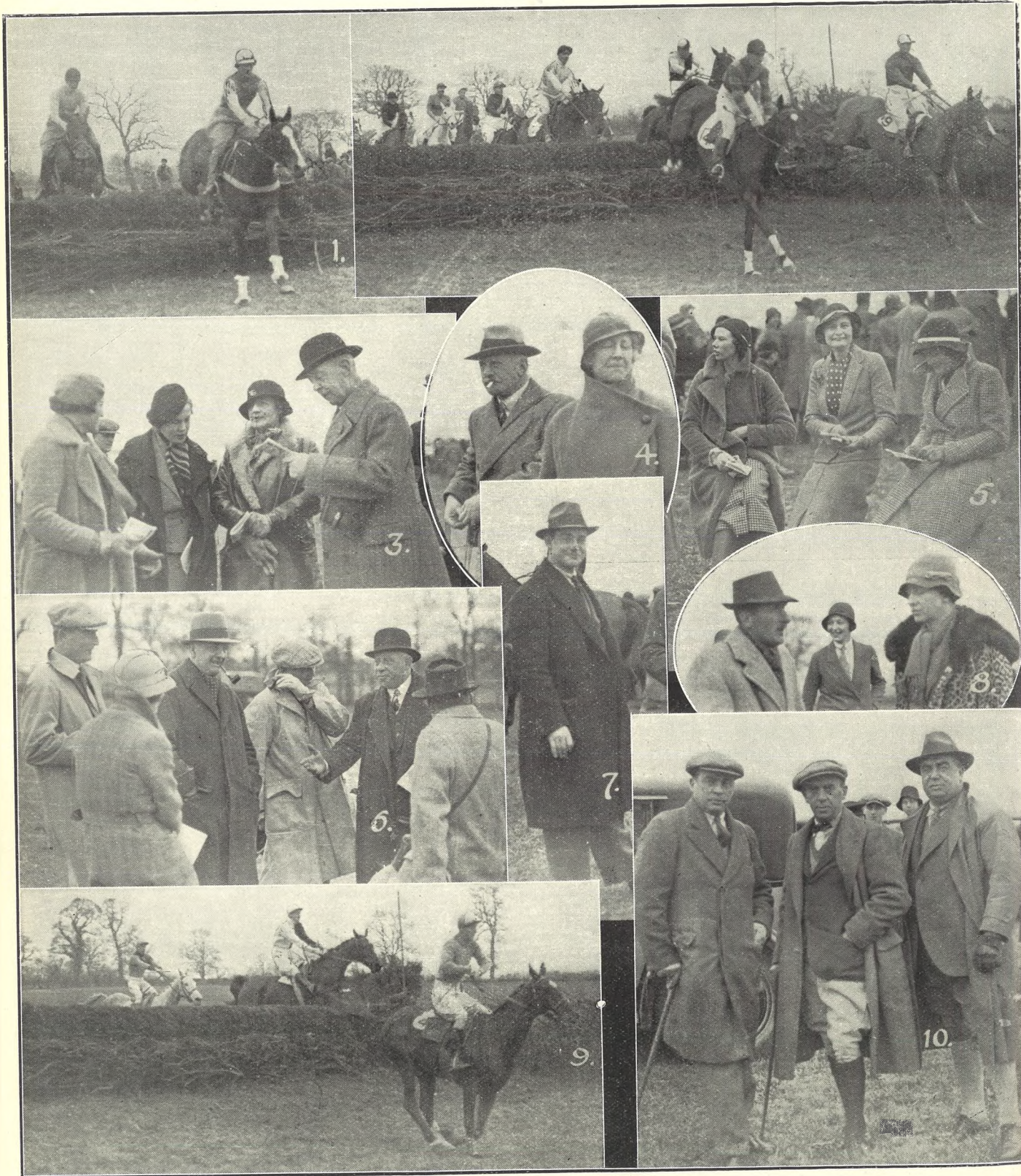

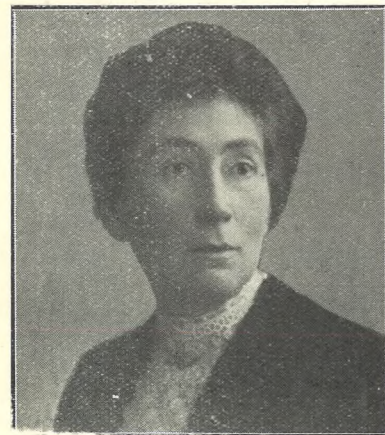

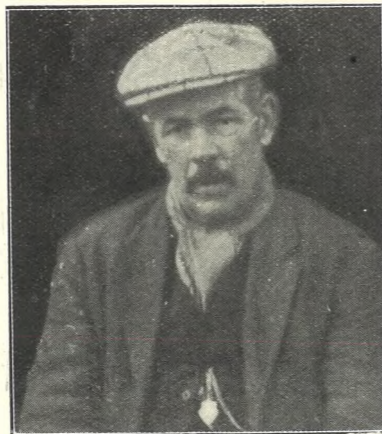

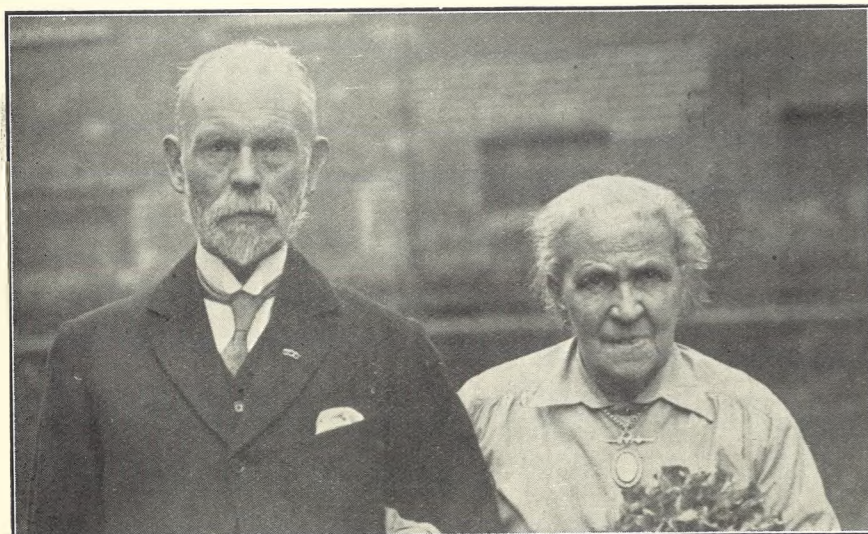

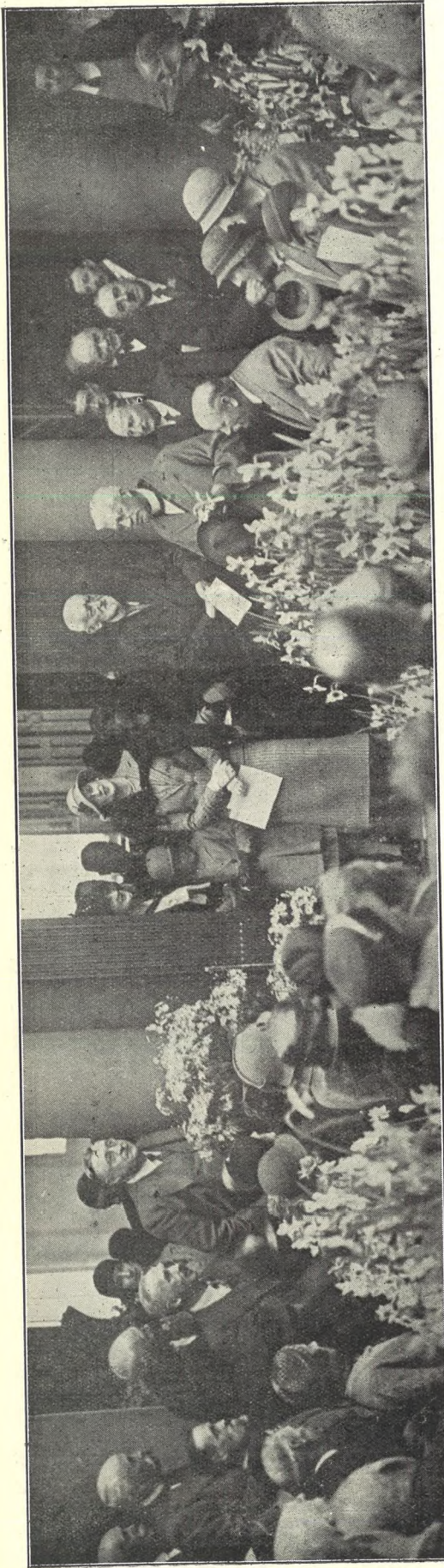

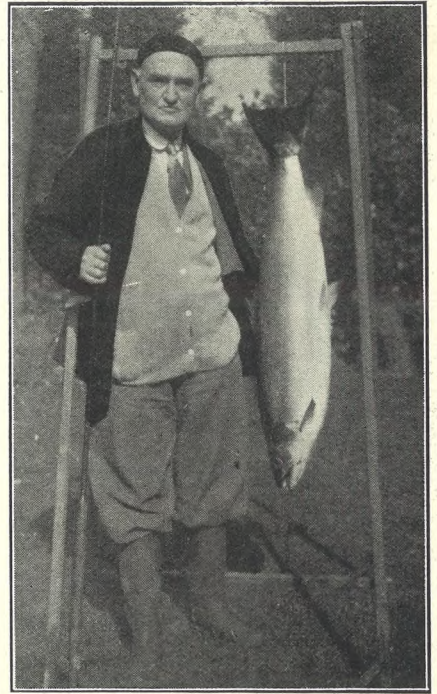

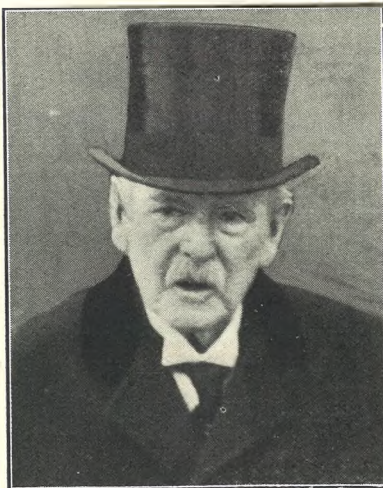

MISS A. HILDA YONGE,

eldest daughter of Mrs. Vernon Yonge, of 8 Lansdown-parade, Cheltenham, who died on April 20, at Wotton House, Gloucester, of which she had been warden for the past three years. She was a great Red Cross worker. During the war she was secretary of the Cheltenham Red Cross Society, and was brought into great prominence. She was ultimately appointed Assistant County Director and later County Secretary, and received from the King the decoration of an A.R.R.C. She afterwards became superintendent of St. Martin's Hospital for disabled soldiers in Cheltenham.



MUTINY VETERAN'S DEATH

Captain J. H. Waller, C.V.O., of The Old Priory, Charlbury, who died last week, aged 94 years. He was one of the very few surviving combatants of the Indian Mutiny, and was the oldest member of Cheltenham New Club, and an original member of the Cheltenham Steeplechase Club. He was born at Bourton-on-the-Water in 1839, a son of the late Rev. Robert Waller (rector for 35 years) and a descendant of the poet Waller. He saw considerable military service, retiring in 1870, when he joined the Queen's Bodyguard of the Hon. Corps of Gentlemen at Arms, in which he served under three Sovereigns.
