FLOOD SCENES IN GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—BOURTON-ON-THE-WATER, TEWKESBURY, ASHCURCH AND CHELTENHAM

During the week-end torrential rain has fallen in this district and vast tracks of land have been water-logged and flooded—some from surface water and some from the overflow of the Avon and Severn.

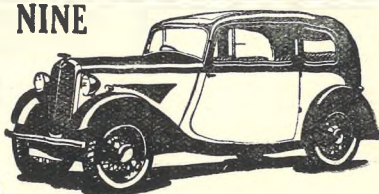

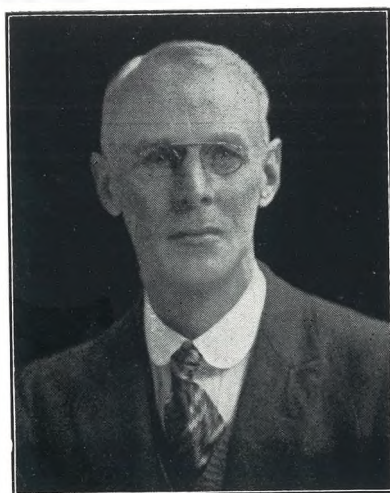

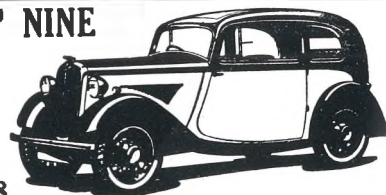

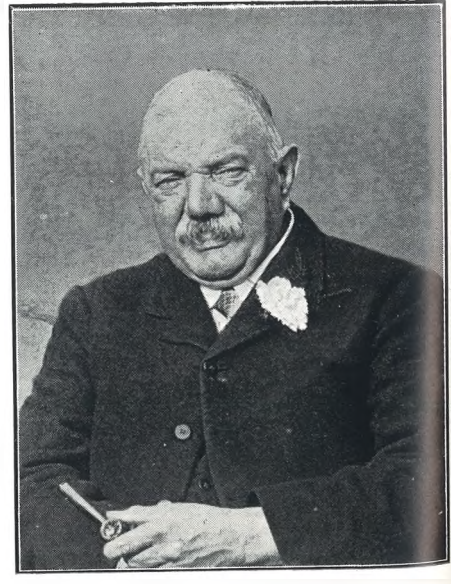

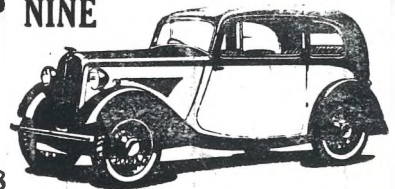

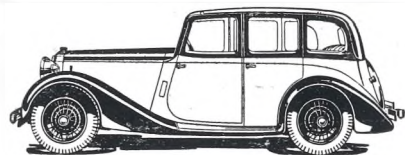

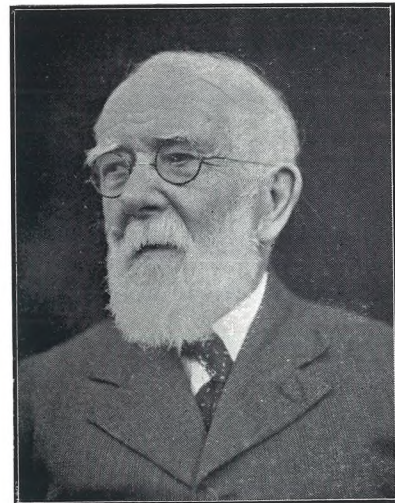

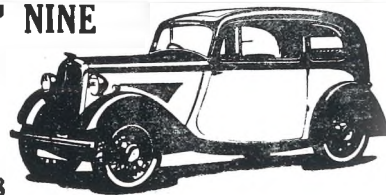

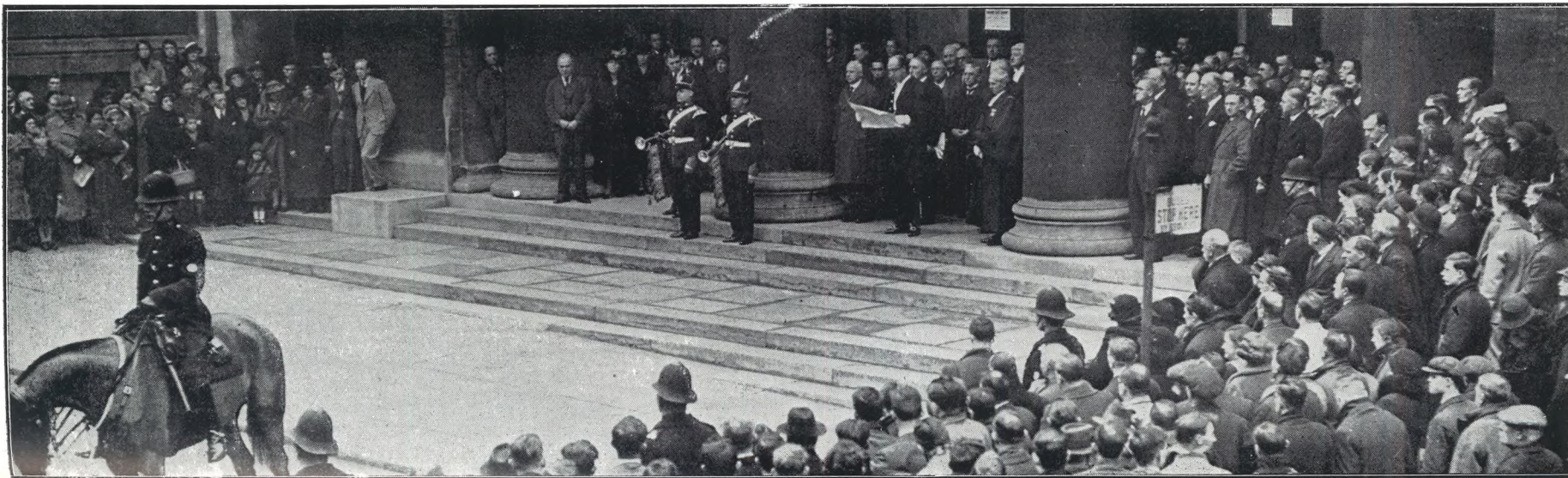

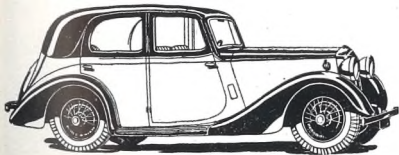
