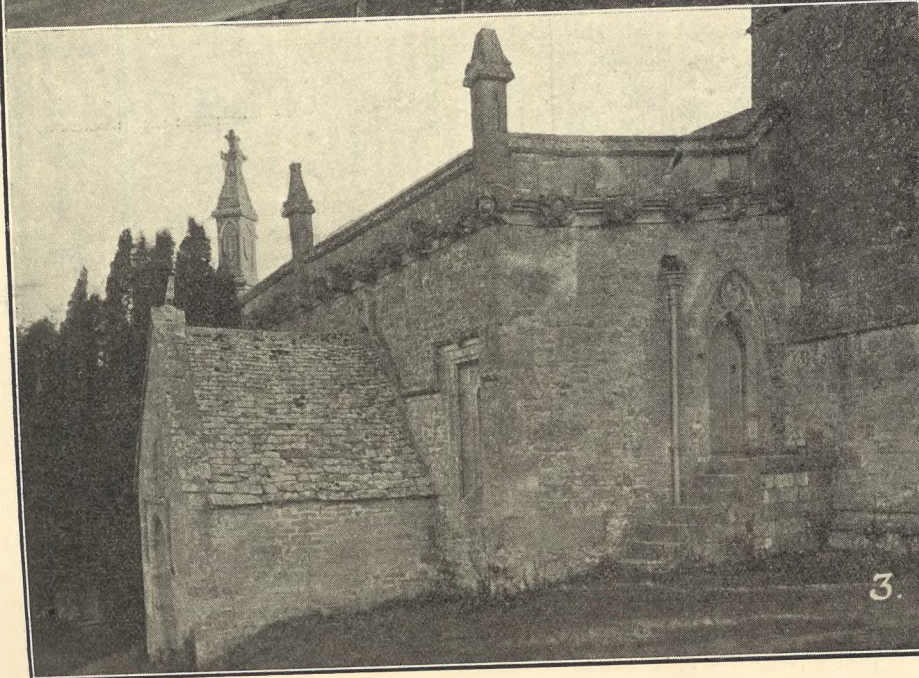
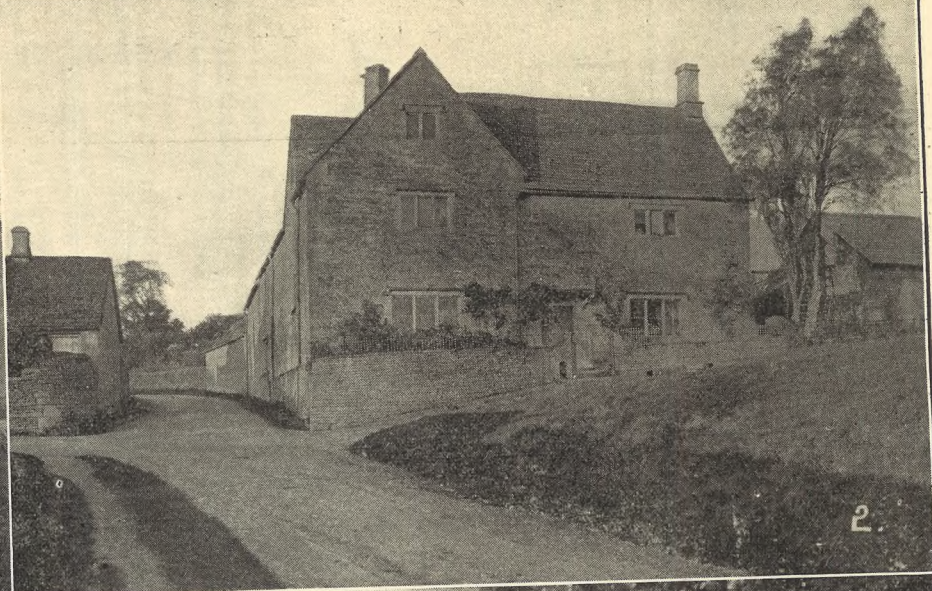
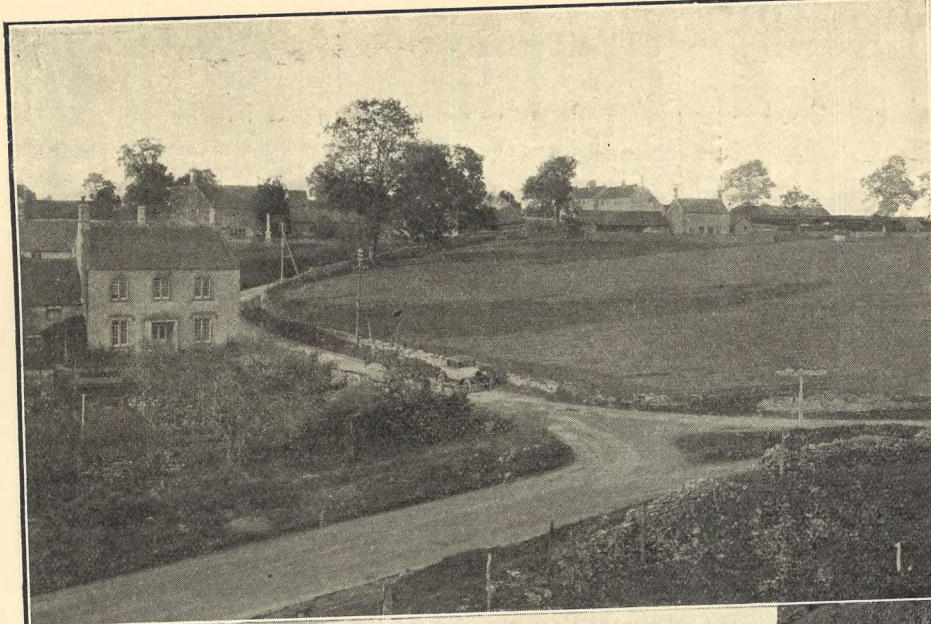

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—ALDSWORTH

Aldsworth is an ancient and picturesquely-situated Cotswold village on the road from Cirencester to Burford and four miles South-East of Northleach. The houses are built of stone, and blend into the lonely landscape with the serenity so natural in these Cotswold villages. Here the Bibury Club held their race meetings down to the middle of the last century, the club having been formed about 1775.

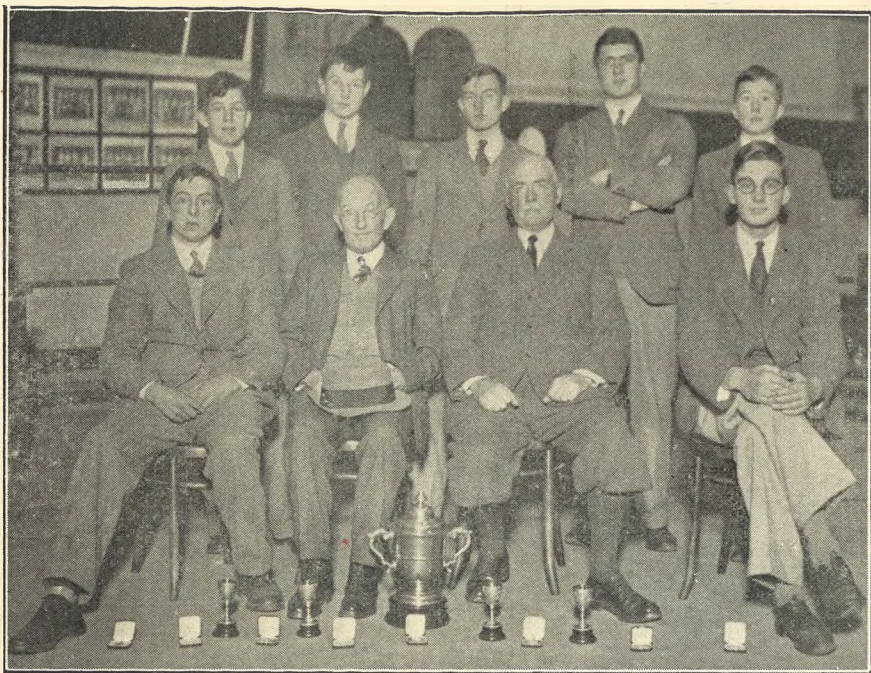

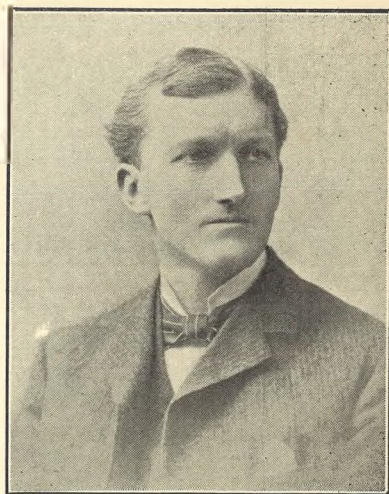

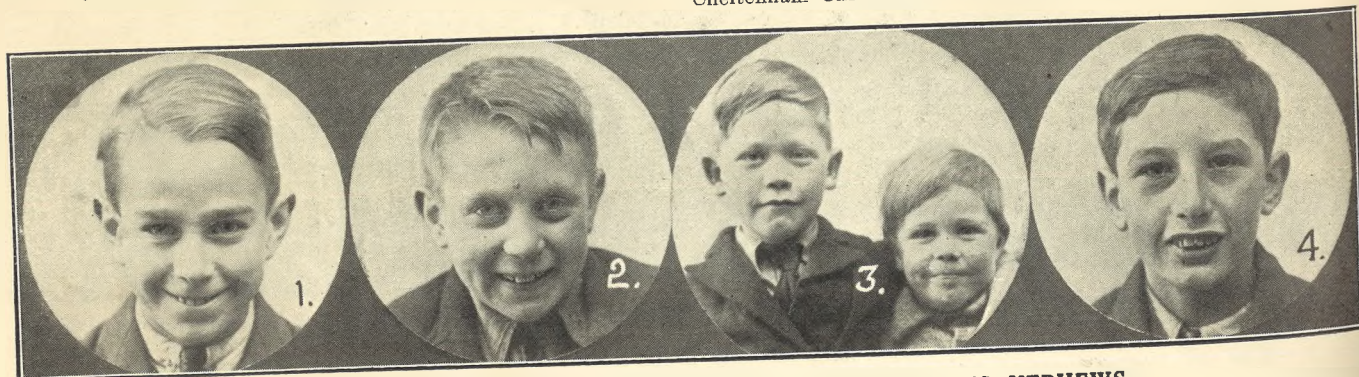

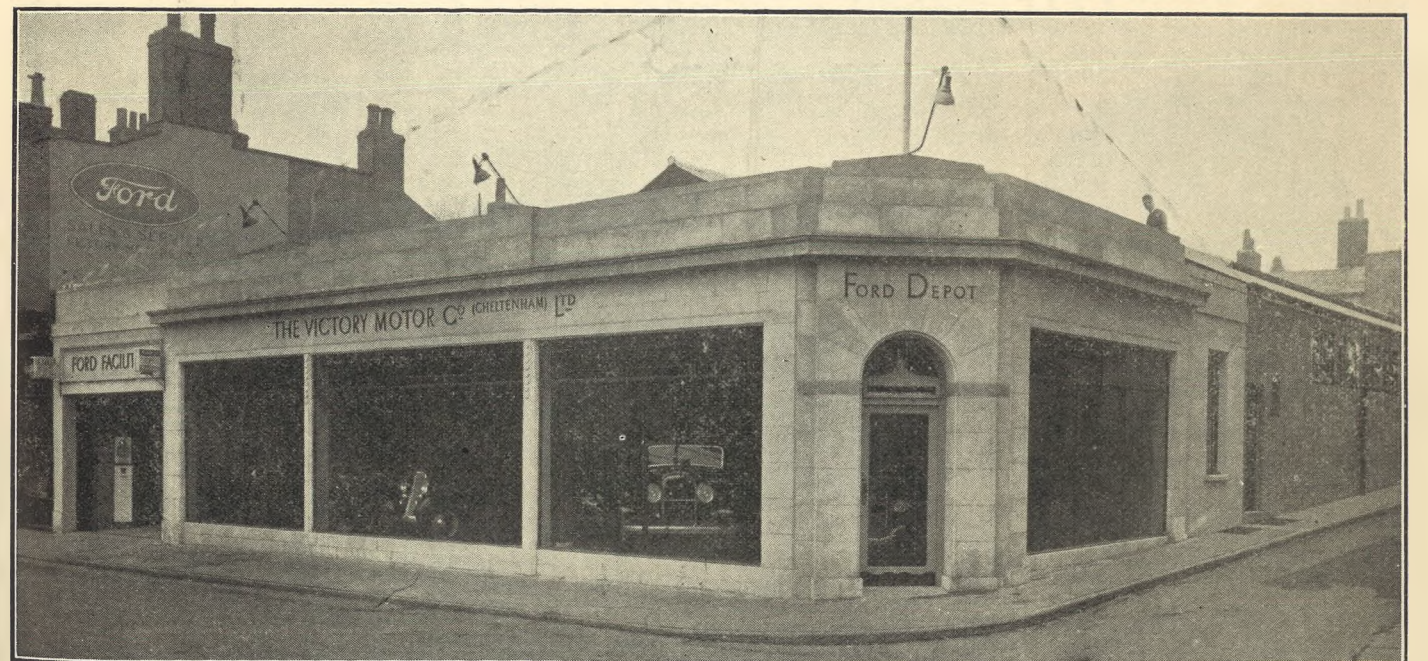

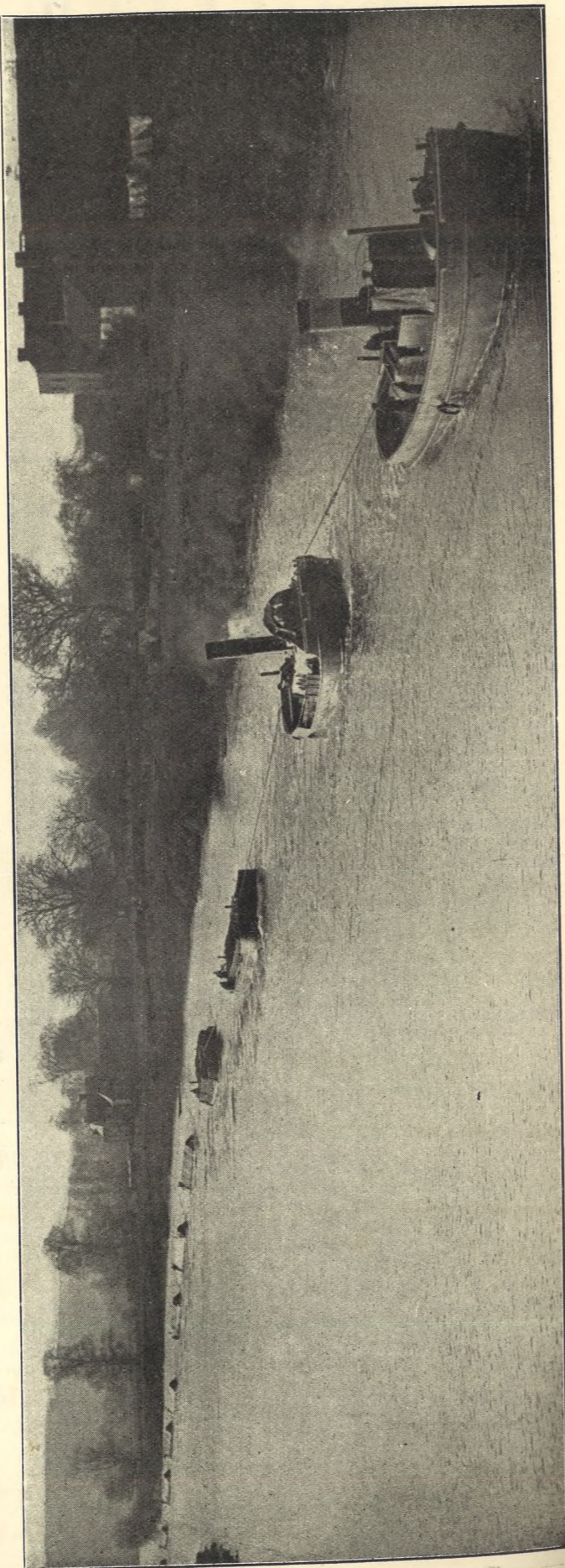

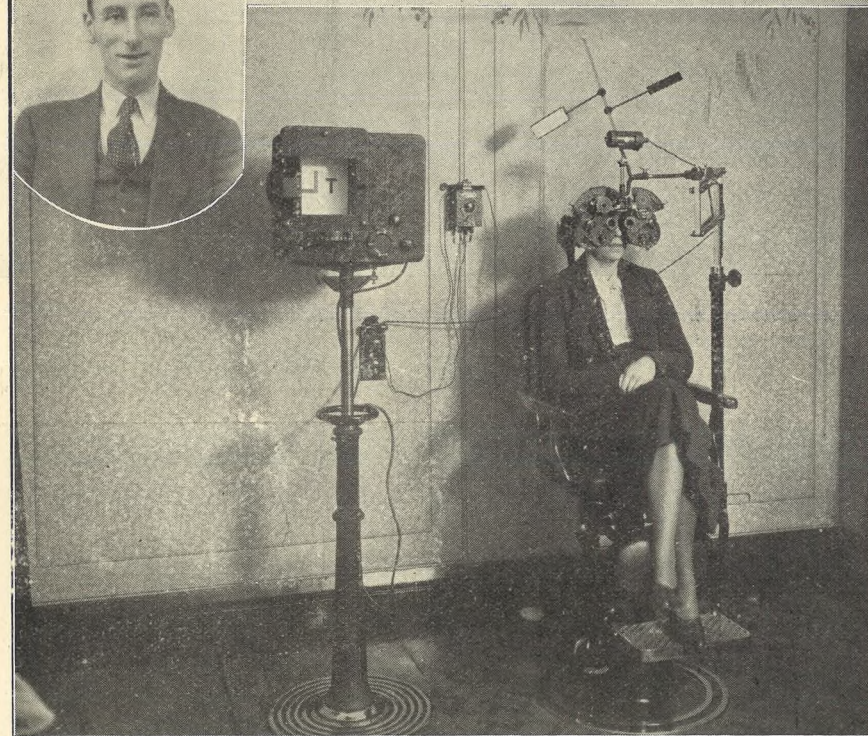

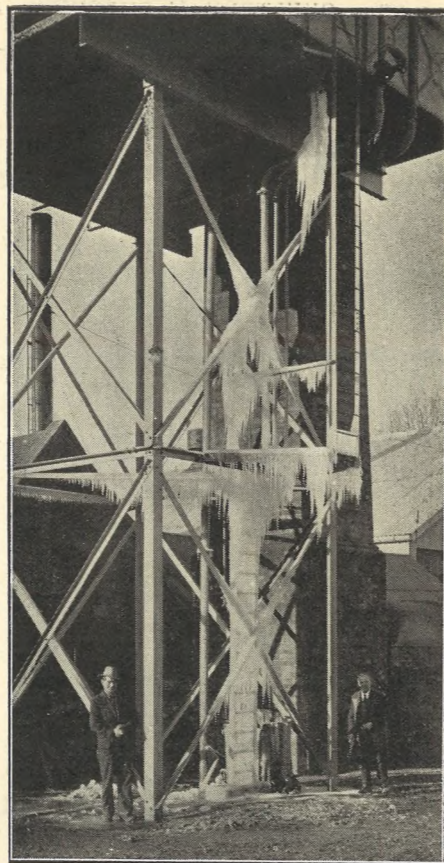

BREDON—THE VILLAGE THAT BROADCAST TO THE WORLD ON CHRISTMAS DAY

Bredon was selected by the B.B.C. as a typical English village to take part in the Empire broadcast on Christmas Day. It is a very picturesque village, situate just over the Worcestershire border, ten miles from Cheltenham and three from Tewkesbury. The parish church of St. Giles', from which the broadcast came, was originally erected in the latter half of the 12th century, and is intensely interesting. It has a light and graceful spire 160 feet in height, and much of the Norman work in the church is particularly good.

4.—The old Tithe Barn, which is believed to be 14th century work. It has a room in the gable with a fireplace and a beautiful little stone chimney.

7.—A singular 14th century monument discovered some years since face downward in the flooring. It is supposed to belong to the Reede family.

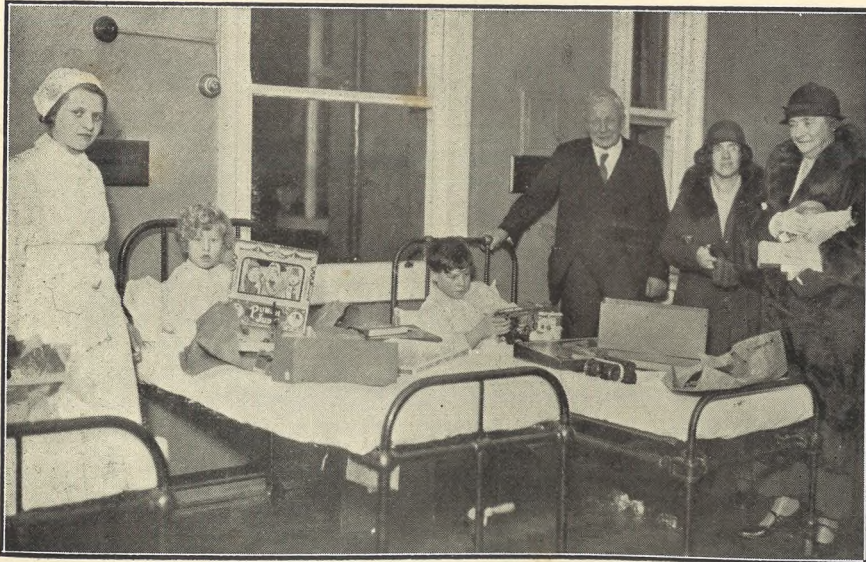
