



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

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—LONGBOROUGH

Longborough is an ancient and secluded village three miles south-west of Moreton-in-Marsh and three miles from Stow-on-the-Wold. It is on a declivity facing east, and commands pleasant views of part of Oxfordshire. Richard, Earl of Cornwall, and brother of King Henry III., who founded Hayles Abbey in 1246, owned the manor of Longborough, then known as Langeberge, and he endowed the Abbey with this manor. It continued in the Abbots' possession until the dissolution. It was then given to the Leigh family, who have held it until almost the present time. Lord Leigh is still part patron of the living.





PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—ADLESTROP AND CHASTLETON

(A NEIGHBOURING VILLAGE OVER THE BORDER).

Adlestrop is an interesting village on the extreme east of the county, and bordered on the north, east and south by Oxfordshire. The Manor was owned by the Abbey of Evesham until the dissolution, when it was granted to Sir Thomas Leigh, and it still remains in the possession of the Leigh family. Chastleton is an adjoining village just over the Oxford border. Chastleton House, with its dignified, tall, grey front, is a notable house, and at once carries one back to the days of the Stuarts. In the Cavalier room is a secret chamber which was put to good use by its owner after the battle of Worcester (September 3, 1651). He made good his escape from the Roundheads, who had surprised him at home.

FAMILY RE-UNITED AT A GOLDEN WEDDING


