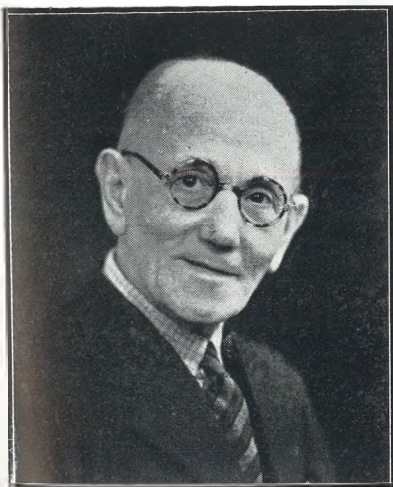


INDUCTION OF THE REV. R. H. SUTCH AT ST. STEPHEN'S, CHELTENHAM

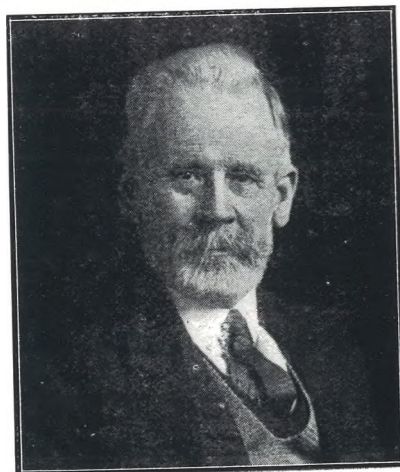

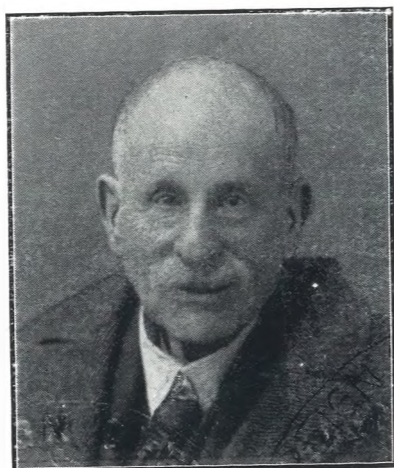

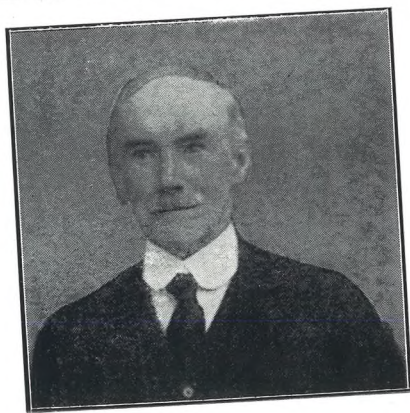

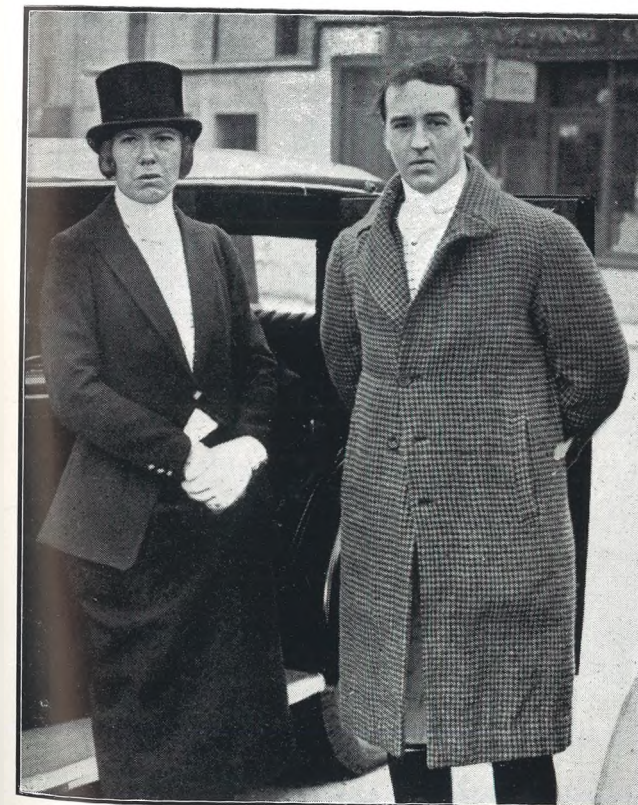

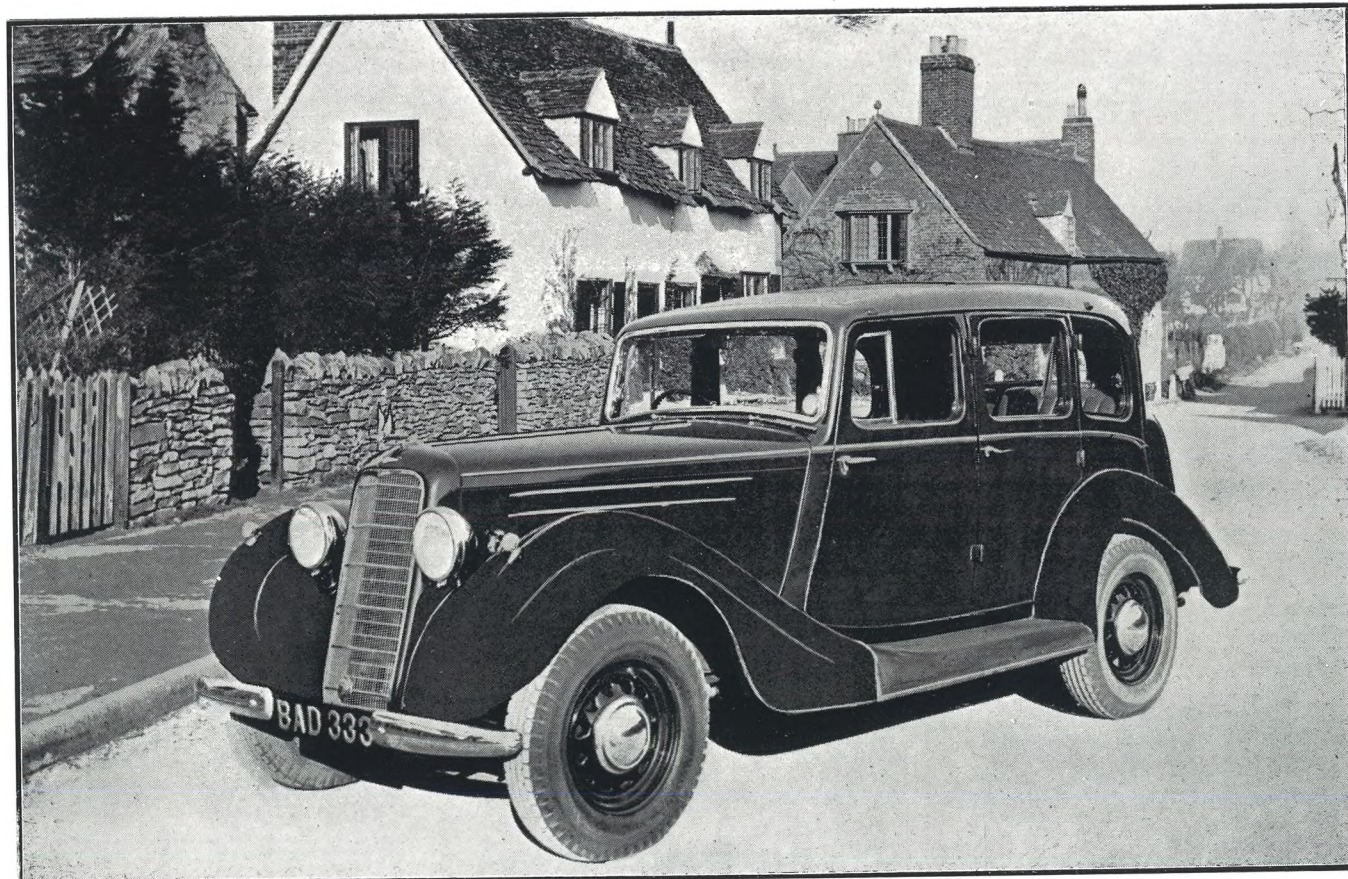

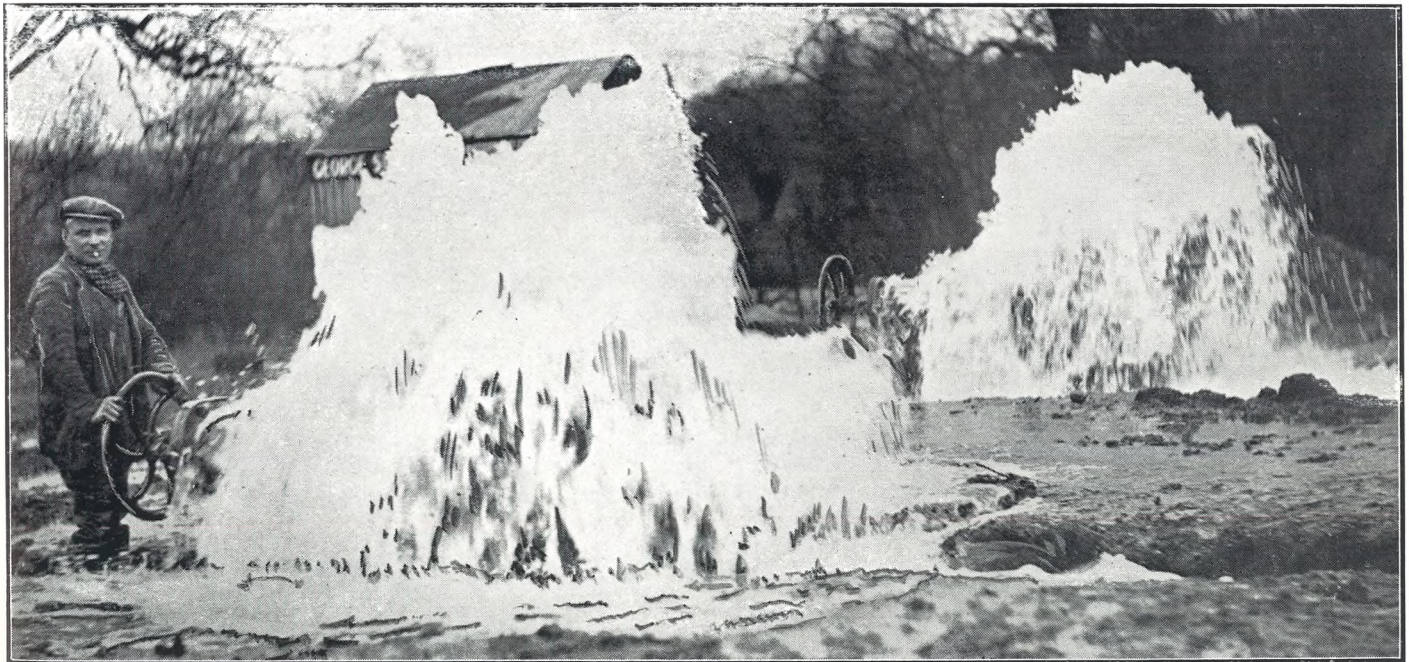
