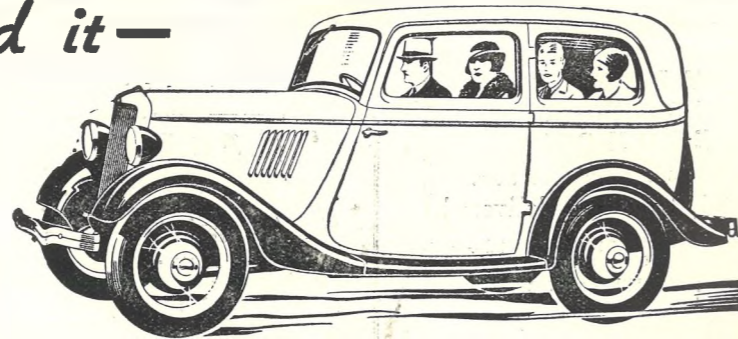

PRETTY TWYNING WEDDING

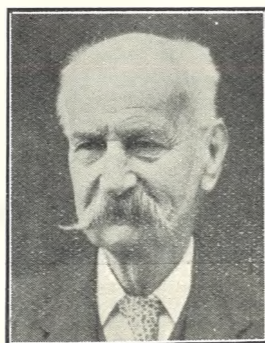

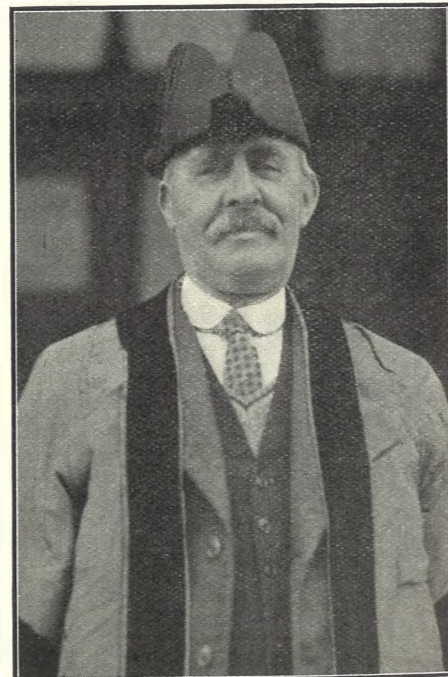

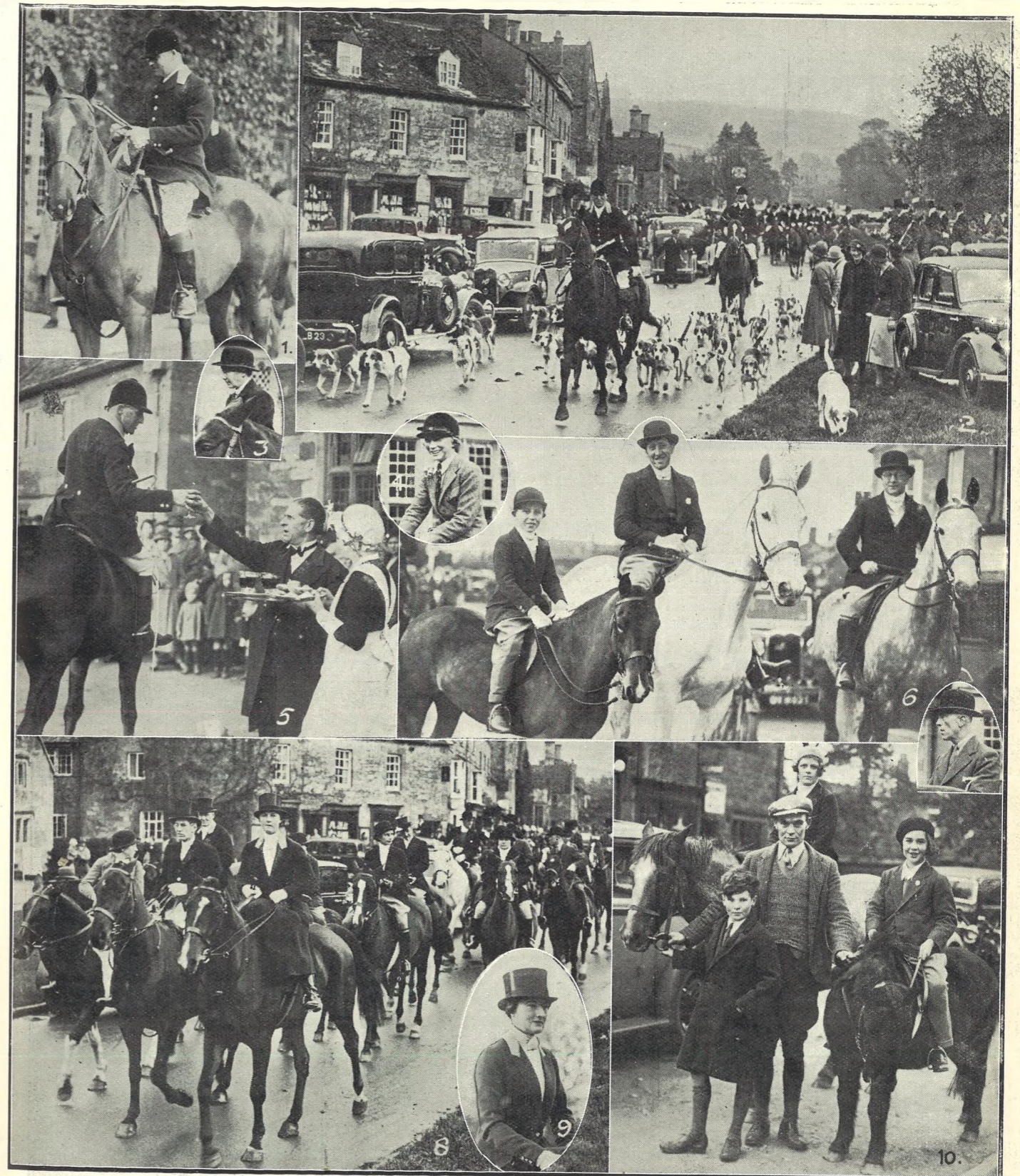


FOX-HUNTING CENTENARY MEET AT LOWER SWELL

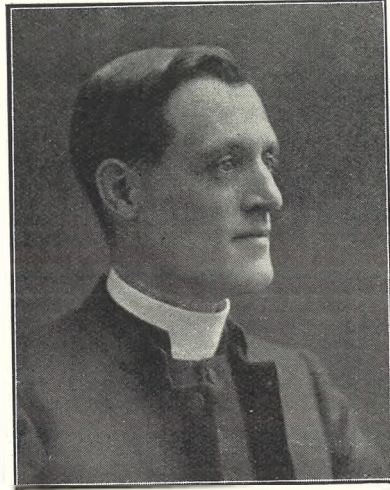

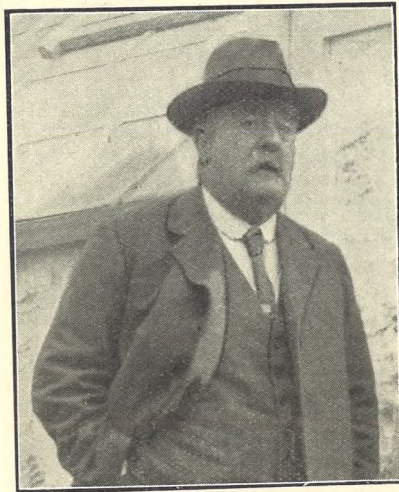

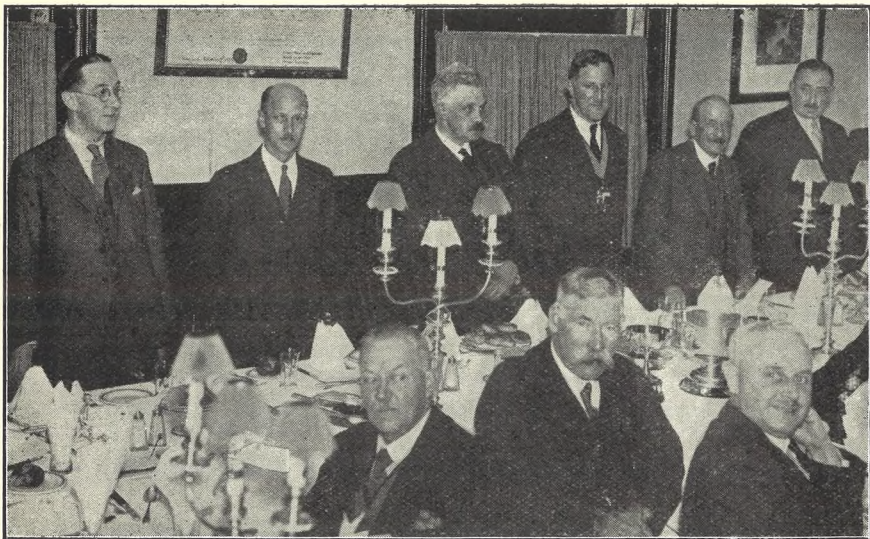

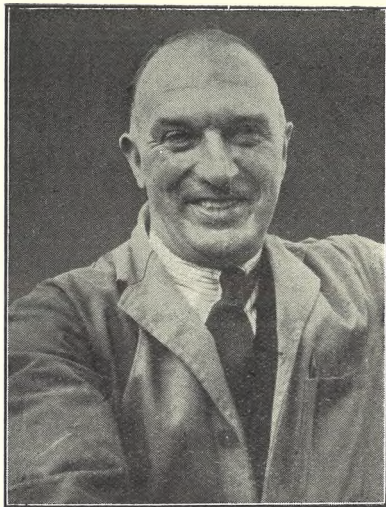

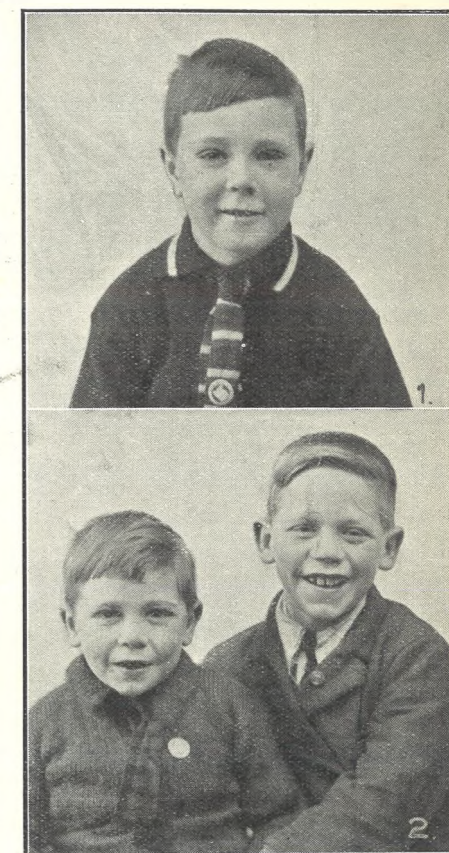

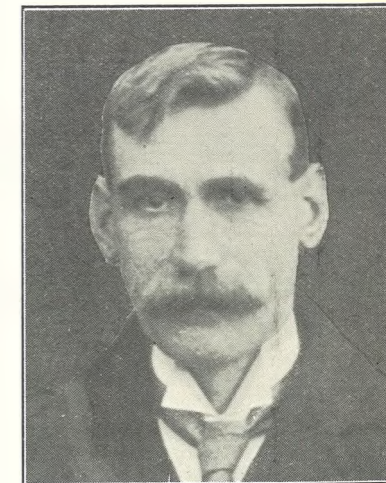

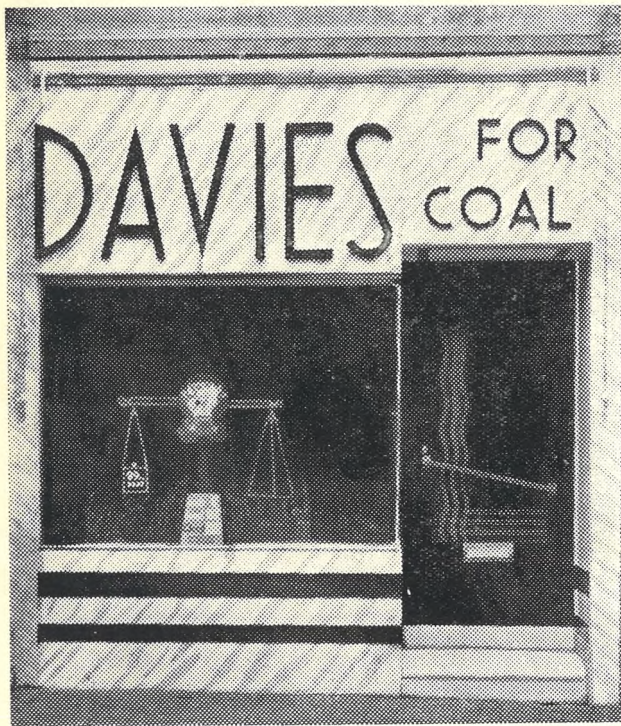
