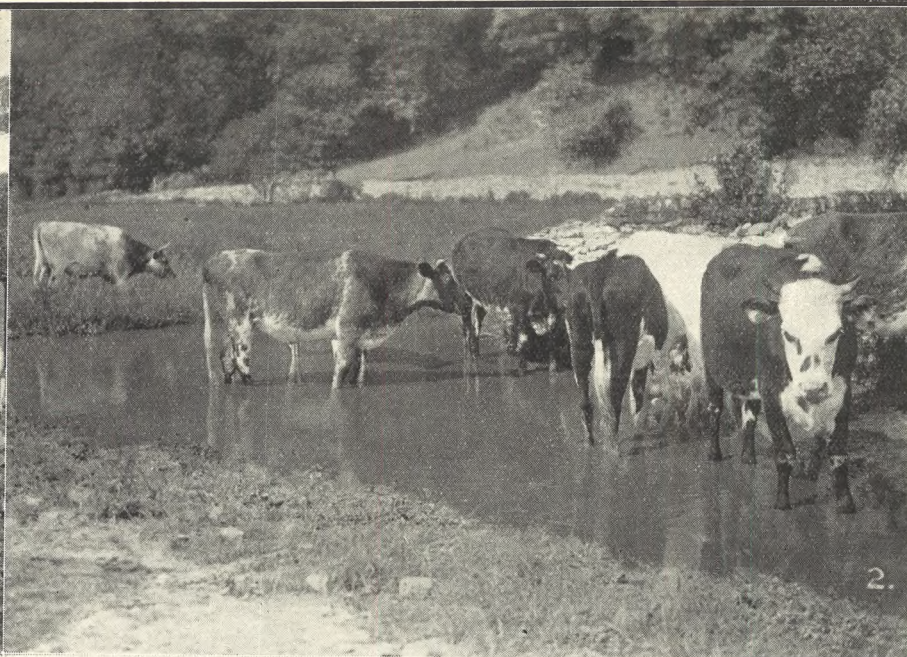
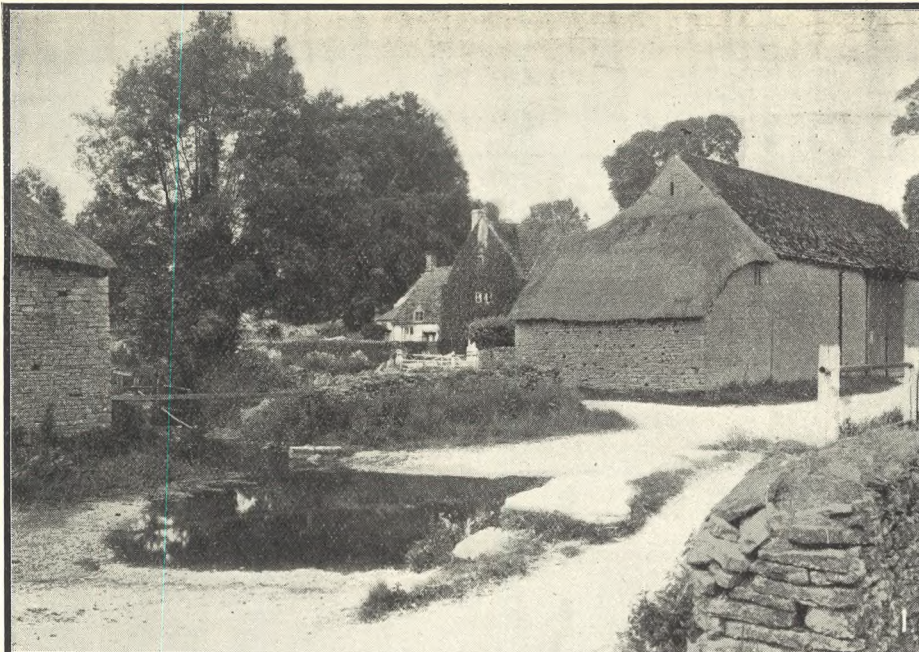

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE—DUNTISBOURNE ROUSE

Duntisbourne Rouse is a delightful little unspoilt village about half a mile on the west of the old Roman road from Birdlip to Cirencester and about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the latter. The little church is Norman and seems to have been little altered for six hundred years. An inscription on the curious low saddleback tower records that "This was built by John Halden mason" in 1587, and certainly a tower formed no part of the original churches of this character. The village name of Rous or Rouse was derived from the knightly family of Rous, who owned the manor in the time of the first and second Edwards.

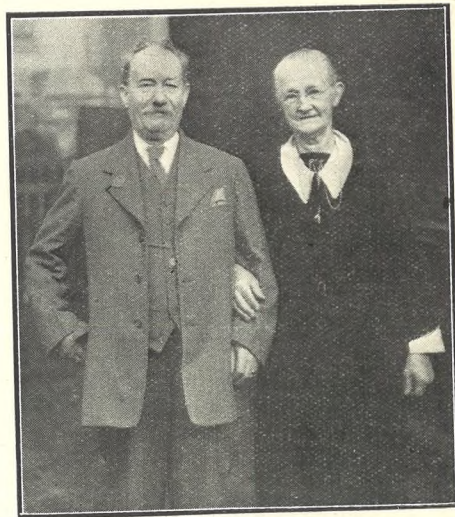

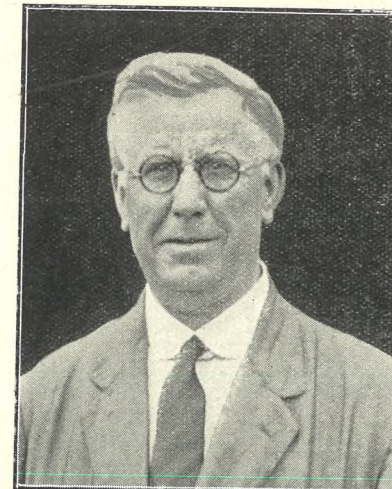

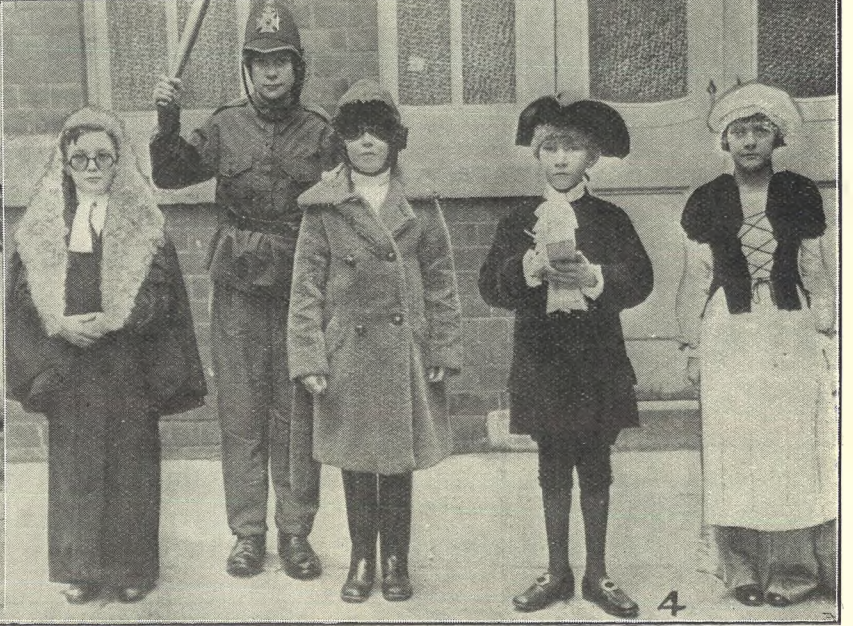

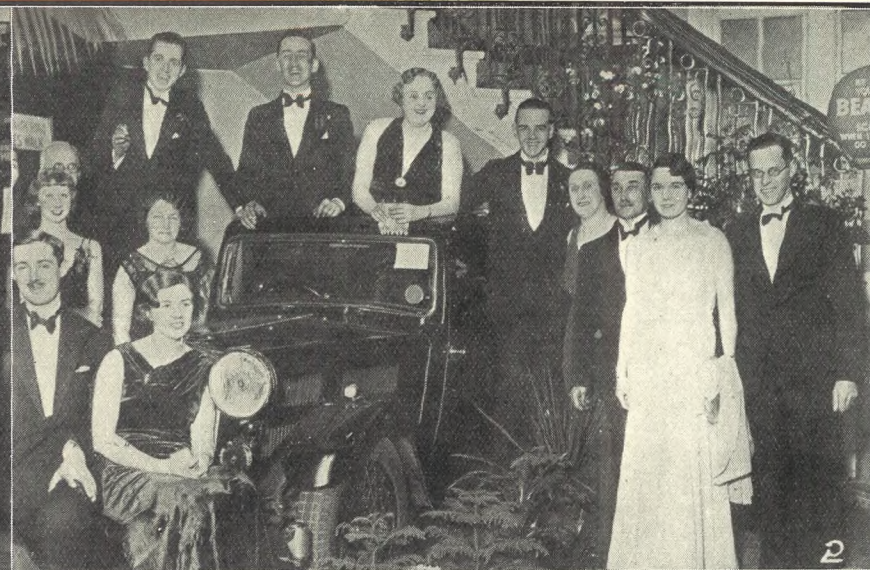

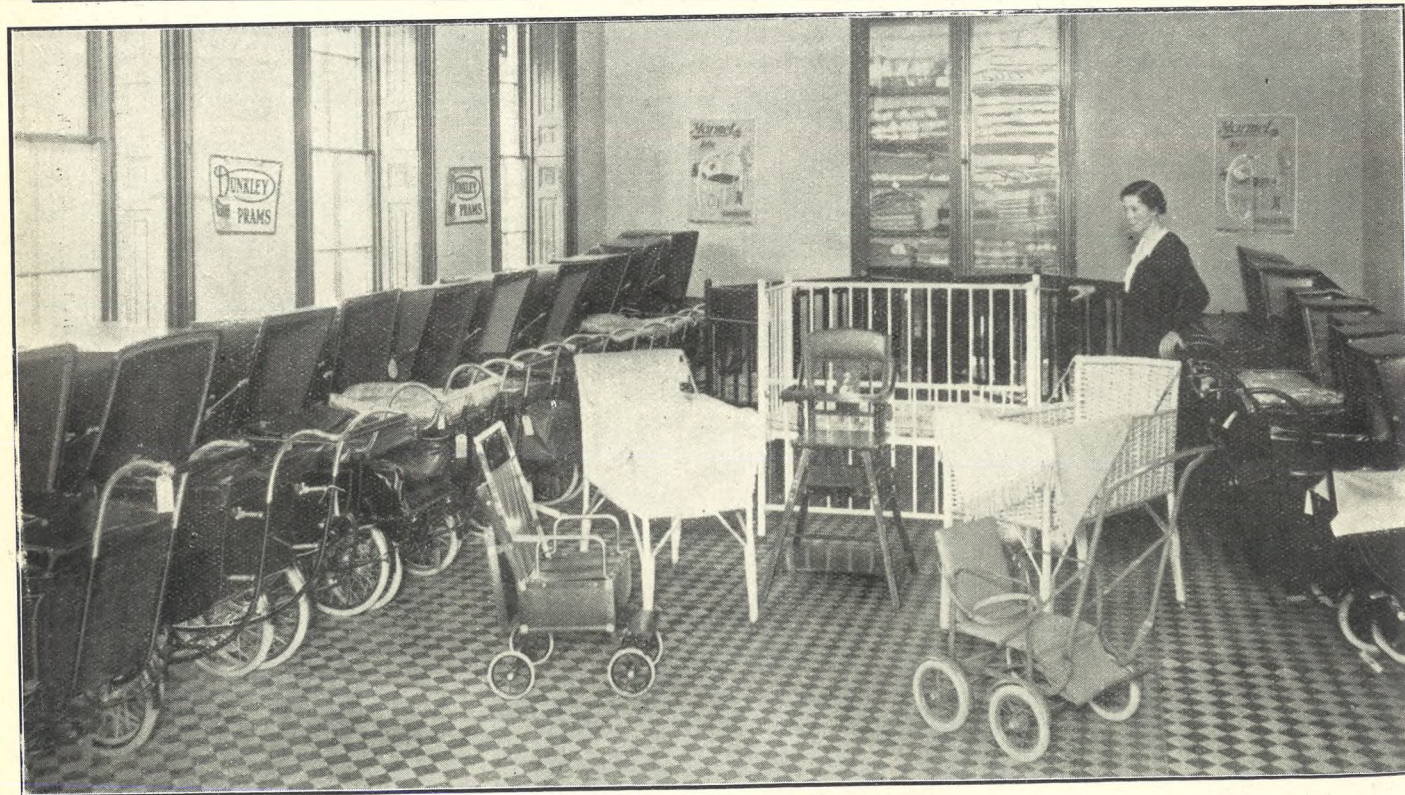

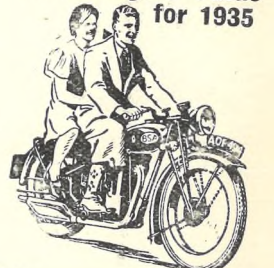

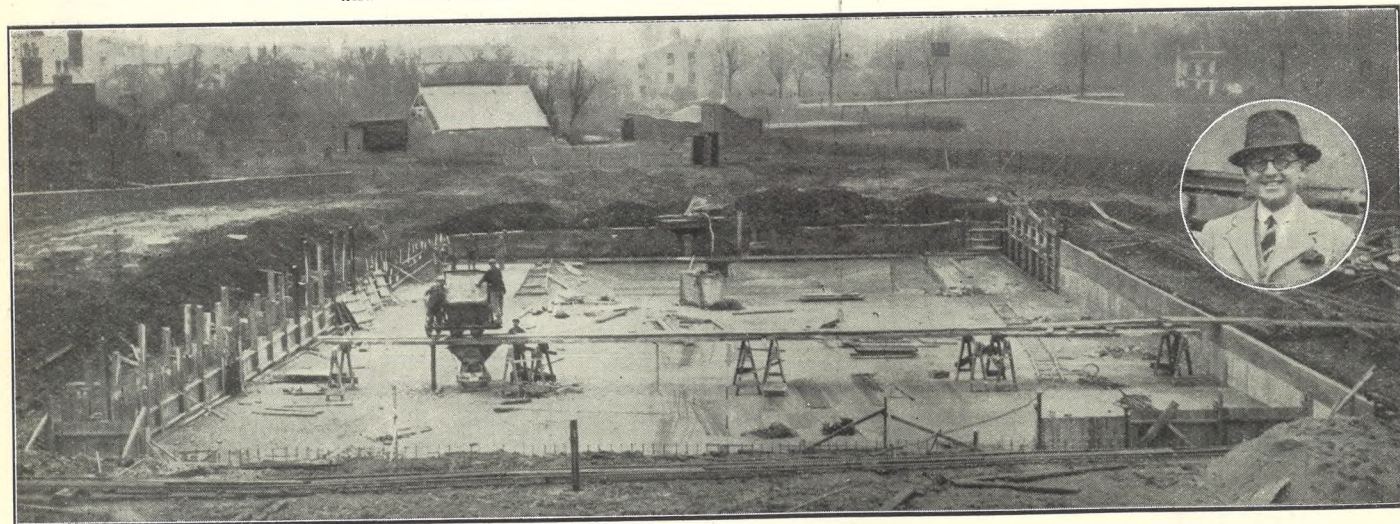
