









MODERN BUILDING METHODS IN CHELTENHAM

Work is proceeding apace on the preparations for erecting the second part of Messrs. Shirer and Haddon's new building in the Promenade. A dozen feet below road level the foundations are now being laid down—these consisting of 9 inches of slack concrete at the bottom, then a double layer of rubberoid, and, above that, an 18 inch thickness of reinforced concrete raft. Our picture shows the iron binding—technically the "raft"—being laid down preparatory to the concrete being put on. The two well-like arrangements seen in the foreground, which have excited interest amongst lookers on, are two of the places prepared for the tremendous stanchions which will carry the weight of the building. On the righthand side of the picture can be seen the remains of cellars, which extend under the path and are. of course, a relic of the time when all this position was either private houses or single shops. Incidentally, during the excavations several old wells have been found, which were evidently the water supply before the days of water mains and taps.






