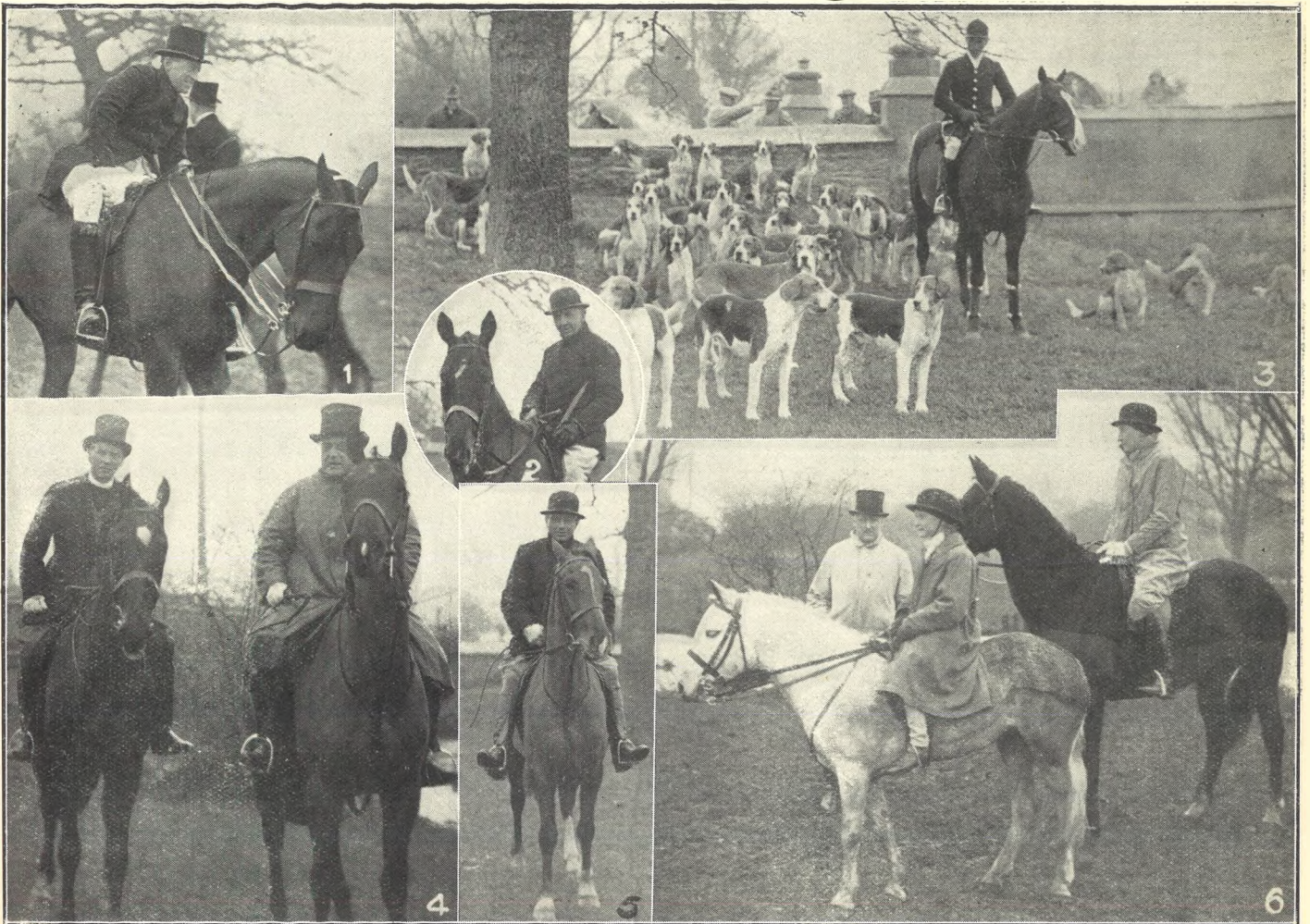

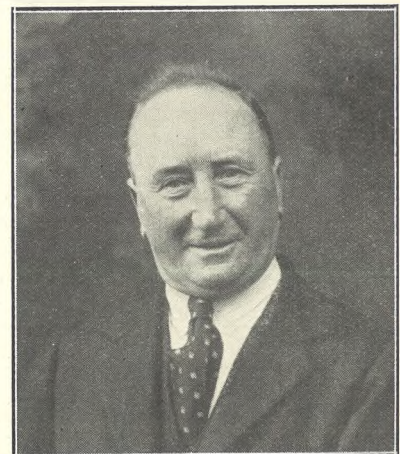

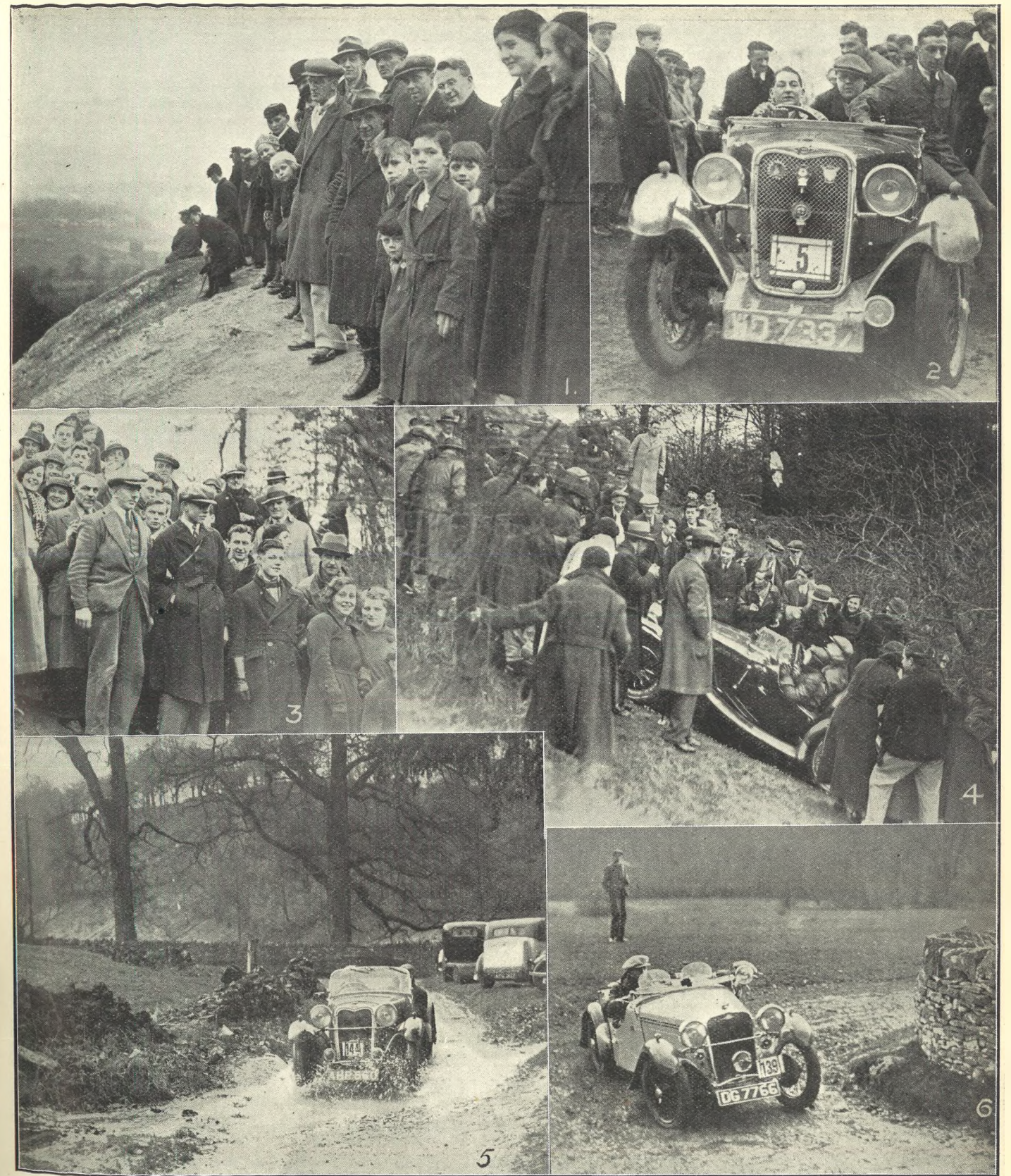

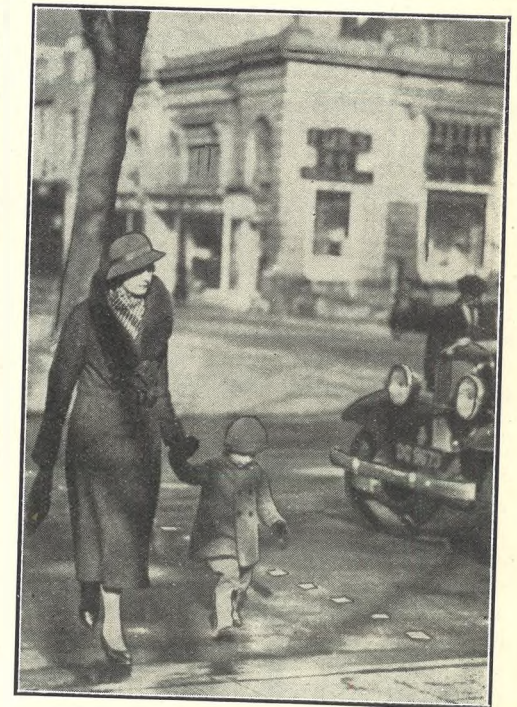

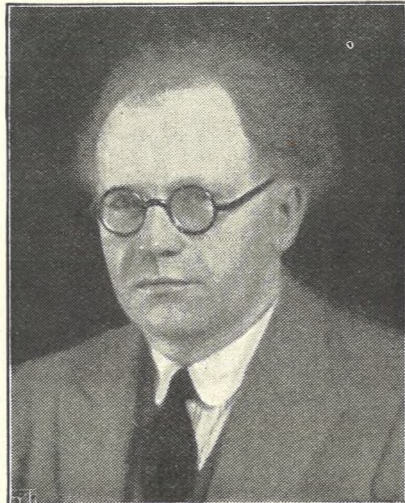

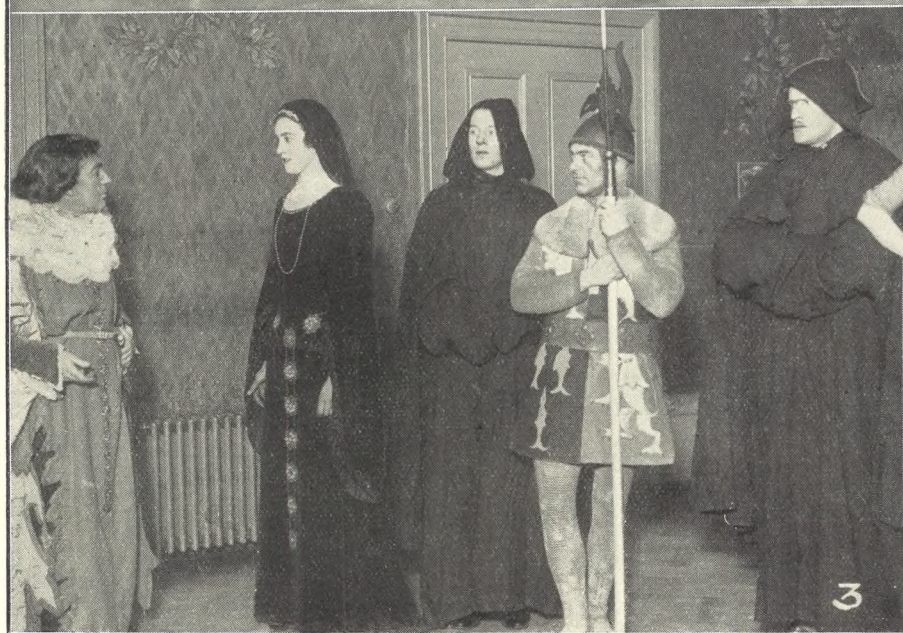

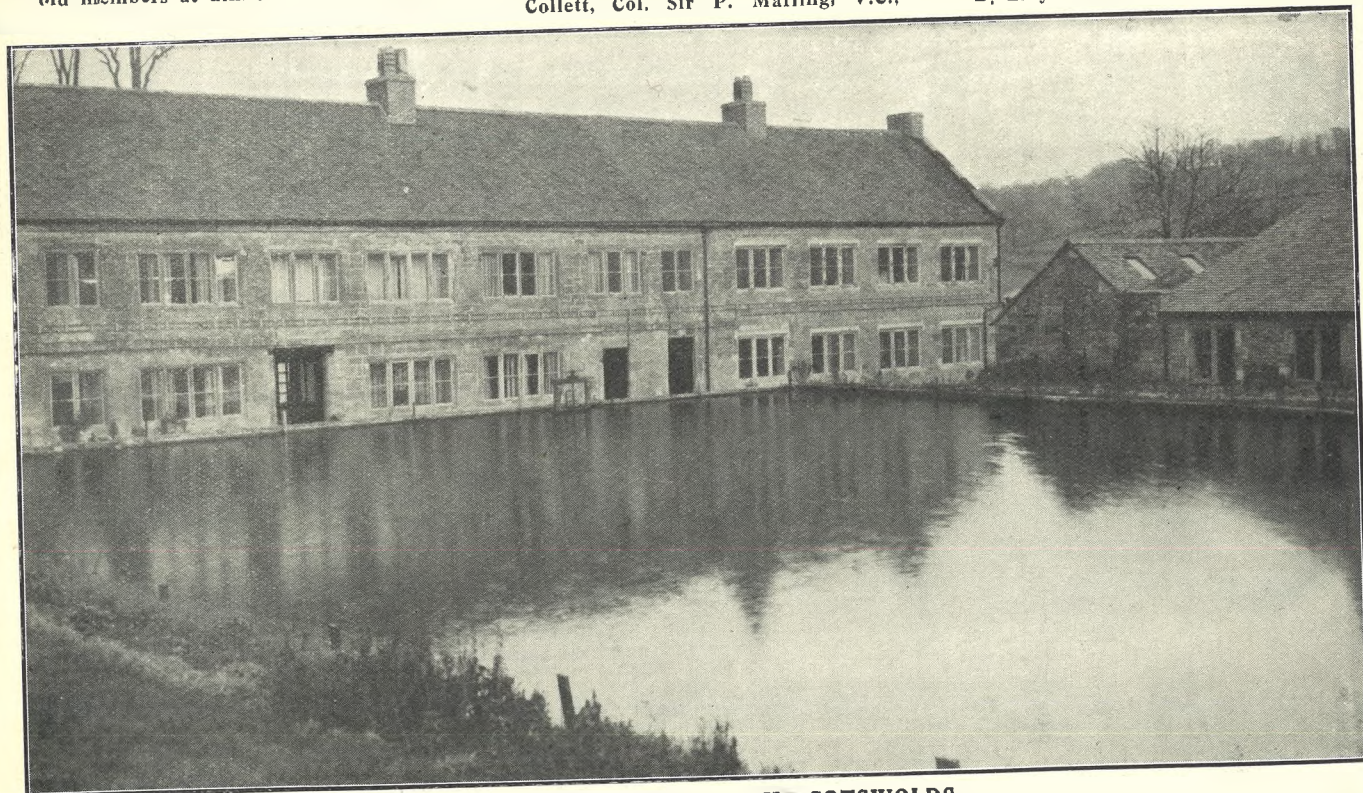

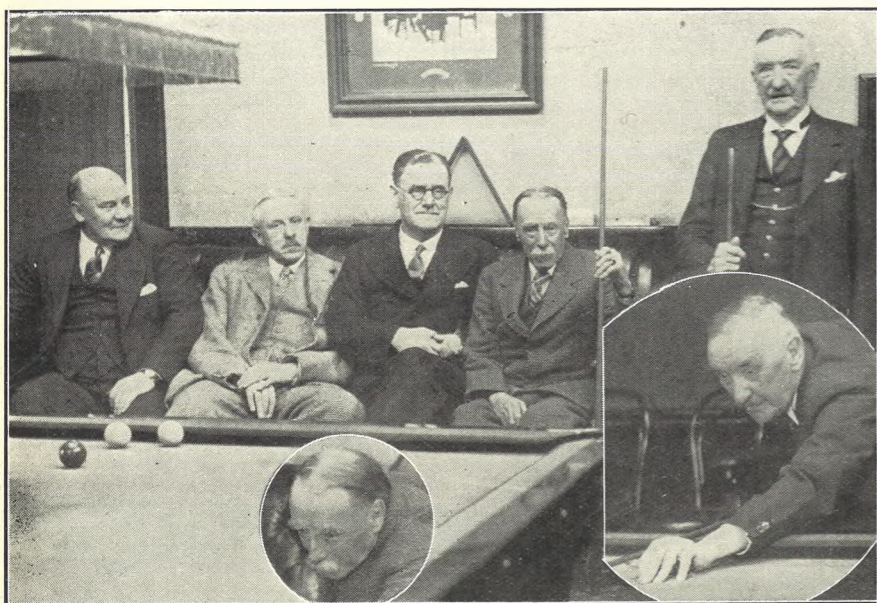

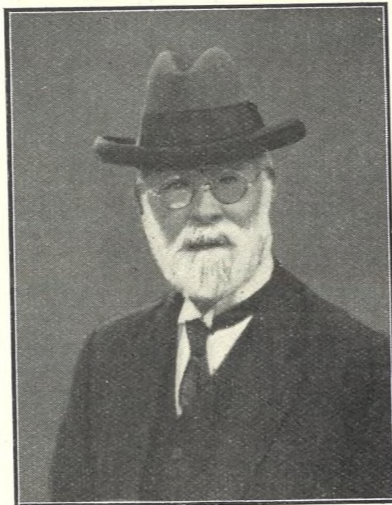

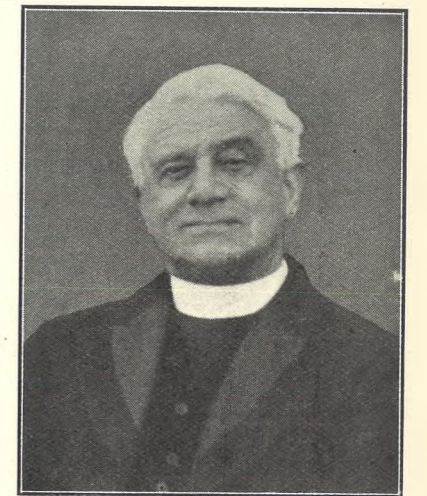

TWO TEWKESBURY OFFICERS RESIGN



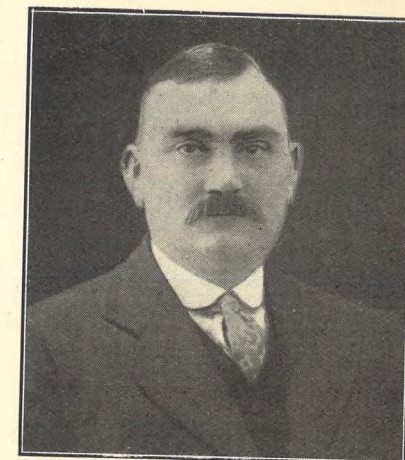
MR. G. R. BARLOW

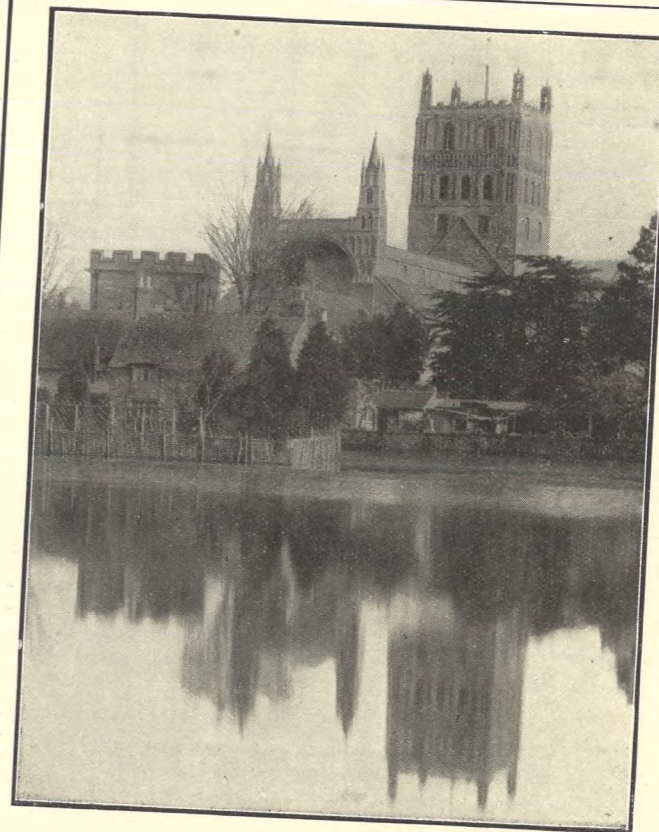

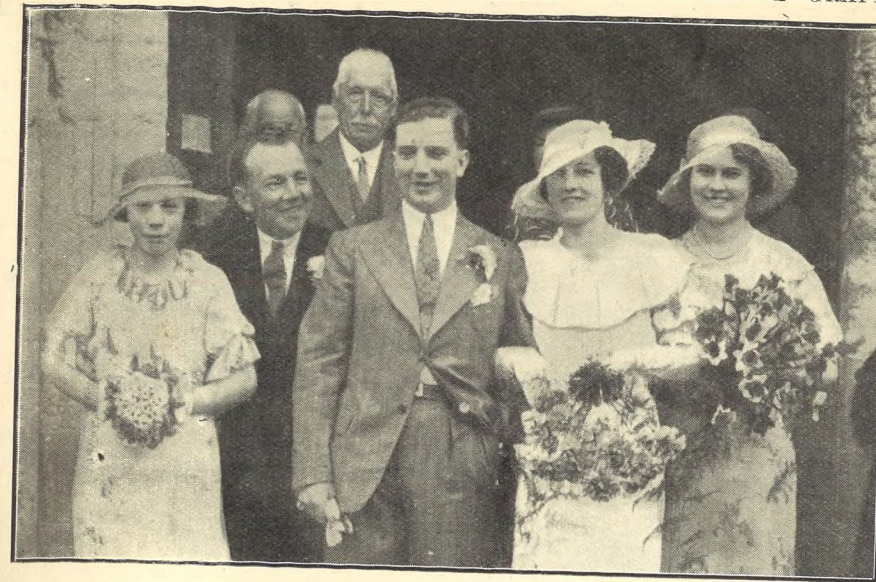
