

EXCAVATIONS AT NOTGROVE LONG BARROW

Important and interesting discoveries have been made during the second seasons excavations at Notgrove Long Barrow by Mrs. E. M. Clifford, of Witcombe, assisted by a party of Cambridge graduates and others. The sections which were excavated were open for public inspection on Saturday, and provided a rare opportunity for seeing the real structure and nature of the Cotswold long

Bottom (left).—A splendid example of the dry walling forming the outer edge of the Barrow, which curves round to make a horned entrance at the East end. This walling was placed here perhaps 4,000 years ago by ancient Britons.












CHELTENHAM FROM THE AIR, NO. 3.—A CENTRAL VIEW: PARABOLA ROAD AND LADIES COLLEGE






