BOXING DAY MEET OF COTSWOLD HUNT AT QUEEN'S HOTEL

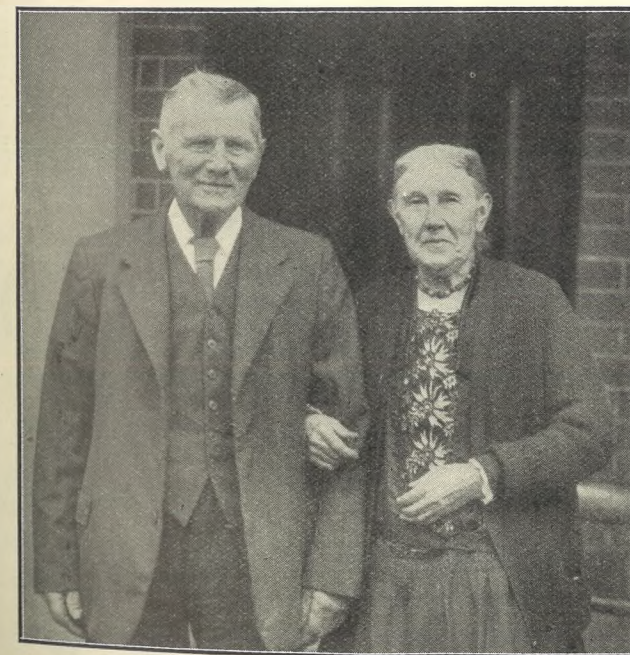

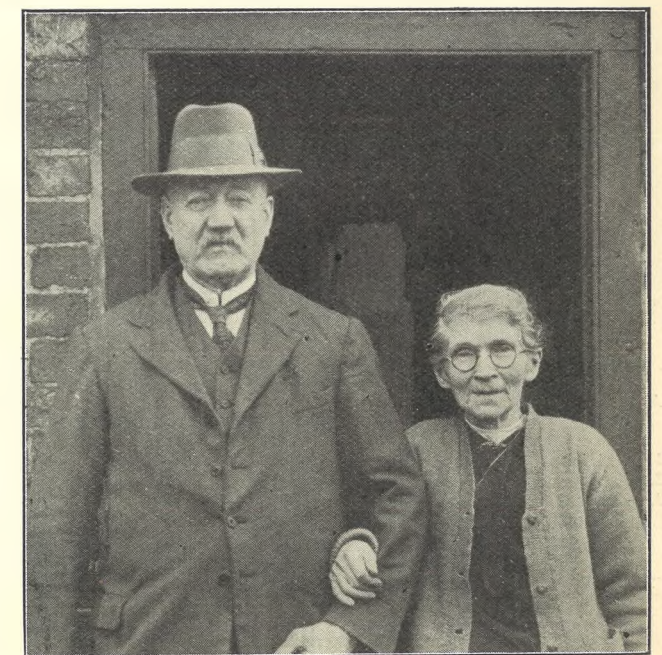

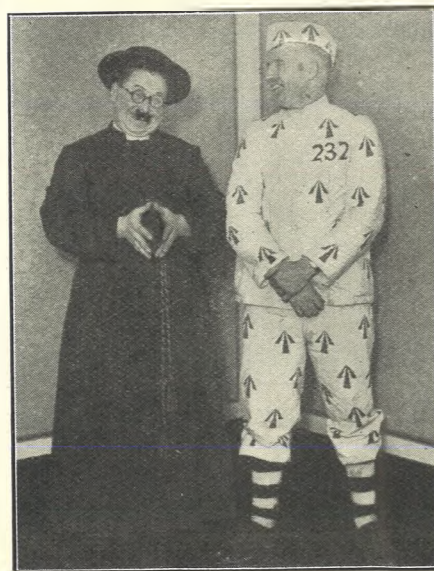

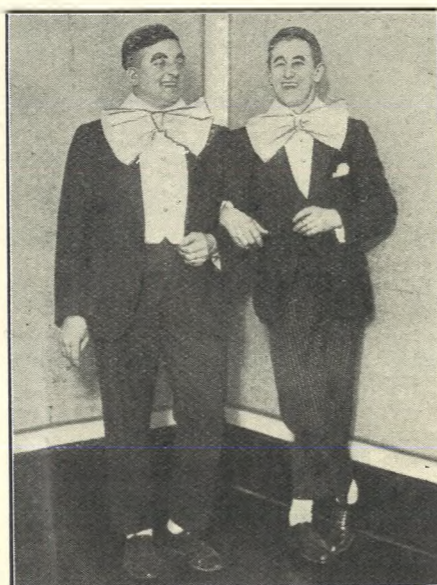

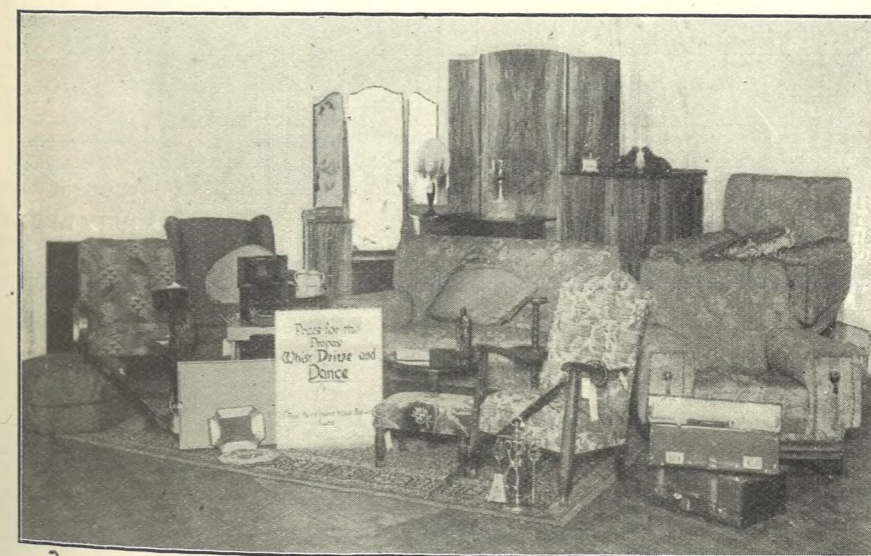

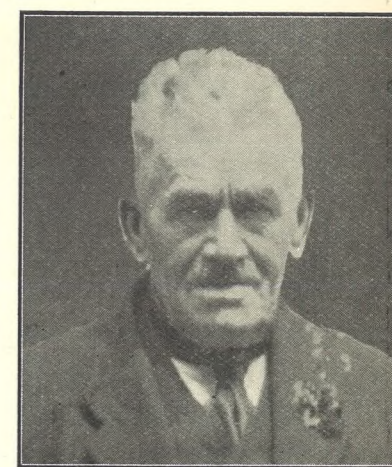

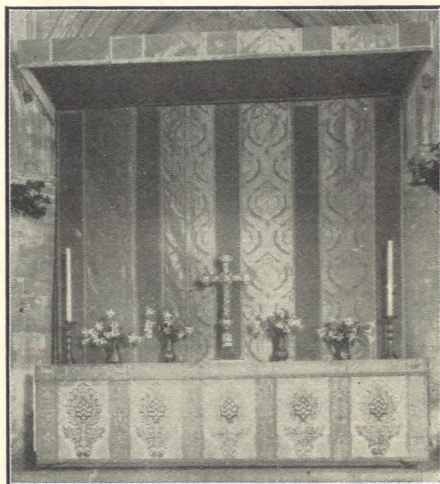

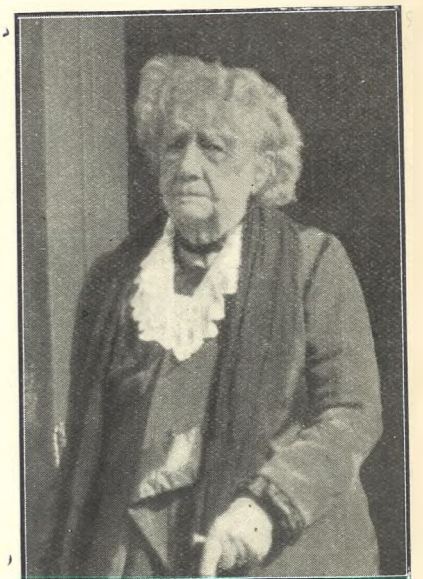

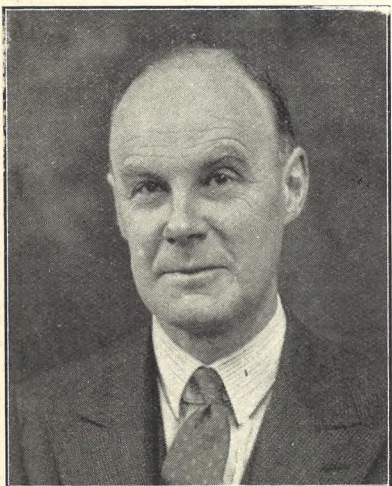

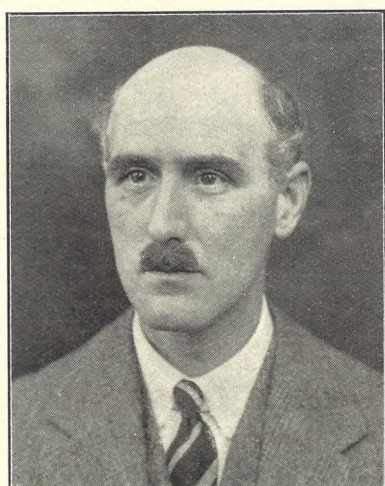
CHELTENHAM WATERWORKS TABLET AT TEWKESBURY

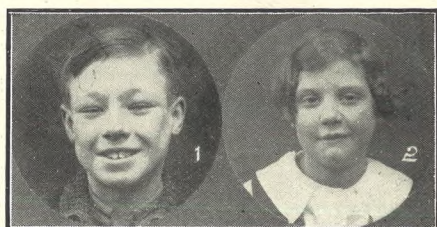

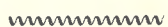
