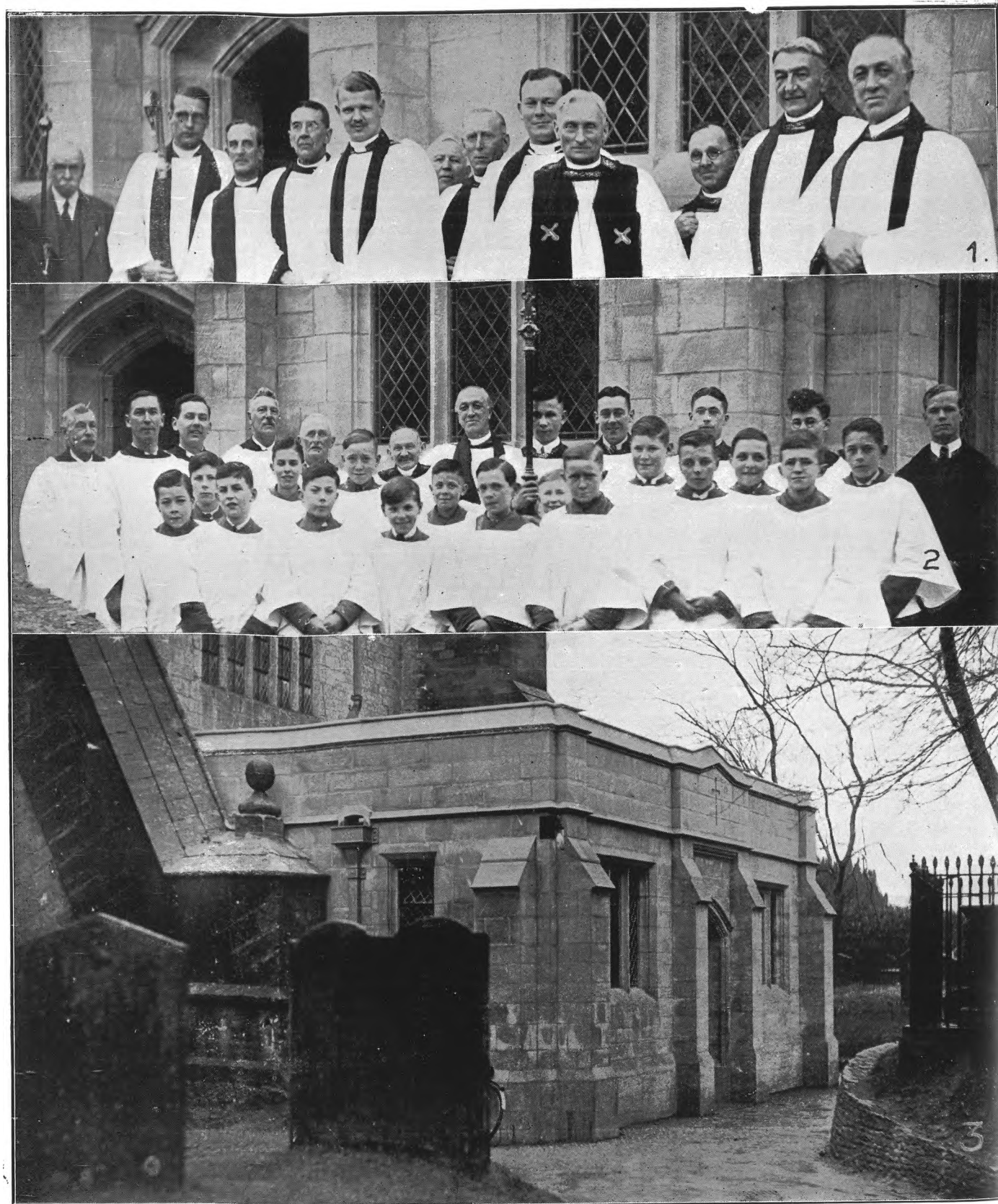

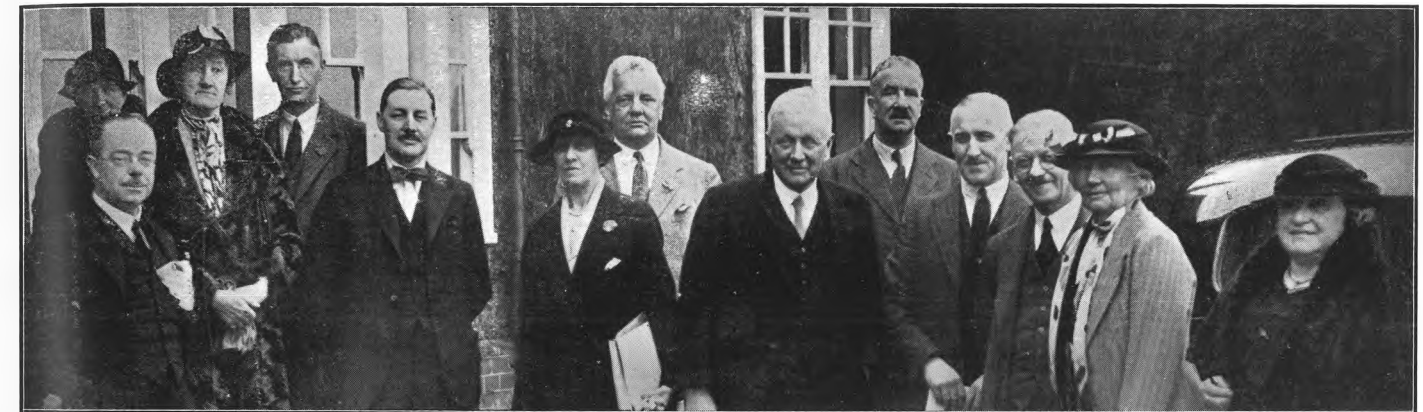

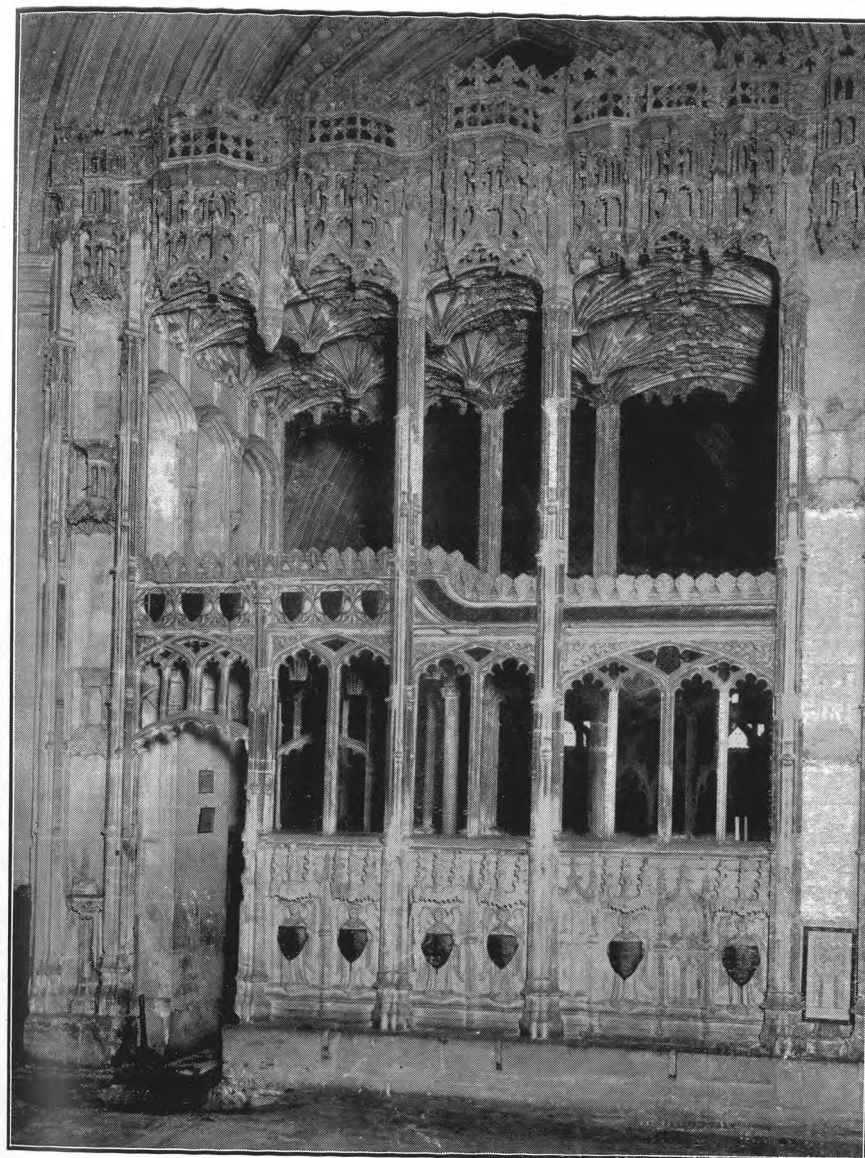

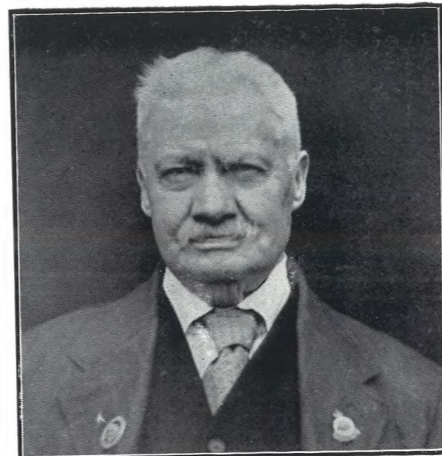

**HARMONICA COMPETITION WINNERS**

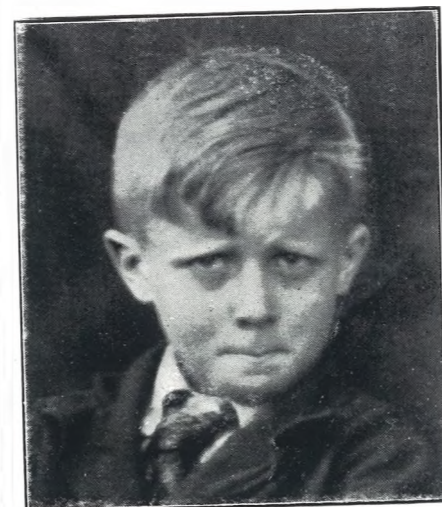
