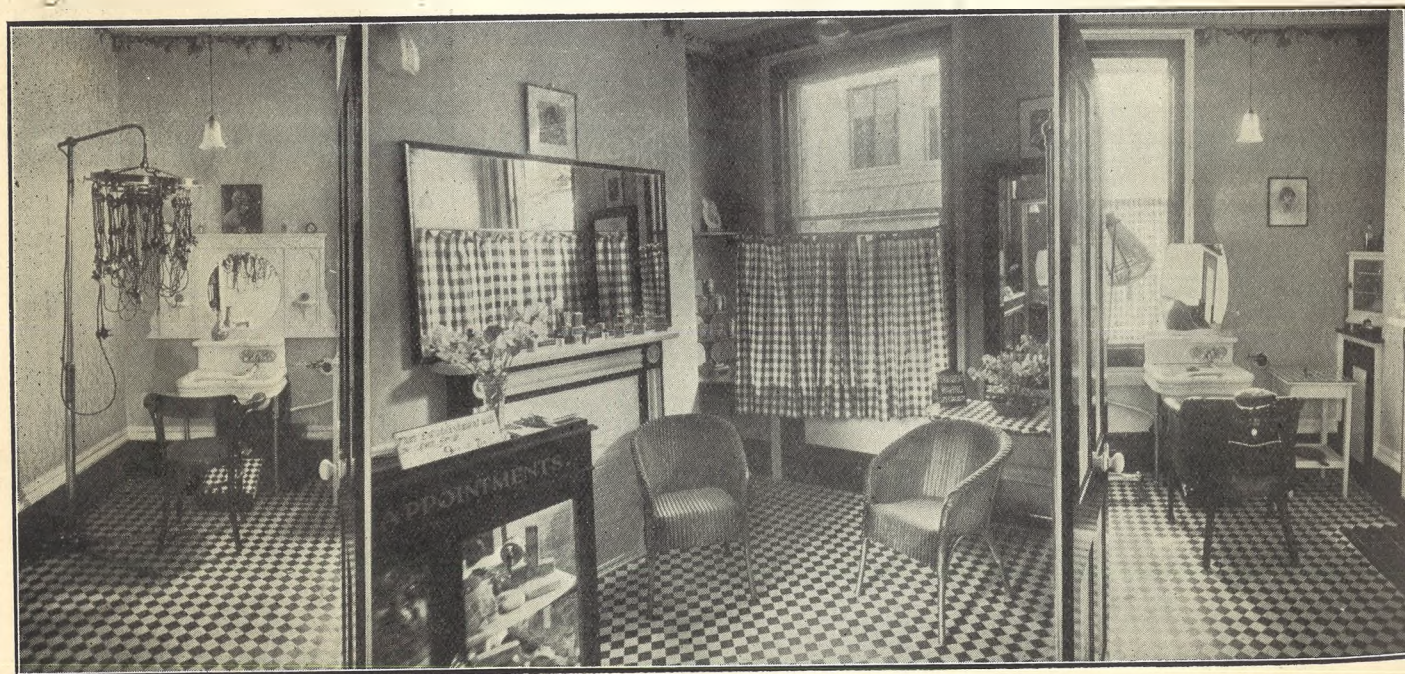

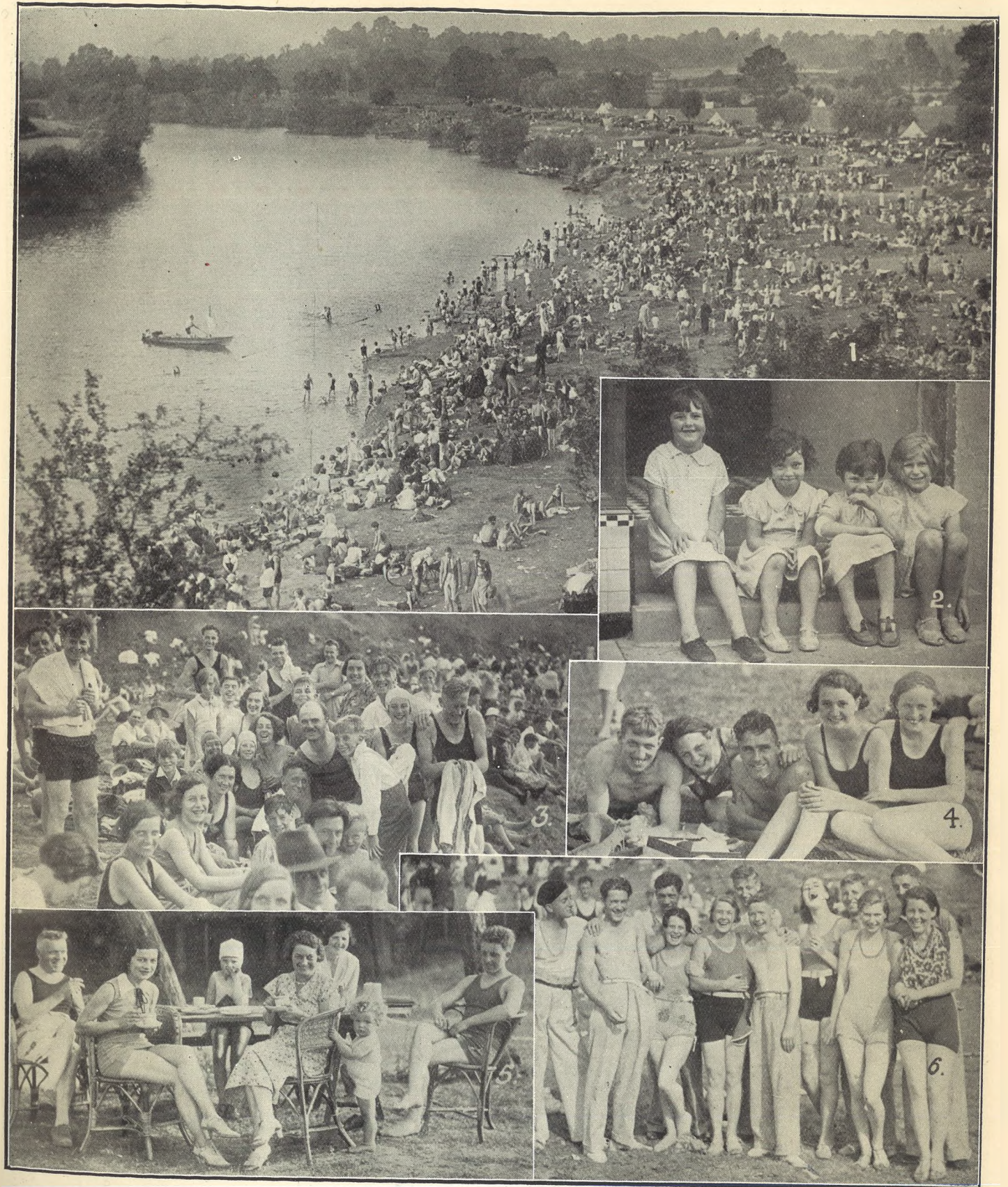


CHELTENHAM MOTOR CLUB RODEO

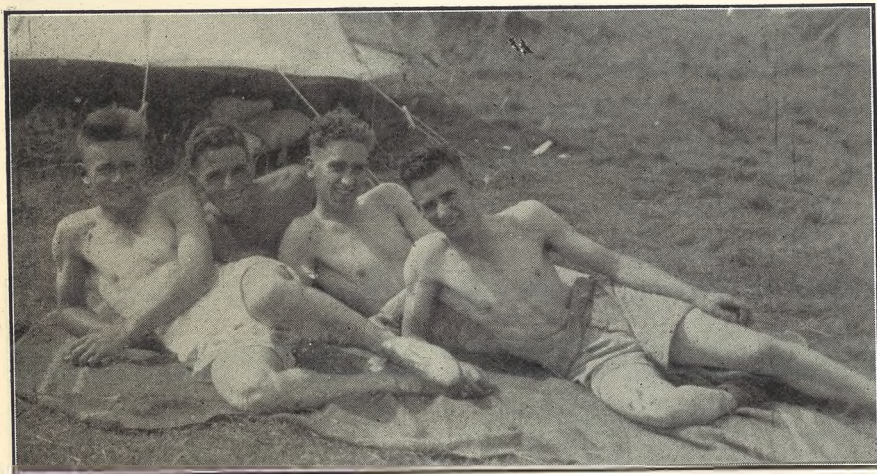

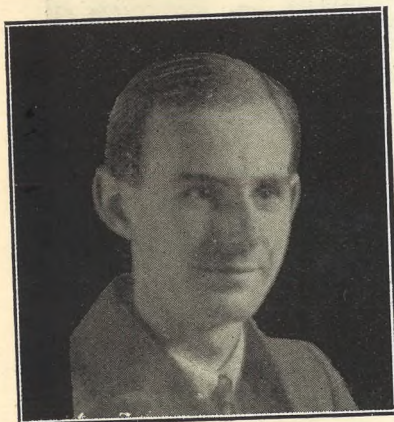
