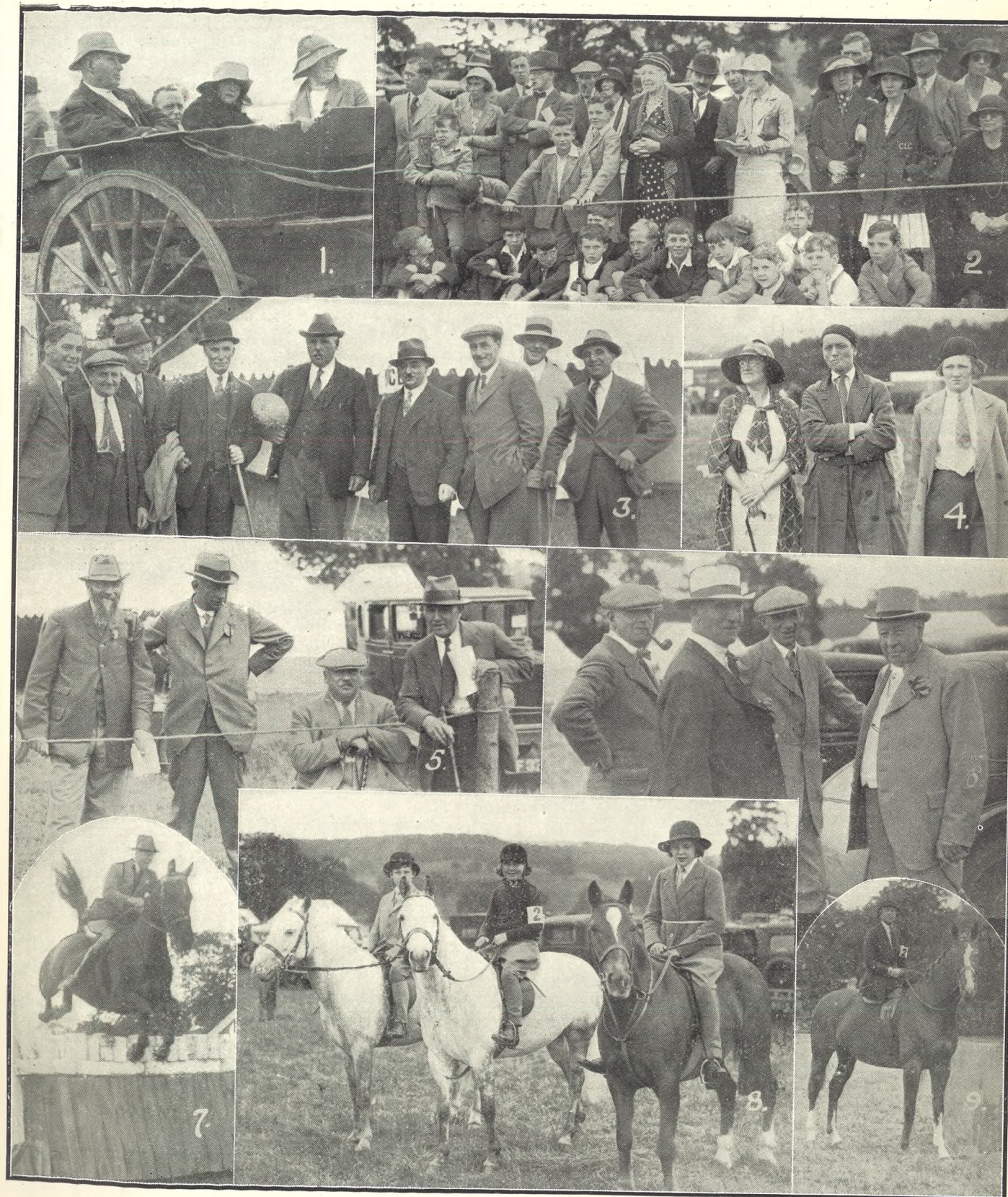


COUNTY BOWLS MATCH AT CIRENCESTER

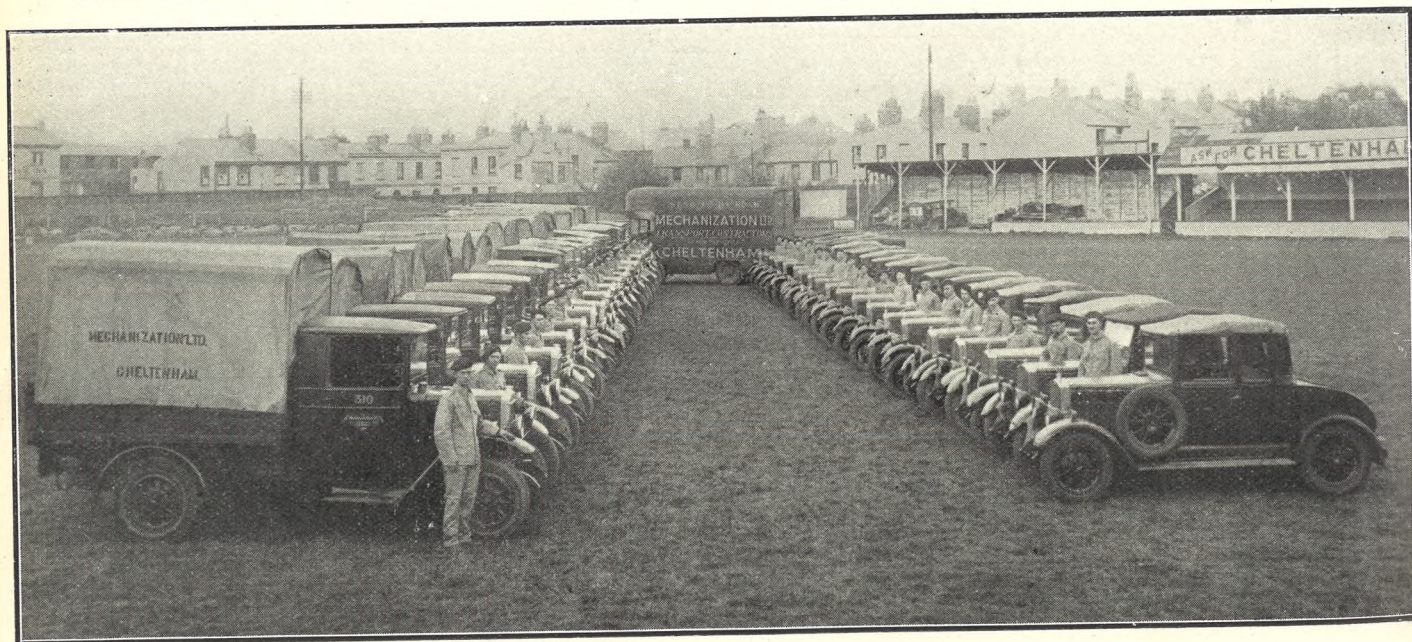


A DISAPPOINTING BORE

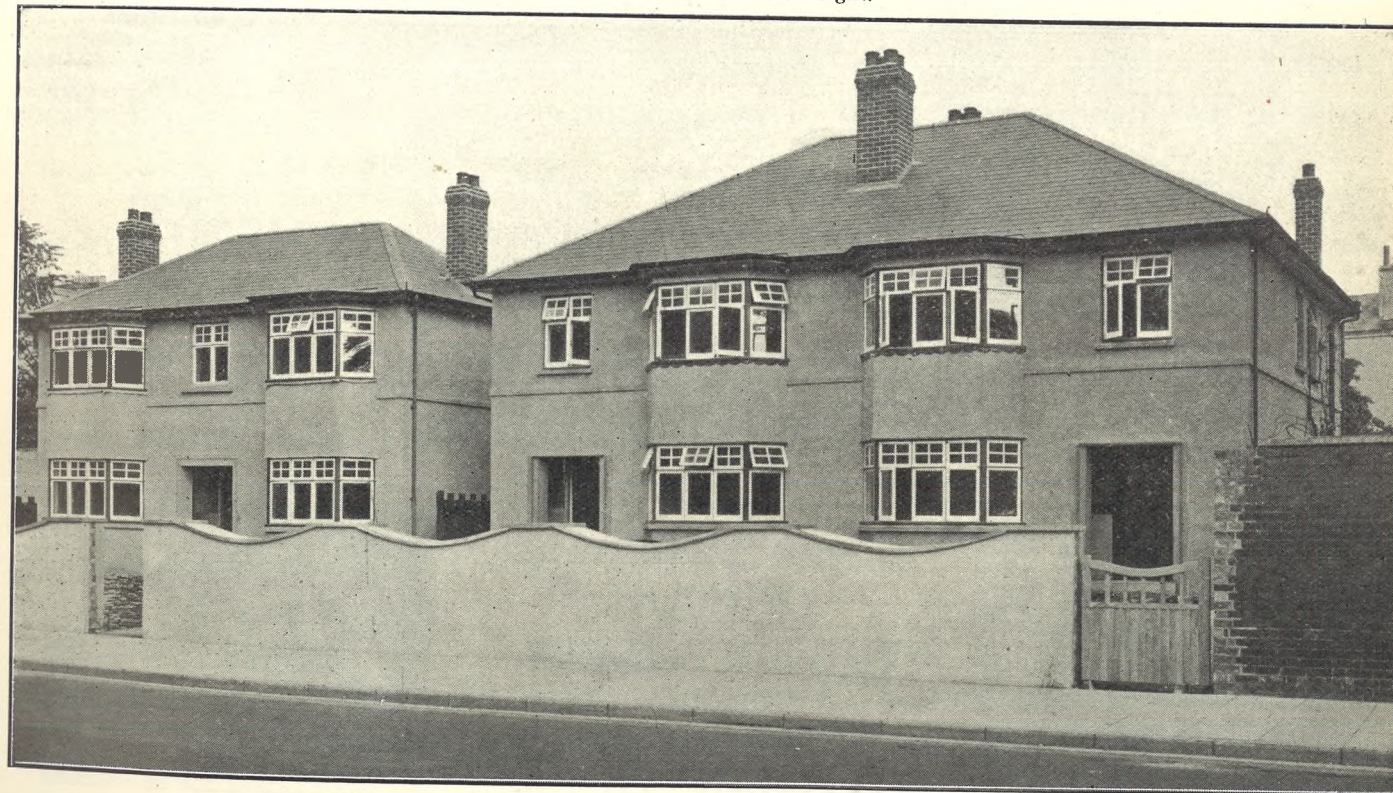

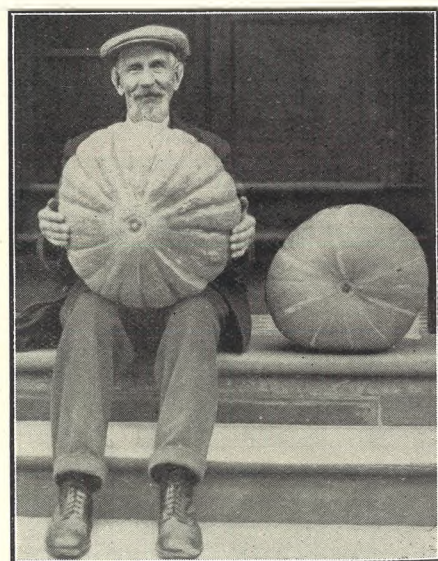

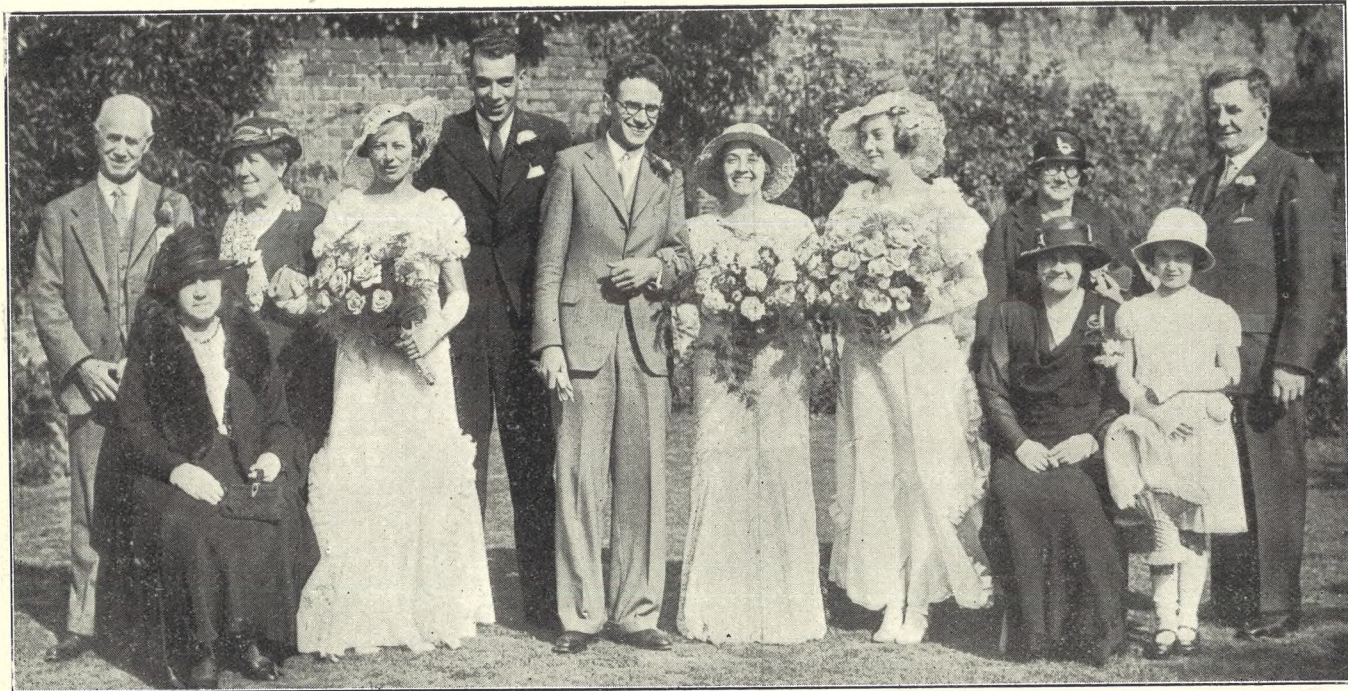

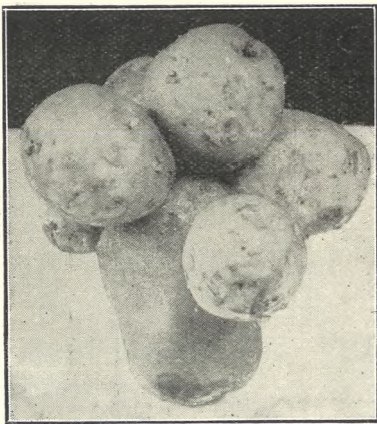

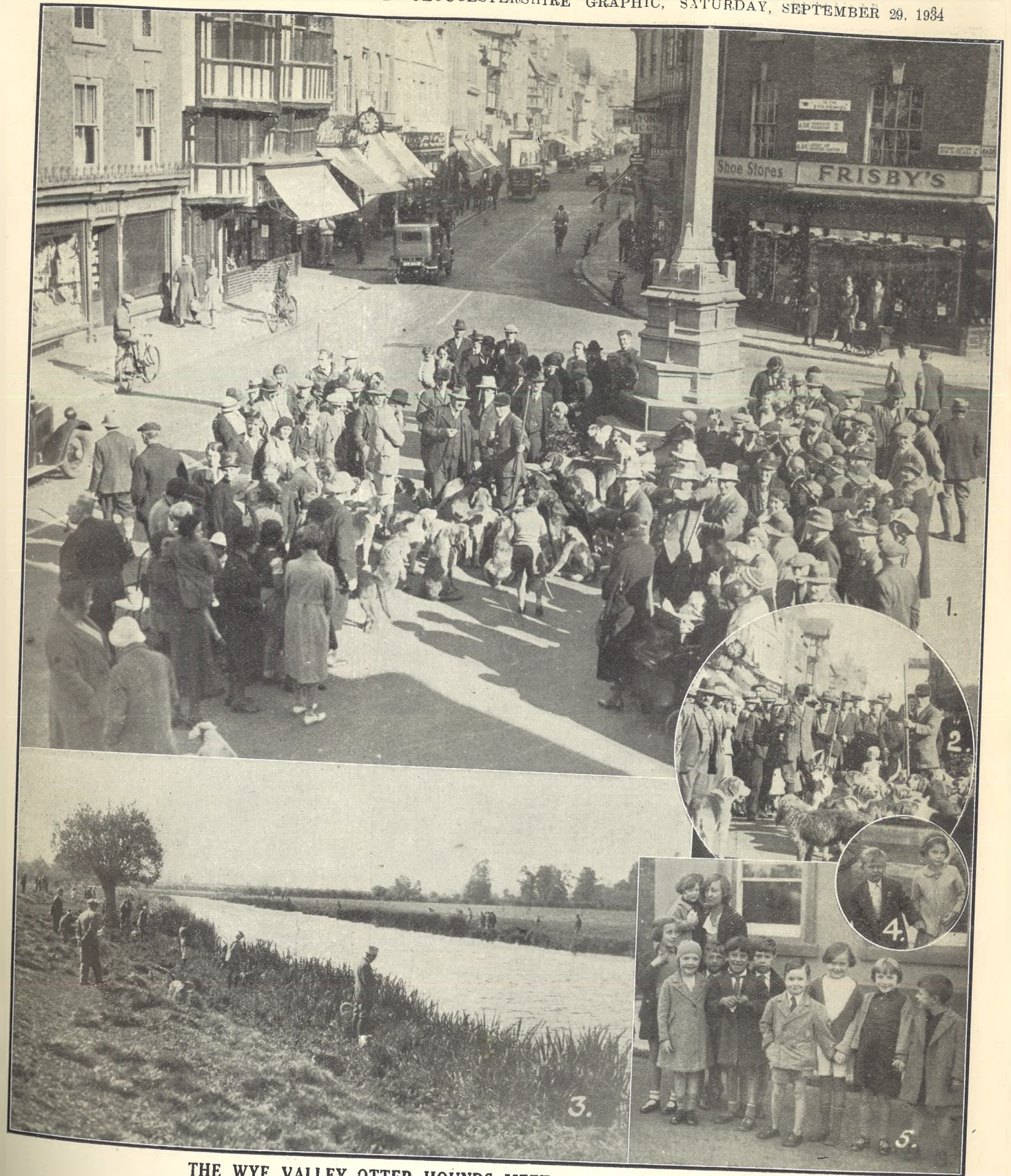


"CLIPPING" THE CHURCH AT PAINSWICK FEAST

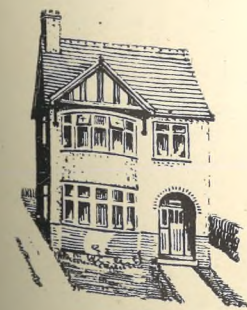

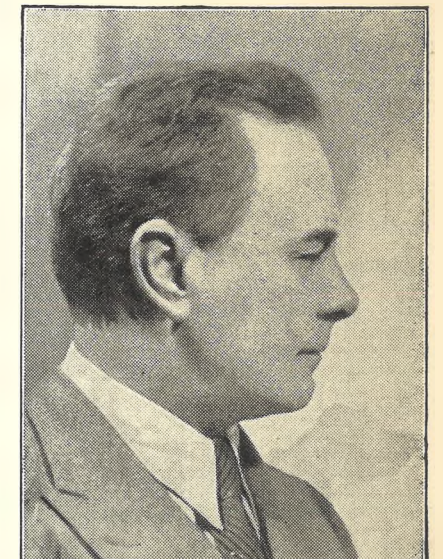

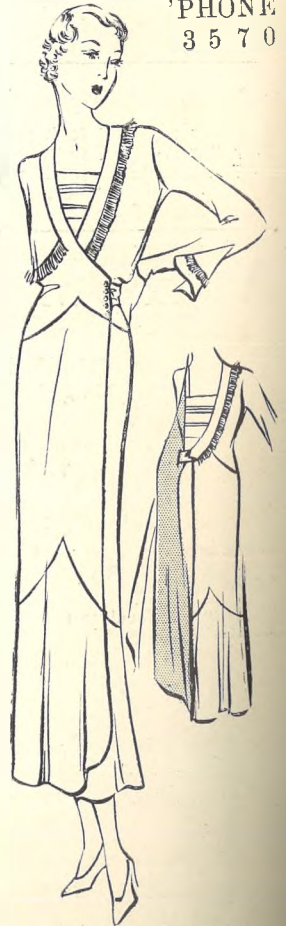
