



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BEAUTIFUL LIGHTING EFFECTS

The streets of Cheltenham and many of its best-known buildings and gardens have provided a most beautful sight every evening this week, for special lighting arrangements were made in connection with the visit of the Association of Public Lighting Engineers. Many of the principal thoroughfares were illuminated by latest methods, and the week has been most convincing in its demonstrations of the possibilities which modern lighting arrangements have placed at the disposal of communities and individuals.

- 1-The Queen's Hotel was illuminated by means of Osira colour floods in red and blue, the General Electric Co., Ltd., being responsible for this very striking effect. Installation load approximately five kilowatts. The General Electric Co were also responsible for the beautiful floodlighting at Cheltenham College (illustrated in the main sheet).
- 2—The ever-enchanting hues of the Promenade Fountain evoked much delighted comment. The work was carried out by the Strand Electric

and Engineering Co., Ltd., 19/24 Floral-street, W.C.2. Wide Angle Flooded Lanterns were used, with Sunray lamps to illuminate the foliage, and Fairyland Striplites in the water. Red, green and blue colours were used, and an automatic motor-driven dimmer was the charg-ing medium.

3—The General Post Office, floodlighted by Ediswan. It looked like ivory tinged with green. Only 5,000 watts were used. The "Ediswan" Com-

pany also lighted the Promenade by means of eleven "Northbury" lan-terns. Escura lamps were used in both cases.

-The Promenade Gardens illumination -The Promenade Gardens illumination was entrusted to Siemens Electric Lamps and Supplies Ltd. They used specially designed reflectors, each with two 300 watt Standard gas-filled lamps and mounted on the trees, throwing up the beauty of these gar-dens very effectively. This firm also did some very effective street light-ind. ing.





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


COUNTY SENIOR CUP-FINAL IN CHELTENHAM





This beautiful oak reredos is in memory of King George V., who was Lord of the Manor of Patrington. It was designed by Mr. J. Harold Gibbons, M.C., F.R.I.B.A., of Westminster, and the work has been carried out in the Cheltenham workshops of Messrs. R. L. Boulton and Sons. Mr. W. S. F. Harris, the principal of the firm, is to be congratulated on the beautifully intricate and delicate craftmanship displayed in every detail. The reredos is 20 feet wide, 14 feet high with side towers 22 feet high, and the carving and sculpture can be honorably compared with anything executed in England for a very long time. The large figures on each side are st. Patrick and St. George, and the twelve figures between are twelve Northumbrian saints, with a figure of the Blessed Virgin Mary in centre.

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
