



PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE: EBRINGTON Ebrington, or Ebberton, is an old-world village on the road from Chipping Campden to Shipston-on-Stour, about two miles from Chipping Campden and on the borders of Gloucestershire. It has come into prominence lately by being mentioned in the wireless programmes as famous for quaint sayings attributed to its inhabitants. Sir John Fortescue, Chief Justice of the King's Bench in 1442, lived and died here, and was buried in the chancel in 1476, aged 90 years.. The title of the eldest sons of the Earls Fortescue is taken from this place.









PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—ICOMB Icomb is a small and secluded village about three miles from Stow-on-the-Wold. Half of it was formerly in the county of Worcestershire, being an island village, but Icomb and Church Icomb are now united and in Gloucestershire. Icomb Place, the old manor house, originally built about 1254 and remodelled by the father of Sir John Blaket, who owned it, is now the residence of Capt. G. H. Simpson Hayward, the former Worcestershire and England bowler. Rudder, in 1779, says "the large manor house of the Copes is now in decay and occupied by one of the farmers." It has been carefully restored by Captain Simpson-Hayward, and the grounds laid out as a picturesque rock garden. 


