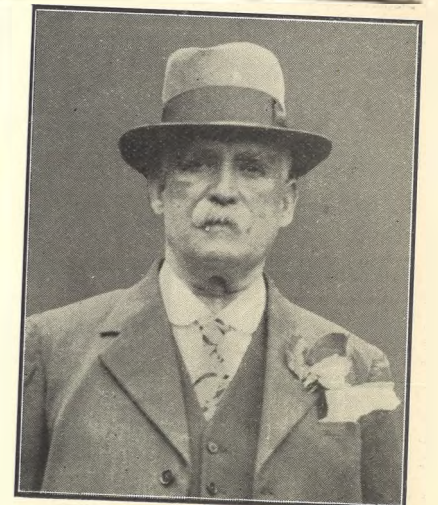

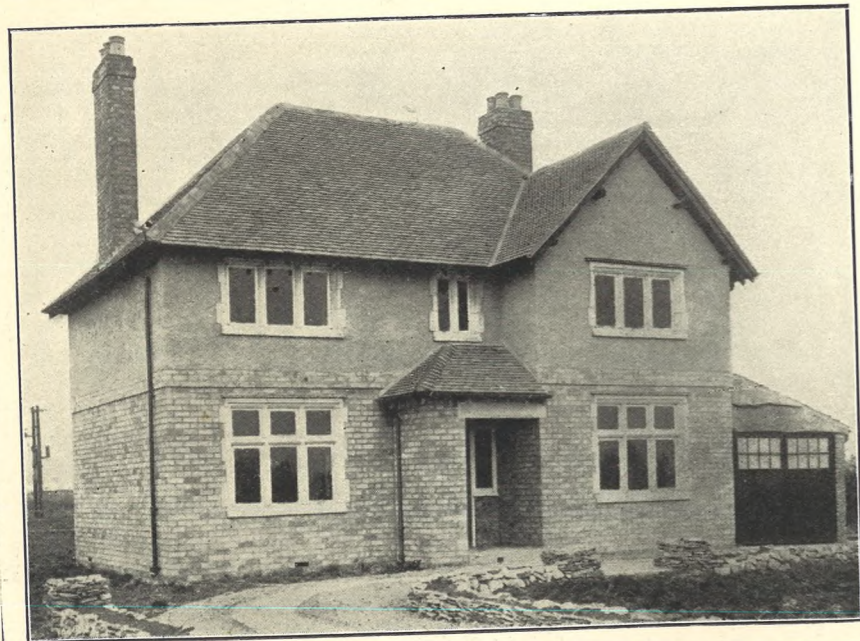

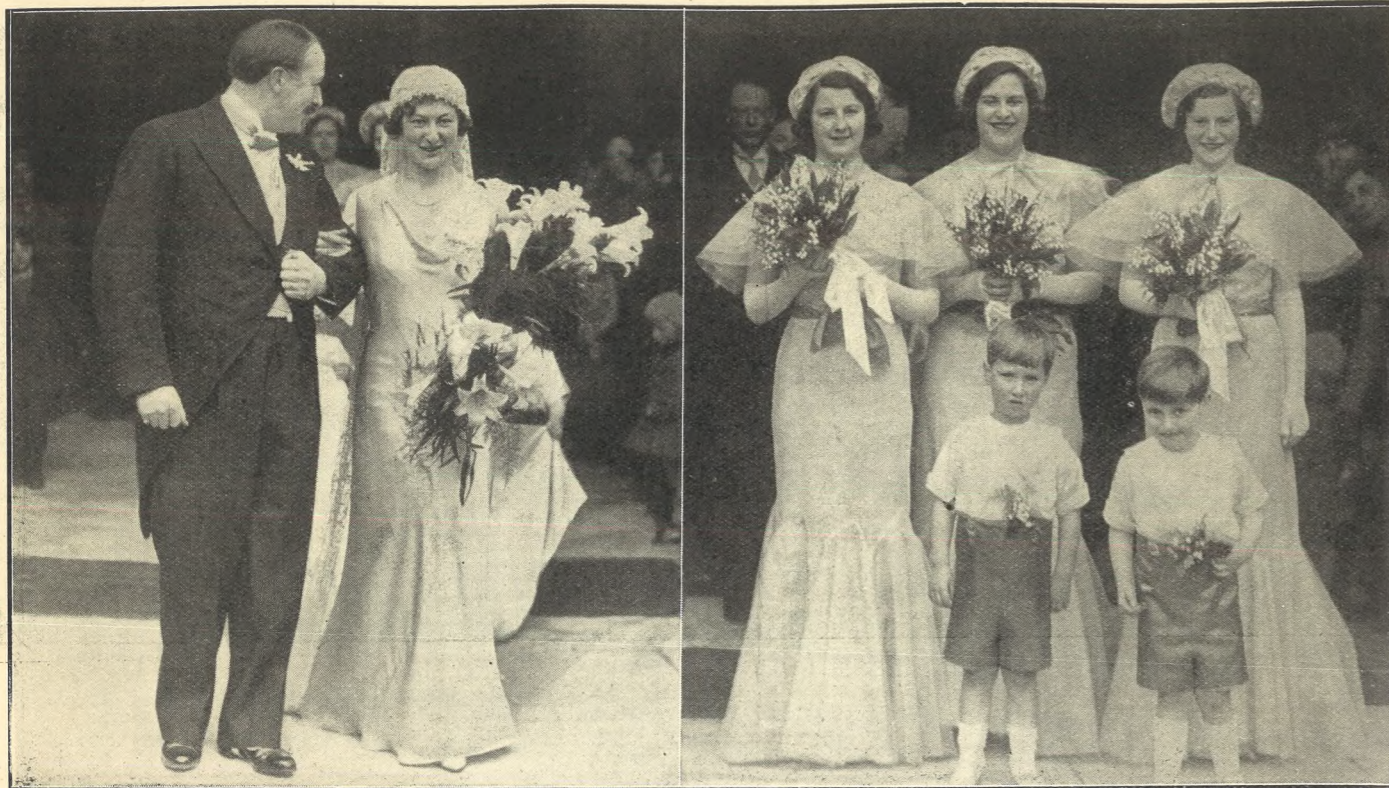


KITTENS' 400-MILE JOY-RIDE

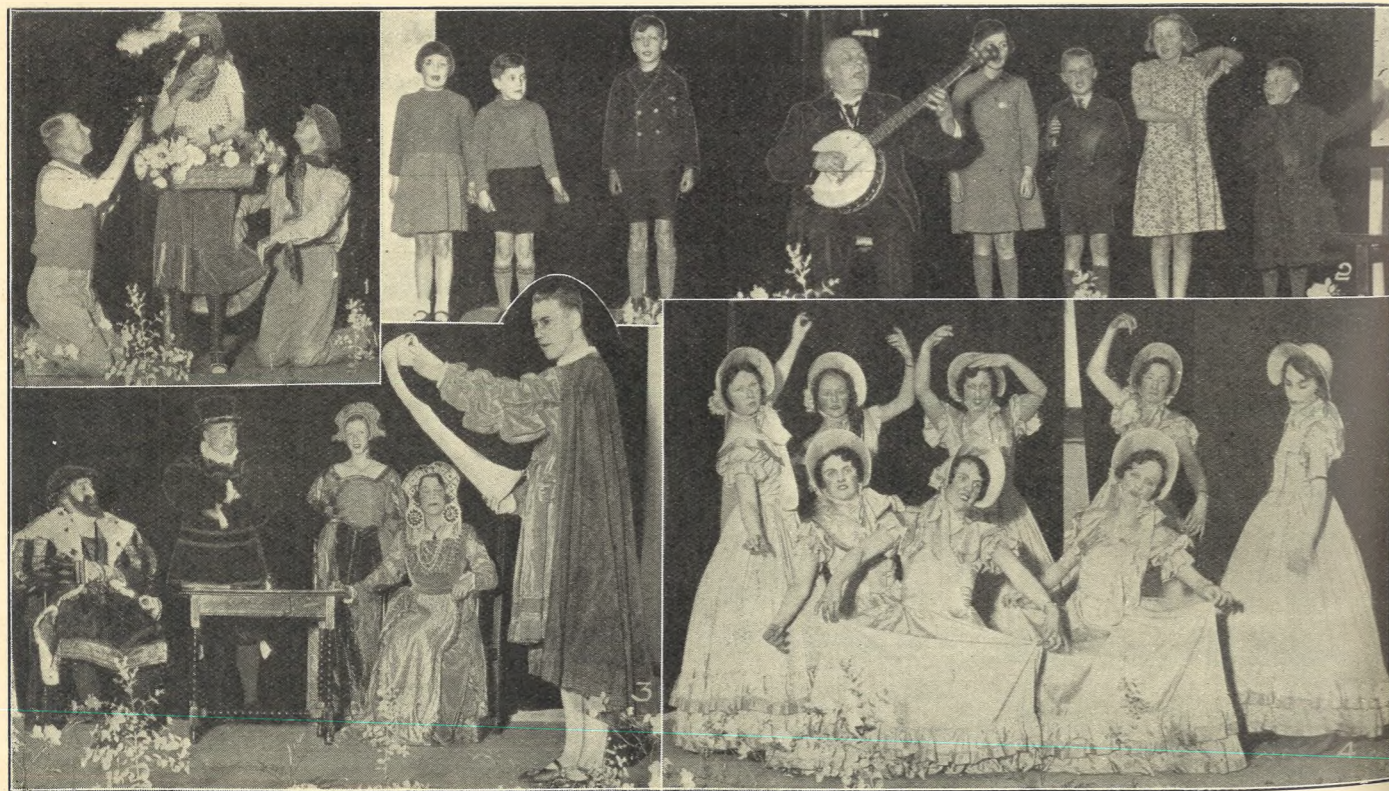

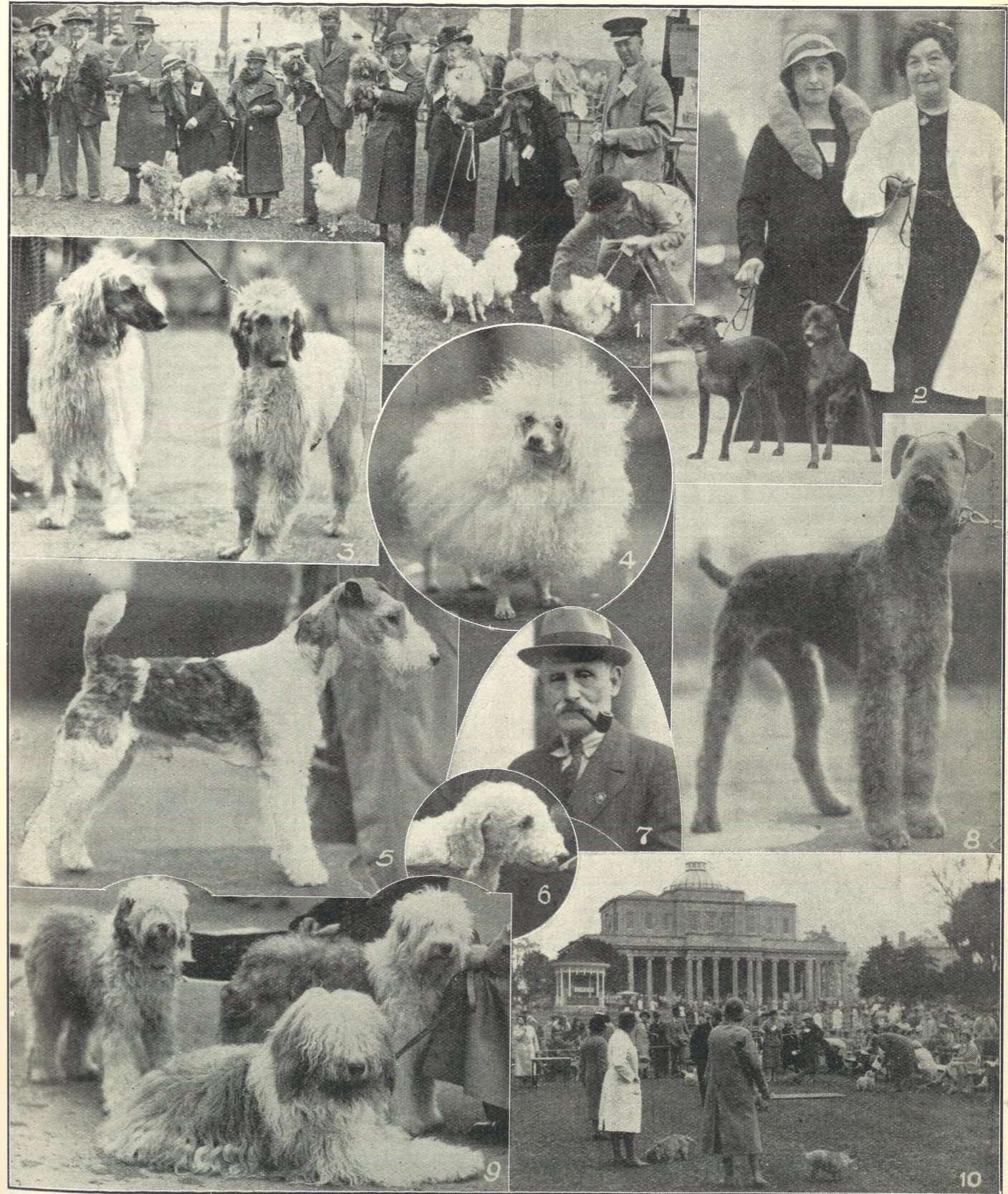

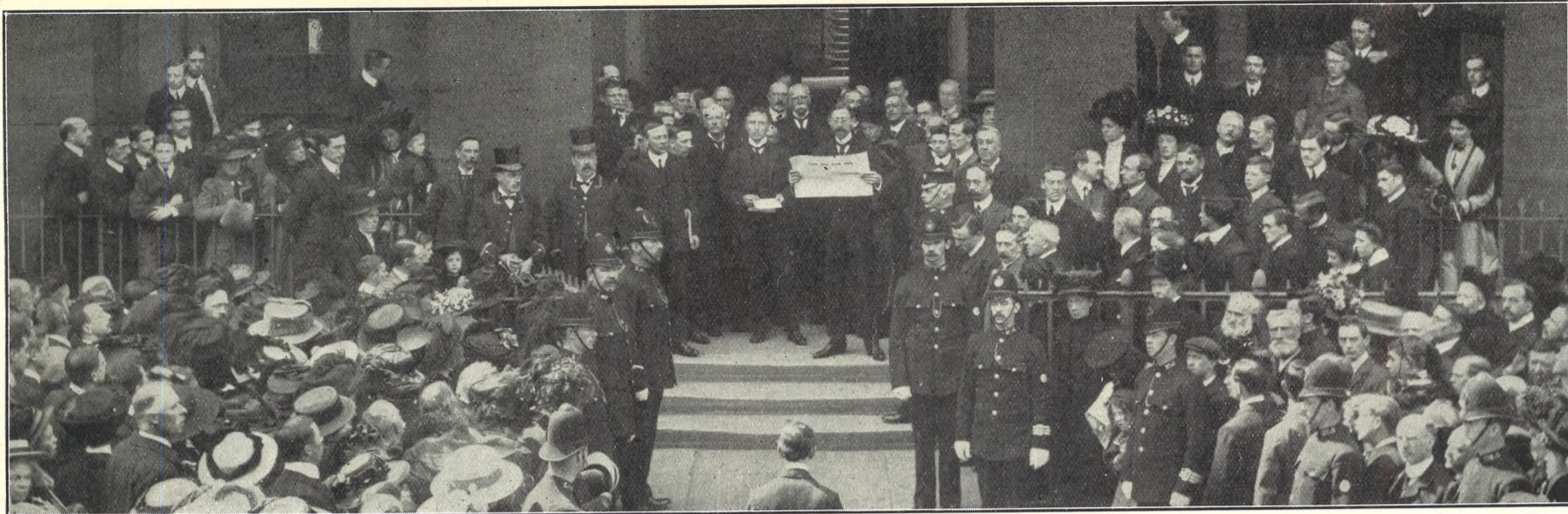


BIGGEST ONE-DAY DOG SHOW EVER HELD IN ENGLAND

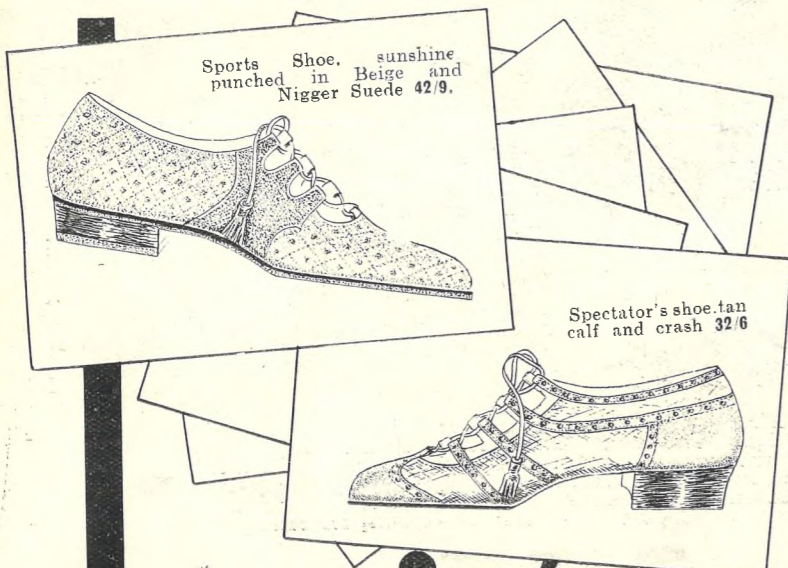

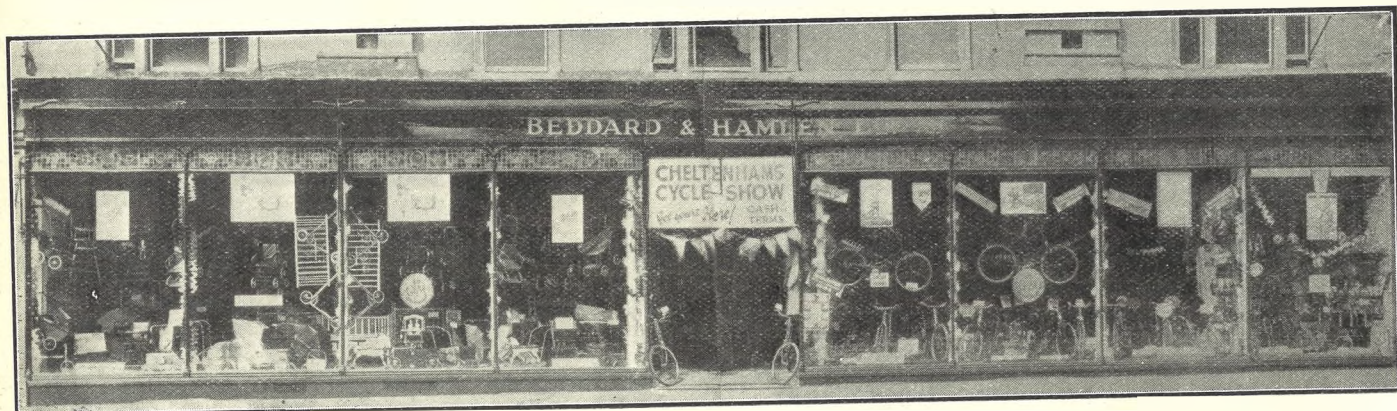

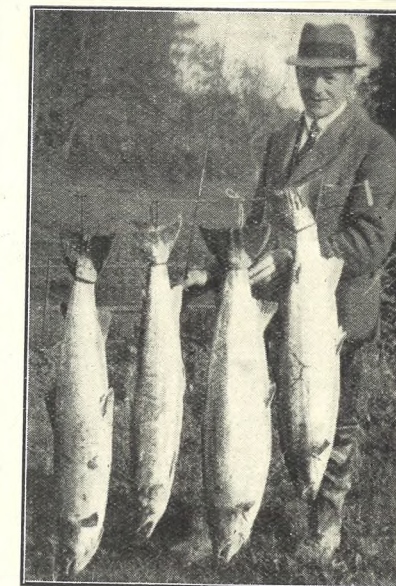

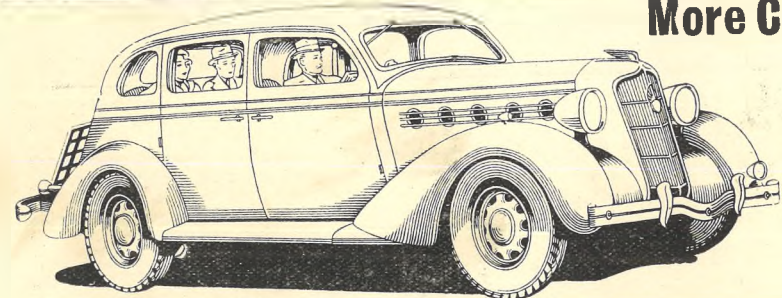

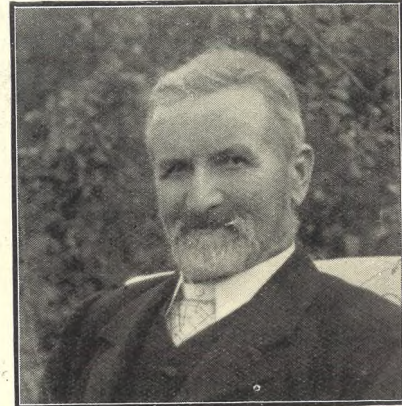

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—BRIMPSFIELD AND CAUDLE GREEN

Brimpsfield is a secluded parish on the Cotswolds, only seven miles from Cheltenham, and about 1½ miles from Birdlip, on a by-road off the Birdlip-Cirencester road. It was a much more important place in early Norman times than it is now. Near the church are the foundations of a castle, anciently belonging to the Giffard family; which was destroyed by Edward II. on his march from Cirencester to Worcester. It had four towers and was of considerable strength. Its then owner, John Giffard, known as John the Rich, was taken prisoner at Boroughbridge, and afterwards executed at Gloucester as a traitor. There was also an Augustinian Priory here, a cell of the Abbey of Fontenay. The nave of the church is supposed to have been part of the priory.

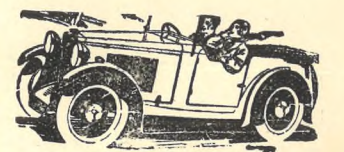

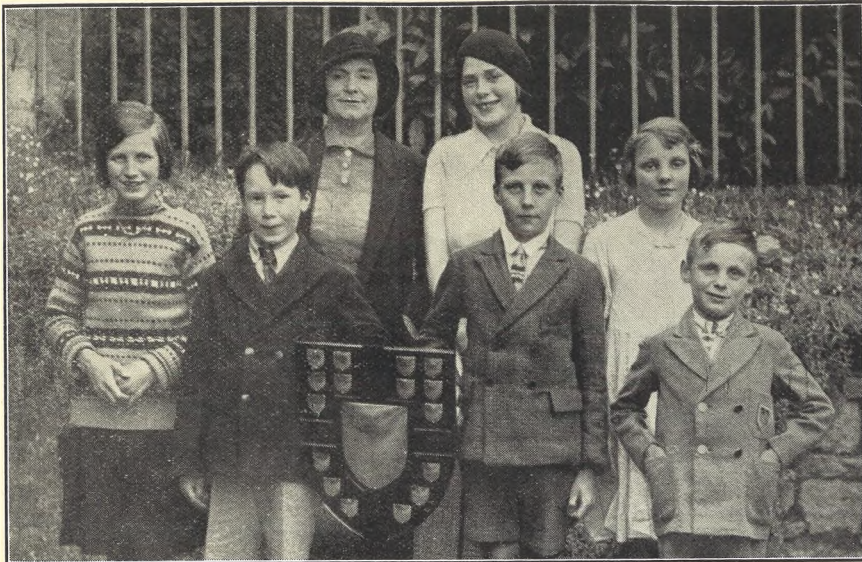
