








OLD COUNTRY BANKNOTES

In the old days many small country towns had private banks which issued their own notes, and Mr. Charles C. Castle, auctioneer, of Cheltenham and Winchcombe, has shown us two specimens (one of which is reproduced above) issued by the Winchcombe Bank (Fisher and Ashmore), in February, 1816. The firm ceased business in 1819. Mr. Castle's family connection with Winchcombe goes back for generations, and these notes were originally the property of his grandfather, John Castle, who died at the venerable age of 96. He gave Mrs. Dent much valuable information in regard to bygone days in the ancient town when that lady was collecting material for her book, "Annals of Winchcombe and Sudeley." Mr. Richard Castle, son of John and father of Mr. Charles C. Castle. contributed several things to Mrs. Dent's collection, including a grandfather clock from Hailes Abbey, which was brought to Winchcombe in 1800.




