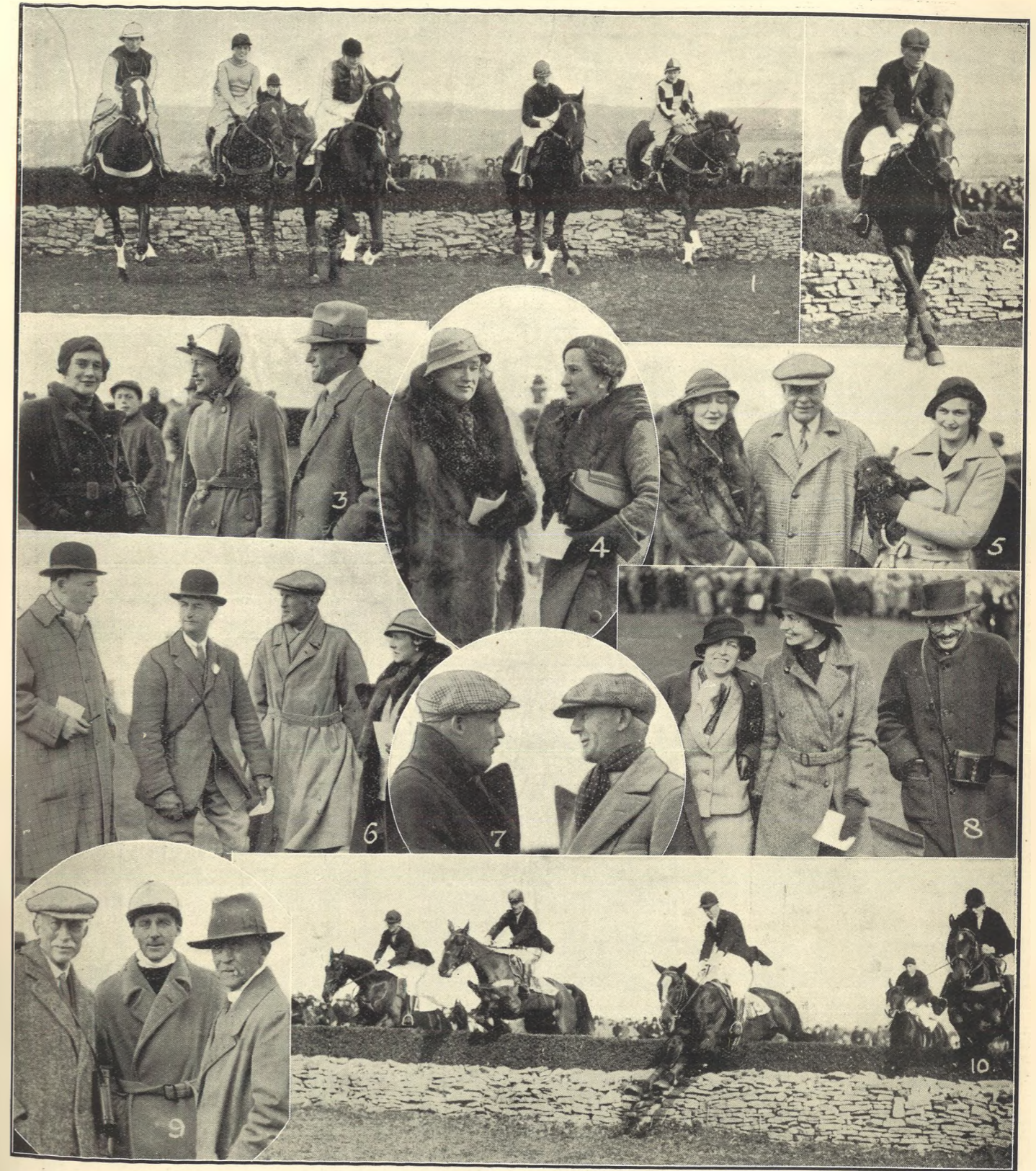


EIGHT RECORDS SET UP AT CHELTENHAM GRAMMAR SCHOOL SPORTS

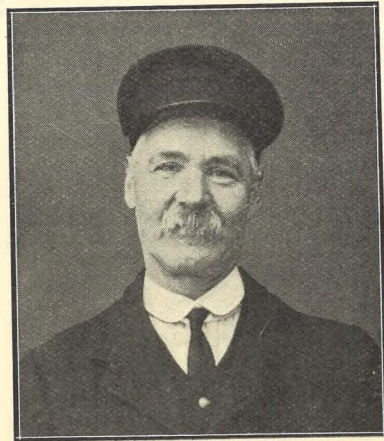

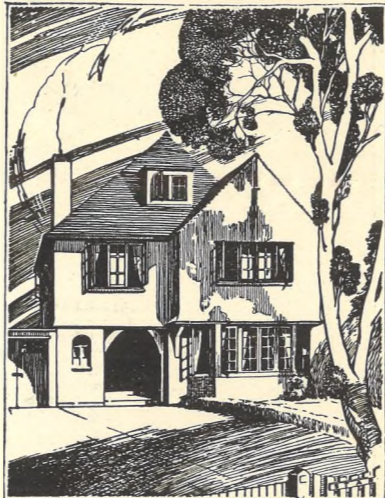

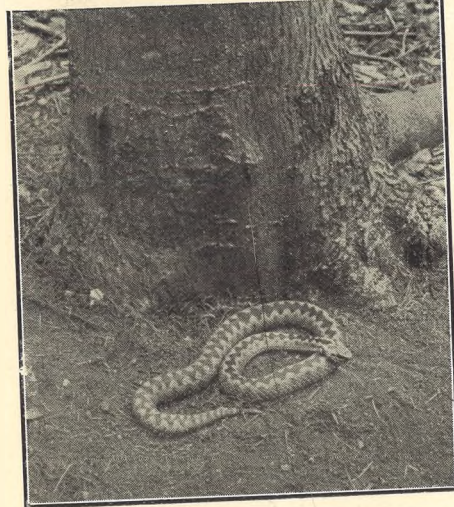
CHELTENHAM GOLDEN WEDDING

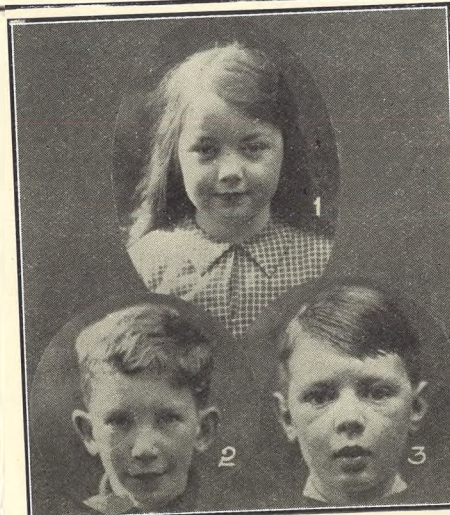
