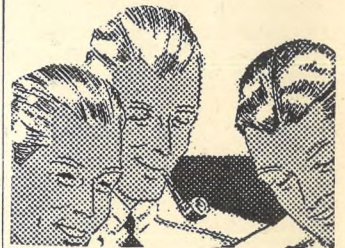


### OLD CHELTONIAN MARRIED IN LONDON

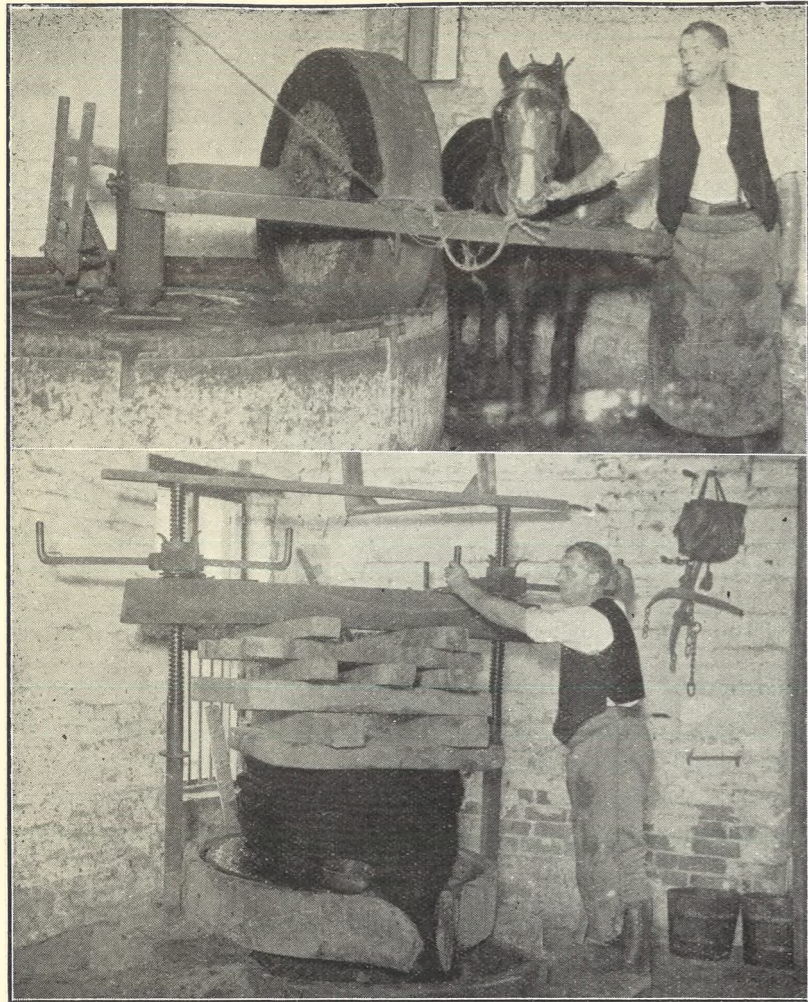

**WORK IN AN OLD CIDER MILL**

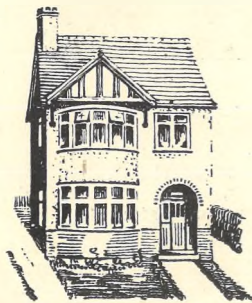

**NAUNTON PARK SCHOOLS' FIRST SWIMMING SPORTS**

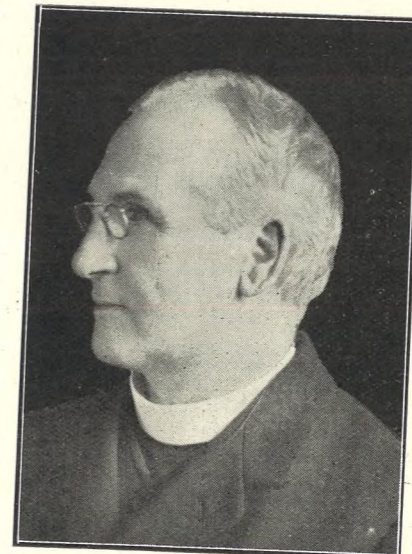

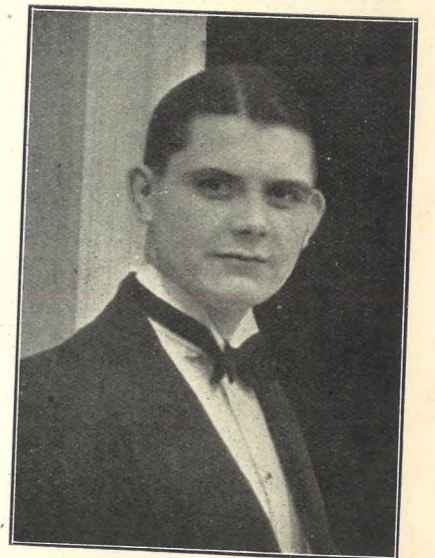

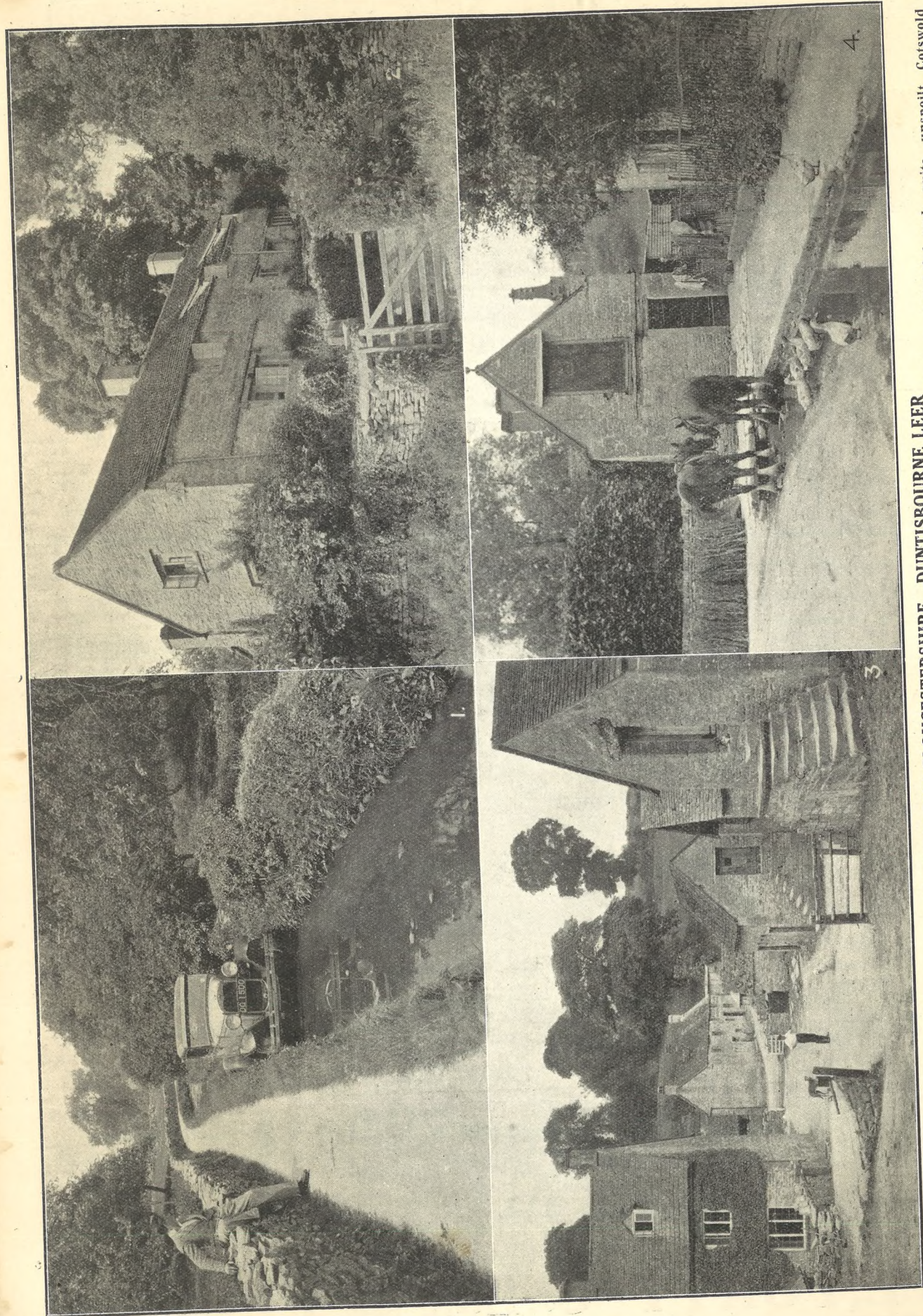

**PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—DUNTISBOURNE LEER**  
 Duntisbourne Leer is a hamlet of Duntisbourne Abbots, about one mile west of the road from Birdlip to Cirencester. It is a delightful and quite unspoilt Cotswold village, and lies off the general highway. It was known as Duntisbourne Lire in Domesday Book, so called from the Abbey of Notre Dame de Lire in Normandy. Mr. Watkinson, the village baker's shop in corner, with horses watering at the stream, which here crosses the public road.
