



MEDICAL OFFICERS WITNESS CLEAN MILK DEMONSTRATION

In connection with the county conference of the Maternity and Child Welfare group, about 30 Medical Officers of Health from all parts of England and Wales attended a clean milk demonstration at Staverton Court Farm on Friday last, and witnessed with great interest a demonstration of the scientific and hygenic methods employed, which Mr. R. B. Prettejohn (proprietor) had arranged in conjunction with Mr. E. Rea, the county agricultural organiser. The Staverton Court herd consists entirely of pedigree Tuberculin Tested Jerseys, and all milk marketed is Grade A (T.T.) under Ministry of Health certificate. The greatest care is taken to ensure absolute purity of supply, the cows being milked by machinery and the whole process of cooling (to ensure good keeping quality) and bottling is carried through automatically. 
